

# SECOND PLACE HONORS TAKEN BY BERKELEY

Polytechnic Finishes Third in  
Annual North Coast C. I. F.  
Competition at Palo Alto

SIX new records were registered in the book when Palo Alto High School's track and field artists nosed out Berkeley High School, 27 to 26, yesterday afternoon on the Stanford oval to capture the North Coast Section California Interscholastic Federation championship which was won by Berkeley High last year.

It was a thrilling meet from start to finish, and as the results show was marked by record times and distances equal in many cases to those made by more mature college freshman.

Perhaps the most outstanding feature of the meet was the rather unique manner in which the winner was determined, and the fact that Polytechnic High School of San Francisco, competing for the first time with a badly crippled team placed third with 18 1-6 points.

Palo Alto had amassed 27 points at the end of the relay race which it won in the record time of 1:33 seconds, with the discus results yet to come.

## ASSURED OF TIE.

Garfinkel of Berkeley High was in second place in the discus throw, and the Yellowjackets were practically assured of a tie when the dope was upset by a crippled athlete from Poly High.

This lad is Elmer Berglund, who despite orders from a doctor forbidding him to compete in the N. C. S. meet, came from behind in his last throw to toss the plate 118 ft. to take second place for Polytechnic and thus enable Palo Alto to win by the lone point.

It was the half mile event, the first on the program that proved to be the real sensation of the meet.

## BECKER TRIUMPHS.

Becker of Berkeley High was picked to win rather easily from the rest of the field, and at the same time break the record. It is true that he won, and broke the record in the fast time of 2:02 3-5, but the battle he was given by Sandy Erickson of Polytechnic is worth writing home about.

Captain Erickson was not figured to do much better than a fourth place, but he followed close behind Becker all the way, and in the final sprint down the home stretch.

## WINS WITH EASE.

It was Captain Warner Wilson, the speed demon of Palo Alto High School, who deserves the bulk of the praise for the peninsula's school's victory, for he won the 100 and 220-yard dashes with comparative ease, and broke the century record by 1-10 of a second in the fast time of 10 1-10. Wilson was also anchor man on the relay team, and completely outclassed the field in the last 220 yards in which he was clocked at 22 seconds.

Tamalpais High sprung another of the many surprises of the afternoon by copping first and second in the mile run, with Ford, breaking the record, running four-lap race in 4 minutes 42 6-10 seconds, with his team mate, Walker, running right behind him.

## COPS FINALS.

Garcia of Hollister High lived up to his reputation as a low hurdler, for after running a fairly fast heat which he won, he copped the finals with about 10 yards to spare, in the fast time of 26 seconds flat.

Petaluma High School's ace was Young, who romped home with first place in the high hurdles, a second in the shot put, and a fourth in the javelin to garner a total of 9 of the 15 points tallied by his team.

The 440-yard race, which was won by Morrison of San Mateo High in the fast time of 51 6-10 seconds, was a sad disappointment to Captain Bill Wilson of St. Ignatius High, for after having led all the way down the home stretch he seemed to tighten up at the tape, and was beaten madly, taking a poor fourth place.

## HOTLY CONTESTED.

The pole vault was a hotly contested event, with Larson of Poly and Baker of Palo Alto tying for first place at 11 feet 8 $\frac{1}{2}$  inches. Peavy of Lick-Wilmerding nosed in for a third place, while six other men tied for fourth place.

Lauterwasser of Poly was beaten in the javelin by a lad from Centerville High named Dwart. He tossed the sphere 165 feet 2 $\frac{1}{4}$  inches, beating Lauterwasser by  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch. On a foul throw Lauterwasser tossed the javelin 166 feet 7 inches.

On the fourteen first places in the meet, Palo Alto High School's cinderpath stars captured four of them and tied for another, a record unequalled by any school entered in a North Coast Section meet in the past twelve years.

Although no official announcement was made after yesterday's meet, it was learned from those of authority that Palo Alto High track athletes will compete in the State Championship meet to be held in Los Angeles on May 8.
