EDWARDS STADIUM, BERKELEY, May 21. - Three double winners and a record breaking pole vault by Jess Undlin of Burlingame highlighted activities as Mt. Diablo High of Concord captured the North Coast Section track and field championship today for the first time in the twenty-nine year history of the event.

The effect of the two-event champions can be readily seen

in the scores:

With Dave "Spider" Krowel snaring both hurdle races for 16 big points, five Red Devils of Mt. Diablo rolled up 31 points for first place.

Hayward, getting all its points on two firsts in the jumps by Dick Dailey and two seconds in the sprints by Larry Lambert, finished second with 26.

And Richmond took third with 24% points, chiefly on the efforts of rocketing Rudy Jackson, who won both sprints.

Undlin climbed 12 feet 111/2 inches to wipe out the oldest record on the NCS books by the narrowest possible margin. The old mark was 12-111/8, established by Irving Moore of Piedmont in 1940.





10 Peninsula Prep Aces Set To Compete in State Track Meet

Undlin Tops Matejka In Pole Vault

BERKELEY — Ten Peninsula Athletic League cinder stars are eligible to compete in the State Meet in the Los Angeles Coliseum next week end as a result of standout efforts in the annual North Coast Section showdown at Edwards Stadium here Saturday.

Palo Alto's Ron Larrieu, Burlingame's Jess Undlin and San Mateo's Gino Della Libera each brought home first-place medals and enhanced their chances of state honors in competition with the best preps from Arcata to King City.

Larrieu used his new-found "kick" in the stretch to capture the mile as expected, although his time of 4:39.9 was somewhat slower than his best. He successfully battled the pack after a relatively slow first half mile and withstood a strong drive by Napa's Fred Green to win.


Undlin set a new NCS record with a vault of 12-11½ and for the third time proved his superiority over Sequoia's Jim Matejka, who took second at 12-6.

Della Libera surprised the dope sheet with a win in the shot over highly-touted Mike Profit, Campbell High soph. The big Bearcat weight star exceeded his best this season with a 54-11½ heave. Don Dirienzo of Lincoln tied for second at 53-334 for another top showing.

Not far behind the Big Three were second-placers Tom Blackwood of Menlo-Atherton in the 880; Al Coruccini of San Mateo in the high hurdles and Leon Krueger in the discus.

Blackwood again ran a strong race, but couldn't get the pole from a surprising sophomore from Pittsburg, Jesse Lea, and finally was nipped at the tape by unheralded Jerry Siebert of Willits.

Blackwood's time was estimated at 1:59.3, which is half a second off his previous best. He looms as a good bet to place down south, however, after winning a battle with Lea for second.

P.A.L. Cinder Aces Head for State Meet

Ten Peninsula Athletic League track stars will leave tomorrow for Los Angeles and the annual State Meet to be staged in the Coliseum on Saturday.

South San Mateo County will be represented by two cinder stars — Menlo-Atherton's Tom Blackwood in the 880 and Sequoia's Jim Matejka in the pole yault.

The northern loop will send Burlingame's Jess Undlin in the pole vault, Jefferson's Jim Rector in the mile, San Mateo's Gino Della Libera in the shot, Burlingame's Leon Kreuger in the discus and San Mateo's Al Corruccini in the high hurdles.

From San Jose comes Lincoln's duo of Jack Searfoss in the high jump and Don Dirienzo in the shot. Palo Alto's

Ron (La Runt) Larrieu, winner of the mile in last week end's North Coast Section meet at Berkeley, rounds out the Peninsula contingent.

Undlin and Matejka are rated the biggest chance to place high in the state meet against Southern California's talentladen brigade. Both have been over 13 feet—which won the southern meet last week.

Kreuger also has an excellent chance of winning some kind of honors, since few southern entries in the discus are expected. Most southland schools do not compete in this event.

Sequoia High this week was conducting a "Send Jim to the State Meet" drive in an effort to finance his expenses.

Coach Forrest Jamieson is scheduled to drive Larrieu, Rector, Dirienzo and Searfoss south. Coach Vic Mangini of Burlingame is planning to take another carload south, while Blackwood will be accompanied by Coaches Don Dorfmeier and George Egan of M-A.

Despite his fine clocking of 1:58.7 Blackwood will have his hands full if he wants to place in the money. In the recent Southern Section Meet, the top five placers were under 1:56 flat, with Ernie Cunliffe of Claremont winning in 1:54.7. Wayne Lemons of Riverside was second with a 1:54.9 time.

Larrieu has been concentrating on his kick in recent meets, but will have to keep up a fast early pace, also, if he's to place in the mile against the likes of Todd White of Newport Harbor (4:22.3) and Rene Rogers of Grossmont (4:21.7) who placed one-two in the Southern Section finals. Larrieu's best time is 4:28.6 in a non-winning performance.

