record with a 65-6¼ toss on one of his two qualifying tries.

Lindgren, who shares the 6-mile world record of 27:11.6 with Billy Mills, failed in a try at the NCAA meet mark with a 28:07 victory over Indiana University's new asphalt track. The meet record is 27:59.2 set last year by Montana's Doug Brown.

Smith's smooth 220 heat victory matched the world 220 mark of :20.2 set by Arizona State's Henry Carr in 1964 but since bettered with a :20 flat clocking by Smith last Saturday at Sacramento.

In Thursday's initial session, preliminaries were held in 15 events and before the day's action was settled, it was evident the flock of defending individual champions were in for a rough time before the meet closes Saturday.

Matson's record-breaking shotput qualifying toss was well ahead of the 63-9¼ best by de-

fending champion Neal Steinhauer of Oregon.

The shotput finals are Friday when Matson also will start a quest for the NCAA discus mark, one of the oldest in the book, with qualifying for Saturday's final in that event.

champions in high hurdler Ron Copeland, Tom Jones in the 220 and the 440 and mile relay teams.

The UCLANS, in dethroning co-champions Southern California and Oregon, didn't require the help of a reversed ruling Saturday on Friday's disqualification of Copeland as winner of the 120-yard high hurdles.

Brigham Young finished second with 33 points, San Jose State was third with 32, followed by Nebraska 30, Washington State 29 and Southern California 28.

The Bruins came strong Saturday after trailing Brigham Young 22-9 after Friday's action.

Big Randy Matson of Texas A & M and tiny Gerry Lindgren of Washington State were double winners. Matson, world record holder in the shot at 70-7¼, shattered the NCAA discus mark with a 197-0 toss Saturday and won the shot with a meet standard of 67-11½ Friday.

Lindgren set a meet three-mile record of 13:33.7 Saturday, and won the six-mile Thursday but failed in a record try.

In all, for NCAA records were established and one tied and a whopping total of 10 individual champions were dethroned. None of the six defending champions in action Saturday repeated.

Stanford's Bob Stoecker, defending title-holder in one discus, was third at 182-5.
