

SOUTHERN LADS ARE CLASS OF BIG MEET

Vallejo and Palo Alto Only Northern Schools to Make a Good Showing.

SOUTHERN California High school athletes cleaned up the California Interscholastic Federation meet at Berkeley yesterday afternoon. Vallejo and Palo Alto were the only northern teams to get into the limelight. Outside of those two teams, Southern California boys, particularly the ones from Lincoln High School in Los Angeles, said it all.

Lincoln was way in front with 17 points. Vallejo and Oxnard tied for second place with 10, Redlands and Compton were next with nine each, and Palo Alto figured with 8 scores.

Every field record on the California Interscholastic Federation was bettered. In the track events, two local marks were broken, the half mile and the 220-yard hurdles. The most notable feats of the day were weight performances of Houser, an Oxnard boy. His discus throw of 135 feet and half an inch bettered the former C. I. F. record by nearly 12 feet. In the 12-pound shot event his distance was 52 feet, against 49 feet 9 inches, the old record. In the 16-pound shot exhibition he made 44 feet 5 inches, nearly four feet better than the old distance.

Boydon of Vallejo was the most impressive performer in the track events, breaking the half mile record by 3-5 of a second and running a pretty second in the quarter mile which followed the half.

Blenkiron of Compton won the hundred in 101-5 seconds, and ran almost a dead heat with Allen of Redland's in the furlong. His bad habit of looking back probably cost him his race.

LINCOLN HIGH IN A GALLOP

*Easily Captures State Track
and Field Meet.*

*Oxnard and Vallejo Tied for
Second Honors.*

*Nine Records Broken During
the Afternoon.*

BERKELEY, April 30.—Lincoln High School of Los Angeles won the track and field championships of the State in the California Inter-scholastic Federation meet here today on the University of California campus. Lincoln had seventeen points. Oxnard and Vallejo High schools tied for second place with ten points each, and Compton and Redlands tied for fourth with nine points. Nine records were broken.

Other point winners were: Palo Alto, 8; Los Angeles High School, 7; Santa Paula and Bakersfield, 6 each; Anaheim, Chino, Huntington Beach and Monrovia, 5 each; Manual Arts (Los Angeles), 4½; Stockton, 4; San Jose, Modesto, Sacramento, Petaluma, Hollywood and Lompoc, 3 each; Chico and Long Beach, 2 each; Vacaville, 1½; Alameda, Hollister, La Verne Academy (La Verne) and Los Angeles Polytechnic High, 1 each.

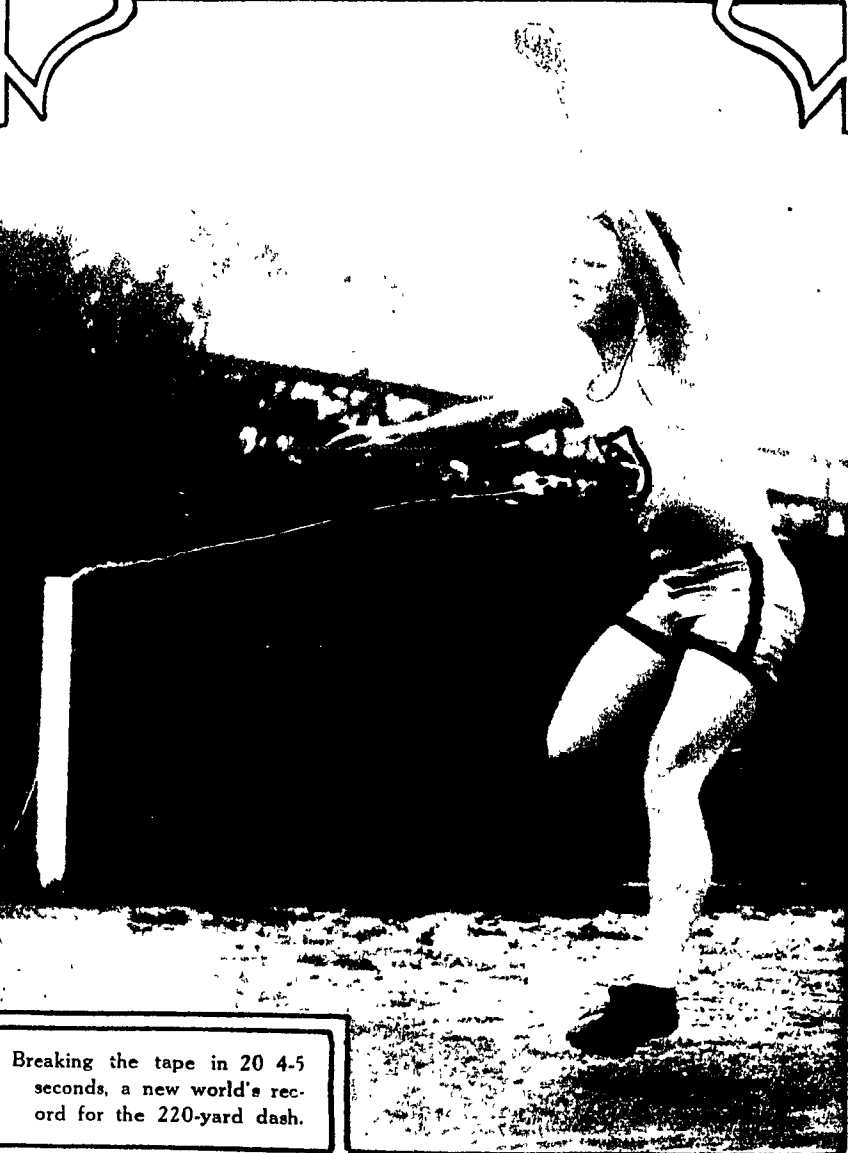

Academy Track

The season just passed has been the most successful in the history of Academy track. For the past three years La Verne has found great reason to be proud of her Academy track team. For three years in succession she has taken the Valley League meet and has run a close second to the winner of the Gala Day.

La Verne has produced several stars in track in the last three years. These men have been for the most part distance and sprint stars rather than field men.

Otis Brooks did splendid work in the 100 yard dash, the 220 yard dash and the relay. "Johnnie" Brooks has been a consistent winner in the 220 yard dash, and ran last man in the relay. Dwight Welch has run the low hurdles in the exceptionally fast time of 16 seconds flat, but has never been able to come up to his record in the interscholastic meets. He can also lay claim to the title of the fastest 440 yard man La Verne has yet produced. He ran second man in the relay team. Bennie Hepner has proved himself exceedingly useful as the manager of Academy track and as third man on the relay team.

Ernest Landis has brought fame to the La Verne Academy by taking second place in the mile run in the Southern California meet. By placing in this meet he was eligible to enter the State meet. There only exceptionally fast men prevented him from taking first place. He placed fourth in the remarkably fast time of 4:34.1.

La Verne had no trouble in taking the Valley League meet with 44 $\frac{1}{2}$ points, while Claremont, her nearest rival, amassed only 33 points. The Perpetual Relay trophy put up at this meet became the permanent possession of La Verne, having been won for the third consecutive time. The time for this relay was 1:37.2.

Because of the temporary loss of one or two men, the Gala Day meet went to Monrovia by the margin of one point. The score was: Monrovia 34, La Verne 33. La Verne won the relay by a narrow margin in the time of 1:39.

Late in the Academy track season La Verne entered the San Fernando invitation meet. This meet was limited to schools of 350 attendance or less. La Verne took second place with 18 points. Compton won the meet with 28 points.
