

LONG BEACH TEAM GETS 21 POINTS FOR STATE TITLE

Los Angeles High Pulls In Second; Glendale Is Third

SELMA, Fresno Co., May 5.—Frank Lombardi, dark haired athlete from the Los Angeles high school, is the latest track sensation to arise from the ranks of California high schools. The lithe southern sprinter ran 101 yards in 9.6 seconds, the recognized world's century record, here this afternoon in the fourteenth annual California Interscholastic federation track and field meet which saw six records pass by the board before the afternoon of thrilling performances came to an end.

Lombardi placed himself on a plane with Charley Borah, Russell Sweet, Charles Paddock and a few other of the nation's greatest sprinters much his senior. His performance overshadowed those of other athletes which in themselves were brilliant. The southern sprint flash actually ran 101 yards. For jumping the gun he was set back one yard at the start and it was only his wonderful finish which brought him in barely ahead of Frank Wyckoff, his greatest rival from Glendale high. He clipped one-fifth of a second off the former prep mark, established by Werner of Brawley in 1926.

Seven Clocks

Seven clocks were on the first place man, and six of these snapped Lombardi in 9.6 and the seventh shaded toward 9.5. Had it not been for the penalty, it is probable that the nation would have another man to place alongside Charley Paddock, who has an unofficial mark of 9.5 seconds.

Los Angeles' stellar Italian sprint performer, not more than 19 years of age, later in the afternoon flashed down the furlong in 21.4 seconds in a deadlock with Wyckoff, sharing another state records with the Glendale star. Lombardi ended a day that completely subdued a similar performance of Wyckoff last season at Modesto, when he ascended to the pinnacle of prep cinder ranks by racing home in his quarter of the relay, giving his school five points in that event and clipping off a fraction of a second from the 880-yard relay mark.

Other marks which were eclipsed during the afternoon were the high jump, javelin throw and broad jump.

Win Team Honors

Long Beach, with four first places and one fourth in the relay, is the champion of the 1928 interscholastic track and field championship with 21 points. Los Angeles high pulled in second with 16 markers, and Glendale was third with 10. Point scores of other teams placing were: Redlands, 8; Los Angeles Poly, 6½; Huntington Park, 6½; Visalia, 6; Jefferson, 5; Oxnard, 5; San Diego, 5; Woodland, 5; Compton, 4; Puente, 4; College City, 3; Fairfax, 3; Hanford, 3; Inglewood, 3; Kingsburg, 3; Lodi, 3; Redondo, 3; Santa Ana, 3; Stockton, 3; Taff, 3; Piedmont, 3; Centerville, 2; Fresno Tech, 2; Hollywood, 2; Mount Shasta, 2; Parlier, 2; Pomona, 2; San Luis Obispo, 2; Monrovia, 1½; Turlock, 1; Santa Cruz, 1; Santa Barbara, 1; San Jose, 1.

Long Beach's victory came largely by the efforts of Bills, who headed the field in both hurdle events. Los Angeles high, conceded the strongest chance to win, saw all its hopes collapse when Foore, its mainstay in the 880-yard run, withered under the heat and was not able to complete the final lap. Welch of Visalia, after taking an early lead only to lose it, had the stamina to stage a final sprint for a first place, closely followed by Moran of Piedmont. The time was comparatively slow, 2 minutes 1.8 seconds.

Six Records Shattered In C. I. F. Track Meet Here Last Saturday

High School Athletes Carry Name of Selma To All Parts of Country in Great Competition on Local Field

One world's record was tied and six new California high school records were established in the state field and track meet here Saturday to blazon the name of Selma on the archives of the California Interscholastic Federation and the annals of world sports.

The meet, which was accorded as one of the greatest prep school sporting events of its kind ever held in California, was won by Long Beach High School with 21 points. Los Angeles High was second with 16 points and Glendale third with 10 points.

Lombardi Stars

The flying feet of Frank Lombardi, 19-year-old L. A. High School youth carried him the distance of 101 yards in 9 3-5 seconds to equal the recognized world's 100 yard dash record and shatter the C. I. F. mark for that event. Given a one-yard penalty for jumping the gun, Lombardi, with a brilliant effort, flashed down the lane to break the tape just ahead of his rival, Frank Wyckoff of Glendale. Six of the seven timers clocked Lombardi at 9.6 and the seventh watch, examined under a microscope, showed 9.5. Had it not been for the handicap the dark haired Frank would probably have tied Charley Paddock's unofficial mark of 9.5. As it is his name will be placed alongside that of Kelly, Drew, Paddock and Coaf-fee, who have travelled the century in that time.

News of the astonishing feat of this youngster was carried to all parts of the nation by press associations and special wires and sent the fame of the Selma track crashing into sport page headlines the following morning.

