

Matejka Takes 3rd In State Pole Vault, Larrieu Wins Mile

CHICO — The disappointing performance of Sequoia High School's Jim Matejka in the pole-vault at the California State High School track and field championships here Saturday evening was overshadowed, at least in part, by the greatest all-around set of performances ever seen in a prep meet anywhere.

Matejka, having considerable trouble getting his step down correctly, could only clear 13-3 in the pole-vault, settling for a tie for third. It was far below his best of 14-1/2, which had made him a strong favorite.

Jefferson had little trouble winning its fifth state title, scoring 24 2/3 points to 12 for Manual Arts of Los Angeles and 10 for Pasadena.

Lone Peninsula Athletic League athlete to do well was Palo Alto's Don Larrieu, who ran his usual come-from-behind race, winning the mile in 4:20.1, just one-tenth off the State Meet record.

Outstanding achievement, without a doubt, was Jerry White's amazing 46.7 quarter mile. The Corcoran ace shattered the seemingly invincible national record of 47.2 set just last year by Eddie Southern of Dallas, Texas.

White, the smallest man in the field, led all the way in the one-turn event, and put on a terrific closing sprint to whip Berkeley's Henry Dorsey by 12 to 15 yards. Dorsey was clocked at 47.4.

Rivaling the 440 for the night's top performance was the remarkable 1:25.9 clocking by the 880-yard relay foursome of Los Angeles' Jefferson High School. By the time Joe Batten, Willie White, Terry Randall and Henry Phillips had covered the two laps, they had a time 13 seconds faster than the national record their school set last year.

Third U. S. mark to fall was in the shot-put, where Homer Robertson, 240-pound giant from Pacific of San Bernardino, tossed the 12-pound ball 63-9 1/2, winning by 3-4 1/2 and breaking the recognized record of 62-9 1/2 set by Don Vick of Chaffey in 1953 and the state mark of 60-9 7/8 set by Leon Patterson in 1951.

In addition to the above three marks, the three other state records to go by the wayside were in the 220, where Pasadena's Bob Poynter clipped .2 off the record with a 21 flat performance, the 100, in which L.A. Jefferson's Willie White ran 9.5, .1 under the old standard, and in the high school discus, with Corcoran's Wayne Crowe getting off a heave of 171-5 1/4, smashing the old record of 165-5 set by the late Leon Patterson of Taft in 1951.

Although Oscar Bean, another of Jefferson's wonders, could not come through with his best of the season of 25-4 1/2 in the broad jump, he did get off a neat 24-9 effort to win that event. The top four jumpers were all over 24 feet, with the fifth placer at 23-11 1/2.

Getting back to the pole-vault, Matejka didn't look good all evening, and after missing on his first two tries at 13-6, balked six times while running down the runway for his third and final attempt at that height. He finally tried for it, but didn't come close.

The pole-vault ended in a tie for first between Bill Logan of El Cajon and Jim Helm of El Dorado, both of whom cleared 13-6. Logan, however, looked by far the best, making the height with ease on his first attempt.

Despite his trouble with his step, Matejka cleared all heights on the first try until reaching 13-3. He ran through on his first attempt at that height, but made it over the bar on the second try.

Had Larrieu stayed up front for more of the race, he would undoubtedly have set a new state record in the mile, but the pint-sized Paly distance star let himself get as far back as sixth or seventh, and only took the lead in the last 50 or 60 yards, defeating the favored Grady Neal of Fullerton by about four of five yards.

The P.A.L.'s other state meet qualifiers, Dick Brown of Lincoln, John Morrison of Palo Alto and Don Wetteland of Burlingame all finished out of the money.

3 U. S. Marks Tumble In Massive Assault

CHICO, June 2—Three national and six State marks fell and one State record was tied tonight in the most devastating assault ever launched by California's high school track and field competitors.

Before 4500 fans at Chico State College Field in the 38th annual California Interscholastic Federation meet, the following was accomplished:

National Interscholastic records—Los Angeles Jefferson High School with a 1:25.9 four-man 880-yard relay; Homer Robertson of San Bernardino Pacific with a 63-9½ put with the 12-pound shot; and Jerry White of Corcoran with a :46.7 in the 440-yard run.

