

COACH BUD WINTER

The man with the winning habit—Lloyd C. (Bud) Winter—is now in his 22nd year as head track coach at San Jose State. Over the past two decades he's turned out champion after champion; toured the world conducting clinics, coaching and consulting written training books and made a film for world-wide use on sprinting.



In 18 of his 22 seasons at SJS the Spartans have scored in the NCAA championships including a present string of 10 straight years.

He's turned out 12 individual and two relay national champions, eight Olympic performers over the past five games, three runnerup teams in the NCAA championships, two runnerup teams in the USTFF championships and so forth.

A highlight of Bud's career came in 1960 when he was selected as an assistant coach for the U.S. Olympic track team.

Recently he's been appointed a consultant in track to the Mexican Organizing Committee for the 1968 Olympics and held a similar position during Japan's 1964 games.

He spent last summer conducting clinics and coaching for the Rumanian government and visited the athletic federations and Olympic committees of Yugoslavia, Denmark and Switzerland.

In 1964 Winter was host of the international coach's conclave at the Tokyo Olympics and was one of four coaches honored for his contributions to track with an Olympic gold medal.

Bud is a past president of the American College Track Coaches Association and in 1956 was the chairman of the first International Track Coaches Clinic. He has represented the State Department on a world-wide tour during which he devoted much time conducting clinics in India.

Winter has written four books titled "Rocket Start", "Jet Sprint Relay Pass", "So You Want to be a High Jumper," and "So You Want to be a Sprinter". He also has a color film on sprint training techniques in circulation.

Before coming to San Jose State, Bud had almost perfect records at Watsonville High and then—Salinas JC (Hartnell College at present) while coaching both football and track.

COACH MERV SMITH

A "dedicated track nut," San Jose State cross country and assistant track coach Merv Smith begins his second year of college coaching after a meteoric rise.

Smith came to San Jose State as an instructor and coach in 1964.



Previously, he had coached but one year at Lodi High School California.

At Lodi, Smith guided the football squad to a championship season.

He inaugurated a cross country team and also coached the track squad to a championship year.

In high school at Modesto High, California, Smith lettered in football, basketball and track. In his four years at Modesto, he ranked third among letter winners.

Smith spent two years at Modesto Junior College, following high school. A member of the nationally touted 1956

Modesto track squad, he suffered leg injuries and saw only limited action.

After transferring to San Jose State, Smith played varsity end on the 1957 and 1958 football squads.

A year of business proved disagreeable so he returned to San Jose receiving his B.A. in 1960.

Graduate coaching with San Jose track mentor Bud Winter from 1960 to 1962 was his only experience prior to his Lodi job.

At San Jose Smith instructs various activity courses and resistance exercise in addition to track and cross country. He is currently working towards his master's degree.

Last fall's SJS cross country squad went unbeaten in dual meet competition, took eleventh at the NCAA meet and bounced back with a fifth place at the U.S. Track and Field Federation championships.

