Monte Jumps 25 Feet 4¼, Hornets Win

Jackson Nabs Two Sprints to Tie State Meet Marks

EDWARDS STADIUM, Berkeley, May 29.—Topped by a national interscholastic record leap of 25 feet 4¼ inches by Piedmont's Monte Upshaw in the broadjump, Northern California athletes went on a rampage here this afternoon in the 36th annual state high school track and field championships.

With a crowd of some 12,000 cheering them on, the North came through with victories in seven of the 12 official events on the program and figured in a three-way tie for first in the pole vault.

Upshaw's record leap in the broadjump came on his third try in the preliminaries. The 25-4¼ mark bettered the former U.S. prep record of 24-11¼ established by the great Jesse Owens while attending East Technical High in Cleveland, O., on June 3, 1933.

In addition to its seven triumphs, the North claimed further glory as Alameda rolled up 19 points to win the coveted perpetual team trophy. It marks the first time a Northern California school has won the meet's overall title.

Low Jolley's Alameda squad picked up its 19 points on wins by James Jackson in the 100 and 220, fourths by Dick Cobb in the broadjump and Joe Griffin in the 120-yard high hurdles and victory in the 880-yard relay.

Upshaw, who turned 18 last week, became the afternoon's only other double winner when he defeated Rafer Johnson of Kingsburg in the 180-yard low hurdles by six inches at the tape. Upshaw was clocked in 19 seconds flat.

The Piedmont star finished strong to nip Ken Biggs of Sanger for second place in the 120-yard high hurdles. His 14 points for the three events gave Piedmont second place in the team standings. Delano was third with 10, followed by Manual Arts of Los Angeles with 9 1/5, Kingsburg with nine and Jefferson of Los Angeles and Santa Ana with eight apiece.

Six new records were set during the 36th annual prep get-together, three state and three Edwards Stadium prep marks. Jackson's times of 9.6 in the 100 and 21.2 in the 220 tied state prep standards as did a 21.2 recorded in the trials by Delano's Leamon King.

Upshaw, Rink Babka of Palo Alto and Don Bowden of San Jose's Lincoln were the state record breakers. Upshaw's 25-4½ effort in the broad jump erased the former mark of 24-2¾. Babka's toss of 148-2¾ in the college discus exhibition topped the old standard of 145-2, and Bowden's 1:52.9 in the 880 bettered the former record by a full second.

Edwards Stadium prep marks were 14.3 in the high hurdles by Johnson, 49¼ inch in the 16-pound shot-put exhibition by Dick Everage of L.A.'s Jordan and Upshaw's spectacular 25-4¼ leap in the broadjump.

Of the seven Northern firsts, six were registered by athletes

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from the Alameda County Athletic League. Dick Dailey of Hayward accounted for the sixth with a winning 6-5½ in the high jump.

Jackson, who tied the national interscholastic record in the 100 with a 9.4 clocking here last Saturday in the North Coast Sectional trials, defeated King by a yard in both the 100 and 220 finals. King was defending state champion in the sprints.

The Alameda speed demon topped off a busy day by anchoring the Alameda relay team to a three-yard victory over Manual Arts of Los Angeles. Jackson was second by three yards when he started the final 220 lap.

Ron Giardina of Castlemont, Harold Theus of Tech and James Green of McClymonds were the only Oakland Athletic League entries to figure in the scoring. Giardina was the fifth in the 100, Green third in the mile and Theus in a five-way tie for fifth in the high jump.

HADLEY WINS MILE

Ty Hadley of Bellflower won the mile in 4:25.8, Bruce Kitchen of Riverside the 440 in 48.7 and Dick Bronson of San Diego's Grossmont the 12-pound shot with a toss of 56-1¾. Stan Gaunt of Concord's Mt. Diablo, Bob McKay of Inglewood and Joe Rose of Glendale's Hoover tied for first in the pole vault at 13 feet.

The exhibition high school discus event went to Jack Egan of San Francisco's Balboa at 159 feet 1½ inches.

Bronson put the 16-pound shot 52 feet 6¼ inches after the results were posted. If the toss had occurred during the meet it would have bettered the state record of 50-9¾ and the Edwards Stadium prep mark of 48 feet. The national interscholastic standard is 52-9¾.

X. L. Emerson of Richmond, the defending state 440 champ, finished out of the money in the finals. Upshaw was defending titlist in the broadjump and Bowden in the 880.