State Records — Willie White of Los Angeles' Jefferson with a :09.5 and Corcoran's Wayne Crow with a 171-5¼ throw of the High School discus, an exhibition event. Jefferson's White, as distinguished from Corcoran's White, also tied the 180 yard low hurdles time of :18.9 to be the only double winner.

BROKEN TWICE

Jefferson's half mile relay team broke the national record not once but twice. In the afternoon trials with the temperature at 95 degrees, the Democrats team of Henry Phillips, Willie White, Terry Randall and Joe Batten clocked 1:26.3 to better its own national record of 1:26.5 set last Monday.

Berkeley (Henry Allums, Henry Dorsey, Rudy Johnson and Fred Dewitt) was second in 1:26.8 and Dorsey High was third in 1:27.1, all three under the former U. S. standard of 1:27.2 set last year by Jefferson.

Then came the finals and Jefferson cut the mark again. Berkeley was 12 yards back in 1:27.3 and LA's Manual Arts was third, six more yards back.

The team title went to Jefferson hands down.

Aside from the records, the meet was heady with upsets. One of the most startling was in the 800 where Tom Siebert of Willits came out of the ruck to win in 1:53.8. Another upset came in the mile where Palo Alto's Ron Larrieu came on in the last 20 yards to triumph in 4:21.1, one tenth of a second over the State record.

Siebert, who surprised in 1955 by winning the North Coast section half mile, came out of eighth place on the turn to pass the pace-setting Tom Brown of Merced 75 yards from the finish.

His long stride carried him to a going-away victory, four yards ahead of Louis Miller of L. A. Fremont. Brown faded to fourth.

Rudy Jackson of Richmond led midway through the 100 but fell back at the finish.

:09.6 MARK

Jefferson's White winning by less than a yard over the favored Bob Poynter of Pasadena, broke the :09.6 mark held by several past greats, including Delano's Leamon King and Alameda's James Jackson. Jerry White of Corcoran was third and Jackson fourth.

Poynter pulled away from Jackson late in the 220 and King City's Tom Pettit lunged at the finish but failed to nip Jackson. Gary Schaaf of Orosi, who got into the finals when films of the trials showed he beat Herb Blanchard of S. F.'s Polytechnic, was fifth.

Poynter's :21.0 was two-tenths under the former state record.

The high hurdles proved a disappointment to the co-favorites, Pierce's Walt Goodman and Pasadena's Charles Piggee.

Goodman felled the third hurdle in the trials and crashed full on into the fourth hurdle, withdrawing, and Piggee went sprawling on the ninth flight in the finals at a time when he was running second.

RECORD TIED

Dale Messer of Lemoore won the highs in :14.2 and Jefferson's White took his second victory of the night by winning the lows in :19.0 just a whisper ahead of the fast closing Messer. White tied the state record of :18.9 in the trials. Oakland Technical's Sam Perry was fourth in the lows.

The 440 was well worth the price of admission alone. White went out at the start to make a shambles of the oldest record in the state book, :46.7 compared to the 1933 mark of :48.2 and the national record of :48.4.

Berkeley's Henry Dorsey was second at :47.4 and Woodland's Jack Yerman caught San Francisco's Carlos Tan (St. Ignatius) at the tape for third place. Tan was timed in :48.0.

Larrieu, who ran fourth, eighth and fifth at each of the first three quarters, overtook Grady Neal of Fullerton 20 yards short of the finish of the mile to win by three yards. He made his first bid on the back stretch by moving to third behind Neal and El Cerrito's Herb Cloe, and moved up for the kill coming out of the turn.

So fast was the field that Bob Hammond of San Francisco's Washington placed eighth in 4:23.8. Cloe, who ran second through the first three laps, was sixth. Hammond moved into ninth place behind Larrieu at the half mile and stayed with the national two-mile record holder until the last 220 yards.

