Berkeley Wins State Track Title; U. S. Marks Fall

EDWARDS STADIUM, BERKELEY, June 2.—Shot putters Clark Branson of Pasadena and Mike McKeever of Los Angeles' Mount Carmel smashed National interscholastic records to highlight the 39th annual State track and field meet today.

Branson, a 6-3, 210 pounder, bettered the old 12 pound iron ball standard of 63-9½ that Homer Robertson of San Bernardino set last year twice. His longest cast was 64-0¾. One try earlier he put it out 64-0⅝.

McKeever undid the 16 pound record with a 53-4¾ measurement. The former best, 52-9¾, was established in 1953 by Don Vick of Ontario's Chaffey.

BERKELEY TOPS.

With 10,500 full throated fans rooting them on, Rich Hacker's Berkeley Yellowjackets annexed the team championship by scoring 22 points, 12 more than Centennial and San Diego which tied for second.

Berkeley's triumph, which was spearheaded by quarter miler Fred Dewitt and hurdler Cebron Russ, is one of three scored by a northern California school in the finals. Alameda won in 1954 and Sacramento tied with two others for the team crown in 1930. The 'Jackets were fifth last year.

Hacker, 32 year old father of five, attributed the outcome to "come through performances by all my boys—all of whom gave everything they had."

During the season Hacker guided his squad to first places in the North Coast Section meet, Alameda County Athletic League and the Fresno, Martinez and El Cerrito relays.

WAS SPRINTER.

Dewitt, a converted dashman, picked up the deciding team points when he upset a star-studded 440 yard field. He turned on a tremendous kick to overhaul six men in the final 25 yards and won by a comfortable margin in 47.9.

Russ, who will enroll in the University of California next fall, accounted for nine points via a second place in the 120

Of all the events at the state high school championships last Saturday the shot-put amazed me the most.

Bob Atkinson of Menlo-Atherton put the 12-pound shot 56-5½ and didn't even qualify for the finals, then came back with 49 feet in the 16-pound event and didn't place! The winner of the 12 was Clark Branson of Pasadena, who was exploding the shot like an orange, finishing with a wrist flip that sent it high in the air and twice over 64 feet for a new record.

BUT THE McKEEVER TWINS of Mount Carmel High really had folks blinking their eyes. They are just about as identical as two people can get, 6-2, 230-pound, curly-headed block busters. Mike was the only one in the regular 12-pound event because brother Marvel's record of 59 feet didn't qualify him in his district.

Mike was having a little trouble with his version of the O'Brien form and only put 51-10¾. The third place went to Jim Wade of Grossmont, cocking the shot too far behind his neck but still putting 60-7¾ and forcing Mike Lewis of San Francisco into fourth place with his 60-2¾.

Four high school kids over 60 and not a one of 'em ever heard of amphetamine!

The fun really began with the exhibition 16-pound event. McKeever started putting, everything the same except he was wearing red pants instead of white, and putting mighty well, out around 49. A couple of minutes later McKeever was putting again but this time wearing white pants, and folks in the press box were saying, how does he get so many puts, eight in all to qualify?

WHEN THE FINALS started and they put in turn, instead of going through in flights of four, the mystery unraveled. The McKeever in the white pants was Mike who blasted the shot 53-4¾ for a new high school record, and the one in red was twin brother Marvel, who followed with another 53-footer, though he fouled on it and had to take second at 50-ft. 8½. What a pair of tackles somebody's going to get, and it could be Chuck Taylor if he keeps his fingers crossed tight enough.

Then three other high school kids, Wade, Mike Lewis and finally Branson, blasted the unaccustomed 16-pounder out over the 50-foot mark, all using some version of the O'Brien form, in the most sensational shot-putting afternoon I've ever looked at. Now I can only wonder why they use the 12-pounder in high school at all, why they don't save it for the junior high kids.

Next was the high jump won by the first diver I've ever seen who got extra height from his head-first form. That was Bob Avant from Hart High of Los Angeles and clearing 6-8 with inches to spare while Connie Varneck Kazarinoff, now coaching South San Francisco, just about flipped.

