

Sprinter Sparkles

At Meet ⁴⁶⁶

BERKELEY—An asthmatic sprinter made highly-regarded rivals look like the sick ones twice while Central Coast athletes were showing some strong recuperative powers at the fastest ever State track meet prelims Friday afternoon at Edwards Stadium.

The sprinter is Phil Underwood of Dorsey of Los Angeles, who ran the second-fastest 220-yard dash in prep history with a 20.5 clocking. Underwood came back later to give Dorsey a win in an 880-yard relay heat with a 20.6 anchor.

The Central Coast, meanwhile, qualified for 11 berths for today's finals, which begin at 12:30 p.m. with the pole vault. The first running event, the half-mile, is slated for 2 p.m.

Many of the area's placers came through with lifetime bests, some of them after failing to come near previous personal standards in last week-end's Sectional.

Buchser's Mike Toler, for instance, shaved two-tenths of a second off his previous best with an 18.8, third place showing in the low hurdles. Toler finished second last week.

His heat was the fastest of the three as George Farmer of La Puente established one of three Stadium prep records with an 18.6 effort.

Making the high hurdles finals was Randy Weil of Burlingame with a 14.3 third-place finish behind Don Parish of Dorsey, who equalled the Stadium mark of 13.9.

San Carlos half-miler John Lilly finished in a third-placed deadlock to muster a spot.

The Central Coast's other two track qualifiers both came in the mile.

Watsonville's Bob Scurich, second last week and disappointing in his past several meets, turned in a 4:19.8 for a third in his heat. It followed another third, in 4:20.2, by Palo Alto's John Enscoe. The latter was the Vikings' all-time low.

As expected, the majority of the area representatives today are in the field events, paced by double qualifier Steve Wilhelm.

The Fremont weightman had the third best throw (62-6½) in the shot put and the fourth best toss (173-10) in the discus. Wilhelm's shot mark came on his second throw and he bypassed his other two chances in favor of the disc. His final platter pitch was 7½ feet over his next-best and two feet past his seasonal standard.

Two other area discus tossers also made the top dozen, which, as in all field events, face a second round of trials this afternoon. Mike Louisiana of James Logan had a disappointing best of 174-2½ and Woodside's Ben Welch chalked up a 166½.

San Carlos high jumper led the field in his specialty on the basis of fewer misses. His jump

of 6-6 was equalled by 10 others—but not by Don Pierce the 7-0 leaper of Pittsburg, who missed all three attempts at that height.

Also out is Cal Robinson of Altos' Tod Peterson, who joined 13 other pole vaulters with a 13-3½ effort.

Notable area non-qualifiers included Peterson's teammate, Bill Chapman in the 440. Chapman got off to a fast start, but was caught by the field in the final 100 yards. The diminutive speedster landed fifth place with a 49.1 clocking.

Despite Underwood's 220 finish, the 6-1, 160-pounder said he "staggered out of the blocks with my feet going to the side.

"I was surprised at the time because of the conditions. . . I usually don't do well in the cold (by L.A. standards)."

In addition to Underwood's time and the hurdles marks, there were several other strong efforts.

Shot putter John Hubbell of Long Beach Poly came within ¾ inches of the meet record with a 64¼ heave. Dave Murphy of Sunny Hills was a half-inch behind in second.

Jim Peters of Piedmont topped the discus trials with a 183-4½ pitch.

Defending champs still in contention include Randy Julian in the 440, Tim Danielson of Chula Vista in the mile and Ralph Gamez of Berkeley in the two-mile. Gamez and the 27 other eight-lappers were the only ones not competing in the prelims.

Radetich, Lilly, Welch Make Finals

BERKELEY — High jumper John Radetich and half-miler John Lilly of San Carlos and discus thrower Ben Welch of Woodside were the Sequoia District entries who qualified for today's finals in the State High School Track and Field championships in preliminary competition here Friday.

Radetich was the most impressive qualifier in the high jump, which was terminated after the field had been reduced to 11 competitors who all cleared 6-6. Radetich used the least jumps, three (one each at 6-2, 6-4 and 6-6) to make the qualifying height.