Robertson, a giant with an unorthodox style, made his record breaking shot put on his first put, later he got another one out beyond the 60-foot line.

Oscar Bean of L.A. Jefferson took the broad jump, Curtis Chappell of Jefferson and Robert Sims of L.A. Jordan tied in the high jump, and Tim Helm of Placerville El Dorado High tied with El Cajon's Bill Longan at 13-6 in the pole vault.

3 National, 3 State Records Shattered in High School Meet

CHICO, June 2.—Three national and three State records were set and San Francisco Bay area athletes came through with many bang up performances in the thirty-eighth annual California Interscholastic Federation track and field meet tonight.

With a near capacity shirt sleeved crowd of 4,500 yelling them on the high schoolers made the most of the evening as:

1—Jefferson of Los Angeles' half mile relay team—Hank Phillips, Willie White, Terry Randall and Joe Batten—bettered the United States record it set last Monday, 1:26.5, two times.

This tandem stopped the clocks in 1:26.3 in the afternoon trials, despite two bad baton passes, and they turned in a 1:25.9 in the evening's finals.

Jefferson set the old State standard, 1:27.2, last year. White and Phillips are hold-overs.

2—Homer Robertson, Pacific (San Bernardino) strongman, established an interscholastic shot put record with a toss that measured 63-9½.

Robertson, whose old best was 62-3, beat the old record, set by Dave Davis of Canoga Park last week, by thirteen inches.

The latter was second at 60-5.

The former CIF record, 60 9/8, belonged to Leon Patterson of Taft.

3—Corocoran's Jerry White wrote another national standard into the books when he won the 440 yard run in :46.7, one-half second under the former mark set by Eddie Southern of Texas last year.

State-wise White's perform-

ances lowered the oldest record in the books. It was made by Myrel Gillett (El Centro) in 1933.

The other CIF records that were wiped out were in the 100 and 220 yard dashes and the high school discus. The latter is contested on an exhibition basis because many of the schools that compete in the meet do not participate in the event.

4—Los Angeles' Jefferson win the team championship for the sixth time. The Demo-

crats scored 24½ points, 12½ more than second place Manual Arts, also of Los Angeles. Pasadena was third with ten.

Jefferson has the distinction of winning the meet the most consecutive titles—four—1949-1952.

Chiefly responsible for Jeff's triumph was White, the meet's only double winner. He sliced one-tenth of a second off the State's century record with a :09.5 clocking and equaled the State mark in the 180 yard low hurdles during the afternoon's trials when he got home in :18.9.

Bob Poynter of Pasadena repeated as the 220 king. His time, :21.0, represented one tenth of a second improvement on the former best which was held by three men, including Jim Jackson, late of Alameda High.

Poynter, who was undefeated in both the furlong and 100 this season, had to settle for second in the latter.

Although it wasn't worth any points, Wayne Crow of Corcoran flipped the prep discus 171-5 for the other CIF mark. The previous top man was Taft's Leon Patterson, 165.5.

Ron Larrieu, who set a national two mile record two

months ago, gave northern California supporters much to yell about when he upset favored Grady Neal of Fullerton by six yards.

Larrieu, who was content to "loaf" through the first three laps, was timed in 4:20.1, one tenth of a second off the mark set by Tod White (Newport Harbor) last year.

Neal served as pacesetter for all but the final 200 yards. It was at that point that Larrieu took charge. Ron, a notorious stretch runner, was in sixth place, 15 yards off the pace when he stepped on the throttle with about 300 yards to go.

Neal, the Southern section champion, was six yards back. Third in 4:20.9, was Robert Monzingo of San Diego's Hoover.

Although White had the 440 all to himself, three north staters—(1) Hank Dorsey of Berkeley, (2) Jack Yerman of Woodland and (3) Carlos Tan of San Francisco's St. Ignatius—each ran the best races of their careers. Respectively, their times were: :47.4, :47.8 and :48.0.

Preps Break Three U.S., Six State Meet Records

By SCOTTY STIRLING

CHICO, June 2—Three national records and six state marks were shattered here tonight as the cream of California's prep track and field athletics staged their 38th and greatest state championships.

