

TRACK HONORS GO TO L.A. HIGH.

Locals Win Bakersfield Meet by Close Margin.

State Records Broken in Many of the Events.

Oxnard Finishes Second and Manual Arts Third.

BAKERSFIELD, April 24.—State records for the high jump, pole vault, broad jump, discus, 12-pound shot, 880-yard run, 220-yard dash, high hurdles and relay were broken at the annual track and field meet of the California Interscholastic Athletic Association here today.

Los Angeles High School won first place with 18 points. Oxnard High School was second with 16 points and Manual Arts High School of Los Angeles was third with 11 points.

Los Angeles high school won first place with 18 points. Oxnard high school was second with 16 points and Manual Arts high school of Los Angeles, third with 11 points. 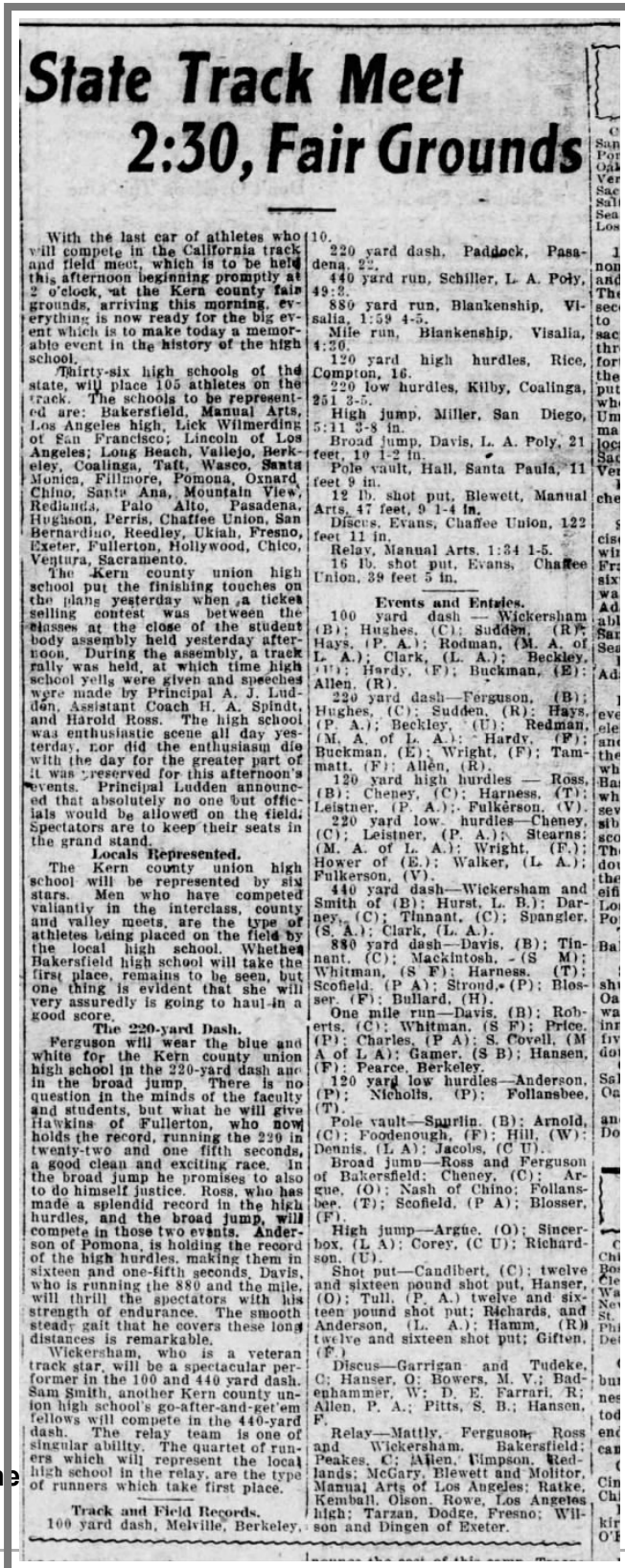

The Los Angeles relay team broke the world's record for four men each man running 220 yards. The former world's record was 1:31. The new record beats the world's record by two-fifths.