Welch appeared to be out of the running until his final throw, when he uncorked an effort of 166-3½ to rank ninth among the 12 entries who will compete today. Friday's distances will not be carried over.

Lilly did not learn until this morning that he had made the finals. He was picked fourth in his heat of the 880 (the first three qualify) but after a review of films, officials called a dead-heat between Lilly and Tom Eklund of San Diego's St. Augustine and certified both into today's final.

Lilly put on a great spurt in the last 30 yards, passing Central Coast Section champ Fred James of Seaside to register his own and the SPAL's best time in history — 1:53.6.

Ravenswood's Jim Marshall failed to qualify in either of the sprints nor did the Trojan relay team make it. Running into a headwind, Marshall was timed in 10.1 and picked seventh in his heat of the 100 and was timed in 21.4 for fifth in his heat of the 220. The first three qualified.

Ravenswood's 880 relay team was sixth in its heat in 1:31.3, almost two seconds off its best effort. Cubberley bobbed the baton and finished seventh in the same heat in 1:32.8.

Serra High's Jerry Tallon finished second in his heat of the 880 in 1:53.1, the fifth fastest qualifying time in the event. Only other qualifier from San Mateo County was Randy Weil of Burlingame, who made the 120 high hurdles with a time of 14.3, but missed out in the low.

Palo Alto High junior John Enscoe put on an impressive finish to take third in his heat of the mile in 4:20.3, the ninth and slowest qualifying time.

Most impressive mark of the trials was the meet record-equalling 20.5 in the 220 by Phil Underwood of Los Angeles' Dorsey High. Underwood ran away from the field in the same heat in which Ravenswood's Marshall ran.

Enscoe, Lilly post top marks

John Enscoe of Palo Alto and John Lilly of San Carlos took over first places in the South Peninsula Athletic League track and field "best" list in the final meet of the season.

Enscoe became the best miler in SPAL history when he ran 4:15.4 while placing sixth in the state meet at Berkeley Saturday.

Lilly took over the lead in the 880 by running a 1:53.6 in the state meet.

UNDERWOOD PACES DORSEY'S DRIVE

BERKELEY—Phil Underwood, a young man in a hurry, was locked in the "Go" position Friday and as a consequence Dorsey High is headed for its first State track and field title.

Running with a sore ankle taped, Underwood tied the State 220 record at 20.5, coasted home second in his 100 heat in 9.8 and raced a blazing 20.6 to anchor Dorsey's 880 relay team to victory in the CIF State track preliminaries at the University of California's Edwards Stadium.

The finals start today at 12:30 p.m. with the pole vault.

7 m.p.h. Gusts

Winds, which at times reached seven miles per hour, hampered most running events, but even the gusts couldn't slow the speedster from Los Angeles.

Commenting on his 220 effort which tied the mark by Muir's Harold Busby last year, the City 100 and 220 champion said, "It was only my second straight-away of the season. I staggered out of the blocks with my feet going to the side. Once I got going, I kept my head down and relaxed. I was surprised at the time because of the conditions. I usually don't do too well in the cold."

It seemed to be Underwood's day all around. Prior to his 220 heat, gusts were blowing into the faces of the runners. When Underwood went to the post, though, the wind shifted and was blowing slightly in his favor.

Different Story

Underwood's 100 heat was won by Jim Hall of Stockton's Edison High in 9.8. Phil said he didn't push himself in the event and was going out only to place. Today, however, it should be a different story.

Dorsey got a boost from hurdler Don Parish, the City 120 and 180 champion who stepped off 13.9 and 18.7 heat victories. He'll be in tough today, though, with Northview's Bruce Gridley, who has done 13.7 twice, and La Puente's George Farmer, with an 18.6 to his credit. Both won their 120 and 180 low heats handily.

As expected, the Dons posted the best relay time, 1:27.1. Dorsey was third by a good 10 yards before Underwood put out the fire with his torrid 20.6. Castlemont ran second in 1:27.3 with Muir next at 1:27.4.

