3 U.S. MARKS FALL IN STATE PREP MEET; ROBERTSON 2ND

California's outstanding array of high school track and field athletes shattered three national interscholastic prep records Saturday in the state finals in the Los Angeles Coliseum before 8,000 spectators.

Charles Dumas, Centennial's great high jumper, again bettered his own national mark with a 6 ft. 9 $\frac{3}{4}$ in. leap. Tad White of Newport sped the mile in 4:20.0 to erase the old 4:20.4 standard and Jefferson of Los Angeles bettered the 880 relay record twice—1:27.3 in the morning prelims and 1:27.2 in the finals.

Centennial, only in its second year of competition, won the team title with 29 points. Los Angeles Jordan, L. A. city champs, were

second with 20, barely nipping Los Angeles Jefferson with 19.

Homer Robertson, Pacific's shot put ace, finished second to Duncan Ward of Santa Monica for the second week in a row with Fontana's Duane Milleman third. Ward put 59 ft. 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., best in the nation, while Robertson tied his best ever, 59 ft. 1 in. Milleman also pushed the iron bulb the farthest of his life—58 ft. 9 $\frac{3}{4}$ in. for a 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. margin between first and third.

In an exhibition with the 16-pound shot put, Milleman won at 47 ft. 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. with Robertson second with a 47 ft. 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. heave.

Dumas' feat was the fourth time he bettered the existing record this year. He topped the 6 ft. 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. jump by Gil La Cava of Bev-

erly Hills in 1938 first at 6 ft. 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., then upped it to 6 ft. 8 in., went 6 ft. 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ in. in the CIF finals last week, and then bounced over Saturday. In addition he has a 6 ft. 10 in. mark made in the open division of the Fresno Relays. After his record, the bar was moved to 6 ft. 10 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. but he missed three chances.

White, who won the CIF mile in 4:22.2, held back for 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ laps, moved up to take over the lead going into the final lap and sprinted home with the new standard. He broke the 4:20.4 mark set by Max Truex of Warsaw, Indiana last year. Truex, now with the USC Fresh, was in the stands to watch White's trick. White was unofficially timed in a blazing 63.5 in his final lap. Truex, on the other hand, ran only 65.9 in his record romp.

ROGERS FADES

Rene Rogers of Grossmont, who had the previous fastest Southland clocking at 4:21.7, led the field part of the race and was in contention until the final 100 yards when he folded and failed to place. Ray Hale of Modesto Downey in second place was timed in 4:21.2, which ties as the fourth fastest mile ever run by a prepster.

The Jefferson High foursome of Henry Phillips, Willie White, Harold Price and Ed Walter broke the U.S. record of 1:27.6 with their 1:27.3 spin in the morning prelims and then came back to register the 1:27.2 afternoon performance.

There were two upsets in the meet. Ernie Cunliffe of Claremont, who won the CIF go at 1:54.7, led the whole way into the stretch in the 880 and when Leonard Havens of Avenal surged by, Cunliffe tried to dive for the tape but fell short and went unplaced. Louis Watkins of Jordan, a favorite in the broad jump off his best of 24 ft. 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., finished only fourth with the winner going but 23 ft. 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ in.