IT SEEMED very silly to have both the high school and college discus with neither of them counting. Both exhibition events, running them off like country cousins they wanted to keep out of sight before the meet started, especially when you have stars like Don Bell of Alameda at 173 in the high school size, and Mike Lewis at 157, Tom Strong at 145 with the college size, breaking both records.

The tall, wobbling Griffin wins the 100 in 9.6, and the 220 in 21.3 after limping in on a bad leg the last 20 yards. DeWitt of Berkeley runs the 440 in 49.7 with a terrific burst at the finish; Cerveny breaks Bowden's record in the 880 with 1:52.7 and Roelen of San Fernando runs the mile in 4:20.2.

Yet the hurdlers must run 3-foot 3-inch hurdles instead of the regulation size because they are much too young and immature for the 3-foot 6-inch jobs and the low hurdles must stick to the butched distance of 180 yards on the theory that 220 is far beyond their feeble young strength. What nonsense.

Babka enters RC meet

REDWOOD CITY—Some of the strongest field event line-ups in track history were shaping up today as entries continued to pour in for the first annual Northern California invitational track meet June 15 at Sequoia's Terremere Field.

A trio of entries from the University of Southern California bolstered discus and javelin fields when Rink Babka and Jack Eagan, Trojan weight stars, and javelinist Bob Voiles signified they'd be on hand.

Babka, a Palo Alto High School product, has a best throw of 181 feet, six inches and Eagan has hit the 176-foot mark. Babka won the Times' Midpeninsula athlete of the year award in 1954.

Voiles, with a best of 246-9, faces two former NCAA champions from the Olympic Club—Leo Long (246-0) and Les Bitner (246-1). Long competed for Stanford, Bitner for Kansas.

Another top event is the pole vault, where half a dozen contestants have bettered 14 feet. One, North Phoenix High's Jim Brewer, is the first prep ever to top 15 feet and now has set his sights on the "impossible" 16-foot barrier.

Coach Hacker, Vet Worrywart, Fretted His Yellowjackets to Title

According to Berkeley Coach Rich Hacker, the fretting an expectant father goes through in a hospital waiting room doesn't compare with the worrying a man does while sweating out a State track and field championship.

Hacker, who guided his Yellowjackets to the C.I.F. title in Edwards Stadium Saturday, should know what he's talking about. He has five children and his wife, Lisbeth, is expecting again.

"I knew my boys could win," the affable 32 year old mentor declared, "but the wondering if they would was enough to bring on an ulcer.

"Even when Dewitt (Quarter Miler Fred Dewitt) won to give us a big point lead, I still had butterflies."

Hacker doped the meet out Friday, and had his boys winning with 19 points. They scored 22.

This is the way he figured it:

High Hurdles—Cebren Russ, third. He was second. **100**—Henry Allums, fifth. He was. **440**—Dewitt, second. He won. **Low Hurdles**—Russ, fourth. He was. **Broad Jump**—Russ, third. He was. **Relay**—First. It was.

The 'Jacket coach said he was positive his relay would win even though five other tandems had equal or better season best clockings, because his foursome, unlike the others, never had been pressed to the limit.

Although Hacker will lose his big guns—Russ and Dewitt to graduation—he expects to field "a very capable team next year." He has excellent holdovers in Sprinter Jackie Williams (:09.8 and :21.5); Nat Allums, who is dependable in the 440, 220 and 100, and LeRoy Whittle, a sophomore who has run the quarter in :49.5. All three also are better than average hurdlers.

NOTES—Although he failed to place in the money, Bob Roenicke of San Jacinto showed nifty form in the high jump despite the fact that one-third of his right foot was amputated when he was four years old as the result of a rattlesnake bite. . . . Centennial's heralded Preston Griffin, a double win

yard highs, fourth in the 180 lows and third in the broad jump at 23-4.

Ken Overholser of Glendale registered an eyelash win over Russ in the high sticks, getting home in 14.3 to equal the stadium high school record set by Rafer Johnson of Kingsburg in 1954 and also tied by Russ in the morning heats. The Berkeley whiz might have reversed the decision had he not hit the first three hurdles.

