## Bob Chambers Runs 880 in 1.54.4 To Capture Examiner-P. A. Classic

Two youngsters of 17 and two grizzled veterans of 30 and 60 years plus stole the show as 145 athletes decided annual Pacific Association A. A. U. championship at Edwards Field, Berkeley, yesterday.

The 17 year old heroes were Bob Chambers of Los Gatos High School and his closest rival for prep half mile honors, Hal White of Los Angeles High.

Chambers, to the delight of a large group of partisan prep followers, got a draw in his attempt to break the world interscholastic 880 yards record of 1 minute 54.4 seconds established by Trojan Ross Bush when he was a Dallas high school student. Four watches clocked Bob in exact record equaling 1:54.4 as he crashed through the tape ten yards ahead of White in The Examiner's battle of interscholastic champions.

Once again, as was the case when he electrified fans two weeks ago by running 1:55, Chambers sped through the first 440 yards in 53 seconds flat—a pace so fast that it clearly established his winning margin.

### FLORES THIRD.

And, although he visibly slowed as he bucked a wind on the home stretch, Chambers managed to hold his own on the final lap, although it appeared for a time that the challenging White might be able to cut the winner's margin. Julius Flores, the Somerville High School boy from Tuolumne—holder of the Central Valley prep title, was a good third, ten yards farther back, while the San Francisco champion, Ernie Pinuti of Balboa, finished fourth in the field of eight.

White was unofficially clocked in 1:57, Flores in 1:58.8.

White, not satisfied with that effort, brought the plaudits of the fans by entering the open 880 an hour later and taking second place behind the veteran Warren Smith of Troy and the Olympic Club as Smith won in the home stretch by two yards in 2 minutes, 1-10 second.

The Los Angeles boy had run only one other 880 in his career, which has included cross-country and mile run up to now. That other 880 was a 2:00.1 effort.

"Gee, I was scared. But it sure felt great to win. College? Well, I don't think I can go to college," young Chambers answered the most important questions tossed him following the race.

### SUFFERED FROM COLD.

It was his coach Orin Matheny, however, who revealed that Bob had been clocked in a truly startling 1:52.4 practice half mile Monday.

"And then he had to catch a cold from which he is just recovering," lamented Doug Helm, the Los Gatos High vice principal who was along to cheer the boys.

Which brings us back to those grizzled veterans of 30 and 60 plus. The hero of 30 is Tom Moore, ex-California and Olympic Club hurdler. Tom not only entered both hurdles yesterday but also surprised by revealing himself as quite a lad at the broad jump and hop, step and jump. He captured high point honors with 14.

Tom, in fact, won the high hurdles by a yard over the Abraham Lincoln High School boy, Jack Passy, in 15.5 seconds. In the lows Tom was nosed into third place by Bears, Garthwaite and Sheppard, the former winning in 25.5.

But before those low sticks had been run, Tom Moore—watched intently by his young son, had been a busy man. He took third behind Claude McWilliams and Don Lind in the broad jump—leaping 21 feet 1½ inches. And then he climaxed his day by winning the hop, step and jump at 43 feet 1 inch.

### McEACHERN WINNER.

While all this was going on, San Francisco's grizzled police warrior, Big Jim McEachern, who has been competing for over forty years, was winning the hammer throw at 117 feet 7 inches, and placing second behind Dan McCarthy in the fifty-six pound weight, McCarthy tossing the implement 24 feet 4 inches.

It was quite a sight to see Jim McEachern's gray thatch winning over far younger rivals.

"Too bad I never throw these things any more. I never get any practice," lamented the ever competitive McEachern.

Lieut. (j. g.) Peyton Jordan, ex-Troy speedstar, who is by way of being somewhat of a veteran himself, won both sprints to prove himself still the speed king.

He captured the Russ Sweet Memorial 100 yards in 10 seconds flat, came back to barely last through and win the Charles Paddock Memorial 220 in 22.6 seconds. Bear Gordon Duffy being the second man in each race with his teammate Kochevar third.

### O. C. TEAM WINS.

Which just about brings us to the point where it should be recorded that "Dink" Templeton's Olympic Club, somewhat aided by the fact that several of them were old enough to know how to toss the

hammer and fifty-six-pound weights while their younger collegian rivals knew none of the tricks, won the meet. Olympians scored 89½ points. California, competing unattached, was second with 39½. Unattached athletes scored 215/6; Modesto Jr. Chamber of Commerce 12; St. Mary's Pre-Flight 10; Abraham Lincoln High School of San Jose 8; Monterey Presidio 5; McClatchy High (unattached) 4½; Berkeley Junior Chamber of Commerce 3; Modesto Junior College 3; Victory Athletic Club 1.

Fred Frevert, arch rival of Chambers in Peninsula Athletic League track, proved his class by winning the mile in 4 minutes 35.6 seconds.

Johnny Fulton provided the quite respectable mark of 48.5 seconds in racing away with the quarter-mile.

Emerson Hiler took the discus at 153 feet 7 inches; Lowell Todd the javelin at 195 feet, while the defending champion, veteran Johnny Mottram was a respectable second at 189 feet 2 inches.

And one record really did fall—the meet was actually over five minutes ahead of schedule, first time in Pacific Association history such a feat has been accomplished.
