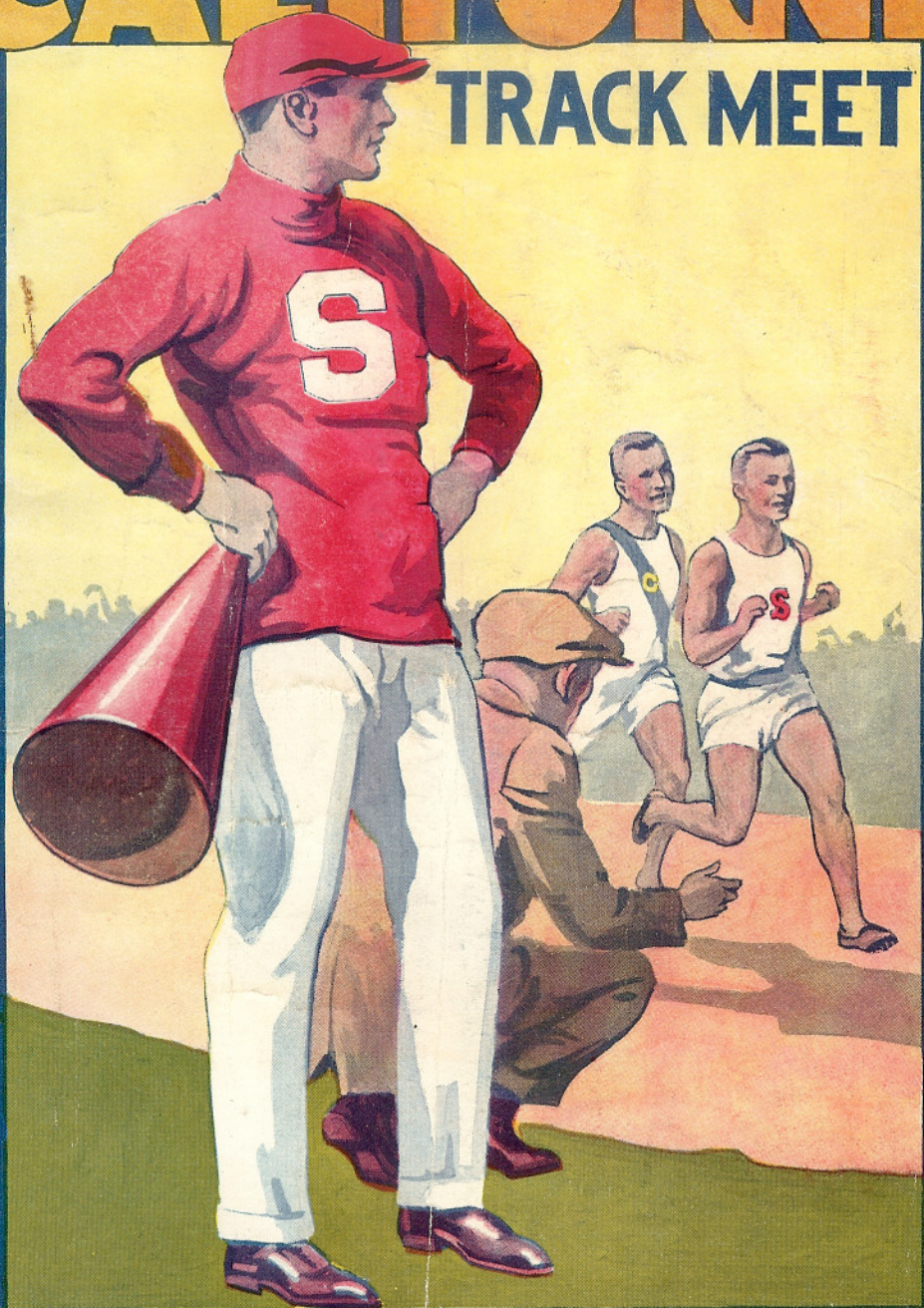

TRACK

TODAY Stanford and California meet for the thirty-first time on the track and field in what is expected to be the largest dual meet in the United States this season. Not only in attendance but in high standards of competition this meet should surpass any dual meet held in the East this year.

