

HONORS GO TO LINCOLN HIGH.

*Wins the Southern California
Track Championship.*

*Trojans Break Record in the
Special Relay Race.*

*Gwynn Wilson Uncorks Best
Effort of His Career.*

Piling up the handsome total of 31 points, Lincoln High School of Los Angeles, yesterday won the Southern California track and field championships at Housh Field. Compton and Redlands high schools tied for second, with 12 points each and Manual Arts and Oxnard tied for fourth place with 10 points each. Points were scored by other schools as follows: Santa Paula, 8; Huntington Beach, 6; Anaheim, 5; Chino, 5; Hollywood, 5; Los Angeles, 5; Monrovia, 5; Pasadena, 4; Riverside, 4; Inglewood, 3; La Verne, 3; Long Beach, 3; Pomona, 3; Polytechnic, 2; Lompoc, 2; San Diego, 2; Santa Monica, 2, and San Bernardino, 1.

During the course of the afternoon the young athletes succeeded in breaking three Southern California records and tying two more. Young Bud Houser of Oxnard, heaved the shot 53ft. 2 2-8in., and the discus 137ft. 2 3-16in. for new marks, while the Lincoln relay quartet ran itself blue in the face, setting a new mark of 1m. 32 2-5s. Blenkiron of Compton tied the 100-yard mark of 10s. flat and Thomas of Manual Arts tied the half-mile mark of 2m. 2 2-5s.

SHARES GLORY.

Blenkiron of Compton, the whirlwind sprinter, and Houton of Lincoln, hurdler, shared with Houser of Oxnard the glory of making high point honors for the day with 10 points each. Bob Allen of Redlands by running sprints, hurdles and relay made 8½ points and Bennett, the all around star from Santa Paula, made 8 points all by himself, the only digits scored by his school.

While these individuals all did nobly in collecting points, no one athlete on the track stood out any more prominently than young Mr. Kerr of Huntington Beach, who galloped away from the field in the mile-run in time which was nothing less than remarkable in view of the bad wind blowing across the field. Kerr grabbed the lead at the start of the second lap and came across the finish without a struggle in 3m. 36 2-5s.

A FACT LAP.

Shaw, a dusky young man from Monrovia High, sprang a decided sensation in the quarter by batting off a lap in 51 3-5s. Hughes of Inglewood broke the wind all the way to the straightaway where Shaw let out a terrific burst of speed and won. Sainsevain of Los Angeles High got lost in the shuffle and never did get into the running at all.

The horrible burst of speed shown by young Tommy Myles on the last lap of the four-man, half-mile relay, earned Lincoln the decision by

a narrow whisker over Los Angeles High. Green of Los Angeles got off just a bit ahead of Myles and succeeded in taking the pole away from the dusky wonder, but in the last 40 yards the little darky shut his eyes and gave every bit of speed he had in him and caught the white boy at the tape. If they'd given the race to Los Angeles nobody would have kicked, it was so close.

PRIZE EVENT.

Dean Cromwell's hand-picked quarter-milers from the University of Southern California, aided by the sterling quartet of baton-passers from the University of Redlands put on absolutely the prize event of the afternoon in the shape of a match race over a one-mile course. U.S.C. won by about six yards in 3m. 22s., a brand new Pacific Coast record and four full seconds under the former Southern California mark.

Bill Isenhour of U.S.C. beat Lloyd Yount of Redlands to the wire by about a yard in the first lap, but Leahy scrambled the baton-passing operation and Knights of Redlands got off well ahead of him, giving Bill Yount a lead of six yards on Gwynn Wilson. Gwynn uncorked the greatest race of his career, running his quarter in 49 flat, and giving Schiller a four-yard lead on Kilby, which Spec increased to six yards by running a lap in 49 2-5s., while Kilby was just 1-5 of a second slower.