Berkeley had a first place half mile relay tandem, of Dewitt, Jackie Williams, Nat Allums and Henry Allums—who were clocked in 22.3, 21.8, 21.6 and 21.3 respectively—and Henry Allums' fourth in the 220 and fifth in the 100 to thank for its other points.

15 RECORDS SET.

Branson, McKeever and Berkeley's men were not the only stars. All told, 15 records were set like this: National, 2; State, 5; Stadium (by a prep), 8. Another State mark was equaled.

In addition to Branson and McKeever, the new California standard bearers are:

1—MIKE LEWIS of San Francisco's Lincoln who hurled the college weight discuss 151-7 $\frac{3}{4}$. The old best, 148-2 $\frac{3}{4}$, was set by Rink Babka of Palo Alto in 1954. Lewis, a 6-1, 205 pounder, wiped out this event's 20 year old record of 154-9 with a 158-7 $\frac{1}{4}$ toss in the Hollister Relays yesterday afternoon.

BELL SAILS ONE.

2—DON BELL of Alameda who tossed the high school weight discuss 173-2 $\frac{3}{4}$. Corcoran's Wayne Crow triggered the former mark of 171-5 $\frac{1}{4}$ last spring.

3—JIM CERVENY of Mission Bay who ran the half mile in 1:52.7. This was two-tenths of a second under the old mark that Lincoln of San Jose's Don Bowden set three years ago.

4—JUNIOR. HOWARD of San Bernardino who equaled the 180-yard low hurdle record of 18.9 in the trials. Don Armstrong (Manual Arts) established the record in 1953.

Lewis also finished second in the prep discuss, second in the "lightweight" shot and fourth in the "varsity" shot.

Had it not been for the blistering pace Carl Maloney of Merced set in the 830 run, it's doubtful if Cerveny would have lowered the record. The Mission Bay swiftie stuck on Carl's heels like gum until they hit the final turn. At that point, with about 150 yards to go, Cerveny opened up and won going away. Maloney, who has done 1:53.7, folded and finished sixth in 1:55.2.

2ND JESSE OWENS.

Centennial's Preston Griffin, who came here billed as the "Second Jesse Owens," performed as advertised. He won the 100 and 220 in 9.6 and 21.3.

As it turned out, Griffin, a

6-3, 170 pound 18 year old, was "lucky" to do as well as he did because he pulled a thigh muscle on his third broad jump earlier in the day. All of his leaps were over 24 feet and were good enough to win the meet—but they didn't because he fouled on each.

"Presto," who along with San Diego's Roscoe Cook, has a 9.4 century being considered for National recognition, won the 100 by one step over Taft's Doug Smith. Cook, the only man to beat the Centennial ace, was third.

GOOD LEAD.

Griffin took a commanding lead in the 220, but with 20 yards to go his leg cramped and he just did manage to nip Smith again. The crowd gave "Presto" a standing ovation.

Other first place ribbons went to Pole Vaulteur Voyce Hendrix of Riverdale, 13-6; High Jumper Bob Avant of Hart, 6-8; Broad Jumper Luther Hayes of San Diego's Lincoln, 23-8 $\frac{1}{2}$; Miler Tim Ro-

land of San Fernando, 4:20.2 and Low Hurdler Jesse Bradford, of Shafter, 19.0. The latter also has an 18.4 awaiting National approval.

BURTON SECOND.

Lewis wasn't the only San Franciscan to earn laurels. Mac Burton of Washington took second in the broad jump at 23-7 $\frac{1}{2}$; Lowell's Tim Curtis was fifth in the 440 with his all-time best time of 48.7; Bill Morgan, also Lowell, was sixth in the mile (4:27.4) and Poly's Paul Patton, although out of the money, managed a snappy 1:56.4 in the half mile.

Herb Blanchard of Poly, who has won both the 100 and 220 in the last three All-City meets, pulled up lame in the trials and was lost for the afternoon. Balboa's Claud Cooper had to be scratched as the result of the leg muscles he stretched in the recent S.F.-Oakland dual.

Next year's State championships will be held in Los Angeles.

64-0 $\frac{3}{4}$ and Mike McKeever of Mt. Carmel at the 16-pound (college weight) shot 53-4 $\frac{3}{4}$ in an exhibition event.

