El Centro's Four Horsemen changed to the Three Musketeers yesterday and ran off with the State C.I.F. track and field championship, running up 18 points before a crowd of some 5000 fans at the Coliseum.

The Imperial Valley sensations had the title won before the relay and so withdrew from the baton passing event thereby, not giving their fourth man, Elbert Berry a chance to display his running ability.

Roy Kirkpatrick led the El Centro scoring, winning the low hurdles in 28s. and taking a bang-up second to Roy Staley of Santa Monica in the high sticks, the time being 15.2s.

GILLETT WINS

The quarter-mile was a walk for Myrel Gillett, had leg and all. The El Centro flyer took the lead away from Gordon Miner, Belmont's blond ace, at the 200-yard mark and added to his edge from then on, winning by a good ten yards. The time, 48.4s., was a new State record.

Gillett said his leg was a bit stiff following the race so his coach, Robert Armstrong, promptly removed him from competition, namely the relay.

El Centro's other points came from Leo Madlem's second place in the broad jump. The boys weren't broad jumping so well yesterday, 22ft., earning second for Madlem. Skinner, Manual Arts' pride and joy, hit the board for 22ft. 8in. to get the first-place medal.

L. A. High's Romans, led by the ebony-shanked Corney Johnson, tallied 17 points to earn second place. Corney shattered the State high jump mark, clearing 6ft. 5 3/4-in. and ran anchor lap on the relay team that also cracked a meet record.

The Romans' other points were gathered through the efforts of Gail Gilmore, second in the half, and Lorenz Walchhausen, third in the mile.

JEFFERSON THIRD

Jefferson nosed out Poly for third, 11-11, while Santa Monica, Manual Arts, Hollywood and Compton were all above the first team from the north. Tamalpais, who amassed 7 digits to tie with Belmont and South Gate.

George Anderson, Muir Tech express, withdrew from the 100 to concentrate his efforts on the furlong and Davey Siegel, Poly's pride and joy, went on to take the century by a foot from Adrian Tailley, South Gate's speedster. Anderson cracked the furlong record as intended, winning easily in 21.2s. The former record was 21.4s., held jointly by Frank Wyckoff and Frank Lombardi.

In all, five records fell, Anderson's 21.2s. effort, Johnson's 6ft. 5 3/4-in. leap, the Romans' 1m. 28.2s. relay performance, Virgil Hooper's 4m. 29.4s. mile and Gillett's 48.4s. quarter.

Hooper's victory erased an eighteen-year-old record, Blankenship of Visalia setting the former mark of 4m. 30s. way back in 1915. Hooper ran a perfectly timed race, his laps being 62s., 72s., 72s. and 63s.

The only athlete from the north to crash into a first place was Tamalpais's McCurdy, a long-legged liddle who outsprung Mel Nickerson of Poly, to take the tape in 2m. 1s. Nickerson let up at the finish and was beaten for second by

Gilmore, L. A. High's hard-running star.

TOUGH BATTLES

The hurdles, expected to draw out sensational times, were in a manner disappointing, although the competition was just as hot as predicted. Staley had a hard time winning the highs, three boys, Kirkpatrick, Staley and Frank Beller of Roosevelt, Fresno, all hitting the last barrier practically at the same time.

In the lows Staley did not run but Bill Presley, Monrovia colored boy, gave Kirkpatrick a terrific battle, with Woodrow Strode of Jefferson a bang-up third. The time 24s., was not exceptional, but was the best turned in by a prep hurdler this season.

Jim Donaldson, Hollywood's well-built shot putter, proved to all concerned that he is the best prep weight waffer in the State by winning the twelve-pound event with a toss of 54ft. 3in. and then annexing the sixteen-pound exhibition for the Howard Drew trophy with a heave of 44ft. 6 1-4in.

The pole vault went to Harrison consistent Santa Monica athlete who cleared 12ft. 7in. to take home the medal. Justin McCarthy of Fremont and Archie Mifflin, Coalinga's one-man track team, tie for second, both getting over 12ft 4in.

Incidentally Mifflin gave his school fifteenth place in the meet with his 3½ points in the pole and one digit for fifth in the 100. As forty teams tallied in the annual classic, Mifflin will have a lot to tell his grandchildren about if he can get them to listen to him.

Showing Southern California's predominance in track and field matters, teams from this section scored 103 1-3 points, while schools from the other three C.I.F. groups tallied but 40 digits, which ought to prove something or other.