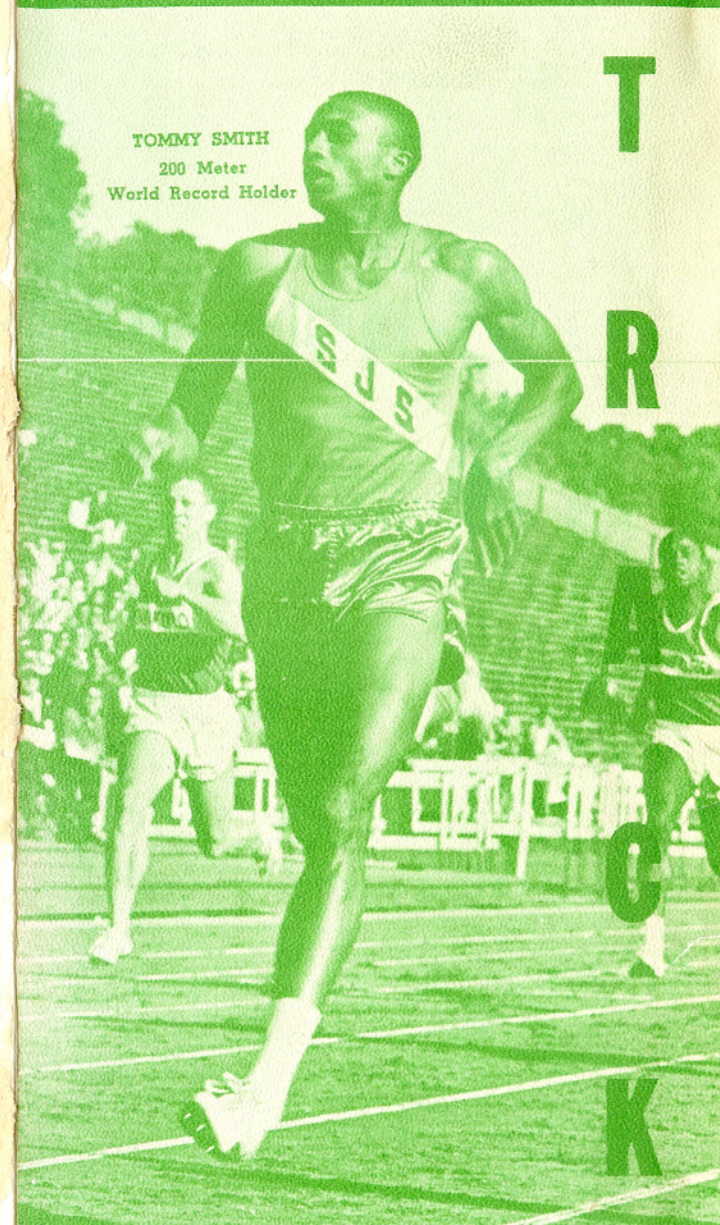

OUTLOOK . . .

An exceptional crop of top individuals head up the San Jose State track team but coach Bud Winter nevertheless needs a quick answer to his depth problem if the Spartans are to be as strong as in previous years.

"The potential is there but until some of the newer faces come around, we won't be quite as tough as in the past," says Winter.

Headliners on the Spartan squad include 200 meter world record holder Tommy Smith (20.0); Wayne Hermen (9.5), the fourth best 220 man in the U.S. last year at 20.6; Craig Fergus (51-7 3/4), second place finisher in the NCAA last season; Ken Shackelford (53.0), top 440 yard intermediate hurdler and mile relay team member; Dick Smith (173-8), 1965 fifth place winner in NCAA hammer throw; 7-0 high jumper Ed Johnson; potential 7-0 high jumpers Terry Doe (6-11) and Gene Zubrinsky (6-10 1/2); discus man Bob Akers (178-0), plus half milers Joe Neff (1:49.0) and Ken Noel (1:49.9).

By event, Winter's 1966 outlook (with best times included):

Sprints—possible world record setting could occur here and in the relays with Smith and Hermen handling the chores. Winter needs fast development from a trio of 9.7 dashmen Jim Twomey, Bill Johnson or Jim Shenberg to give SJS needed meet points.

440—Smith is slated to see action here making the quarter mile a fairly strong and deep event. Tim Knowles (47.9), Shackelford (48.0), Johnson, Twomey, John Bambury and Dave Long are tops.

880—Noel and Neff are solid performers with good promise. Development by newcomers Bill Berridge (1:52.5) and Owen Hoffman (1:53.1) could give Winter a respectable two mile relay team.

Mile—not too strong for SJS this season. Neff (4:05.5) leads the way followed by Owen Hoffman (4:11.6), Steve Brown (4:16.0) and Bill Langdon (4:17.8).

Two Mile—fairly strong with plenty of material to work with headed by Langdon (9:13.7), Hoffman (9:20), Jim Sullivan (9:20.5), Brown (9:21.0) and Rich Klemmer (9:21.5).

High Hurdles—the weakest event for 1966. Candidates here are Bud Noether, Larry Herald and untested Autrey Porter, transfer from San Diego CC who boasts good credentials.

Intermediate Hurdles—an above average event with the presence of Shackelford. Help must come from Ken Davis, Jake Cagle and Noether.

Hammer—Smith is the only competitor here and his fifth place NCAA finish of 1965 should be improved upon.

Shot Put—not too strong with Pat Rose (53-8) the best. Larry Dixon (51-8) and Dan O'Hair (49-9) are the other entries.

Discus—a solid event for Winter with steady Bob Akers (178-0) leading the way. Roger Twelvetrees and Rich Saunders back Akers.

Javelin—weaker with the loss of 1965's top men. Back is Paul Hewitt (200-0) who will get help from Twelvetrees, Ken Dunn and Andy Allen.

Pole Vault—weak with only one candidate in Jim Beam (14-8).

High Jump—very strong and deep with Doe and Zubrinsky backed by Bob Lovejoy (6-9), Bill Fowler (6-4 1/2) and Frank Tarrantts (6-4 1/2).

Long Jump—weak with Fergus (23-5) the best. Cornelius Frazier (22-8) and Pat Moran (22-6) must improve.

Triple Jump—strong with Fergus and Frazier (48-8) backed by Larry Herald (45-8).