Upshaw 'Tricked' Into Long Jump

EDWARDS STADIUM, May 29.—Piedmont's Monte Upshaw, who bettered the national interscholastic broad jump record here today, was tricked into his great performance by his father, Ernest Upshaw, before a crowd of 12,000 fans attending the California Interscholastic Federation track championships, jumped 25 feet 4 1/4 inches to better Jesse Owens' mark of 24-11 1/4; set in 1933.

"I knew Monte wanted that 25-foot jump in the worst way," his father said. "So I put my handkerchief in the sand at 25-5. I told him it was about 25-3 and told him to try and hit it."

The younger Upshaw did just that, driving the handkerchief deep into the sand. Oddly enough, he did not think he got off a record jump and threw down a handful of sand in disgust before he noticed where the officials were measuring.

Upshaw and Alameda's James Jackson were the individual stars of the afternoon. Jackson paced the Hornets to the first team championship ever won by a Northern California team and Upshaw, representing Piedmont, finished second.

A good job of drawing lanes was done when Jackson and Delano's Leamon King were placed next to one another in both the 100 and 220-yard dashes.

They have put on some terrific duels in the past, and today was no exception as Jackson edged his opponent in both races to tie the state records of 9.6 seconds and 21.2 seconds.

The gusty wind aided the runners at times and hampered them on other occasions. It was not evident during the century race, but Jackson had an aiding wind of 1.8 miles per hour in his 220 victory.

In that race, it looked like King was going to overtake Jackson until the final 30 yards. Then James turned on the steam again to pull away with ease. He also ran at 21.2 anchor lap on Alameda's winning 880-yard relay team.

It was a great day for Upshaw, who apparently will be running for the University of California next fall. Besides the broad jump, he won the 180-yard low hurdles and took second in the high hurdles for 14 points and high scoring honors.

He has been invited to compete in the Compton Relays next Friday, but may pass it up now that he has achieved his 25-foot jump.

There is a possibility Monte may compete in the Pacific Association meet in Stockton Saturday if he is not too tired. After a strenuous season, the Piedmont flash is just about ready to take a break.

PCC Officials To Meet June 7

LOS ANGELES, May 29.—(AP)—Officials of the Pacific Coast Conference will take a new look at some athletic policies and a second peep at others when they hold their 1954 spring meeting at Spokane, Wash., June 7-11.

Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt today listed several items which will come before the faculty advisors, athletic directors and coaches. They included:

Consideration of a conference-wide basketball schedule, eliminating in effect the separate northern and southern division competition

Mutual exchange of football game movies as a means of curtailing extensive scouting operations, the cost of which has become a major problem.

A suggestion that the conference hold a football clinic for high school and junior college coaches, with the entire PCC corps of coaches participating.

Review of limitations on the number of games and practice hours for freshman football and basketball. Frosh footballers now are limited to two games a season, the basketball teams to 10. It was pointed out that Big Ten freshmen do not play any formal games.

Probable revision of conference rules to conform to new NCAA regulations. The NCAA stipulates that football practice must not start before September 1. The PCC rule allows three weeks. This fall the PCC may lose two practice days if it conforms to the NCAA rule.

In basketball the NCAA prescribes 26 games. The PCC allows 27.

The usual sessions will be devoted to eligibility rules and petitions, radio and television reports, grants in aid, institutional violations and recruiting rules.

Upshaw Leaps 25-4 $\frac{1}{4}$, Breaks Owens' Record

BERKELEY, May 29—Monte Upshaw, a lanky 18-year-old senior from Piedmont, shattered Jesse Owens' 21-year-old national interscholastic broad jump record with a mighty leap of 25ft. 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. today to feature the 36th annual California high school track meet.

Displaying terrific poise under pressure, Upshaw tacked on exactly four inches to the great Owens' standard set back in 1933 while Jesse was at East Technical High in Cleveland. It was the second-best jump made in the world this year.

Also Wins Low

Upshaw, who they say is due to enroll here at California next fall, put on a terrific one-man performance that had the 12,000 fans gasping. Besides his record hop Monte won a wild 180 low-hurdle dash from Rafer Johnson, the young giant from Kingsburg. Upshaw won this one by inches in 19 flat.

In between Upshaw also rallied in the high hurdles to take

a second behind Johnson. Upshaw faltered midway in the race, fell back to fifth and came on again to barely get the second. Johnson won in 11.3.

Upshaw's work added up to 14 points, good for second place. The winner was Alameda with 19, as the Hornets became the first Northern California team to win the team title outright.

Manual Fourth

Delano was third at 10 while Manual Arts, the defending champ, fell to fourth with 9 1/5.