Major disappointments were the failure of seven-foot higher jumper Don Pierce of Pittsburg to reach the qualifying height of 6-6 and the disqualification of Gardena's relay team when the Mike Jeter-to-Wayne Collett handoff was fumbled on the final 220.

Gardena, with a season best of 1:26.3, was in front at the time and all but assured of a finals berth.

L.A. City champion Dor-

sey and Southern Section titlist Muir lead all teams by qualifying six for the finals. Oxnard will have five competitors today, including three men in the long jump.

Prep Track Season Closes

The season ends for Sequoia High School District trackmen tonight and Saturday with the best at the State Meet and the rest at the Hollister Relays.

A half-dozen State Meet entries competed this afternoon in preliminaries at the University of California at Berkeley, bid-

ding for berths in Saturday's finals.

Most District schools are sending delegations of 20 or more athletes to the Hollister Relays tonight. It's a season-ending "fun" meet for most but Woodside and Menlo-Atherton plan to make serious bids for the varsity and B team titles respectively. Finals tonight begin about 7:30 p.m.

threaten national interscholastic records.

These include Dorsey High's (Los Angeles) 880 relay team, which has equalled the U.S. prep mark of 1:25.9; pole vaulter Paul Hagler of Pasadena's Muir High, whose mark of 16-3 is 3/4 inches short of the national record; and long jumper Doyle Steele of San Diego High who last week cracked the national prep mark with a leap of 25-5/4.

The Sequoia District's most hopeful entry is John Radetich of San Carlos, although he is competing in the finest high jump field ever assembled in one prep meet. Radetich jumped 6-9 3/4, his career best, last week and consistently topped 6-8.

Bill Morris of Compton (6-10 1/4), Fred Jackson of Oakland's Castlemont (6-10 1/2) and Don Pierce of Pittsburg (7-0) are among the men Radetich has to beat. Radetich's qualifying mark was equalled only by Doug Huff of Lincoln in Los Angeles, however.

Some of the other luminaries entered include John Hubbell of Long Beach Poly, second ranking prep shot putter (67-9 3/4) of all time; Terry Rogers of Hilltop in San Diego, No. 2 half-miler (1:51.6) in the U.S. this year; defending two mile champ Ralph Gamez (9:05.2) of Berkeley; and Tim Danielson of San Diego's Chula Vista, the fifth-ranking prep miler (4:06.2) of all time.

BERKELEY — Dorsey High of Los Angeles, a team that couldn't win the dual meet title in its own league, gained some consolation Saturday by winning the 48th annual State high school track meet.

Biggest upset of the day came in the pole vault where Henry Paul Hegar, with a best of 55.4, failed to make 35 feet and lost out to Wayne Meyers of Sacramento's Fort Hall High at 34.0 5/8. Hegar still had good for second place.

The high jump produced three 6:10 efforts and was won by Tom Ciochi of San Francisco's Bellow High. Doug Huff of L.A. Loyola and William Morris of Compton were second and third, respectively, at that height.

Only 12 Valley Trackmen Gain State Prep Finals

BERKELEY—Only nine of the central section's representatives to the 48th annual California Interscholastic Federation track and field championships survived the preliminaries to gain today's final at Edwards Field.

They will be joined by three two-milers who did not have to qualify during yesterday's prelims, which were highlighted by a state meet record-equaling 20.5 furlong by sprinter Phil Underwood of pre-meet title favorite Dorsey High School of Los Angeles.

Gaining the finals were: All three of the valley's shot putters, Mike Wood of Bullard, with a fourth-place throw of 61-feet, 5-inches, Mike Garrett of Taft, with a sixth-place toss of 60-11-1/2, Roger Castenada of Porterville, with a 10th spot heave of 57-7; high jumper Jim Flynn of Roosevelt, one of 11 leapers over the bar at 6-6; quarter-miler Ellery Temple of Edison, third in his heat with a time of 49-seconds flat; pole vaulters Larry Tuck of Shafter and Dale Schmidt of Reedley, both of whom cleared 13-3; discus thrower Steve Wilson of Delano, with a seventh-place spin of 169-5-1/2; Garratt, only four and a half inches behind Wilson, and Ben Jennings of Riverdale, with a 10th spot sling of 161-6-1/2.