Corruccini also was thing of a surprise with his secahead of acknowledged stars like Henry Aguilar James Lick and Bob Harrington of San Francisco's Riordan.

Kreuger flipped the college discus 134-4½, one of his best tosses of the year, but lost to Watsonville's Dave Cole by a quarter of an inch.

Biggest letdown was the fourth-place finish of Burlingame's feet quarter-miler, Rog-er Peterson. Regarded as a good bet behind Salinas' Eddie King and Riordan's Don Chesarek, Pete ran about as usual—but couldn't stave off the fast drive of Mount Diablo's Jim Brooks.

King and Chesarek had the race to themselves in :49.0 bethe San Francisco inched ahead at the tape. King might still win state honorsprovided his ailing left leg continues to mend.

Five Valley Stars Jain State Meet 5th

BERKELEY—Five Santa Clara Valley track and field athletes qualified for the California state meet by placing in Saturday's North Coast Section championships at Edward's Stadium.

Henry Aguilar of James Lick, Mike Profitt of Campbell, Don Dirienzo and Jack Searfoss of Lincoln, and Ron Larreau of Palo

Alto earned tickets to the state Saturday finals next in Angeles.

Diablo High School Mt. the NCS team championship with 31 points, five more than second place Hayward could amass.

One NCS record was written into the books Saturday. Jess Undlin of Burlingame cleared 12' 111/2" in the pole vault to break the 15-year-old record of 12' 111's" held by Irving Moore of Piedmont.

Salinas' Eddie King, hampered by a pulled muscle in his right leg, hobbled the quarter-mile and was barely nipped at the tape by Don Cheserak of Riordan. It was a great try by King, who edged out in the good time of # 49 seconds.

The Salinas relay team finished five yards in arrears of Diablo which won in 1:30. King did not run for Salinas.

Aguilar gained the state finals by placing third in the high hurdles, while Profitt nudged the shot put 54'334" for second place, Dirienzo was third in the shot with a put of 52' 31/4". Searsfoss tied for second in the high jump at 5'10" but won a place in the state meet by flip of a coin. Larreau captured the mile run in 4:32.9.

Others from Santa Clara Valley who placed were Lincoln's Hank Olguin, tied for fifth in the 100, and Fremont's Blane Jones, fifth in the discus.

Max Kinsey of Campbell tied for first place in the Class B pole vault at 11 feet. Campbell's Monty Sheridan placed third in the discus. Lincoln's Alex Ramos was fifth in the 660, and mont's Frank Aguinaga was fifth in the 1320.

Mt. Diablo Takes Prep Spikesters North Coast Track In NCS Meet

Mt. Diablo won the North Coast Section track and field championship for the first time in the school's history, but a two-man team from Hayward surprised by taking second place yesterday at Edwards Stadium. Dave Krowel's double victory in the hurdles, Mt. Diablo's Poly Vila of San Africa

sprint points, and first place in the relay with the outcome of the meet hanging on the result gave the Blue Devils 31 markers.

State high jump champion Dick Dailey and Larry Lambert, who was selected as a halfback for the North in the L. A. Shrine football game, totaled 26 points for Hayward.

Dailey won the high jump at 6-11/4 and the broad jump at 22-714, and Lambert was second to Richmond's Rudy Jackson as ne won the 100 in :09.8 and the 220 in :21.8.

ONE MARK FALLS

Only one varsity mark fell in contrast to the record breaking spree in 1954. Burlingame's Jess Undlin wiped out the oldest mark in the book, by the narrowest of margin. He pole vaulted 12-111/2—just a fraction of an inch better than Piedmont's Irving Moore did 15 vears ago.

Lack of records was more than made up for by the closeness of competition. Riordan's Don Chesarek pulled away from a fast field in the 440 in :49.0. Salinas' Eddie King, a doubtful starter because of a pulled leg muscle, was a close second. Chesarek came back to place third in the 220.

The 880 winner was a complete surprise. Jerry Siebert, only a junior, roared out of an all-star field at the finish to win in 1:59.0. Siebert is from Willets, and his school is without a track.

Palo Alto's Ron Larrieu fought off the challenge of Napa's Fred Green to win the mile in 4:37.9.

BERKELEY BEES WIN

With the outcome of the meet hanging in the relay, the Mt. Diablo team composed of Dick Brown, Krowell, Jim Brooks and Harold Hayworth won by ten yards in 1:30.0.

Berkeley won the Class B title with 42 points, almost double the total of second place El Cerrito with 211/2.

San Mateo's relay team ran :44.5 to break the mark set by Berkeley in the morning trials, and five athletes tied to break the high jump mark by a fraction of an inch. Mike Priete of Monterey, Eureal Bell of El Cerrito, Marion Mayes of Encinal, Sherman Lee of Encinal, Max Kensey of Campbell and

Bob Kile of San Mateo all leaped 5-9.
