Fred J. Imhof March 16, 1900-November 12, 1971

What is now the National Library Of Sports was actually started in 1929 by the late Fred J. Imhof of San Jose.

While working at Libby McNeill & Libby in Sunnyvale where he later became assistant superintendent, Fred was smitten with collecting. "The fellows in the cannery were making 10¢ bets on fights," Fred said, "so I started keeping records of the boxers so I could handicap them better. I had varying measures of success. It wasn't the dime, but the fact that I wanted to win. And, with my love for track, I started keeping records there, and little by little I started. I found a book on this and I found a book on that."

Fred and his wife Lillian would take a month's tour of the states in the fall to poke around bookstores for rare volumes. Lillian would dutifully stay by the car to feed pennies and nickels into the meters.

One of the many complete runs of guides and periodicals in the collection is Spalding's Official Baseball Guide from 1882. Imhof picked up many of the early ones for a dollar or two and now they are worth from \$60 to \$70 each.

Football guides go back to 1894, tennis guides date from 1892, and the basketball series starts with 1902.

After moving several times to secure additional space to store his library, Fred finally felt compelled to spend \$4,500 to erect a building in the backyard of his new home in San Jose. Lillian was delighted because Fred then used only one of the bedrooms for duplicates and the garage for triplicates.

Fred never tried to capitalize on his remarkable collection as he answered questions from all over the world without charge and with tremendous devotion to accuracy.

THE NEED

A national library of sports is something that has been needed in this country for a considerable period of time.

The world is experiencing one of its most trying periods. In many ways, the United States represents a microcosm of the larger world. In the face of political, economic, social, and spiritual turmoil, there are hopeful signs. One of these is represented by the expansion of cultural exchanges between nations otherwise engaged in conflict. Among the examples of cultural exchanges are those involving friendly competition in sports.

THE COLLECTION

Trying to describe the National Library Of Sports collection is like trying to describe the universe—and giving two examples.

There are a total of 145,000 research materials among five principal resources comprising the collection: (1) books, (2) journals and periodicals, (3) annuals such as almanacs and guides, (4) game programs (35,000 for football alone), and (5) clippings from magazines and newspapers. The Library is housed in 2,200 square feet of space in the San Jose Public Library.

THE SERVICES

The primary objective of the National Library Of Sports is to provide research materials for the serious sports scholar and recreation for those interested only in browsing, to disperse information through the printed and audio-visual mediums for members, sportswriters, sportscasters and the general public and to present awards for outstanding writing, sportscasting, sports photography and sports art.

Most questions can be answered by National Library Of Sports personnel with a single phone call and most research can be completed within 24 hours.

THE COVERAGE

The collection is uniquely structured for research with 175,000 index cards and 1,500,000 references. References are expanded daily. There is information on 95 different sports organized according to subject headings ranging from almanacs to yachting. Each sport is a department within itself.

THE SPONSORS

The National Library Of Sports is a non-profit organization sponsored by its members throughout the United States and endorsed by the Greater San Jose Sports Association of Santa Clara County and City of San Jose, California.

RESOLUTION FOR CONGRESSIONAL RECOGNITION