Shotputter Branson was a crowd pleaser in breaking Homer Robertson's U. S. 12-pound record of 63-9 $\frac{1}{2}$ twice on puts of 62-5 $\frac{1}{2}$, 64-0 $\frac{5}{8}$ and 64-0 $\frac{3}{4}$, the last two threatening to sail over the restraining wall. So strong was the field that fourth place Lewis was over 60 feet.

Lewis, who broke the national scholastic record for the college discus with a 158-7 $\frac{1}{4}$ throw at Hollister Friday night, placed in three events.

Despite Howard's record tying low-hurdle heat, Jesse Bradford of Shafter captured the final in :19.0, a yard ahead of Howard.

Russ met near-triumph and near-tragedy in the highs, knocking over the first and third hurdles after a good start, coming back to stride with Fresno Edison's Bob Gill until Overholser shot ahead midway and then closing fast on the winner approaching the tape. Overholser was clocked in :14.3.

San Fernando's Tim Roelen won the mile in 4:20.2—two tenths over the State record—with second place Jim McGowan of Morningside 10 yards back and third place Alan Gaylord another ten back. Piedmont's Keith Wallace was fourth, Bill James of

Sacramento's El Camino fifth and San Francisco Lowell's Bill Morgan sixth (a. 4:27.4) and out.

Cerveny, who clipped two-tenths off Don Bowden's State record with a 1:52.7 clocking, won by some eight yards over Narbonne's Bill Knocke. Merced's Carl Maloney, expected to be Cerveny's chief foe, apparently made his bid too soon and faded in the stretch from second to 11th.

DeWitt took the 440 in :47.9 by two yards over Eagle Rock's Dean Balzaret, much to the surprise of form followers who noted four men had better previous times than the Berkeleyan. DeWitt made his bid in the final 100 and took charge over the final 50. Lowell's Tim Curtis allowed two men to push him down to fifth in the final few yards after a fine race.

Berkeley wrapped the meet up with the relay win in 1:27.0, a yard and a half ahead of San Diego. Nat Allums surged ahead in the stretch of the third lap to give brother Henry the pole on the final turn. Henry held on as first Manual Arts tried to pass on the turn and then San Diego closed at the finish for second.

San Francisco's best performance of the day was that of Washington's Mac Burton

in the broad jump, whose 23-7 $\frac{1}{2}$ was second by only an inch to winner Luther Hayes of San Diego Lincoln. Bob Avant of Los Angeles' Hart won the high jump at 6-3 and Voyce Hendrix of Riverdale the pole vault at 13-6.