Upshaw's long hop also bettered the State meet record by more than a foot, the obliterated mark being 24ft. 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ in.

The meet record in the 880 was also broken, and the 100 and 220 marks of 9.6 and 21.2 were tied by James Jackson, who edged defending champ Leamon King of Delano in both runs.

Jackson won by two feet in the century as he came from behind and outlasted King in

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a desperate stride-for-stride dual all through the furlong. King was credited with 9.7 in duel all through the furlong. Santa Ana's Bill Swisshelm ran third in both sprints, well back in 9.9 and 21.9.

Shuffling Don Bowden of Lincoln, San Jose, scored his expected impressive triumph in the 880, winning in 1:52.0. That is exactly a second under Lang Stanley's national mark but Bowden has a better one, his 1:52.3 of last week having been submitted as a new mark.

Bob Harman of Los Angeles was a gutty second in 1:55.8 as Van Nuys' Tom Anderson, the city champ, faded in the last 40 yards and got only a fifth.

North Wins Eight

The long overdue Northerners won eight of the 12 events. The Southland scored the meet's one big upset when Bruce Kitchen, Riverside's big, powerful entry, took the 440 in 48.7 as Defending Champ X. L. Emerson of Richmond finished third.

Husky Dick Bronson of Grossmont bested Jordan's Dan Everage by a couple of inches in the shot-put, 59ft. 7 1/2 in. to 59ft. 5 1/2 in. Everage won the exhibition 16-pound shot, 49ft. 1/2 in. to 48ft. 8 in., but Bronson got off a 52ft. 6 1/2 in. effort after the competition.

Manual Arts' Everett Jackson, who had been eliminated in a photo finish of the 100 prelims and placed only fourth in the 220, ran a great anchor leg on the relay to bring the Toilers up from third to second. He actually picked up about 3 yards on his namesake from Alameda, who hit the tape in 1:28.7.

Hadley Wins Mile

Ty Hadley of Bellflower ran a weird race and was lucky to take the mile, where he was the solid choice. Hadley ran dead last for more than a half, hitting his quarters in 68.5 and 2:15.8. After three laps Hadley was still in the middle of the pack and laboring hard to get around the stubborn foes. He finally reached the front at the end of the backstretch but was so fatigued from the effort that

he barely held off Ray Hale, a junior from Downey of Modesto. The time was 4:25.8.

The Southland's bad day was topped off by the pole vault, where favored Joe Rose of Glendale Hoover and Bob McKay of Inglewood only maneuvered 13ft. and settled for a tie with Stan Gaunt of Mt. Diablo.

Jackson Nabs Two Sprints to Tie State Meet Marks

EDWARDS STADIUM, Berkeley, May 29.—Topped by a national interscholastic record leap of 25 feet 4 1/4 inches by Piedmont's Monte Upshaw in the broadjump, Northern California athletes went on a rampage here this afternoon in the 36th annual state high school track and field championships.

With a crowd of some 12,000 cheering them on, the North came through with victories in seven of the 12 official events on the program and figured in a three-way tie for first in the pole vault.

Upshaw's record leap in the broadjump came on his third try in the preliminaries. The 25-4 1/4 mark bettered the former U.S. prep record of 24-11 1/4 established by the great Jesse Owens while attending East Technical High in Cleveland, O., on June 3, 1933.

In addition to its seven triumphs, the North claimed further glory as Alameda rolled up 19 points to win the coveted perpetual team trophy. It marks the first time a Northern California school has won the meet's overall title.

Lew Jolley's Alameda squad picked up its 19 points on wins by James Jackson in the 100 and 220, fourths by Dick Cobb in the broadjump and Joe Griffin in the 120-yard high hurdles and victory in the 880-yard relay.

Upshaw, who turned 18 last week, became the afternoon's only other double winner when he defeated Rafer Johnson of Kingsburg in the 180-yard low hurdles by six inches at the tape. Upshaw was clocked in 19 seconds flat.

The Piedmont star finished strong to nip Ken Biggs of Sanger for second place in the 120-yard high hurdles. His 14 points for the three events gave Piedmont second place in the team standings. Delano was third with 10, followed by Manual Arts of Los Angeles with 9 1/5, Kingsburg with nine and Jefferson of Los Angeles and Santa Ana with eight apiece.

Six new records were set during the 36th annual prep get-together, three state and

three Edwards Stadium prep marks. Jackson's times of 9.6 in the 100 and 21.2 in the 220 tied state prep standards as did a 21.2 recorded in the trials by Delano's Leamon King.

