Smith and Evans, who are close friends, have been nothing less than sensational in recent weeks, and the Jaguar star is beginning to wonder what he has to do to swipe some attention away from Tommy.

Last Saturday morning Evans set a new national junior college record of 46.2 in the 440 and tied the curve 220 standard of 21.1.

That should have been good enough for front page coverage anywhere, but later that same day Smith decimated the world records for 220 yards and 200 meters on a straightaway with a clocking of 19.5, a full half second under the old marks. He also won the 100 in 9.3 and was clocked in a remarkable 9.2 for his 110 yard anchor leg on the Spartans' 440 yard relay team.

Both Evans and Smith will anchor 440, 880 and mile relay teams today. Evans will go in the 440 and 880 this afternoon, and in the mile tonight. All of Smith's races will be tonight.

San Jose's 440 quartet Wayne Hermen, Tim Knowlton, John Bambury and Smith, a best of 39.9, two-tenths of a world record set by St. d

here last season. The Spartans will be sternly challenged by Stanford, California, UCLA, USC and New Mexico in both the 440 and 880.

Ken Shackelford will replace Bambury on San Jose's mile foursome.

The Spartans will also have a two mile team of Ken Noel, Joe Neff, Bill Berridge and either Owen Hoffman or Steve Brown. San Jose's Craig Ferguson will go in the triple jump and Ed Johnson, Terry Doe and Gene Zubrinsky in the high jump.

Stanford's 440 and 880 teams will consist of Roger Cox, Donn Forbes, Jim Ward and Larry Questad, and the Indians have also entered mile, two mile and medley relay foursomes. Top Tribe individuals entered are Bob Stoecker, discus; Jim Esh-

elman and Chuck Smith, pole vault; Peter Boyce, high jump; George Porter, javelin, and Bud Walsh, hurdles.

Brilliant fields have been lured for the pole vault, shot put, long jump, triple jump and high jump. Three members of the 17-foot club, John Pannel, Sam Kirk and Bob Seagren, plus Marc Savage, Paul Wilson, Jeff Chase and Olympian Ron Morris will go in the pole vault.

World record holder Randy Matson, 70-7½, will head the shot put field and he'll also challenge three-time Olympic champion Al Oerter in the discus.

Ralph Boston, world record holder with a mark of 27-5, tops the long jump field which includes Hiroomi Yamada of Santa Clara Valley Youth Vil-

lage, Rainer Stenius of Los Angeles State, Olympian Gayle Hopkins and Clarence Robinson and Ira Robinson of New Mexico.

American record holder Art Walker, 54-9, features the triple jump field. Otis Burrell of Nevada, who has the best mark of 7-2½ this season, will pace seven high jumpers who have cleared 7 feet.

Colliding in the 100 yard dash will be Darel Newman of the Striders, Gil Smith, Texas

A & M; Lennox Miller, USC Frosh; Harold Busby, UCLA Frosh; Fred Kuller, Striders, and Rene Matison, New Mexico, all of whom have clocked 9.5 or better.

Defending champion Brigham Young has entered 25 men and is strong in many events, but UCLA, Stanford, New Mexico, San Jose and USC are rated in the title picture. The Cougars nipped San Jose and USC by one point last year, with New Mexico only another point back.
