the javelin throw when R. Churchill, brother of Kenneth Churchill former University of California star, tossed the spear 185 feet 7½ inches. This distance was almost 10 feet better than the second place man, Todd of San Jose, could attain. Glasson of San Jose and DeCarlo, of Hollister, finished three, four.

Churchill's remarkable throw fell less than two feet short of the sectional record which is 187 feet 3½ inches.

## WINNERS ENTER FINALS

Those who placed in this meet became eligible for the California Interscholastic Federation State finals which will be held at Modesto next Saturday. At this meet representatives of the four sections of the C. I. F. will vie for honors. In addition to the North Coast meet at Berkeley yesterday, three others were held, one at Chico for the northern California section, the other two in the valley and Southern California.

# ALAMEDA WINS; PREPS BREAK 3 RECORDS

## Hollister Second in North Coast Track

Three records, one of them 11 years old, were bettered and another tied in the eighteenth annual North Coast sectional track and field meet held at the new Edwards field in Berkeley, yesterday afternoon. Representatives of 32 high schools, comprising the seven leagues included in the section,



took part, with Alameda high school's team taking first place by a wide margin over Hollister and Palo Alto, second and third place teams.

The final scores were: Alameda 20 1/2, Hollister 14, Palo Alto 13, San Rafael 11, Petaluma 10, Piedmont 10, Analy 9 1/2, Vallejo 8 1/2, Santa Cruz 7, Tamalpais 7, Berkeley 6, St. Helena 5, Watsonville 4, Pacific Grove 3 1/2, Marinnes 2 1/2, Centerville 3, Pittsburg 3, Redwood City 2, King City 2, Sequoia 2, Burlingame 1, Crockett 1, Danville 1/2, Concord 1/2, Hayward 1/2.

### MOORE SETS RECORD

Moore of Petaluma, who won both hurdles to give his school all of its points, established a new record in the high hurdles when he was timed at 15.7 seconds, one-tenth of a second better than the mark established in 1921 by Leister of Palo Alto.

Cook gave Santa Rosa a new record in the mile run with a brilliant sprint which carried him from third place to the tape. His time was 4 minutes, 22.5 seconds, one-tenth of a second faster than the time turned in by White of Petaluma in 1927.

Palo Alto's relay team, over the half mile distance, established a new record for that event when it bettered the 1:25 mark established by a team from the same school in 1926. Yesterday's quartet went the distance in 1:24 1/2.

The tied record occurred in the quarter mile, when Candrian of Tamalpais breezed around the circuit in 51.4 seconds. This equaled Talbot's mark, set for Analy in 1924.

Perhaps the outstanding event of the day was the mile run. This, won by Cook in record-breaking time, was a battle throughout between him, Rice of Alameda, Voorhees of Santa Cruz and Fowler of Piedmont. Cook held back until the last lap, when he sprinted ahead of Rice to take second place, with Voorhees leading.

### BATTLE TO FINISH

As they trotted down the back stretch, with Voorhees in front, Cook second and Rice third, Fowler came up to fourth place and the quartet was bunched closely for the sprint. On the final turn Cook and Rice started sprinting simultaneously but Voorhees apparently had nothing left for a spurt.

Cook got around Voorhees, leaving Rice a foot behind and unable to clear Voorhees until thirty yards from the tape, when he opened up valiantly. From the stands it appeared a dead heat between Rice and Cook, but the officials saw about an inch difference, with Cook in front. Voorhees trotted in third about a yard behind. Fowler romped home an easy fourth. Moore's race was foretold by his brilliant work in the preliminary heats which he won by a 10-yard margin over the second place man, Jury of Palo Alto, in 1:43 seconds. He finished easily, apparently holding himself in reserve for the record breaking flight over the hurdles which was to come. In the final Moore got away at the gun on the outside line and cleared the first hurdle two yards to the good and increased his advantage steadily, beating the field by 10 paces.

The winner of the quarter mile run finished five yards ahead of Blank of Analy who, before the meet, was touted as being capable of equalling or breaking the record established by an Analy athlete. Harold, of Piedmont, was third and Castro of Crockett was fourth. Hollister won five of its points in
