ANNAPOLIS (Md.) May 22.

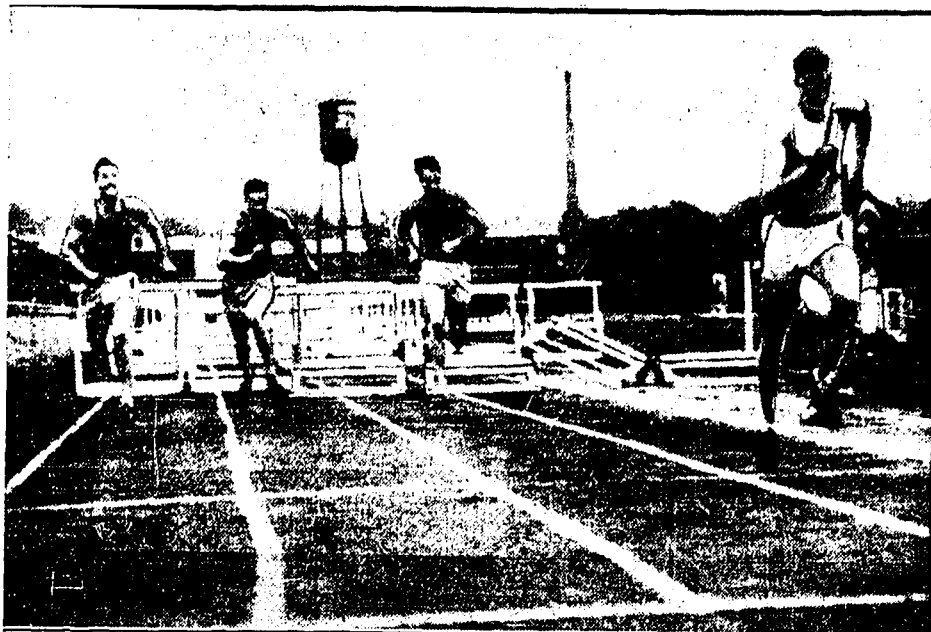
(Exclusive)—Navy's athletes made an excellent showing today, winning four and losing one of the five contests which were held at the fields here.

JEFFERSON HIGH COPS STATE TRACK CHAMPIONSHIP

Bryant Allen, a husky, tan-colored flyer, and Wilbur Miller, who's really not big enough to worry about, turned a two-man trick yesterday which would have won the State championship for high schools without further ado.

Actually three more Jefferson Democrats, equally dusky and equally adept at flinging themselves about a cinderpath, piled up a few more points, bring the total to 23½ as Coach Harry Edelson's septa speedsters annexed the State title at Long Beach.

But all that was really expected.

BOTH SPRINTS

Allen failed the Stephens Field track for twin sprint triumphs, capturing the century in 9.8s. by three good yards with Miller second and then roaring to a record-equaling 21.2s. furlong.

Miller sped into the 440 tape in 49.7s. That's 19 points between them, 5½ more than the second place Wilson. Bruins scored.

But the real news came in pole vault and low hurdles as two Southern California youngsters stepped onto hallowed ground where they displaced names that are coupled with some of the greatest achievements in track and field history.

HURDLES AND VAULT

First of all, George Sangster, blond Muir Tech youngster, stepped over the low hurdles—220 yards—in 23.8s., which lowers by one-tenth of a second the old State mark jointly owned by Ernie Payne and LeRoy Kirkpatrick. Payne's was set in 1929 when he represented San Bernardino, while Kirkpatrick's share was obtained in 1934.

Then Baylor Maynard, wearing the green and black of Belmont, skimmed over the pole vault standard of 13ft. 1¼ in., landing atop the bar on his first try and barely brushing over on his second.

This performance highlighted the entire meet, coming at the end of the afternoon when

threatening clouds and a chilling breeze cooled the ardor of spectators but failed to dim the spirit of the well-built Belmont youngster who was known last fall as one of the best prep fullbacks in town.

Six boys had cleared 12ft. 6in.

By unanimous consent the bar was moved to record height, and Maynard came through as a dark house threat.

BARNES'S MARK FALLS

The record he broke? None other than that of Lee Barnes, former world's record holder and the first man in track and field history to clear 14ft. Barnes set the old prep mark of 12ft. 11¼ in. in 1929 when he attended Hollywood High School, and in succeeding years such brilliant