Jefferson High of Los Angeles won the team title with 24½ points, but a shirt-sleeved crowd of 4,500 at Chico State College Field hardly noticed that after witnessing the following performances:

1—A national record-breaking 46.7 quarter-mile by rangy Jerry White of Corcoran. Henry Dorsey of Berkeley ran second to White in 47.4, which was two tenths of a second shy of the old record of 47.2 by Eddie Southern of Dallas, Tex., last year.

2—A 63-foot, 9½-inch shot put by burly Homer Robertson of Pacifica. Robertson's tremendous toss snapped the old national record of 62-5¼ by Don Vick of Chaffey in 1953.

3—An astounding 1:25.9 880-yard relay clocking by a Jefferson quartet of Henry Phillips, Willie White, Terry Randall and Joe Batten.

The timing eclipsed the National record of 1:27.2, set by a Jefferson team last year. During the relay trials this afternoon, the Jeff foursome turned in a 1:26.3.

In addition to the U.S. marks, the following California records were established:

Willie White of Jefferson, 9.5 in the 100-yard dash; Bob Poynter of Pasadena, 21.0 in the 220; Wayne Crow of Corcoran (near Fresno), 171-5¼ in the high school discus.

Jefferson's White proved the meet's lone double winner, picking up a blue ribbon in the 180-yard low hurdles in addition to the 100. During the trials, White tied the low hurdle record of 18.9. In the finals he traveled the distance in 19.0.

White was forced to go all out in the 100 when Rich-

mond's Rudy Jackson broke from the blocks in rocket-like fashion and maintained a sizeable lead for the first 50 yards. Rudy faded, however, and finished fourth.

Jackson also was instrumental in aiding Poynter to his record-smashing 220 effort. Rudy again led from the blocks until about

the midway point, where he was overhauled by the galloping Poynter. Jackson hung on to nab second place.

Corcoran's White, whose previous best in the 440 was 47.3, led from wire to wire, maintaining a two-yard lead over Dorsey until the final 20 yards, when he opened the gap to five yards with a tremendous spurt.

Robertson's record shot heave came in his first turn in the circle. The Pacific ace, with a previous best of 62-3, was rated second in pre-meet rating behind Dave Davis of Canoga Park, who finished second tonight with 60-5.

While they failed to produce records, the half-mile and mile races were among the meet's most thrilling.

Jerry Siebert of Willits provided a real upset in the half when he won in 1:53.8. The record for the event—both state and national—is 1:52.3 by Don Bowden of Lincoln of San Jose. Siebert, North Coast Division champ, had a previous best of 1:57.1.

On the mile Ron Larrieu, the 5-4, 119 pound national two-mile record holder from Palo Alto missed the state mark by two-tenths of a second when he won in 4:20.1.

Larrieu's victory also was considered an upset since his previous best of 4:24.2 rated him fourth among the field.

Larrieu, running fifth at the start of the final lap, moved into third with 220 yards to go and caught the leader, Harold Harkness of North Hollywood 20 yards from the finish.

El Cerrito miler Herb Cloe stayed in second position for two full laps, but the pace was too much for the blond and he finished sixth.

In addition to Jackson of Richmond and Dorsey of Berkeley, Eastbay point-getters were:

Tech hurdler Sam Perry, fourth in the 180-yard lows; Sydney Lane of Encinal of Alameda, fourth in the high school discus; John Cadwell of Acalanes, fourth in the college discus; Don Bell Jr. of Alameda, fifth in the college discus; Julius Jefferson of Fremont, tie for third in the high jump.

Richmond's 880-yard relay team nabbed a fifth in the race which saw Jefferson set the record.

Berkeley's quartet — Henry Allums, Dorsey, Rudy Johnson and Fred Dewitt — was only two yards behind Jeff in the trials, but in the final was a good five yards back, despite the 1:27.4 clocking.

