

WYKOFF CAPTURES TRACK MEET FOR GLENDALE HIGH

Wing Frank Takes Three First Places; Pasadena 2nd; Santa Ana Third

story of Wykoff's performance. As pre-figured, southern California athletes won major honors. The second state record which was shoved into the discard, was also made by a southern supporter, youth—Jeddy Walsh of Pasadena. His mark was made in the high hurdles, which he tipped in 14.48 seconds. The old state record, made by Meeks of Hollywood in 1926, was 15.1 seconds. Walsh repeated his victory in the low hurdles, cresting them in 24 seconds flat, to come within one-tenth of a second of the state record made by Payne of San Bernardino in 1926. Falter founded out Glendale's great team by tossing the 12 pound shot 40 feet 3 5/8 inches for first. Aycliff of Los Angeles Polytechnic was closely pressed in the half mile, to break the warsted ahead of Peris, Harvard Military Academy athlete. The time was 2 minutes 3.45 seconds, not fast enough to jeopardize the existing mark.

OF the thirteen starters, Helstank of Sacramento led the field to the finish in the mile run, to win northern California's third first place of the meet.

YOUTH TAKES THREE FIRST PLACES; SETS NEW RECORD

Pasadena Finishes In
Second Place; Santa
Ana Captures Third

Bang! Bang! Bang!
"Flying Frank" Wykoff of Glendale high school's "Dynamiters" rocked the field here yesterday with three explosive performances, so single-handedly score enough points to give his team victory over 84 other select track squads.

This "fastest juvenile human," the big noise of Glendale's TNT squad, blew up a state record in the 220 yard dash that had withstood the assaults of seven years of competition, tied the 100 yard dash mark and placed first in the broad jump.

Wykoff Wins Meet

His two and a half points in the relay race gave him a total of 17 1/2 (kisses—a half point more than the total score made by Pasadena high school, which finished second in the meet.

Santa Ana was third with 11, giving southern California the first three places in the meet.

Arrayed against a field of 260 of California's choicest athletes, competing in the thirteenth annual California interscholastic Federation meet, Wykoff engraved his name in the record books as the greatest prep sprinter in a decade.

Wykoff, a one-man team in himself, didn't need the support of his teammates to give Glendale victory in California's greatest athletic event, but, as he was backed by men who were divided as invariably great as he, the "Dynamiters" point total reached 35 when the last event of the day, the relay, was run.

Slocum Shows His

Speed in Century

Russell Slocum, the second "fastest juvenile human," turned in performances that were exceeded only in T. N. T. qualities by "Flying Frank." Slocum finished almost in a dead-heat with his teammate in the century, placed third in the 220 yard dash and was a member of Glendale's winning relay squad. The finish in the 100 was so close between the two red-stripped youths that it required a consultation of judges to name the lad who first breasted the tape.

Wykoff's time in the 100 was 9 4/6 seconds; Slocum ran it in under 10 seconds flat—a time not equalled in the Stanford-California "Big Game."

After tying the state record in this event, Flying Frank took a few deep breaths, won a first in the broad jump in a matter-of-fact sort of way and then leaped out of his holes in the 220 yard dash.

Sets New Record

In 220 Yard Dash

At the half-way mark the fastest "juvenile human" shot past the field to win the event by yards over Habies of King City. There was a hush as the timers put their heads together and then a cheer when his time of 21 seconds flat was announced.

His flying heels shattered the old record of 21.8 seconds made in 1920 by Sudden of Lick-Wilmerding, San Francisco.

The prep school athlete, who combines the qualities of Charley Faddock and Roland Locke, is a huskily built chap of medium height. His features go unnoticed as it is hard to concentrate on any thing but his legs. But the few who did focus their eyes above Wykoff's thighs discovered he has sandy-colored hair and blue eyes.

He's just a boy in his 'teens. And he is still developing.

FRANK WYKOFF STARS IN PREP TITULAR MEET

Glendale Sprinter Wins Three Events, Gives Team Victory, Ties Record for 100 Yards

STADIUM, MODESTO, May 7.

—(AP)—Behind the flashing heels of Flying Frank Wykoff, Glendale High School won the thirteenth annual California Interscholastic Federation track and field championship here today with a score of 35 points.

Wykoff, sprinter extraordinary and broad jumper of ability, won the meet almost single handed for his school with three first places. He captured the 100 and 220 yard dashes and leaped to victory in the broad jump, equaling the State record in the first event and setting a new mark in the second with times of 9 4-5 seconds and 21 flat, respectively.

