Clipper flashed 20.7 in the 40th annual State High School Track and Field Meet. Clipper has a previous record time of 20.6 pending.

In the pole vault, John Rose of Hoover High School in Glendale cleared 14-1, to better the old state record of 13-9 $\frac{1}{8}$ set in 1953 by Ron Morris, Burbank.

Manual Arts of Los Angeles won the team title. Compton and Muir tied for second.

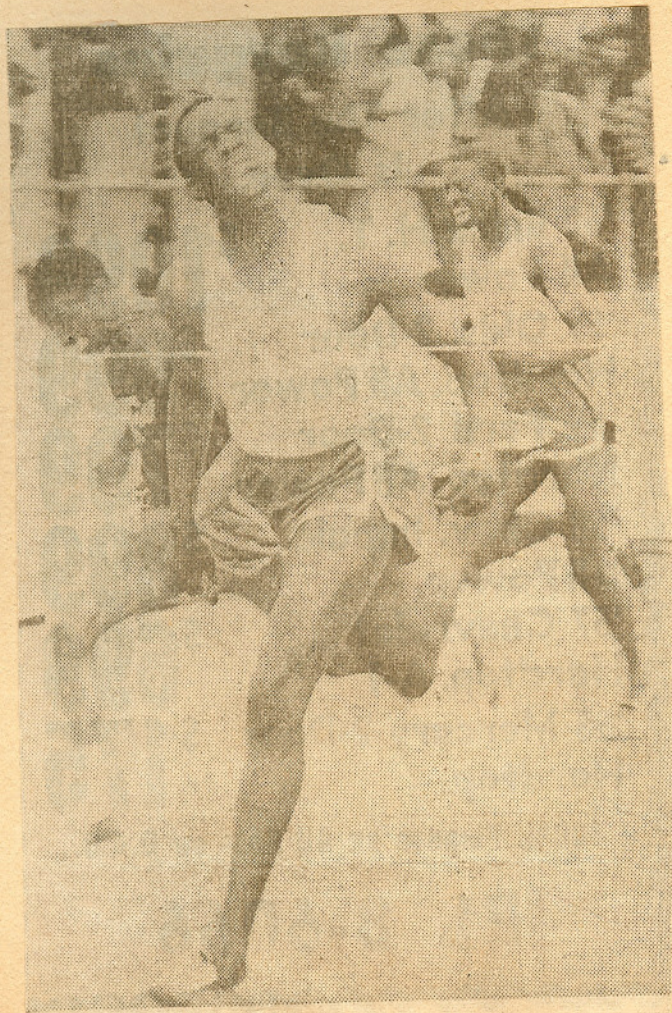

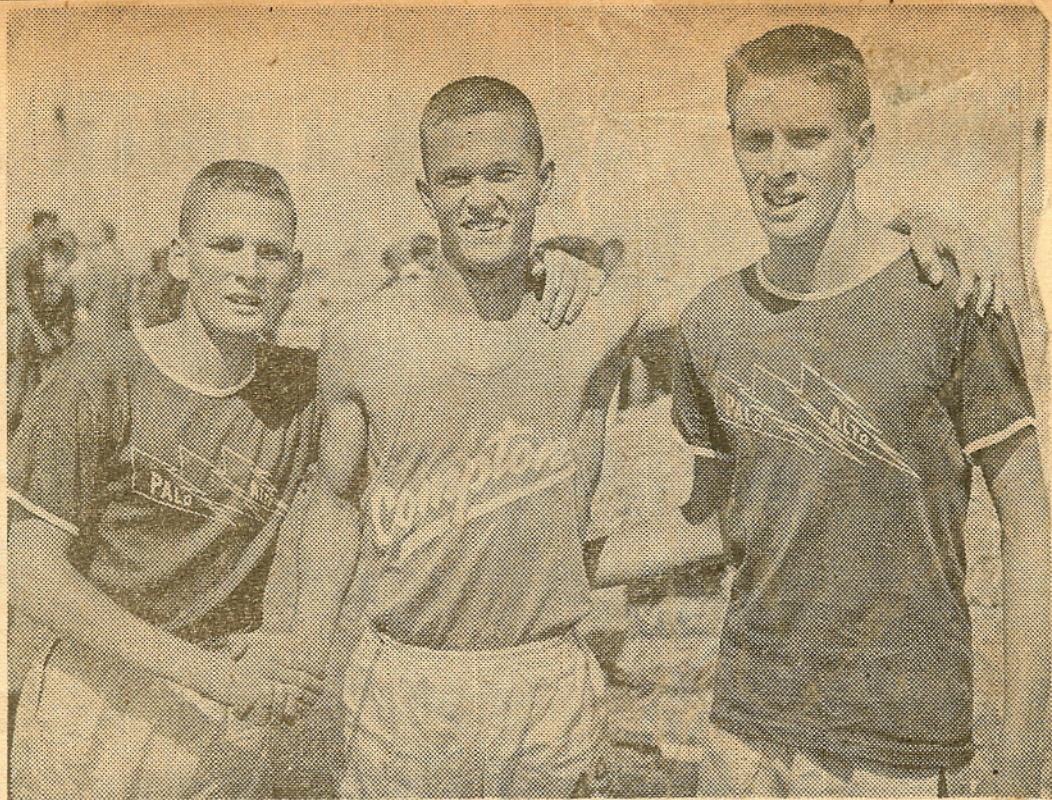

After returning from the state high school track meet at Long Beach last weekend the same question was asked close to a hundred times.

What happened to the Northern California representatives in the meet?

It is not an easily answered question. There are several reasons for the failure.