Due to the rapidly increasing popularity of track on the Pacific Coast, the annual Big Meet has outgrown the old ovals at Stanford and the University of California, and is held today in the Stadium. The track inside the bowl is a monument to the memory of "Dad" Moulton, who coached and trained Stanford track men for many years. He died soon after planning the present track, but the work has been carried on according to his plans.

Stanford comes to the Big Meet undefeated and with impressive victories over strong aggregations. California met defeat at the hands of the Illini last Saturday by a score of 72 1-3 to 58 2-3, but many of the Blue and Gold performers came through in unexpected fashion, indicating a closer meet today than had been predicted. California is fighting desperately today to retain the advantage which has given her victory over the Cardinal each year since 1919, with the exception of the tie meet in 1922. Stanford has the finest lot of men to represent the institution in recent years, and is confident of humbling the Bears and going East to take the national title from them. One of the most thrilling meets in the history of Stanford-California competition may be the result before the last event is run.

Additional interest attaches to today's meet because some of the men competing will probably represent the United States at the Olympic Games this summer. Stanford and California have always produced athletes of national renown, and with a number of brilliant prospects in action the times and distances made this afternoon will give some indication of the representation of the Cardinal and the Blue and Gold on the American Olympic team.

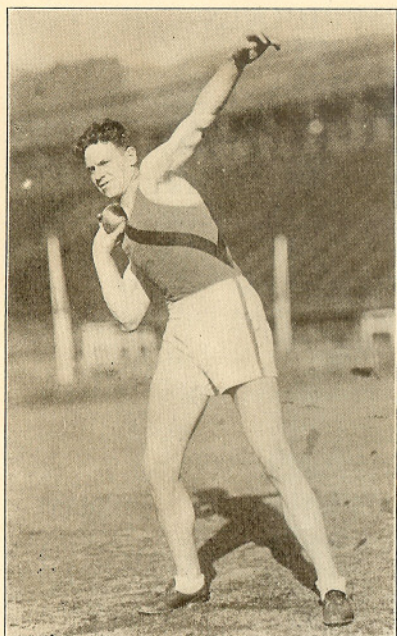

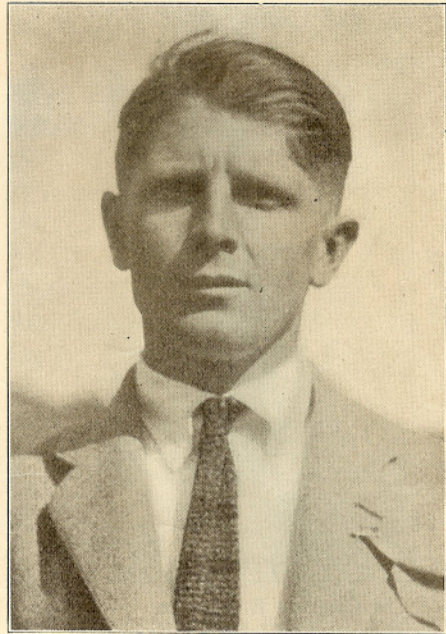
TRACK CAPTAINS

Bill Neufeldt is without a doubt the outstanding man on the Blue and Gold team. Last year in the Big Meet he won both the shot and discus events and took second in the javelin. His throw of 137 feet 4 inches with the discus set a new Stanford-California record. This season he showed himself to be a real captain by making 13 points in the California-U. S. C. meet, being high-point man of the day.

Nelson Van Judah, Cardinal captain, is a veteran performer in the quarter-mile and relay, and for the past three years has been one of the outstanding and consistent 440 men on the coast. Not only his consistent work on the track, but his ability to lead and encourage his men has made him a worthy man to captain the 1924 Stanford team, one of the greatest aggregations in recent years to wear the Cardinal.