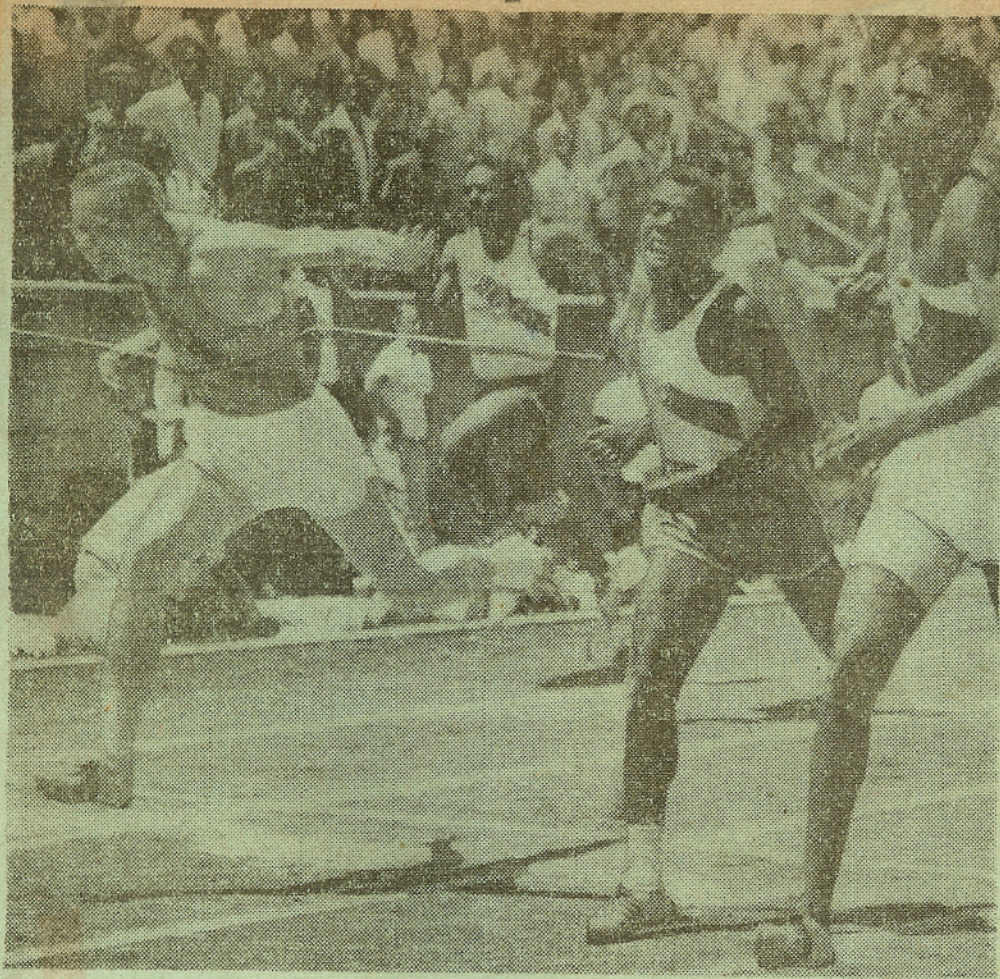

State Prep Track

S. F. Cindermen In Good Showing

San Franciscans, though generally disappointed, looked back on Saturday's State track meet as their best yet, certainly the best since Washington's Don Bauer won the 1950 mile.

Note that Washington's Mac Burton was just one inch away from being State champion in the broad jump, that Lowell quarter miler Tim Curtis—who as a junior has another crack at the prize—was a good fifth and just a whisker or two away from third; and that Lincoln's Mike Lewis, despite a troublesome knee, was fourth in the shot put.

That doesn't include Lewis' state discus record of 151-7¾ in an exhibition event—which doesn't count for team points—and his second at 173-1¼ (one inch behind state record breaker Don Bell of Alameda) in the college weight discus, another exhibition.

SEVEN FOR S. F.

So, just counting the official events, SF preps, who had to settle for just one fourth place in the 440 last year and were shut out altogether on other occasions, scored seven points.

It's not much in comparison with state champion Berkeley's 22 points, but it's a lot in view of SF performances in former years.

State Meet Places Changed

Berkeley High's Henry Aliums was given fourth place instead of fifth in Saturday's 100-yard dash of the State prep track meet at Berkeley after officials studied films yesterday.

Berkeley, which had already won the State title with 22 points thus wound up with 23. Ed Buchanan of Kearny was dropped to fifth.

In another change, Cecil Green of Los Angeles' Manual Arts replaced William McMillen of San Ramon as the 440 third placer and McMillen was dropped to fourth.

INASMUCH as you can be sure there will be a flock of imitators I'll describe this new dive style. Avant approaches slightly from the right, jumping off his right foot. At the take-off he raises his hands just like he was going to hit the water. Going into the air he raises his left leg out to the left, but keeps his head and body going straight over. Then when he gets his height he jack knifes his head and shoulders over, takes a tuck with his hips and does a three-quarter flip, his legs going high over his hips, and lands on the back of his left shoulder. I don't know why his left leg goes out to the side, but it's a cinch it works, and will work as long as they pile plenty of sawdust in the pits. No, it's not against the rules. You can dive all you want, just so you don't take off of both feet at once.

The best-looking jumper was Sylvester Pointer of Fresno, clearing 6-4 but not getting his lead leg up high enough to clear the bar on 6-5.

Berkeley wins state title, Tom Strong 2nd in discus

The curtain fell on the 1957 high school track season at Berkeley Saturday but not before Berkeley High School had won the state championship and two national records had fallen.

The Berkeley boys withstood the challenge of the Southern California "phenoms" to give Northern California its first team crown since 1954 and only the second since 1930.

