

BAKERSFIELD WINS VALLEY C. I. F. MEET IN CLOSE FINISH

HANFORD, Calif., May 1.—(A. P.)—The Bakersfield High school nosed out Fresno and Hanford in a sensational finish to the valley track and field meet held here this afternoon. The final outcome of the meet was in doubt until the discus throw and the relay, the last two events of the day, had been decided. The final score was: Bakersfield 33, Fresno 27, Hanford 22.

The high point man was Dodson of Fresno, with $10\frac{1}{4}$ points, closely pressed by Knowles of Bakersfield, 10, and Rice of Hanford, $9\frac{1}{4}$.

A remarkable performance was that of Carter of Kingsburgh High, who, though handicapped by an artificial foot, broke the high jump record of 5 feet $9\frac{3}{4}$ inches made by Hill of Coalinga in 1916. Carter cleared 5 feet $11\frac{3}{4}$ inches.

Porterville easily won the limited class competition with $14\frac{1}{2}$ points. Bakersfield was second with 13 7-10 and Hanford third, with $9\frac{1}{2}$.

**Carter, of Kingsburg, With Arti-
ficial Foot, Breaks High Jump
Record Ten Years Standing**

Bakersfield High nosed out Fresno and Hanford in a sensational finish to the Valley track and field meet held here yesterday. The final outcome of the meet was in doubt until the discus throw and the relay, the last two events of the day, had been decided. The final score was Bakersfield 33, Fresno 27, Hanford 22.

The high point man of the day was Dodson of Fresno High with 10 1-4 points. He was pressed closely by Knowles of Bakersfield with 10 and Rice of Hanford with 9 1-4.

Carter, of Kingsburg High, jumping under the handicap of an artificial foot, shattered the Valley record for the high jump with a leap of 5 feet, 11 3-4 inches. This was the only record broken or equaled although in many events the records were in danger. Carter's remarkable performance was easily the feature of the day. The previous record of 5-9 3-4 was made in 1916 by Hill of Coalinga.

One of the prettiest races of the day was the 100 yard dash, in which all contestants were so closely bunched at the finish that there was doubt in the minds of the spectators as to the winner. Jackson, of Fresno, barely heading his teammate Tsuki Ball of Porterville, and Rice of Fresno, placed second and third, who were so close that many thought it was a tie.

In the mile run, Wymore of Porterville, chased Knowles, of Fresno, for the entire distance and made a strong bid for the honors in the last furlong when with a fine sprint he nearly overtook his opponent.

Porterville easily won the limited class competition with 24 1-2 points. Bakersfield was second with 13 and 7-10, and Hanford third with 9 1-2. Castle of Porterville was high point man in this class, with

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10 points, Frame of Porterville, second with 7 1-2.

WASHINGTON SOLONS PLAY NATIONAL GAME

Washington, May 1. Congressional dignity was left at an almost deserted capitol today while house and senate adjourned to the American League park for a baseball game between house Republicans and Democrats. The Donkey beat the Elephant, 12 to 9.

It was a contest of "has-been and never-wasers," and both gave out at the end of the seventh inning, when a hall was called. As is customary the two parties had an argument, Democrats holding up the game at one time to make a point of order that the Republicans were batting out of order.

The decision of the umpires was overruled. They appealed to press correspondents for support. But the reporters decided in favor of the Democrats. Preceding the game, Representative Soj Bloom, a New York Democrat, won a single-handed victory. He was high bidder at \$600 for a baseball autographed by President Coolidge. Nick Altrock, comedian of the Washington Nationals, who was a visitor, faked a temporary collapse when the bidding reached \$500. The receipts go to the Women's Congressional Club here.

SOUTHERN C. I. F. RECORDS

Los Angeles, May 1.—Monks, of Hollywood high school, equaled the world's high school record for the 120 high hurdles and broke the state high school record here today by vaulting the barriers in 15-2 seconds.

James Payne of San Bernardino broke his own national record in the 220-yard low hurdles, running the distance in 23.8 seconds. The Hollywood 880-yard four-man relay team set a new national mark of 1 minute, 30 seconds.

Polytechnic's score for the meet was 22 1-6 points, Hollywood was second with 18 3-8; San Diego third, 15 1-2; Manual Arts, Los Angeles, fourth, 10 2-3; San Bernardino fifth, 9 points. Santa Barbara scored two points.