3 National, 3 State Records Shattered in High School Meet

CHICO, June 2.—Three national and three State records were set and San Francisco Bay area athletes came through with many bang up performances in the thirty-eighth annual California Interscholastic Federation track and field meet tonight.

With a near capacity shirt sleeved crowd of 4,500 yelling them on the high schoolers made the most of the evening as:

1—Jefferson of Los Angeles' half mile relay team—Hank Phillips, Willie White, Terry Randall and Joe Batten—bettered the United States record it set last Monday, 1:26.5, two times.

This tandem stopped the clocks in 1:26.3 in the afternoon trials, despite two bad baton passes, and they turned in a 1:25.9 in the evening's finals.

Jefferson set the old State standard, 1:27.2, last year. White and Phillips are holders.

2—Homer Robertson, Pacific (San Bernardino) strongman, established an interscholastic shot put record with a toss that measured 63-9½.

Robertson, whose old best was 62-3, beat the old record, set by Dave Davis of Canoga Park last week, by thirteen inches.

The latter was second at 60-5.

The former CIF record, 60 9/8, belonged to Leon Patterson of Taft.

3—Corocoran's Jerry White wrote another national standard into the books when he won the 440 yard run in :46.7, one-half second under the former mark set by Eddie Southern of Texas last year.

State-wise White's perform-

ances lowered the oldest record in the books. It was made by Myrel Gillett (El Centro) in 1933.

The other CIF records that were wiped out were in the 100 and 220 yard dashes and the high school discus. The latter is contested on an exhibition basis because many of the schools that compete in the meet do not participate in the event.

4—Los Angeles' Jefferson win the team championship for the sixth time. The Demo-

crats scored 24½ points, 12½ more than second place Manual Arts, also of Los Angeles. Pasadena was third with ten.

Ron Larrieu, who set a national two mile record two

months ago, gave northern California supporters much to yell about when he upset favored Grady Neal of Fullerton by six yards.

Larrieu, who was content to "loaf" through the first three laps, was timed in 4:20.1, one tenth of a second off the mark set by Tod White (Newport Harbor) last year.

Neal served as pacesetter for all but the final 200 yards. It was at that point that Larrieu took charge. Ron, a notorious stretch runner, was in sixth place, 15 yards off the pace when he stepped on the throttle with about 300 yards to go.

Neal, the Southern section champion, was six yards back. Third in 4:20.9, was Robert Monzingo of San Diego's Hoover.

and the mile standard for the Peninsula Athletic League and the North Coast Section division and final meets.

Saturday night's action at the Chico State Stadium found a crowd of 5,000 on hand to see the prep tracksters break three national marks and three state records.

The new U.S. schoolboy records established were by Jefferson of Los Angeles in the 880 relay, 1:25.9; Homer Robertson, Pacific of San Bernardino, in the shot put, 63-9½; and a sizzling 46.7 by Corcoran's Jerry White in the 440.

JEFFERSON OF Los Angeles won the team championship for the sixth time, scoring 24⅔ points.

Larrieu's victory was considered a mild upset, defeating the favored Grady Neal of Fullerton by a margin of six yards.

Neal led throughout the race until the final 200 yards when Larrieu zipped up his pace to grab the No. 1 position. The Palo Alto star was in sixth place with 300 yards to go when he made his big bid.

Finishing third was Bobby Monzingo of San Diego's Hoover in 4:20.9. John Morrison, another Palo Alto entry, failed to place, finishing 13th.

LARRIEU'S TIME for the final 440 was a blazing 59.8 after covering the first 1320 yards in 3:20.3.

Forrest Jamieson, Palo Alto coach, was happy over his pupil's sparkling performance. He nixed any thought that Larrieu was disappointed in missing the state record by the slim one-tenth of a second margin.

"Ron is more interested in winning than setting records," he said. "He always runs just hard enough to win and that's what he did Saturday night."

Jamieson pointed out that the race was the fastest ever in high school history when the eighth place finisher was timed in 4:28.8.

ONLY OTHER Peninsulans to place in the meet were Mike Profit, Campbell, with a fourth in the shot put; and Jim Matjeka, Sequoia, who tied for third in the pole vault. Profit's distance was 58-3¼, while Matjeka measured 13-3.