The Yellowjackets piled up 23 points to 10 for second place

Centennial of Compton and San Diego. All of Centennial's points were chalked up by Preston Griffin. He won the 100 and the 220 in 9.6 and 21.3. A leg injury forced his withdrawal from the broad jump, an event in which he was the favorite.

THE BATTLE FOR outstanding performer of the day was a five-way fight. Cebron Russ and Fred DeWitt of Berkeley; Griffin; Pasadena's Clark Branson, and Tom Strong of Menlo-Atherton, all turned in stellar performances.

Russ, with a second in the high hurdles, a fourth in the lows, and a third in the broad jump, accounted for nine Yellowjacket points. DeWitt put on the outstanding finish of the day as he out-kicked Dean Balzarrett in a blazing 440-yard finish.

DeWitt also got Berkeley off to a lead in the 880-yard relay and they were never headed.

Branson threw the 12-pound shot farther than any other prep in history when he pushed the steel ball 64-0 $\frac{3}{4}$. The effort topped the meet, stadium and national mark by more than four inches.

STRONG, competing in two exhibition discus events, spun the college-weight platter 145-3 $\frac{7}{8}$ to take second place. He tossed the high school discus 162-2 $\frac{3}{4}$ to take third in that event. It was the top performance turned in by a Peninsula athlete.

One other national mark fell during the afternoon. Big Mike McKeever of Los Angeles's Mt. Carmel High School pushed the 16-pound shot 53-4 $\frac{3}{4}$ for a new national prep record. The points for the winning toss do not count in team standings.

Mike Lewis of San Francisco's Lincoln High School wiped the last Palo Alto High School record off the books when he threw the college-weight discus 151-7 $\frac{3}{4}$. The toss was three feet better than Rinky Babka's old mark, set in 1954.

Prep state meet results changed

Two changes have been made in the official results of the state high school track and field meet at Berkeley last Saturday.

After a review of motion pictures, Henry Allums of Berkeley was moved into fourth place in the 100-yard dash with Ed Buchanen of San Diego's Kearny High dropping to fifth.

Cecil Green of Los Angeles Manual Arts was given third place in the 440, trading places with Bill McMillen of Danville's San Ramon.

The changes put Berkeley's winning team score at 23 points instead of 22 and moved Manual Arts into sixth place with six.

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TRACK TRIUMPH

Berkeley High Nabs State Title

By ALAN McALLASTER

EDWARDS STADIUM, June 1—Clark Branson of Pasadena High broke the national interscholastic shot-put record and Berkeley High scored 22 points to win its first State championship in the 39th annual California Interscholastic Federation track and field meet here today.

Branson heaved the 12-pound shot 64 feet, $\frac{3}{4}$ inch to top the 63 foot, $9\frac{1}{2}$ inch national mark set by Homer Robertson of San Bernardino's Pacific High. last year. Branson's first heave of the day was 64 feet, $\frac{5}{8}$ inch.

Berkeley's 880 team of Fred DeWitt, Jackie Williams, Nat and Henry Allums won the relay and DeWitt came from behind to capture the 440 as the Yellowjackets beat their closest rivals, Centennial and San Diego, by 12 points.

It is only the second time in the history of the meet a local team has won. Alameda triumphed in 1954.

An estimated 10,500 fans watched the meet.

Cebren Russ got a second

place in the high hurdles, a fourth in the lows and a third in the broad jump. Henry Allums was fourth in the 220 and fifth in the 100-yard dash to complete Berkeley's scoring for the day.

The Jackets set a stadium prep record of 1:27.0 in winning the relay. The 1954 record of 1:28.4 established by Alameda was bettered by Fremont (L.A.) in the first trial heat (1:28.0) and by San Diego in the second heat (1:27.4).

Don Bell of Alameda set meet and stadium records with a 173 foot, $2\frac{3}{4}$ inch discus throw. Wayne Crow of Corcoran posted the meet standard of 171 feet $5\frac{1}{4}$ inches last year and Taft's Leon Patterson set the stadium record of 165 feet, 5 inches in 1951. Bell's previous best toss was 166 feet.

The meet half-mile record of 1:52.9 set by Don Bowden of Lincoln of San Jose in 1954 was bettered by Mission Bay's