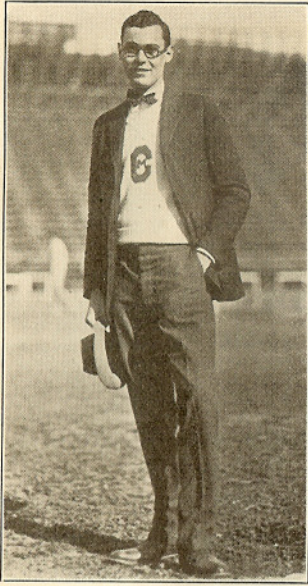

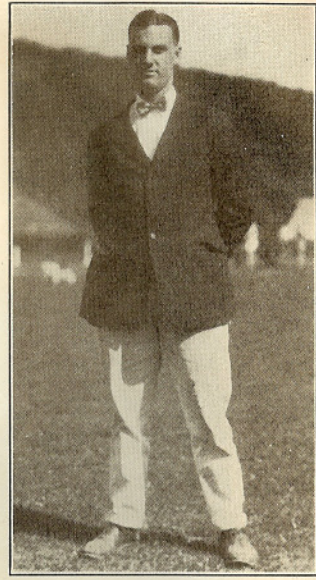

Walter Christie, coach of California track teams for more than twenty years, has come to be recognized as one of the outstanding track coaches in the United States. For the past three years his team has won the I. C. A.A.A.A. meet, the track classic of America, in competition with the best men in the country. He has not only sought to develop good performers on the track and field, but has worked faithfully for a better recognition of western athletics. He has recently been named to assist Lawson Robertson of Pennsylvania with the coaching of the track and field team which will represent the United States at the Olympic Games this summer.

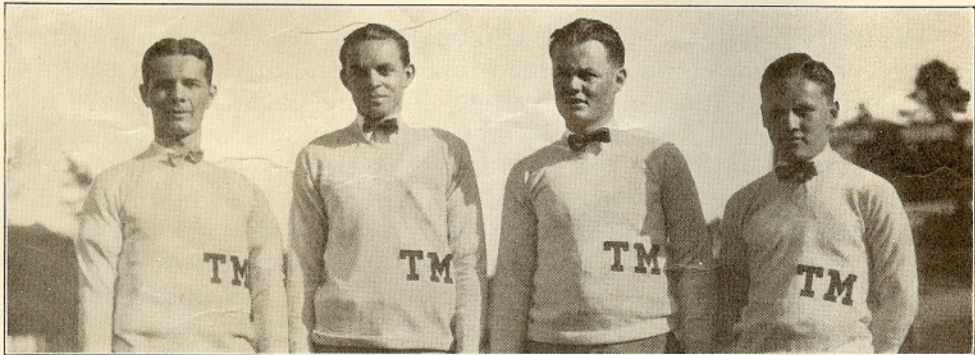
Robert L. Templeton, known only as "Dink" to all Stanford people, is completing his fourth season as coach of the Cardinal track team. His appointment came at the end of a brilliant career as a Stanford athlete, one of the greatest ever produced on the Farm, and he has been equally as successful as a coach. He is the youngest track coach in any American university of note, but his natural ability, enthusiasm, and constant study of his work have enabled him to more than hold his own in competition with older and more experienced coaches. In 1922, his team tied the Blue and Gold when not conceded a chance by the dopesters, and today, with a well-trained, hard-fighting aggregation, all followers of the Cardinal look forward to a victory over their old rivals from across the bay.

RELAY

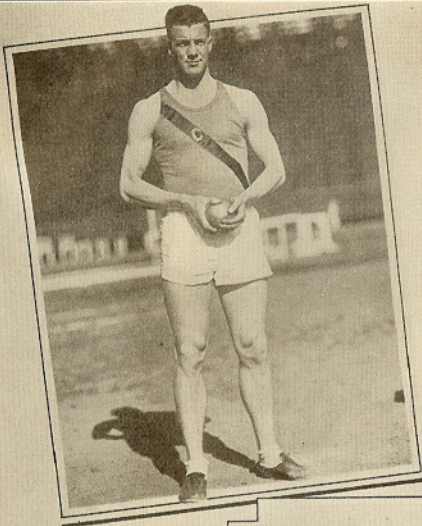
More than one Big Meet has been decided by the relay, always one of the most spectacular races of the day, and such may be the case today. Both Stanford and California have exceptionally good relay teams and have made good times in preliminary meets. Last Saturday the California relay men, Geertz, Aggeler, McMillan, and Hurst, defeated the Illinois team in the good time of 3:25 5-10. In the Stanford-Southern Conference meet on April 12 the Cardinal team, Smith, Coverley, Judah, and Miller, won in 3:24 7-10. It is probable that both coaches will shift their relay teams in order to get even faster combinations today.