Six Records Fall

The six records broken, with the old marks, are as follows:

100-yard dash—Lombardi, L. A. High, 9.6. Old C. I. F. record of 9.8 made by Wehner of Brawley in 1926 at the Los Angeles Coliseum.

220-yard run—Wyckoff, Glendale, and Lombardi, L. A. High, tied, 21.4. Old C. I. F. record of 21.8 made by Sudden of Lick - Wilmerding in 1918.

High Jump—Lassalette, Puente, and Van Osdel, Compton, tied at 6 feet 2 3-5 inches and in the jump-off Lassalette cleared 6 feet 4 1-2 inches for new record. Old C. I. F. record of 6 feet 1 1-2 inches made by Bowen of Santa Monica in 1925.

Broad Jump—Barber, Long Beach, 23 feet 5 1-4 inches. Old C. I. F. record of 23 feet 2 3-4 inches made by Kaer of Red Bluff in 1923.

Javelin throw—McKenzie, Ox-nard, 174 feet 4 7-8 inches. Old C. I. F. record of 172 feet made by Lauterwasser of San Francisco Poly in 1923.

Half mile relay—L. A. High team composed of Rousseau, Houck, White and Lombardi, 1:29.6. Old C. I. F. record of 1:29.9 made by Holly-wood in 1926.

Records Recognized

All of these records, including Lombardi's time in equalling the world mark will be recognized, according to Logan C. Edwards, who had charge of the meet. Previous to the meet the track was surveyed by a licensed surveyor, the stop watches used were checked before and after the meet and read with

NEED FOR CLEARER TAX REPORT SHOWN

C. S. Hubbard, Fresno Educator,
Addresses Exchange Club
at Meeting Tuesday

Emphasizing the need for a clearer and more understandable report of the distribution of tax money in Fresno County, C. S. Hubbard, assistant superintendent of the Fresno city schools addressed members of the Exchange Club at their meeting Tuesday. W. H. Dewhirst was the day's program chairman and introduced the speaker. The musical program included selections by the Boys' Glee Club of Selma Union High School under the direction of Edward C. Snyder. Mr. Hubbard in his talk declared that charts prepared by county experts to show the Fresno County expenditures were confusing to the average citizen and tended to present an unexact picture of the distribution of money raised in the county. Although 56.23 per cent of the money spent in Fresno county is for educational purposes in reality only 38.18 per cent of the total amount of money in the county is used for this purpose, Mr. Hubbard showed. The remainder comes from outside sources such as the federal department, the state and from the sale of bonds, he pointed out. Thirty per cent of the money spent in the country in 1926 and 1927 came from sources outside the county, the speaker declared. The published reports and charts should be accompanied by tables clarifying the expenditures and giving the citizens a more intelligent understanding of the distribution of the funds, he said.

H. C. Carr of San Francisco, a member of the Bank of Italy corporation will be the speaker at next Tuesday's meeting.

Scores by Schools

Taking four first places and a fourth in the relay race, Long Beach High School won the state title in the fourteenth annual C. I. F. meet. Point scores for the other schools are: L. A. High 16, Glendale 10, Redlands 8, Huntington Park 6 1-2, L. A. Poly 6 1-2, Visalia 6, Jefferson 5, Oxnard 5, San Diego 5, Woodland 5, Compton 4, Lodi 4, Puente 4, College City 3, Fairfax 3, Hanford 3, Inglewood 3, Redondo 3, Santa Ana 3, Stockton 3, Taft 3, Piedmont 3, Centerville 2, Fresno Tech. 2, Hollywood 2, Kingsburg 2, Mt. Lombardi, who placed first in the 100-yard dash, tied with Wyckoff in the 220, and had a big share in the relay victory, tallied 10 1-4 points to cop highest individual honors for the meet, Bills of Long Beach was second with 10 points.

It was a great day for the dark haired Frank from L. A. High. After winning the century he took his heat in the 220-yard run and then tied with Wyckoff for a new record in that event. As a grand finale to his day's performance he spurred from ten yards behind the Glendale runner on the last lap of the half mile relay to win that race and clip three-tenths of a second off the old relay record. His performance in the 100-yard dash will considerably strengthen his chances for making the 1928 Olympic team.

Century Race First

The century was the first item on the afternoon's program and as many of the contestants had dropped out, the heats were abandoned. With the Two Franks renewing their track duel the race proved to be a thrilling affair. Benefiting by Lombardi's one yard handicap, Wyckoff led the parade but with his rival thundering close behind until near the end of the stretch when the steller Italian sprinter passed the fair-haired Frank from Glendale to win in a brilliant finish.

The furlong was another brilliant affair which brought the 1300 spectators to their feet. Wyckoff jumped into the lead at the start and half way down the lane was leading Lombardi by about a yard but again a final spurt brought the L. A. High flash to the tape to tie with his rival.