Field event marks made during the prelims will not carry over into today's finals.

The two-milers who will join the field are Pete Romero of Reedley (9:11.8), Robert Yslas of Madera (9:27.6) and Rick Hitchcock of North Bakersfield (9:43.1).

Wood's toss was one of the surprises. The 6-foot-3, 248-pound giant surpassed his career best mark of 60-7, and, for the first time all this season, beat his valley nemesis, Garratt, who tapered off from a career best mark of 62-6 3/4.

Lelon Rich, valley half-mile champion from Tulare, ran the fastest race of his life, clocking 1:53.5, but it was not good enough to make the finals.

Bill Blanchard of Reedley and Rich were in the same heat with Hilltop's Terry Rogers,

who whipped the first lap in 52.3 to check in with a 1:52.7 two-lap reading.

Blanchard, running in lane 8, was fourth after the first go-around but faded fast after Rich who started in Lane 7, passed him on the backstretch of the second lap. Rich was holding third place until the final 20 yards when Mike Owens of Valencia caught and passed him for the qualifying spot.

Rogers was expected to win his heat, having clocked 1:51.6 earlier in the season. Rich improved from a former best of 1:55.3. Blanchard wound up ninth — or last. No time was given for Blanchard.

The valley's third half-mile entrant, Mike Vasquez of East Bakersfield, also missed qualifying when he placed fifth in the second heat, won by Carl Henry of Eisenhower, 1:51.8.

Vasquez, running in lane 8, was eighth after the first lap, then closed to fourth place before Phil Boehme of Foothill (Sacramento) inched past him in the final three yards. Vasquez clocked 1:55.2. His previous best was 1:56.5.

The valley's three 100-yard dashmen were eliminated in the heats. As usual the sprinters crossed the finish in an almost solid wave. Roger Jones of East Bakersfield and Alan Auerbach of Lemoore drew heat No. 2, won by Jim Smith of Upland (Ontario), 10-flat. Jones finished fifth, also 10-flat, and Auerbach was seventh at 10.4.

Art Bryant of Bakersfield High, running with a heavily-taped right thigh, finished seventh in 10.1 in the third heat. Bryant lunged across the finish line, losing his balance and fin-

BERKELEY — The 1966 California Interscholastic Federation Track and Field Meet, which closed here Saturday afternoon, has to be considered successful from a Chico point of view.

No Chico boys placed in the meet but all eight of the competitors from the Mid-Valley Area town performed brilliantly in representing the North Section.

Saturday Chico High School's Jim Davis, Jack Forester and Dan Steben took on some of the finest high school competition in the world and fared remarkably well.

Davis came within a tenth of a second of getting into the picture in the high hurdles. He ran :14.3 (which ties his CHS record) and finished sixth in the nine-man final.

Davis also ran :14.3 in the preliminaries and the Roseville Invitational early in the year. The event was won by Don Parish of Dorsey High School in Los Angeles. Parish was timed in :13.9.

"If Jimmy (Davis) had gotten his usual start he might have placed. The first three hurdles are generally the best part of his race," said CHS track coach Mel Jones reviewing Davis' effort.

Forester finished 13th in what has to be the finest high school age two mile field the world has ever seen.

The Chico senior took a full eight seconds off his previous best of 9:34.6 as he ran 9:26.6 to set a CHS record.

Ralph Gamez of Berkeley won the event in meet record time as he toured the eight laps in an amazing 9:01.6. He broke his own record of 9:12.9 set last year and five other contestants were also under that standard.

Sixth place, a non-scoring position, was 9:11.6.

Forester stayed with Gamez' pace through the first mile of the race. Gamez ran the first four laps in 4:32.6 while Forester was timed in 4:33.0 along with several other runners.

But in the final four laps Gamez pulled out by running his second mile in 4:22.0 including a 63 second final 440.

"Jack (Forester) said he felt great for the first mile and a half but seemed to lose it after that," reported Jones who had talked with the Panther ace.