3 U. S. Marks Tumble In Massive Assault

CHICO, June 2—Three national and six State marks fell and one State record was tied tonight in the most devastating assault ever launched by California's high school track and field competitors.

Before 4500 fans at Chico State College Field in the 38th annual California Interscholastic Federation meet, the following was accomplished:

National Interscholastic records—Los Angeles Jefferson High School with a 1:25.9 four-man 880-yard relay; Homer Robertson of San Bernardino Pacific with a 63-9½ put with the 12-pound shot; and Jerry White of Corcoran with a :46.7 in the 440-yard run.

State Records — Willie White of Los Angeles' Jefferson with a :09.5 and Corcoran's Wayne Crow with a 171-5¼ throw of the High School discus, an exhibition event. Jefferson's White, as distinguished from Corcoran's White, also tied the 180 yard low hurdles time of :18.9 to be the only double winner.

BROKEN TWICE

Jefferson's half mile relay team broke the national record not once but twice. In the afternoon trials with the temperature at 95 degrees, the Democrats team of Henry Phillips, Willie White, Terry Randall and Joe Batten clocked 1:26.3 to better its own national record of 1:26.5 set last Monday.

Berkeley (Henry Allums, Henry Dorsey, Rudy Johnson and Fred Dewitt) was second in 1:26.8 and Dorsey High was third in 1:27.1, all three under the former U. S. standard of 1:27.2 set last year by Jefferson.

Then came the finals and Jefferson cut the mark again. Berkeley was 12 yards back in 1:27.3 and LA's Manual Arts was third, six more yards back.

The team title went to Jefferson hands down.

Aside from the records, the meet was heady with upsets. One of the most startling was in the 800 where Tom Siebert of Willits came out of the ruck to win in 1:53.8. Another upset came in the mile where Palo Alto's Ron Larrieu came on in the last 20 yards to triumph in 4:21.1, one tenth of a second over the State record.

Siebert, who surprised in 1955 by winning the North Coast section half mile, came out of eighth place on the turn to pass the pace-setting Tom Brown of Merced 75 yards from the finish.

His long stride carried him to a going-away victory, four yards ahead of Louis Miller of L. A. Fremont. Brown faded to fourth.

1957 CIF Meet Awarded to Cal's Edwards Stadium

CHICO, June 2—The 39th annual California interscholastic federation track and field championships to be held June 1, 1957, was awarded to Edwards Stadium in Berkeley today. Berkeley last staged the meet in 1954.

Although it wasn't worth any points, Wayne Crow of Corcoran flipped the prep discus 171-5 for the other CIF mark. The previous top man was Taft's Leon Patterson, 165.5.

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Neal served as pacesetter for all but the final 200 yards. It was at that point that Larrieu took charge. Ron, a notorious stretch runner, was in sixth place, 15 yards off the pace when he stepped on the throttle with about 300 yards to go.

Neal, the Southern section champion, was six yards back. Third in 4:20.9, was Robert Monzingo of San Diego's Hoover.

Jefferson's White winning by less than a yard over the favored Bob Poynter of Pasadena, broke the :09.6 mark held by several past greats, including Delano's Leamon King and Alameda's James Jackson. Jerry White of Corcoran was third and Jackson fourth.

Poynter pulled away from Jackson late in the 220 and King City's Tom Pettit lunged at the finish but failed to nip Jackson. Gary Schaaf of Orosi, who got into the finals when films of the trials showed he beat Herb Blanchard of S. F.'s Polytechnic, was fifth.

Poynter's :21.0 was two tenths under the former state record.

The high hurdles proved a disappointment to the co-favorites, Pierce's Walt Goodman and Pasadena's Charles Piggee.

Goodman felled the third hurdle in the trials and crashed full on into the fourth hurdle, withdrawing, and Piggee went sprawling on the ninth flight in the finals at a time when he was running second.