Bills 'Collects'

Bills of Long Beach started the Jackrabbits on their march to victory by winning the 120 high hurdles. His race with Berry of Fairfax in this event was a close one. Then later in the afternoon Bills repeated his performance to win the 220 high hurdles, but the time in both of these two events was nothing to write home about and both the old marks remained on the books. Childreth of Long Beach, as had been doped, placed first in the 440-yard run and Barber added another valuable five points to the school's total by breaking a record to win the broad jump, also according to dope. A fourth place in the relay gave Long Beach its other point.

What hopes Los Angeles High may have had of winning the meet were sunk when Foore, who was expected to win the 280, found the going under the hot sun too strenuous and was forced to drop out on the last lap. Welsh of Visalia, after losing an early lead, came back with a final sprint to be the first one to reach the tape in this event with Moran of Piedmont close at his heels.

Some High-Jumping

Van Osdel of Compton and Lasallete of Puente, tied with each other to better their record breaking mark of 6 feet 1 1-2 inches in the

high jump but neither was able to stretch this until after the competition was finished when Lasallete won 6 feet 4 1-2 inches over bar in the jump off.

McKenzie of Oxnard, a comparatively unheralded youth, shattered the standing record in the javelin throw by hurling the spear 137 feet 4 7-8 inches. Duarte of Centerville and Brase of Fresno T who have hurled the javelin 127 feet 11 inches and 178 feet 3 inches respectively, on previous occasions could get no better than place third and fourth in this event.

Miller of San Diego, who a week previous at Los Angeles had surpassed the C. I. F. record climbing up into the ozone 13 feet 2 5-8 inches, placed first in the pole vault but could not officially lower the record.

The only development out of the ordinary in the mile run was the disqualification of Minch of Inglewood, for cutting in. Minch was reported by three different inspectors for three separate infractions of the rules and although he was the field and was the first to finish he was forced to surrender the honors to Brooks of Redlands, who was close behind Minch throughout the race, was timed at 4:30 while the C. I. record is 4:30.

Only fair marks were made in the shot put, which was won by Arbelvide of Huntington Park, and in the discus won by Stevens of Woodland. Houser's 1922 records of 55 feet 4 4-5 inches in the shot and 144 feet 3 1-5 inches in the discus are expected to endure some time.

seventy-five athletes from seventy-six schools took part in the meet which was witnessed by approximately 1300 spectators. The warm weather handicapped some of the athletes from the northern section of the state and several collapsed on the track. A slight trace of wind blew directly across the field and favored none of the athletes.

Track Praised

The Rose avenue athletic field with its excellent 220-yard straight-away, was well-equipped to handle the meet and its splendid condition received the highest comment from the visiting officials. As a result of Saturday's performance the track is now recognized as one of the fastest in the state. Under the supervision of Coach Edwards the numerous arrangements for staging the meet were completed according to schedule and the affair was run off with smoothness and a minimum of delay. A slight delay which preceded the relay was due to failure of the C. I. F. directors to announce a change in method of running this event.

NEARLY 200 HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETES COMING FOR EVENT

Selma To Be Host at Biggest Athletic Affair of Its Kind in Western Part of United States

With the cream of California's high school athletes competing in the west's biggest prep school sport event of the year, eight existing California Interscholastic Federation records seemed destined to become ancient history before the sun sets on the C. I. F. state field and track meet here Saturday afternoon. In addition to this there is also a possibility that a tenth of a second may be clipped from the present world's record in one of these events and a new world high school mark registered in another.

Among the afternoon's stellar attractions, events in which the new records may be hung up, are the 100-yard run, 220-yard run, 440-yard run, half mile, half mile relay, pole vault, javelin throw and high jump. The best C. I. F. marks in all of these events have been either surpassed or equalled in this year's sectional meets and with Saturday's meet to attract the most brilliant assemblage of high school track and field stars ever gathered in a meet of this kind, including the youths who have been doing things at the preliminary contests, strong indications are that several changes will be made in the official record book.

Seventy-Five Schools Will Be in Meet

One hundred and seventy-one athletes, representing seventy-five high schools in California, will participate in the state interscholastic track and field meet to be held here on Saturday, according to the complete entry lists received by Coach Logan C. Edwards yesterday afternoon. Of the schools represented, twenty-seven are from the southern section of the C. I. F., seventeen are from the central section, seventeen are from the northern section and fourteen from the north coast section.

Track in Good Shape

The track at the Rose avenue athletic field is recognized as one of the best in the San Joaquin valley and the lane has been well groomed in preparation for the meet. The first event, the pole vault, is scheduled to start at 1 p. m. and the other events will get under way at 1:30.

