

GREENE AN QUIROLO BI STARS; FIV MARKS FAL

Sunset School Takes Unlim
Meet While Cardinals C
ture Weight Team Ho

PILING up an imposing total of 86½ points, the Polytechnic High School unlimited track and field performers eased into their fourth consecutive A. A. A. title before 3,000 fans at Kezar Stadium yesterday afternoon. Mission finished in second position with 31½ points.

The Red and Black squad romped off with ten first places. Ray Quirolo and Greene taking a piece, and scored places in other events.

In the lightweight meet Lowell drew her vengeance for three years of smashing defeats by taking the title from Poly by a 69 to 57 score.

Five records fell during the afternoon, three of them to Lowell men, one to Lowell and one to Galileo.

The unlimited relay team of Mechanics clipped 2 1-5 seconds from the former mark in the three-quarter mile relay, covering the distance in 2 minutes, 29 3-5 seconds. Ray Quirolo, Poly and Lowell man, led to the tape by two and five yards.

SHOT RECORD.

"Hands" Slavich, Galileo football and basketball star, bettered Harry Laborde's shot put mark by nine inches with a splendid heave of 49 feet 11½ inches. "Horse" Homel, Poly favorite, finished in second place, followed by Vivaldi and Burres, two of Lowell teammates.

Jack Prouty, Poly leader, raised the pole vault mark up one inch by clearing 11 feet 7 inches. This was the second year that Prouty copped this event.

The other two records fell in the lightweight meet, both in the high jump. Mel Newman of Lowell, competing in the 130-pound high jump, leaped over 6 feet 5-16 inches in the most startling performance of the day. Comparative heights showed that the Lowell star would have had a certain victory even in the unlimited jump, the best of the heavies winning with 5 feet 10 inches.

Pedersen, 120-pound Poly High jumper, improved on the old mark of 5 feet 4½ inches by one-eighth of an inch. So much for the new records.

MILE UPSET.

In the biggest upset of the day Dempsey, sturdy Galileo mile runner, beat out Fraser of Mission by 10 inches. The Galileo star dogged Fraser for the first three laps, drew even with him at the start of the last one, strided with him for 300 yards and pulled ahead 10 yards from the tape, in the fast time of 4 minutes 44 3-4 seconds.

In the sprints Ray Quirolo, Poly favorite, nosed out his teammate Segal, in a 100-1-5 hundred, to win by a shade. He came back to take the 220 easily, leading Delmas, Poly and Bihler of Mission by nine yards.

Greene, the only other doubt winner among the heavyweights, easily copped the quarter mile, despite an early challenge by Menard and Barnard of Mission, and won by three yards. In the 800, after trailing for a lap and a half the lane Poly lad stepped out to win handily by ten yards. Connolly of Lowell led most of the way, but faltered near the finish and was forced into the second position.

Stith, clever Mission high hurdler, divided the two hurdle events with Stone of Poly, taking

the lows himself in 26 2-5 seconds, and trailing Stone by a yard and a half in the high stocks.
