Runs Winning Lap on Roman Relay Team

Glendale Star is Victor in 100-Yard Dash

The long-awaited Wykoff-Lombardi duel ended in a draw at the Coliseum yesterday afternoon and

by virtue of the Roman runner's victory in the furlong Los Angeles High copped the annual Southern California interscholastic track and field championship. Fair-haired Frank won the century all by himself in 9 4-5s., but bowed to his Roman rival in the 220, Lombardi's winning time being 21 3-5s. Only the width of a worm's hips separated the two boys in the furlong, while Wykoff's margin in the century was almost three yards.

Showing the stuff of which champions are made, Lombardi came back after his decisive defeat in the 100, and not only trimmed Wykoff in the longer sprint but actually brought Los Angeles High victory in the afternoon's meet by running a space-annihilating lap on the Roman relay squad. Black-haired Frank was yesterday's hero and he richly deserves the plaudits of the multitude.

RELAY DECIDED IT

The relay decided the meet, as had been expected. Glendale ruled the favorite, due to the setting of a new record in the preliminaries last week, but the Dynamiters were already out of the running, due to Wykoff's defeat in the 220 and his downfall in the broad jump. The struggle was strictly between Long Beach and Los Angeles High. Long Beach had an imposing total of 18 points. The Romans trailed with 15 1-4, a total which looked rather slim alongside of Long Beach's score.

With Wykoff running the first 220, Glendale naturally got off to a respectable lead. Long Beach ran second and L. A. High, third. The second Roman runner got a bad pass to "Red" Houck and the fiery-knatched galloper started off fully fifteen yards behind his Glendale rival. Now, Bro. Houck is not red-headed for nothing, as he demonstrated, much to the annoyance of Glendale and Long Beach rooters. Running as if he were going to a fire, Houck made up a large part of the loss and passed the baton to Lombardi. Frank got off in a hurry, but Slocum of Glendale, was more than five yards in front of him and even the last Long Beach runner was away before Lombardi's flying feet started him on his jaunt to victory. In no time at all, Frank forged into second place, with only Slocum between himself and a wonderful triumph. Slowly but surely, the Roman rambler gained, until they came to the final curve, when it seemed that he could gain no more. Then as they raced into the home stretch, Frank pulled for all he was worth and the final effort shot him past Slocum in a hurry, the sudden spurt occurring ten yards from the tape and giving Lombardi a margin of more than two yards at the finish. That won the meet for L. A. High. It also brought a new world's record of 1m. 23s. to the Romans.

The boys had a lot of fun with the record book yesterday.

FIVE NEW RECORDS

Five new Southern California records were established and two of these will go down in the books as

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aries last week. L. A. High's mark a new world's interscholastic record.

Pole vault—Miller (Long Beach), 13ft. 2 5/8-in. Old record of 13ft. 1 5/8-in. made by Williams of Inglewood in 1925. Miller's mark a new world's interscholastic record.

High jump—Van Osdel (Compton), 6ft. 7 1/8-in. Equals his own mark made in preliminaries last week. Old record of 6ft. 2 1/8-in. made by Coggeshall of L. A. Poly in 1924.

Broad jump—Barber (Long Beach), 23ft. Old record of 22ft. 4 3/4-in. made by Sullivan of L. A. High in 1926.

100-yard dash—Wykoff (Glendale), equaled the record of 9 4/5-sec., which he holds jointly with Lombardi of L. A. High and Slocum of Glendale.

Eddie Rich's Roman team just naturally had too much all around strength for both Glendale and Long Beach. Los Angeles High placed in eight events. Los Angeles Poly came next, winning points in six events. The Romans got three firsts, as did Long Beach. The Roman entries fell down only in the mile, where Crossley and Ferrie failed to place.

TOO MUCH FOR WYKOFF

Wykoff's task of winning three firsts and running on the relay team proved more than any human could stand up under, which isn't surprising considering the class of competition which Frank faced yesterday. He got off to a nice start by winning the 100, but about the same time Dick Barber of Long Beach startled the populace by leaping 23ft. on his first broad jump effort. This just about sank Glendale then and there as Wykoff had bettered that mark only once and then with the wind at his back. As it turned out Barber's mark stood all afternoon. Wykoff did 22ft. 1 1/2-in. on his first leap, a noble effort, but crow-hopped an inch or so.

Lombardi never had a chance in the 100, Wykoff putting on a burst of speed at the eighty-yard mark to win by almost three yards. In the furlong the two boys ran side by side most of the way and finished in what looked like a dead heat, although all the judges agreed that Lombardi had won.

Foore of L. A. High started the Romans on their way to victory by cracking the 880-yard record in the opening event of the day. He just went right out in front and stayed there, which isn't a bad way to run.

BERRY SURPRISES

Berry of Fairfax was a surprise winner in the high hurdles. It was the defeat of Bills in this race that cost Long Beach the meet. The Jackrabbits had expected Bills to win. He did take the lows, but the damage was already done.

Childreth of Long Beach profited by Foore's performance in the 880 and went into the lead at the start of the 440, stayed there while a lot of other guys were struggling in the ruck, and then won as he pleased in 49 3/5-sec. Houck was caught in the rut and only got third by dint of his great driving power during the last thirty yards.

Bill Miller's vaulting feat would have overshadowed every event in any meet but one which featured Wykoff vs. Lombardi. Imagine a mere kid of 16 years clearing 13ft. 2 5/8-in., when the Olympic Games vault was won at 12ft. 11 1/8-in., only four years ago. Jefferson of Inglewood vaulted 13ft. yesterday.

Fred Westerberg, who timed the 100-yard dash with his new motion-picture watch invention, caught Wykoff in 9 19/25, which is just slightly under the announced time of 9 4/5-sec. It would have been interesting had Westerberg had his camera on the finish of the 220.