Steben cleared 13 feet 6 in the pole vault but failed in his bid for the 14-foot barrier. Foothill of Sacramento's Wayne Myers won the event with a height of 15 feet ¾ while the other four place winners made 14 feet 8.

Steben's best is 13 feet 11¾.

Gamez was one of five boys to set records Saturday. Other standards were set by Jim Peters of Piedmont (189-feet-1 in the discus), John Hubbell of Long Beach Poly (66 feet 11 in the shot put), Balboa of San Francisco's Tom Clyburn (6 feet 10 in the high jump) and Chula Vista's Tim Danielson (4:07.0 in the mile).

Other winning marks were 1:51.5 in the 800, 47.8 in the 440, :09.6 in the 100, 25 feet 3¾ in the broad jump, 1:26.4 in the 880 relay, :18.7 in the low hurdles and :21.2 in the 200.

A strong adverse wind slowed the 220 competitors. Dorsey of Los Angeles easily won the team title with 22 points to 15 for second place Muir of Pasadena.

Phil Underwood, who tied the meet 220 record with a 20.5 time in the preliminaries, won the 100 and 220 in the finals for Dorsey.

Chico's Bob Turner was left off the list of senior athletes in the state meet who had better than 3.0 grade point averages. His name was not read at the meet but he deserves this men.

an all-time best of 6-10 and grabbed first place right out of the hands of two southern Californians.

The 6-5 Clyburn, a junior, had a previous best of 6-7 1/2 and didn't figure in anyone's pre-meet predictions. All he did was establish a new CIF Meet record while winning first place on fewer misses over Compton's William Morris and Doug Huff of Lincoln High in L.A.

All three were credited with the record. Clyburn claimed the gold medal because he only missed twice—once at 6-4 and again on his first attempt at 6-10—before all three failed at 6-11.

IT WAS a tremendous triumph because the track and field experts rated this year's high jump field the finest ever in the U.S. Long Tom became the first S.F. winner in the State Meet since Lincoln's half miler Mike Gibean in 1961.

Still, the biggest crowd pleaser had to be the brilliant record-breaking 4:14.8 two-mile victory by Berkeley's Ralph Gamez. The defending State champion lowered his own two mile standard by some 11 seconds and was under the existing National Intercollegiate record of 4:08.4 set by Arthur Delang of Randolph, Mass.

EVEN THOUGH they "threw away" a cinch nine points in two events, L.A.'s Dorsey High swept up the team title with ridiculous ease.

That took away nine points from Dorsey's total, but it didn't matter. With Underwood a clear cut winner in the 100-yard dash in 8.6 seconds and the 229 in 21.2, there wasn't a team on the field that could match what must be considered the best team ever to compete in the State Meet.

CALIFORNIA'S other record-shattering performance was turned in by Piedmont's husky Jim Peters, who heaved the discus 189-1 in his final preliminary throw after getting off to a "shaky start." The UCLA-bound Peters, a scholar-athlete, cracked the 185-6 1/2 mark set by Bob Stoecker (Los Altos) in 1961.

that tumbled over the shot put with Long Beach Poly's John Hubbell throwing 66-11 and leading a southern Cal 2-3 sweep, and the mile, where defending champion Tim Danielson ran all by himself and finished in 4:37.9 with the closest competitor some 50 yards in the rear.

Wayne Myers of Foothill High in Sacramento scored somewhat of an upset when he cleared 15 feet 5 1/2 inch in the pole vault to beat out highly favored Paul Hoglar of Muir, whose seasonal best is 16-3. The winning height was 1/2 inch over Myers previous all-time best.

Southland spikers dominate state meet

BERKELEY — Redistricting of the state didn't help the North in the 48th annual California Interscholastic Federation track and field championships here Saturday.

No matter how the state is sliced up, the past winners usually come from Southern California.

The only winners from the North in the record-shattering finals were pole vaulter Wayne Meyers of Foothill High School in Sacramento, two-miler Ralph Gamet of Berkeley, high jumper Tom Clyburn of San Francisco's

Balboa, and discus thrower Jim Peters of Piedmont.