From the firing of the first gun for the trial heats to the finishing of the relay, the meet was one of intense interest. It was one of the fastest meets held in the history of the athletic association. This can be readily assumed by the number of state records broken. The work of the Lick Wilmerding, high school of San Francisco, came as a big surprise to the spectators. It was little expected that the northern high school would step in for first place in the 100 and 220 yard dash.

While the local high school did not place first in any of the events, the school is proud of the honor of having five athletes on the field and having the meet on the home field. Wickersham, Ross, Smith, Davis, Ferguson, who represented the local high school ran some mighty good races, the best being in the relay race, in which Bakersfield placed third.

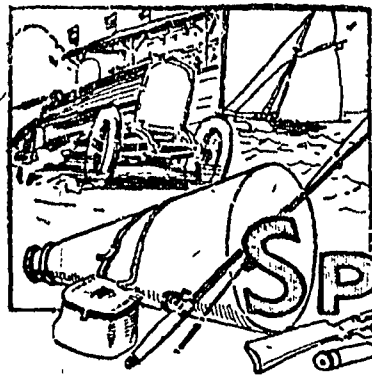

SOUTHERN LADS SHOW THE BEST.

Break Eight Out of Nine Records at Berkeley.

Sudden of Lick Only Northerner to Make Showing.

Paddock Very Nearly Shatters World's Century Mark.

Track athletes of Southern California, particularly those of preparatory affiliation, have been performing to the fine needle point of perfection this season. Ample evidence of this was given last Saturday, when nine new track and field records were established in the State meet held at Berkeley.

It is worth noting that southerners made eight of the nine. By running the 220-yard dash in 21 4-5s, Sudden of Lick was the only man from the North to get his name in the book as a figure smasher. This had equaled the old mark of 10s flat, in the 100-yard dash.

New State marks for the high jump, pole vault, broad jump, discus, 12-pound shot put, 880-yard run, high hurdles and relay race were made by chaps from the sunny South.

Just two weeks previous in the all-Southern meet, held at Occidental College, records for the relay, shot put, discus, pole vault and 440-yard dash had been broken. Here are both the new Southern and State marks, and the names of the men who hold them:

440-yard dash—Clark (Los Angeles High School) 50 3-6s; Southern California record.
880-yard run—Stroud (Perris High School) 1m. 59 4-5s.; State record
Relay race—Manual Arts, 1m. 33s. Southern California record; 1m. 37 3-5s.; State record; Los Angeles High School.

High jump—Corey (Chaffee High School) 6ft.; State record.

Pole vault—Goodenough (Fillmore High School) 11ft. 9 13-16in.; Southern California record; 11ft. 10 in.; State record.

Broad jump—Nash (Chino High School,) 21ft. 9 1-2in.; State record.

Discus throw—Houser (Oxnard High School,) 127ft. 3in.; Southern California record; 123ft. 8in. State record.

Shot put—Houser (Oxnard High School,) 43ft. 2 1-3in. Southern California record; 48ft. 9in. State record.

While the college products have been shaving things pretty close no new records have been splattered about save the 3m. 28s. of the Redlands quartette in the mile relay. This smashed an old figure of 3m. 28 4-5s. made by U.S.C. several moons back.

Charley Paddock has come so close to the world records in the 100 and 220-yard dashes that it will occasion no surprise when he does make the grade. Three clocks caught him in 9 3-5s at Berkeley recently while two had 9 4-5s. A heavy track at Pomona in the A.A.U. meet knifed his chances there, but at that he stepped in 9 4-5s. and 21 2-5s., respectively in his two specialties.

Dan Kelly, for the past fourteen years holder of the world's record in the 100-yard dash, who died recently in Fernie, B. C., was a University of Oregon man. Kelly made his record at Spokane in 1906. It has since been declared that he had a wind at his back, but the record was allowed to stand.

Kelly held lesser records in several other events. He had a Coast record of 24ft. 2 1/2 in. in the broad jump, and a mark of 21 2-5s. in the 220. He was also a fast quarter miler, running it in 49 1-5s.