The strongest bid for honors in the meet will be made by the Long Beach, Los Angeles and Glendale High Schools, according to indications from the preliminary affairs. In the Los Angeles ranks will be Lombardi, 100-yard and 220-yard run man, and Poore, half mile specialist. The school will also send a strong relay team. Long Beach will be strongly represented by Childreth in the 440, Bills in the low hurdles, and Barber in the broad jump. The Glendale school will have the speedy Wyckoff, who is expected to do something startling in the century and 220-yard runs. The Glendale relay team, which has been playing tag with the Los Angeles high team in the matter of surpassing records this season, will also be among those present.

Outstanding Stars

Outstanding among the 171 contestants from the 75 schools who will gather here Saturday is Wyckoff, the Glendale high school flash, hailed by southern track followers as Charley Paddock's successor. It is this Wyckoff who among other things, may set a new world record in the 100-yard dash. Last Saturday at the Southern Section C. I. F. meet in the Coliseum at Los Angeles, he equalled the Southern California record of 9 4-5 seconds in this event which he now holds jointly with Lombardi of L. A. High, Skocum of Glendale and Wehner of Brawley, holder of the C. I. F. record, who made the same time in 1926. That's only part of the tale however. This same Wyckoff is reported to have been clocked at 9 2-5 seconds on two separate occasions while doing the century and if he can repeat this performance on the Rose avenue field track a new world record will be registered. The present record for the event is 9 6 seconds held by E. J. Kelly who set that pace in 1926. H. P. Drew in 1914, Charley Paddock in 1922 and C. H. Coaffee of Canada in 1922.

Wyckoff, however, has a rival on the track in the person of Frank Lombardi of Los Angeles High School, who last Saturday in the same meet bettered the C. I. F. record of 21 8 seconds in the 220-yard event to cover that amount of territory in 21 6 seconds. By doing this he nosed out Wyckoff by the "width of a worm's hips," according to the account of the duel in the southern California public prints, the sport writers of which described the finish as an apparent dead heat. In contrast to this Wyckoff earlier in the day stepped right out ahead of Lombardi in the century

Lombardi's smashing race over-
shadowed all other events of the
California Interscholastic Federa-
tion track-and-field meet that
saw six State records toppled. He
actually ran 101 yards because of a
yard penalty for breaching the gun
and his time, clocked by officials,
is considered as a record for an ath-
lete of the West. A recheck of
the timers revealed that six were
snapped at 9 3-5 seconds—the sev-
enth showed about 9 5-10.

DEAD HEAT IN 220

Coming back for the 220-yard
dash, the Los Angeles youth ran
to a tie with Frank Wyckoff of
Glendale High, his greatest rival,
and ended a great day by sprint-
ing home to victory in the final
stretch of the half-mile relay to
give his school an added 5 points.
In all three events, Lombardi came
from behind with a tremendous
spurt that carried him into the
lead just before the tape.

Team honors were won by Long
Beach High School with four first
places and a fourth place for 21
points. Los Angeles High finished
second with 16 points, mainly
through the work of Lombardi.
Glendale High, 1927 C.I.F. cham-
pion, rested in third position to-
day with 10 points. Redlands
posted 8 titles for fourth place
and Huntington Park and Lo-
Angeles Poly with 6 each tied for
fifth.

SIX NEW MARKS

State records broken today in-
cluded, besides the 100, the high
jump, 220-yard dash, javelin throw,
broad jump and half-mile relay.

Both Lombardi and Wyckoff shat-
tered the 220 mark when they broke
the tape abreast in 21 2-5s. The old
record of 21 8 was set in 1918 by

Lasalette of Puente and Von Osdel of Compton tied for first in the high jump at 6ft. 23-16in., and in an exhibition leap afterward Lasalette went over the bar at 6ft. 4 1/2 in. The former mark was 6ft. 1 1/2 in., made in 1925 by Bowen Santa Monica.

In the javelin McKenzie of Oxnard tossed the spear 174ft. 4 7-8in. to surpass the old record of 172ft., held by Lauterwasser of San Francisco Poly, made in 1926.

RAH FOR BARBER

The new broad-jump record went to Barber of Long Beach. He leaped 23ft. 5 1-4in. to better the mark of 23ft. 2 3-4in. set by Kaer of Red Bluff in 1923.

High-point honors were captured by Bills of Long Beach, who won both the high and low hurdles for a total of 10 tallies. Lombardi ran second with 9. One disqualification was written into the records. Minch of Inglewood, who led the way in the mile run, was disqualified because inspectors charged him with cutting in.

The extremely warm weather handicapped some of the athletes from the northern section of the State and several collapsed on the track. Only a slight trace of wind was noticeable and it favored none by blowing across the field. About 2000 persons were on hand for the fourteenth annual meet.
