THE RACE—The outcome of the meet could easily depend on the strategy used by the two coaches in this event. If Stanford's Maury Graves does not enter the four-lapper California should sweep the mile easily. However, Bowden, House, and Orme all have to come back in other events later in the afternoon: Bowden is being depended on to win the 880 and anchor the relay team. House will have to meet Graves in the two-mile, and Orme will be shooting for second in the 880. Coach Hamilton might not run all three men. Bowden and House are both capable of breaking the meet record, but they probably won't go for it because of the tightness of the dual meet competition.