The Stanford-California record for the four-man, one-mile relay was made in 1914 by the Stanford team, Gard, Wolcott, Murray, and Chace, the time being 3:21 3-5. After standing for ten years, this record is in danger of being broken today, for either team may be expected to do a little better than in previous performances under the stress of Big Meet competition.

The International Amateur Athletic Federation record for the relay is 3:16 4-5, made by the United States team, Rodgers, Brown, Eby, and Maxam, in 1921. This is also the American amateur record.

BASEBALL

Interest in college baseball, as in all other sports, has grown rapidly since the war. Every season more people attend the games and follow the teams, and the standard of competition among the Pacific Coast colleges is improving in proportion, and will continue to improve.

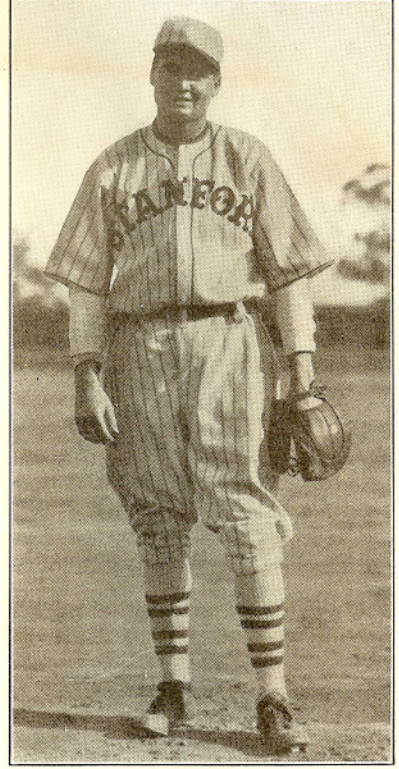
Particularly at Stanford we have increased the interest in baseball during the last two or three years, and although we have not had a team on the Farm that defeated California since 1919, the followers of the game are certain that the day is not far away, and with that spirit and the brand of baseball played this season we are going to give good, stiff competition to every team we meet, and win at least our share of games from now on.

On April 7 a meeting of representatives from ten coast colleges was held in Los Angeles for the purpose of promoting baseball interests at the next meeting of the Pacific Coast Conference. California, Stanford, University of Southern California, Davis Farm, Santa Clara, St. Mary's, Occidental, Pomona, California Institute of Technology, and U. C. Southern Branch were represented, and questions of schedules, eligibility rules, and similar matters were discussed. The organization expressed itself as being in favor of a series played by the Conference teams in California, and a similar series among the northern Conference institutions, with championship games between the winners in the two divisions, similar to the present system in basketball. Although the colleges outside the Conference would not participate in the sectional games, it is planned to include them to a greater extent in the regular schedules for the season. With the smaller institutions baseball is an important major sport and their teams are up to the standards of Conference colleges.

It is probable that baseball will continue to grow in popularity, both with student bodies and the general public, and better ball clubs in Pacific Coast colleges are bound to result.

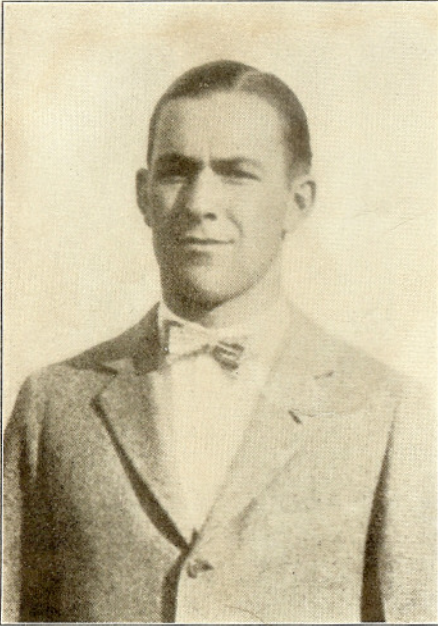

Both Stanford and California were forced to elect new baseball captains when the season was well under way, due to the ineligibility of the captains chosen at the end of last season. "Duffy" Gerlach replaced "Dutch" Thompson at California, and "Bud" Woodward was elected at Stanford when "Pat" Patterson resigned.

