Prominent in the list of attainments announced from the blue and gold campus was the time of the mile run, which was won by Windnegle of the Washington High School in 4:21. It was the initial event of the day, Windnegle and his teanmate, Wilson, approaching the tape in a fashion that indicated the subsequent strength of the Portland athletes. The result is by far the fastest time recorded in Pacific Coast preparatory school athletics, runfor the fusiest time recorded in Pacino, Coast preparatory achool athletics, rurpassing as it does the record of the Academic Athletic League and the Stanford Interscholastic Windmasle cama bock in the half-mile run and missed winning by inches. In the shorter run Milholland of the Fremont Wish School proved the supprise of the Nigh School proved the surprise of the meet.