RECORD TIED

Dale Messer of Lemoore won the highs in :14.2 and Jefferson's White took his second victory of the night by winning the lows in :19.0 just a whisper ahead of the fast closing Messer. White tied the state record of :18.9 in the trials. Oakland Technical's Sam Perry was fourth in the lows.

The 440 was well worth

the price of admission alone. White went out at the start to make a shambles of the oldest record in the state book, :46.7 compared to the 1933 mark of :48.2 and the national record of :48.4.

Berkeley's Henry Dorsey was second at :47.4 and Woodland's Jack Yerman caught San Francisco's Carlos Tan (St. Ignatius) at the tape for third place. Tan was timed in :48.0.

Larrieu, who ran fourth, eighth and fifth at each of the first three quarters, overtook Grady Neal of Fullerton 20 yards short of the finish of the mile to win by three yards. He made his first bid on the back stretch by moving to third behind Neal and El Cerrito's Herb Cloe, and moved up for the kill coming out of the turn.

So fast was the field that Bob Hammond of San Francisco's Washington placed eighth in 4:23.8. Cloe, who ran second through the first three laps, was sixth. Hammond moved into ninth place behind Larrieu at the half mile and stayed with the national two-mile record holder until the last 220 yards.

Robertson, a giant with an unorthodox style, made his record breaking shot put on his first put, later he got another one out beyond the 60-foot line.

Oscar Bean of L.A. Jefferson took the broad jump, Curtis Chappell of Jefferson and Robert Sims of L.A. Jordan tied in the high jump, and Tim Helm of Placerville El Dorado High tied with El Cajon's Bill Longan at 13-6 in the pole vault.

Prep Vaulters Sets U. S. Mark

TUCSON, Ariz., May 11 (AP)—Jim Brewer, North Phoenix high school star, set a new national high school record in the pole vault tonight with a vault of 14 feet, 6¼ inches.

880: Dodge Gopher Holes

Last week's State high school track and field championships at Chico produced three national records, six State records, and what was universally hailed as the best meet in its 38 years. But perhaps the most interesting story to come out of the meet did not concern a record. Instead, it concerned a young man who had to watch for gopher holes on the make-shift track his coach laid out for him.

Jerry Siebert of the lumber town of Willits, 140 miles north of San Francisco, won the 880-yard run in 1:53.8 to the surprise of most everyone save himself and his coach. His best previous time this year was 1:57.1 and eight other entrants had done as well or better.

Actually, Jerry had lost only one race at 880 yards, though in that one he was badly beaten. This was in the 1955 State meet in Los Angeles when he barely finished in 2:03.

Since then Jerry learned two things: pacing and speed.

The speed was more easily developed than the pacing. By this spring he was able to turn in a :22.2 in the 220. But he was still faced with the fact that Willits not only does not have a track but the best coach Chandler Kjos could improvise was a 330-yard course on the football field.

Kjos, a Midwesterner who earned his teaching credentials at Sacramento State, worked Siebert by the integral method—running a quarter, jogging a quarter, then running again. Despite the off-size course, Siebert learned to pace himself and the spectacular victory at Chico was the result.

Last year in the State meet, Jerry tried to stay up with the leaders through the first quarter and he went that distance in :54.5. This time, Jerry laid back for a :56.5 first quarter and then came out of the pack to win easily.

Only two other high school runners have done the half-mile faster. Cal's Don Bowden had a best of 1:52.3 while attending Lincoln High School in San Jose and Ted Meridith of Mercersburg, Pa., clocked 1:52.5 in the 1912 Olympic Games. Lang Slanley's high school record, set in 1950, was 1:53.9.

Siebert's training course, a far cry from facilities enjoyed by his opponents, was in a sense an obstacle course. As a sophomore, Jerry caught his foot in a gopher hole and was held out of the 1320-yard run with a sprain.

Until the Northwest League meet in May, Jerry ran three competitive half-miles—2:03, 2:01 and 1:59.1. By the North Coast meet two weeks ago, Jerry was down to 1:57.1.