Gerlach is a veteran of three seasons with the Blue and Gold and holds down the third sack.

"Bud" Woodward is also playing his third year of baseball, and has won his block "S" twice in football. He is playing first base this year, but can work at almost any position on the team if necessary.

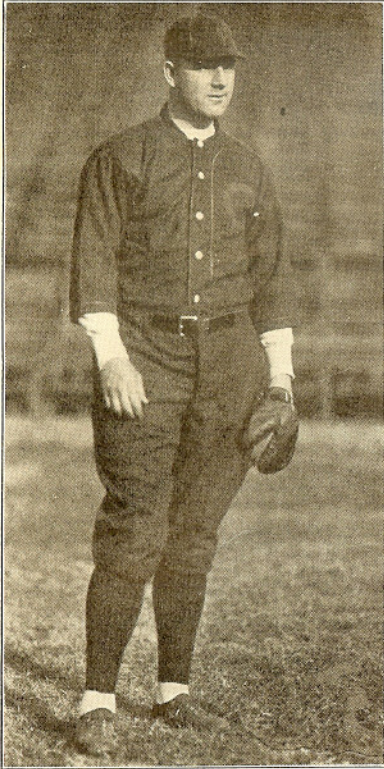

At both Stanford and California the tryoutee system is used in baseball as in all other sports. The present managers spent two busy seasons as sophomore tryoutees and junior managers to earn the job as senior manager. Then they found their troubles had only started, for they must make the arrangements for trips, take the teams to the places scheduled for games, please the coaches and players, keep their expenses within the budget allowed for the sport, see that their assistants receive and care for the visiting teams, have the grounds ready for games, care for the equipment, have umpires on hand for all games, and the thousand and one things incidental to the managing of a college baseball team. By the time the season has ended they have fully earned their "S" or "C," for they have worked fully as long and hard as the men who play the game.



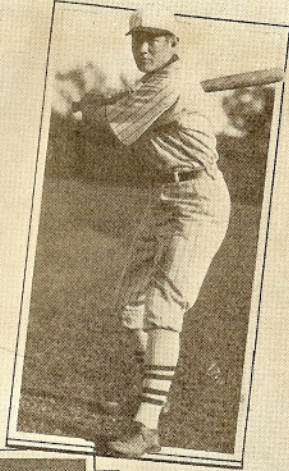
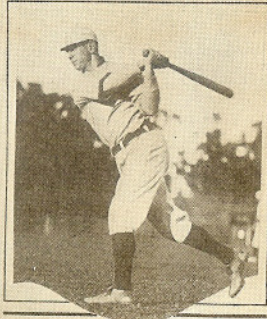
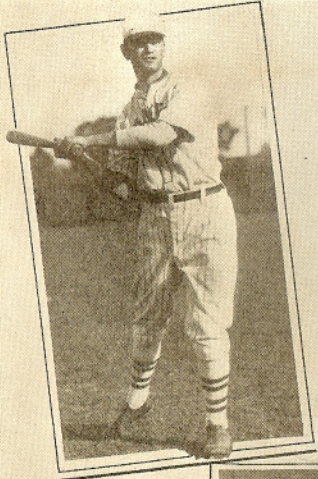

Carl Zamloch has coached the Blue and Gold ball tossers for the past several years and has always had a team that compared favorably with any college outfit. He has been successful in winning from Stanford for the past four years. Several of the men who played under him have later made good in fast company. He advocates a schedule of Conference baseball games similar to that played in football in order to stimulate interest in the game.

After coaching the Stanford team in 1916, Harry Wolter signed up with the Chicago Cubs. His big league career was cut short when he broke a leg sliding into a base, so he turned again to coaching. He returned to Stanford last season, where he has bent all his energies to developing a strong team. He believes that the present team has shown a steady development that will call forth every ounce of California's strength in the annual series. Through his efforts baseball has greatly increased in popularity at Stanford during the past two years.