Pasadena High School piled up 17 points to hold down second place, while Santa Ana High took third position with 11 tallies.

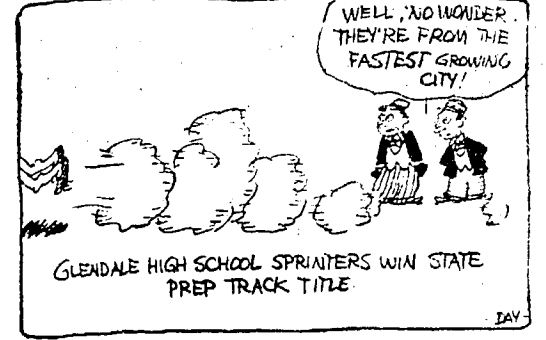

GLENDALE WINS STATE PREP SCHOOL TRACK TITLE

WYKOFF SHOWS WAY WITH TRIO OF FIRST PLACES

Sets Mark in Furlong Dash; Takes Hundred, Broad Jump Events; Pasadena Places Second

MODESTO, May 7. (AP)—A blond-thatched youngster, answering to the name of Frank Wykoff and seemingly possessed with the wings of Mercury, hung up three brilliant victories in the thirteenth annual California Interscholastic Federation track-and-field meet here today to virtually win the championship alone for his alma mater—Glendale High School. His efforts accounted for 15 of the 35 total winning points.

In his portrayal of a one-man team, "Flying Frank" streaked down the lanes for first positions in the 100 and 220-yard dashes; leaped out over space 22ft. 2in. to capture the broad jump and topped off the sparkling individual performances by aiding his school to annex the half-mile relay, last event of the day. Before his stunning speed, a seven-year record in the furlong was tumbled into oblivion and a new mark of 21s. flat established. It was the only record broken in the meet. The former record time of 21 8-10s. was set in 1920 by Sudden of Lick-Wilmerding, San Francisco.

Aside from that, Wykoff tied the C.I.F. mark in the 100 of 9 4-5s. In this event, he was pressed closely by his team-mate, Stocum, who also ran to third place in the 220-yard dash.

ounding out the winning combination's total, Falter heaved the shot 49ft. 9 5-8 in., for the first place in that trial and another five points.

Dimmed only by the work of the Glendale star, was the individual prowess of Welch, Pasadena hurdler, who topped both the 120 highs and 220-yard low barriers for triumphs to account for ten of the seventeen points which placed Pasadena second.

The high-jump record was seriously threatened when Scott of Eureka, slid over the bar at 6ft. 3-in., the present mark is 6 ft. 1 1/2 in.

SARGEIS IS CERTAIN TO GET POINTS

Erickson, Oakdale Athlete, May Garner a Place in Broad Jump Event

WILLIAM the Flying Heels of the Golden State conclude their annual convention on the Modesto high school track Saturday, Stanislaus county men will not go unmentioned on the minute book.

Interest will center largely on individual performances, for no county school has even the slimmest of chances to win. Individually, however, it's a matter of a different color. At least two of the Stanislaus leading events are fairly certain to figure in the final and record books, and several others should pick up portions of the annual obituary.

BANGS IN JUMP

The two whose past actions speak loudest are both jumpers. Erickson, of Oakdale, performs a "horizontal" and Sargeis, of Turlock, does the up and over. Both have done rather well, and not for an altogether too adequate supply of jumpers, Stanislaus county could count on two firsts.

Erickson has bettered 22 feet, but then so has Wyckoff, Glendale high school boy who last Saturday won three first places for his school in the Southern California meet.

Wyckoff, however, has the edge, and not a thin edge at that, for his mark of 22 feet two inches was made in competition just four days ago, while Erickson's performance that bettered 22 feet was recorded in practice.

In the central section meet held Saturday, Erickson jumped only 20 feet 10 1/2 inches. This was enough to win first, however, and perhaps he could have put his feet in it a few not further down the line if it had been necessary.

Sargeis, judging from past performances, has about an even chance to win the high jump, his closest competitor should be Schott, of Turlock, who has done 6 feet 1. Sargeis cleared 6 feet 6 inches in the central California meet at Chico, and after you're up six feet, what's a half-foot?

Sargeis also throws the discus, but not far enough to greatly worry the crowd. He took second at the Chico meet, where the winning toss was 112 feet. At Los Angeles, the mark was 120 feet. Erickson also does the high and low hurdles, but the authorities may not wait for him. He was fourth overall at Chico, the high is 10 3/4 and the low is 21 1/4. The times for these stunts at Los An-