Considering, S. F. Preps Did Nobly

Although San Francisco managed to get only two points, its performance in the State high school track and field meet Saturday at Chico was encouraging to coaches Lou Vasquez and Steve Ebert.

Even Carlos Tan's fourth place in the 440 was perhaps a bit more than could have been expected, although he lost third place by only whisker. Two clocks caught Tan in :47.8.

The next most successful San Franciscan was Mike Lewis of Lincoln who placed second in the college-weight discus. Mike also had a fifth place in the high school weight discus, and actually accepted a medal for such, but a recheck placed him sixth.

Bob Hammond of Washington ran the mile in 4:23.8 and finished only eighth. This was only one-tenth of a second off the record — breaking time of Ron Bauer of Washington when he won the State mile in 1950.

"All in all our boys performed very well," said Ebert of Polytechnic. "They did their best and for the most part they were right in there, but the competition was terrific."

"Actually San Francisco did much better this year than usually," said Vasquez of Washington. "We may have scored more points at times but we got more men closer to placing this time."

Poly's Herb Blanchard was one who came close. In fact, he was qualified in the 220-yard dash, only to be told later that films revealed that Gary Schaaf of Orosi had edged him. Schaaf placed fifth in the finals.

Poly's 88-yard relay team was one place out of qualifying but Ebert said he was sure they would have qualified easily had they had not been allocated the fifth outside lane. Blanchard, the anchor man, was "boxed" in on the turn and could not pass his men.

Washington's Gaynell MacPherson broad-jumped 22-11 and Poly's Wilfred Gasper high jumped 6-0 and pole-vaulted 12-6. Gasper just didn't have a good night.

But with national records being set in the relay, shot-put and 440-yard run, and state records being set in those events as well as in the 100, 220 and high school weight discus, the competition was tough indeed.

As Al Ragan, assistant U. of California track coach, was heard to say:

"We would be mighty happy just to have tonight's eleventh-placers enrolled at California."

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Jefferson Wins as 3 U.S. Marks Fall

CHICO, June 2—A 63ft. 9½in. shot-put. A 440 in 46.7. An 880-yard relay in 1:25.9. Three national records.

This figured to be the finest California high school meet in history and it was more than that. Two other State meet marks toppled and still another was tied as the lads gorged themselves on terrific competition and perfect conditions.

Jefferson, which wound up as team champion as every Democrat came through for a total of 24½ points, started the record busting in the afternoon prelims by lowering their own half-mile mark to 1:26.3. They had set the standard in last year's State meet at 1:27.2 and bettered it unofficially last Monday in the trials to determine the city's three entrants here with a 1:26.5 clocking.

Robertson Hits 63-9

In the night's final event Jeff lowered its mark to 1:25.9.

At twilight, when the torrid 90 deg. had cooled into the 80's, Homer Robertson, Pacific High of San Bernardino giant, unleashed a tremendous shot-put effort that measured 63ft. 9½in. It was his first meeting with Canoga Park's vaunted Dave Davis, who two weeks ago raised the National mark from 62ft. 5¼in. to 62ft. 7½in.

Robertson, a 6-foot 4-inch,

254-pound behemoth who wears a hearing aid, got his big one on his first attempt, after Davis had done 60ft. 5in. And Davis couldn't get any closer. Robertson had another effort of 62ft. 7½in. And four of his other five tries were over 60 feet.

White Does 46.7

Then, midway in the meet, Jerry White of Corcoran, a lithe lad with a long stride, stepped off his 46.7 quarter, around one turn and with virtually no wind.

Run in lanes all the way, White made a quick move from the pole and at the 220 mark had a clear lead of about three yards. He was timed in 22.5 at that point. Around the curve he eased ahead steadily and in the stretch glided on with powerful, unswerving strides to win by six yards as Henry Dorsey of Berkeley finished fast for second in an amazing 47.4.

The race was so fast that Jack Yerman of Woodland, timed in 47.8, was only third, Carlos Tan of St. Ignatius, S.F., fourth in 48.0 and J. C. Phillips, Bakersfield, fifth in 48.2.

So all five finishers broke