Peters, Gamet and Clyburn had to set meet records to win.

Peters hurled the discus 189-1/2 to wipe out the old state meet mark of 184-1/2 set in 1961 by Bob Stoeker of Los Altos.

Gamet raced to a spectacular win in the two mile, a race in which all five placers broke the old meet record of 9:12.4. Gamet's time was 9:01.6, including a 45 second final lap.

Clyburn was one of three high jumpers to clear 6-10, but was declared the winner on fewer misses at lower heights.

John Raderich of San Carlos

was fourth at 6-8. He barely missed a lifetime best of 6-10 lap sprint to silver over Los Angeles when he knocked off the crossbar with his knee on his third and last attempt at that height.

Raderich was one of only two entrants from the newly formed Central Coast Section to score in Saturday's final. The CCS includes all schools between King City and South San Francisco.

The other post winner was junior Steve Wilhelm of Fremont who placed fifth in the shot-put.

Wilhelm was seventh in the discus with a throw of 189-8. Ben Welch of Woodside was eighth at 164-4.

Miler John Eacco of Palo

Alto got on a spectacular last in Darvey High School of Los Altos when he won a trial final Friday in 20.3.

The Dons were so powerful that all sorts of misfortunes couldn't stop them from winning.

Hurdler Don Parisk was the high for Darvey and lost another sure gold medal when he hit the final hurdle in the low hurdles and finished sixth.

Sprinter Phil Underwood of Darvey was a double winner. His times were 9.6 and 21.2 with the latter time cutting against a stiff breeze.

Underwood, who says he will attend USC this fall, ran the second fastest 200 in prep his-

torial when he won a trial final Friday in 20.3.

He placed sixth with a lifetime best of 4:13.4. Escoc ran his final lap in 40.3 seconds to move from eighth to sixth place.

Mike Tolos, the fine hurdler from Redwood, got a sixth in the low hurdles with a time of 29.9.

John Lilly of San Carlos was eighth in the 800-yard run with a time of 1:34.7.

Mike Gamet of Wilcox in Santa Clara finished 21st in the two-mile with a time of 9:29.3.

Tad Peterson, the pole vaulter from Los Altos, cleared 13-6 but couldn't get over 14 feet.

The team championship won-

dered by the Dons in 20.3.

Darvey was disqualified in the 800-yard relay, but that didn't make any difference. The Dons already had 22 points which was twice as many as second-place Muir of Pasadena could get.

Southern California teams grabbed six of the top seven spots in team scoring. Over-all, the Southern Section (all the area around Los Angeles) scored 80 points and the Los Angeles city schools scored 22.

Lilly's time was the best of his life.