Upshaw, Rink Babka of Palo Alto and Don Bowden of San Jose's Lincoln were the state record breakers. Upshaw's 25-4 1/4 effort in the broad jump erased the former mark of 24-2 3/4. Babka's toss of 148-2 3/4 in the college discus exhibition topped the old standard of 145-2, and Bowden's 1:52.9 in the 880 bettered the former record by a full second.

Edwards Stadium prep marks were 14.3 in the high hurdles by Johnson, 49 1/2 inch in the 16-pound shot-put exhibition by Dick Everage of L.A.'s Jordan and Upshaw's spectacular 25-4 1/4 leap in the broadjump.

Of the seven Northern firsts, six were registered by athletes

from the Alameda County Athletic League. Dick Dailey of Hayward accounted for the sixth with a winning 6-5 1/2 in the high jump.

Jackson, who tied the national interscholastic record in the 100 with a 9.4 clocking here last Saturday in the North Coast Sectional trials, defeated King by a yard in both the 100 and 220 finals. King was defending state champion in the sprints.

The Alameda speed demon topped off a busy day by anchoring the Alameda relay team to a three-yard victory over Manual Arts of Los Angeles. Jackson was second by three yards when he started the final 220 lap.

Ron Giardina of Castlemont, Harold Theus of Tech and James Green of McClymonds were the only Oakland Athletic League entries to figure in the scoring. Giardina was the fifth in the 100, Green third in the mile and Theus in a five-way tie for fifth in the high jump.

HADLEY WINS MILE

Ty Hadley of Bellflower won the mile in 4:25.8, Bruce Kitcher of Riverside the 440 in 48.7 and Dick Bronson of San Diego's Grossmont the 12-pound shot with a toss of 56-1 3/4. Stan Gaunt of Concord's Mt. Diablo, Bob McKay of Inglewood and Joe Rose of Glendale's Hoover tied for first in the pole vault at 14 feet.

The exhibition high school discus event went to Jack Egan of San Francisco's Balboa at 159 feet 1 1/2 inches.

Bronson put the 16-pound shot 52 feet 6 1/4 inches after the results were posted. If the toss had occurred during the meet it would have bettered the state record of 50-9 3/4 and the Edwards Stadium prep mark of 48 feet. The national interscholastic standard is 52-9 3/4.