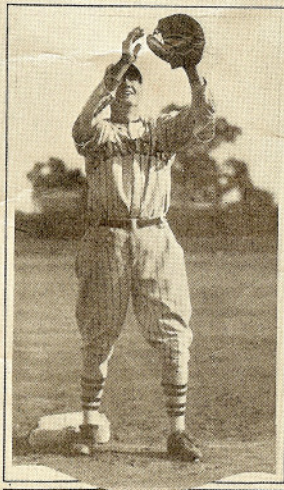

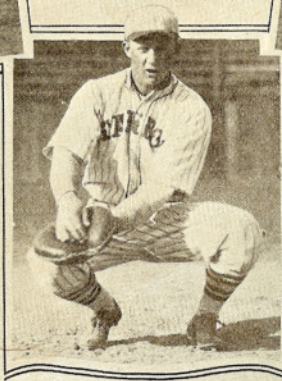

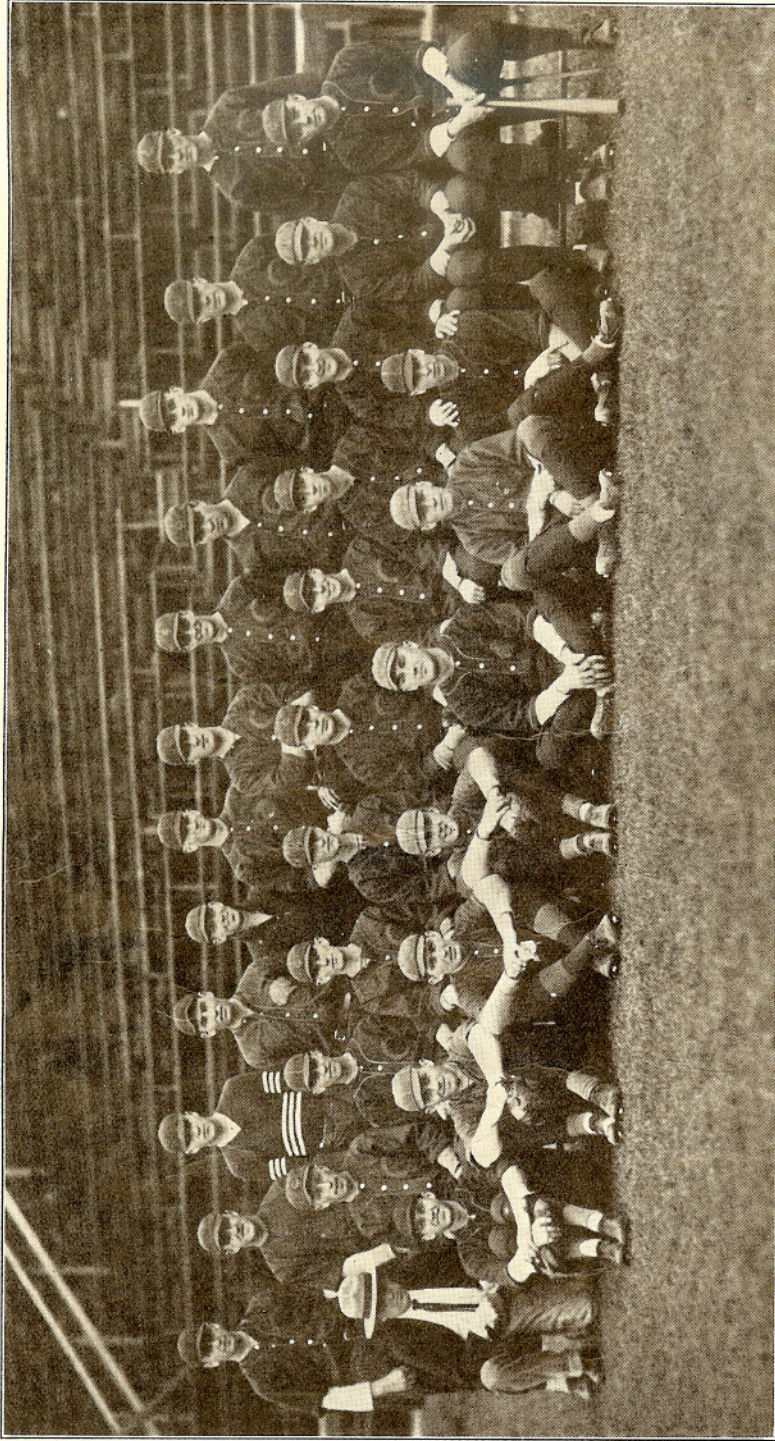
