Dark Horse Cinches Meet
for Hilltops

Hollywood Places Second in
Title Affair

Favored Pioneers Finish in
Third Position

twere nineteen different prep schools throughout the district.

FINISHES FAST

Dowers won the mile race in 4m. 23.8-36., with as courageous a finish as ever was shown in the Coliseum. The 15-year-old tow-head came from third place on the last turn, to pass two firing runners, and just nipped Roberts of El Monte at the tape. Dowers' victory came when San Diego's hopes were sagging, for Fernando Ortiz had just been shut out in the low hurdles when he had been expected to pick up a third or a possible second. But down the stretch of the mile came Dowers, seemingly barely able to drag his feet off the ground for each shortening stride. Ahead of him, as he rounded the curve, were Baker of Huntington Park and Roberts of El Monte. This trio had distanced the field.

Baker struggled along, but faded as Dowers passed by him. Ten yards from the tape, Roberts was leading the San Diegan by three yards. But he was firing fast. His steps were dragging, even slower than the laboring tow-headed youngster behind him. Both were giving everything they had, but Dowers had just a spark more life than his rival. A yard from the tape, Roberts collapsed, but a fraction of a second before he stumbled across the finish line, Dowers breasted the ribbon, a winner by scant inches. That gave the Hill-toppers five totally unexpected points, and clinched the meet for them.

There were no records established, but the meet did not lack for sparkling performances. The half-mile, as expected, was a sensational struggle, but this time neither Dave Reese of L. A. High, nor Rudy Obergrall of Hollywood won. Ferris Webster of Webb School in Claremont, galloping home a victor over the two local rivals in 1m. 59. Obergrall finished a close second, while Foore was some distance in the rear to take third place.

Webster was in a pocket no less than four different times during the race, was continually weaving back and forth over the track, and still had enough left to nip the Hollywood runner at the tape in a thrilling finish.

Carmichael of Jefferson and Houck of L. A. High staged another bitter duel in the quarter, although the feature was largely supplied by another sawed-off San Diego athlete, Warburton, whose short, tramping legs carried him into fourth place. Matched against runners who towered a head or more above him, he buzzed right along with the long-striding leaders, and hung on to fourth place in a bitter stretch battle. Carmichael was clocked in 2m. flat, just 3-8ths of a second less of the record set by Cliff Gault of Poly in 1926.

REBOIN FLOPS

Alva Reboin, star Santa Ana hurdler, was far off form. While leading in the high steeple, he hit the next-to-last hurdle and tumbled out of the race. Berry of Fairfax, the defending title-holder, went on to win. In the low Reboin again hit a hurdle, but recovered to take fourth place. Norman Paul, his team-mate, won the boys, and, incidentally, was high-point man for the day. He also won the broad jump, with a leap of 22ft. 4-8-in.

Jimmy Wilson, midget Hilltop sprinter, won the 100-yard dash, and placed second to Hollister of Oats in the 220. The judges came in for a bit of razzing in both events, and the picture of the finishes appear to bear out the claims of the rooters. Hollister was right on Wilson's heels in the 100, but was given third place, behind Koenig of Huntington Beach. The photos appear to show Wilson hitting the tape a scant inch or two ahead of Hollister in the running, with Koenig a sure third. The judges failed to give Koenig a place, and gave Oswald of Hollywood, fourth, when, in the picture, he is actually in sixth place.

Capt. Bill Miller of San Diego, despite a lot of unspportsmanlike peering on the part of L. A. High fans, scored a victory in the pole vault at 11ft. Line-burner of the Romans, finished second, falling three times at the height which Miller cleared on his second jump. He made a couple of unsuccessful attempts to clear 13ft. 6-in.

Darby Jones continued his unbroken string of victories when he leaped 6ft. 1in. to win the high jump. McKenzie of Oxnard, won the javelin exhibition, tossing the spear directly into the wind, for a mark of 162ft. 8in., some seven feet below his own record.

Nelson Gray of Chaffee hurled the twelve-pound shot, 24ft. 10 1-2-in., to come within five inches of breaking Bud Houser's record. Pink of Equita won the discus with a toss of 124ft. 4 in.

Picking up points in six of the nine events, Ingleswood nixed out Polytechnic for first place in the Class B meet, 18 points to 17.

Brown won the seventy-yard high hurdles, and Kenyon took the broad jump to swell the Sentinel total.

TALAMANTES HERO

Glenn Talamantes won the Class C championship all by himself, although the official title goes to Lincoln. The midget speedster took first place in the 100-yard dash and broad jump, and placed second in the fifty-yard sprint by scant inches, to run up all of the 13 points the Halleluicians collected. Huntington Park gathered 16 points for second honors. The summary shows how Coach Glenn Broderick's runners amassed the championship:

INGLEWOOD, April 27.—Easily clearing fifteen kneeling boys, while 500 enthusiastic pupils and parents looked on, Alfred Brown, one of the tumblers' team of the Queen-street departmental school, yesterday set what is believed to be a world's record for long diving.

Recently a New York man claimed a record in clearing fourteen persons, and in clearing fifteen, young Brown set a grammar-school record that can hardly be contested, according to Virgil Dahl, Inglewood coach for the city school system.

He said that the boy made the leap indoors with a limited run and maintained perfect form throughout, taking off with both feet and doing a perfect roll, to a stop to a point six feet from the place he landed.

The leaden feet and iron heart of Evans Dowers carried San Diego High School to its first Southern California prep track and field championship in the Coliseum yesterday, when the Blue and White of the Hilltoppers surged to victory over the Blue and White of the favored L. A. High athletes.

San Diego piled up 22½ points to win the meet, with Hollywood nosing out the Romans for second place, 14 points to 13½. Santa Ana and Jefferson tied for fourth with 11½ points each, while Fairfax, winners of the Minor City League title, finished sixth with 11 1-4. The remaining points were scattered be-