X. L. Emerson of Richmond, the defending state 440 champ, finished out of the money in the finals. Upshaw was defending

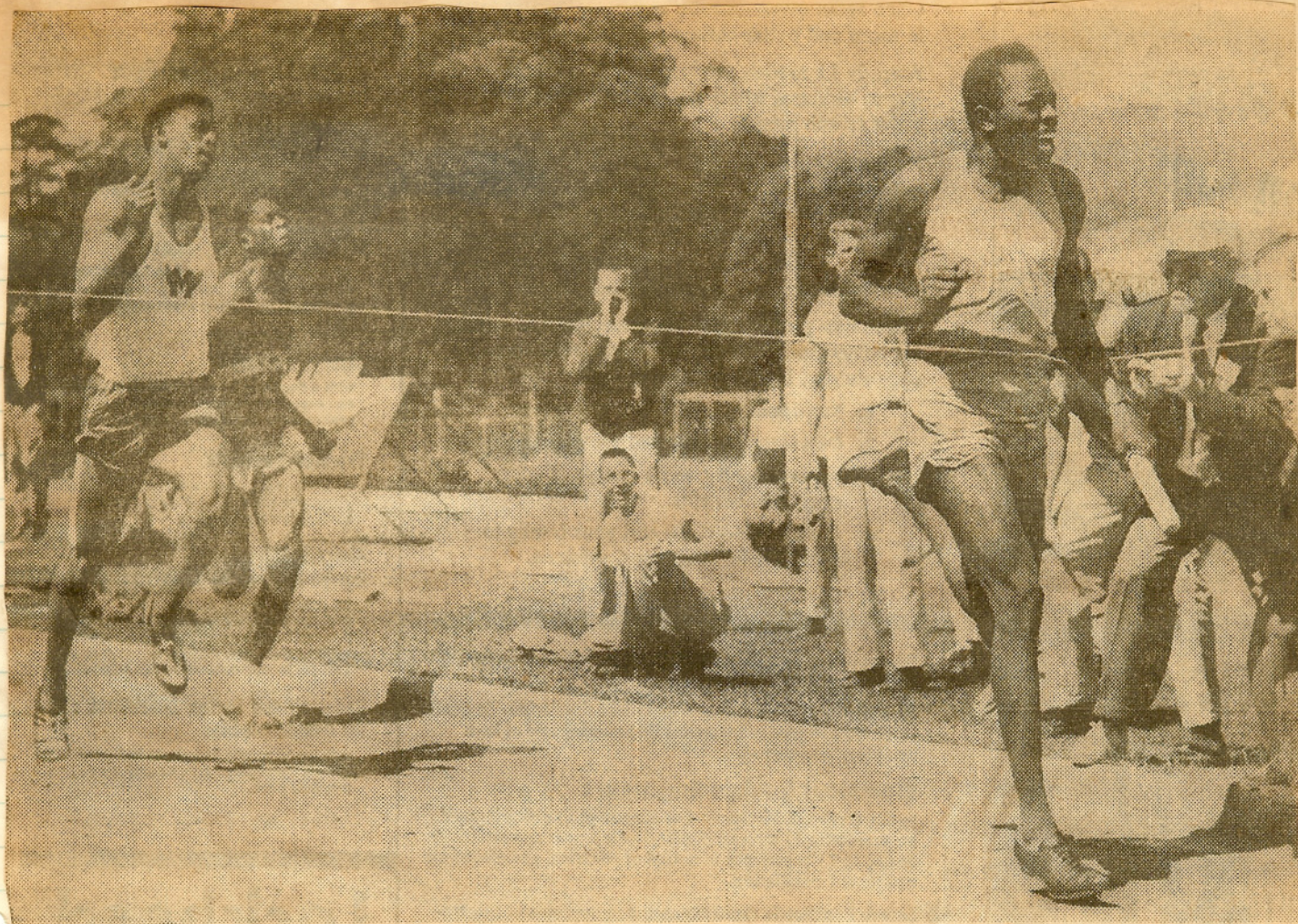

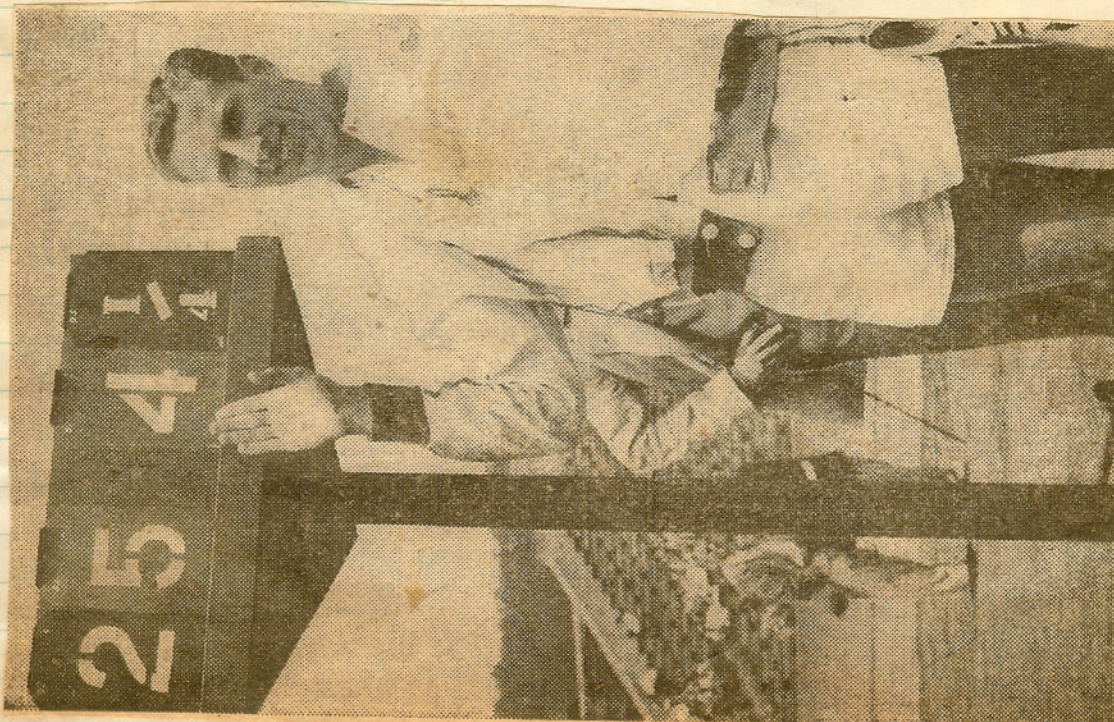
