

Farmer Stars in No. Coast

SUNNYVALE, May 24.—Despite record breaking performances by Larry Guilford and John Northway, Miramonte's one man track team, Dixon Farmer, stole the show during the North Coast Section championships here tonight.

Farmer won three events—the 440 in :48.7, broad jump at 22-7 $\frac{3}{4}$ and the 180 low hurdles in :19.2. This was good enough to give him second in the "team" standings with 24 points.

Berkeley amassed 27 for the title. Palo Alto was third, one digit back of Miramonte.

Guilford, a Santa Clara entry, set his record in the 120 high hurdles. He hit the tape in :14.4, one-tenth of a second under the mark established by Piedmont's Monte Upshaw and equaled by Joe Griffin of Alameda and Cebron Russ of Berkeley.

Northway, Palo Alto miler, circled the four laps in 4:24.8, best by a northern California prep this season. Keith Wallace of Piedmont was the old standard bearer at 4:26.5.

As expected, Berkeley's heralded Jackie Williams won both sprints.

The first three finishers in each event qualified for the State meet at Long Beach next Saturday.

Peninsula qualifies 13 preps for state track meet Saturday

All roads lead to Veterans Memorial Stadium in Long Beach for the state track meet Saturday and there will be the biggest contingent ever of Peninsula runners and jumpers making the trip.

Although Berkeley High School took the team crown in the North Coast Section finals at Fremont High School Saturday, it was a great night to remember for a quartet of Palo Alto High School athletes—Don Beal, John Pastinieks, George Linn and John Northway.

OTHERS WHO stood out were Dennis Boyle, a Palo Alto boy attending Bellarmine, Jim Zamlich of Fremont, Dixon Farmer of Miramonte High School, Larry Guilford of Santa Clara and the fabled 440-yard relay team from Menlo-Atherton High School.

There were disappointing moments too. Menlo-Atherton, figured to be in the thick of the fight for the team crown, scored only four points as everything went wrong.

Cubberley's Ernie Stevenson found competition from a host of East Bay swifties too much

and he missed the trip in a 100-yard dash photo finish.

All in all, the 1,500 fans on hand were treated to a night of thrills like nothing seen before in a Peninsula prep track meet.

ONLY A HANDFUL were on hand in the afternoon when Guilford flashed over the high hurdles in 14.4 to crack the NCS record of 14.5.

The M-A relay team of John Finegold, Jon Peck, Stu Hawley and Dick Burns were clocked in 43.3 to crack another meet standard.

But the show at night was the big one. It would be hard to choose between Northway, Boyle or Farmer as the top performer in the meet.

No one—not even Northway or Boyle — would complain if the nod went to the fabulous Farmer, Miramonte's one-man track team.

FARMER WON the 440-yard run in 48.7 for his first trip to the top level on the victory stand. He edged out Guilford and Ernie St. Julian, El Cerrito soph, to win the low hurdles in 19.2, fastest time in Northern California this year for the event.

He put the topper on a once-in-a-lifetime performance with a 22-7/8 broad jump on his last try of the night. The leap topped Zamlich's leading mark by a quarter inch.

It was a bitter pill for Zamlich. He was jumping in his home pit. He looked like he was in for his proudest moment until Farmer's flight.

ZAM WAS ONE of the first to congratulate his conqueror. Both make the trip to Long Beach. Zamlich won the exhibition hop-step-jump with a 42-6 effort.

Farmer's 24 points gave him second in team scoring. Berkeley won with 27 on two sprint wins by jet-propelled Jackie Williams, a win in the 880-yard relay and a third by Ed Whittle in the 440-yard run.

Palo Alto finished third with 23 points. It was a night of personal triumph for Northway. He beat back a last-lap challenge of his long-time nemesis, Linn.

NORTHWAY'S time of 4:24.8 was the fastest in Northern California, two seconds better than the meet record, fifth best in the state and the 18th best in the country this year.

Boyle, the bespectacled Bell with a kick of a shotgun, ran his competition ragged with a sizzling second lap.

Only Boyle looked fresh at the finish and he might have clipped another second off his excellent time of 1:56.4 had he been pressed.

Menlo-Atherton's luck went sour in the afternoon when its crack relay team was disqualified after winning a heat race with yards to spare.

TERRY BAKER and Bob Kennedy never reached their peak of last week in the broad jump but Baker did take third to earn the trip south.

The B title went to Vallejo High School. They scored 42 points to 26 for Encinal and 24

for Menlo-Atherton. One race — the 75-yard dash final — saw all eight entrants hit the tape within a 10th of a second of each other.

Finegold of M-A, who seemed the winner, ended up in third place after a long wrangle by finish judges.

Scott Lewis of Los Altos, Billy Gray of Cubberley and Mike Chilton of Palo Alto all turned in outstanding performances in the B meet.

Lewis pushed the eight pound shot 57-1 1/2 to win the event. Gray high jumped 5-11 1/2 for a personal best and a blue ribbon. Chilton lost out to Dave Dunbar of Westmoor in a torrid stretch duel in the 660. Dunbar broke the record in winning.