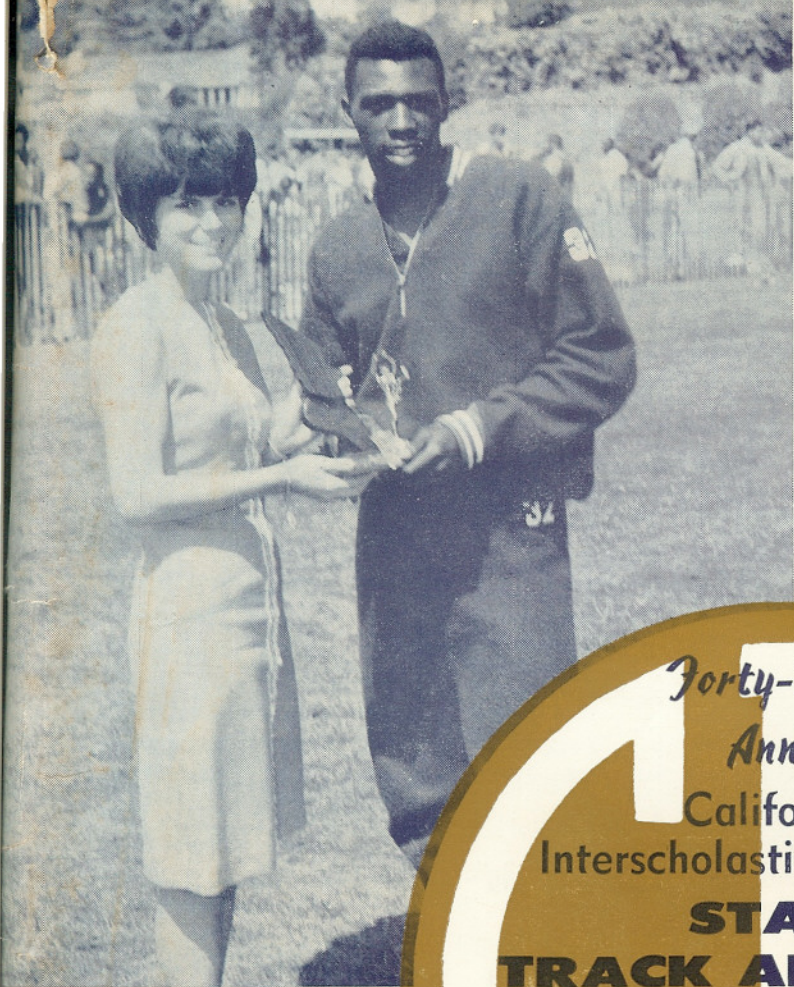

Chapman ran 49.7 and also was fifth in his heat.

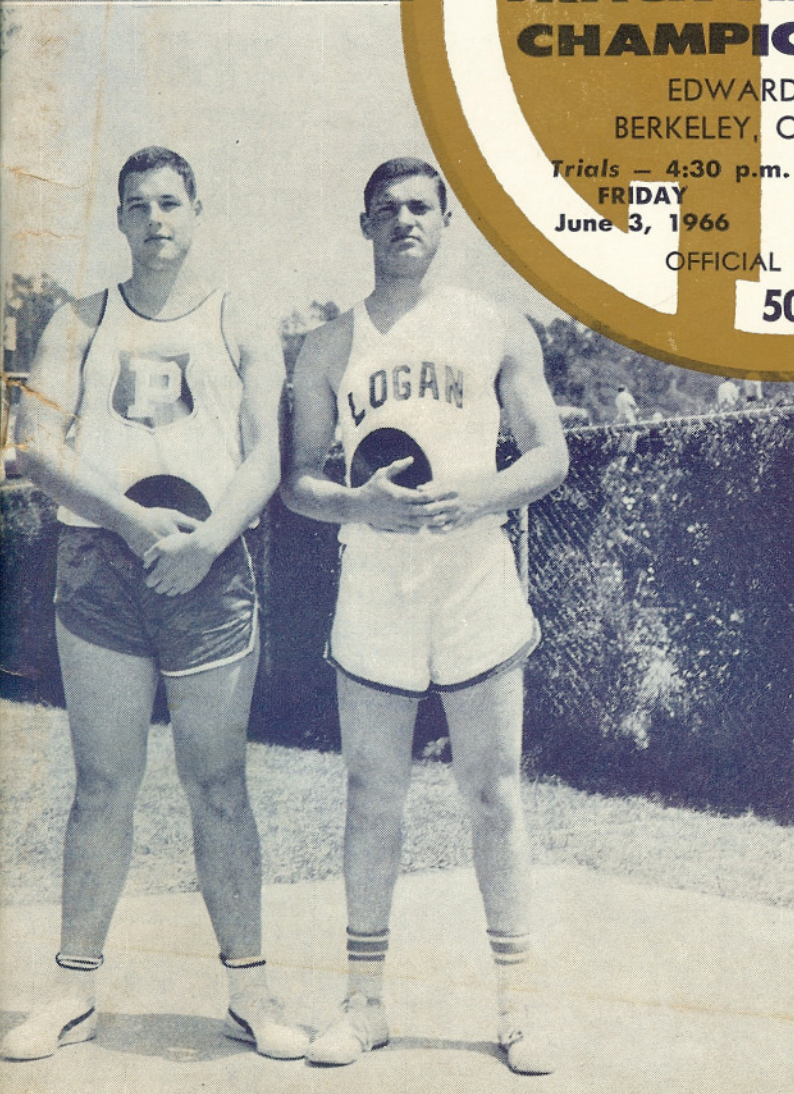

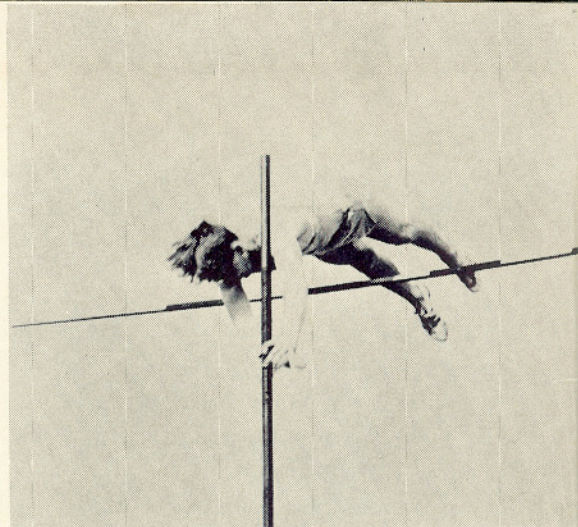

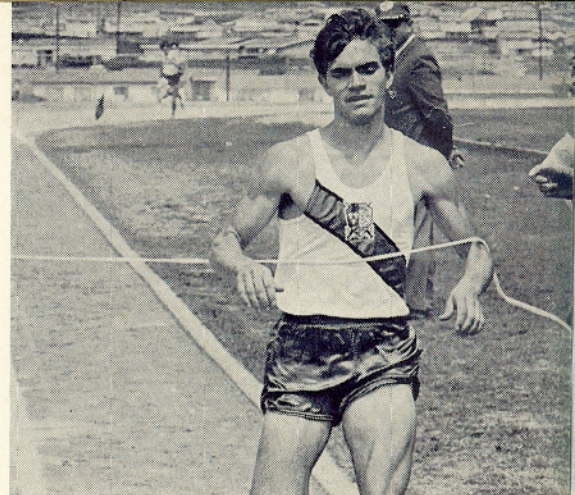

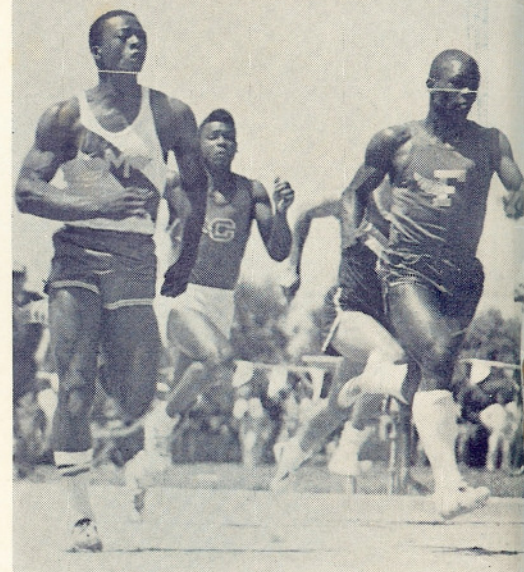

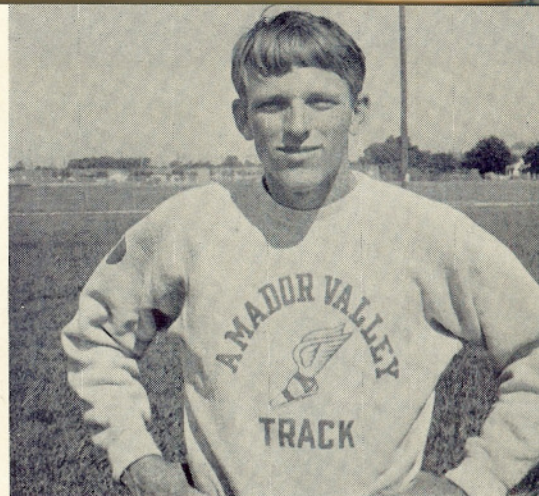