Perhaps it's the pressure on north state athletes appearing in the biggest track event of the year. There's pressure. Just ask anyone who competed this year.

IT ISN'T like that for the southern boys. Shucks, their toughest meet is the week before in the southern CIF meet. Better athletes than the north sends are eliminated in that dog-eat-dog battle.

There's an anticlimactic feeling for the survivors. The state meet is a pushover.

Another reason is that the runners down in the south are just a little bit faster and jump a little bit farther.

Late in the afternoon, when the pole vault was the only event still going, Don Beal of Palo Alto watched with interest. He had cleared 13-0 and just missed at 13-4.

Out on the track was a lithe junior from Glendale. He was going for a new meet record of 14 feet. John Rose made it too. Beal had done his best but it wasn't good enough.

THE BROAD JUMP was another event where the best of the north wasn't good enough. Terry Baker did better than 23 feet but still took third place. The winning jump was 24-6.

John Pastinieks of Palo Alto and Jim Zamlich of Fremont, were two other NCS competitors in the broad jump.

Zamlich was bothered by the asphalt runway that made it faster on the run up. He had to change his running distance before jumping.

Pastinieks, looking through the meet program on the flight home, quipped, "I would have won the meet in 1922 with my best jump today."

JOHN WAS RIGHT. That must have been a bad year for the southern boys. That's about the only time our end of the state gets any blue ribbons.

Coach Forrest Jamieson of Palo Alto and Father James Devlin of Bellarmine figure the extra long season in the south has something to do with the vast difference in performance.

Win or lose, all competitors enjoyed the trip and the meet. It's good experience to compete with the best, even if you do get beaten.

North state prep spikers fail as Manual Arts wins state title

LONG BEACH—MA is the state high school team track champion. But it stands for Manuel Arts of Los Angeles rather than the Peninsula's Menlo-Atherton. Ten thousand eight hundred forty-two fans saw it happen here Saturday.

The Bears did as well as any Peninsula team against the cinder whizzes from the southland. Terry Baker, the lone M-A entrant, took third in the broad jump.

That was good for three points, only eight less than Manuel Arts scored to win the team crown. It was a tightly contested meet with a potful of fine performances by the southern boys just about equalizing the agonizing failure of Midpeninsula representatives.

PALO ALTO, rated as a long shot for the title, ended up with one point. That was for the medal junior George Linn brought home for his fifth place in the mile run.

John Northway, in third place at the end of three laps, faltered on the fourth go-around and wound up seventh with a time of 4:31. That's almost eight seconds slower than the Northern California "best" time he recorded in winning the North Coast Section title last week.

John Pastinieks soared 22-7 in the broad jump but it wasn't far enough to place. It is the best ever by a Palo Alto jumper.

Don Beal was on his way to his greatest day in the pole vault until the bar was hoisted to 13-4. He hadn't missed a jump but missed three in a row

at the height to drop out in sixth place.

ONE OF THE two records of the day came in the vault. John Rose, a junior from Glendale Hoover, cleared the bar at 14-1, third best ever by a prep, to win. It was four inches better than the previous meet standard.

The other record came in the 220-yard dash where Muir High School's Mel Clipper hustled to a 20.7 clocking. That's the fastest anyone except Clipper himself has covered the furlong.

Mel has a 20.6 mark, made last week, pending for a national record. Clipper wanted to make up for a humiliating defeat at the hands of a sophomore, Hubie Watson of Jordan, in the 100.

Clipper won the race by eight yards and was pulling away like a hopped-up Thunderbird at the finish.

DIXON FARMER of Miramonte ("where's that?" the Los Angeles writers asked) took the only gold medal for the north state. He came off the final turn with an unbelievable burst of speed to win the quarter mile by three yards.

It took the finish judges several minutes to decide against a double win for Dixon as he almost "stole" the low hurdles event.

Farmer came from far back to gain an identical 19.0 clocking as was given the winner, Dave Douglas of East Bakersfield.

With his nine points, Farmer tied for fourth place in team scoring.

DENNIS BOYLE of Bellarmine was lost in the frantic battle for the half-mile crown. He was in contention until the final turn. His time was 1:56.8, second best he has ever run. The winner, Al Gentry of Los Angeles Fremont, was caught in 1:55.4.

Baker might have won the broad jump except for two unique happenings. He was past the 23-foot mark three times and went almost 24 feet on another jump. It was declared an illegal jump, however, when the pit official found the imprint of Terry's front spike a quarter inch past the toe board.

Then Steve Rogers of Brawley got off a once-in-a-lifetime 24-6 jump to win the event. His previous best was 23-9.

THE MILE LOOKED like the big race for Palo Alto. Although Linn couldn't untrack himself on the first two laps, he still was among the leaders.

Northway ran third through most of the race as the quarters clicked off in 63.4, 2:12 and 3:21.3. Then he tied up and couldn't use his carefully saved final lap kick.

Linn started to make his move at the same time Randy Hudson of El Cajon and winner Woody Covington of Compton made theirs.

Next year's state meet is scheduled for either Sanger or Bakersfield. The northern runners may be a year wiser but also must be a few seconds quicker if the title is ever to come up this way again.

Muir's Clipper Dashes :20.6

LONG BEACH, May 31 (UPI)—Mel Clipper, brilliant sprinter from Muir of Pasadena, equaled Jesse Owens' 25-year-old high school record for the 220-yard dash today with a time of :20.7, but Manual Arts of Los Angeles won the team championship of the California track meet with 11 points.

Clipper failed to match his :20.6 clocking of a week ago in the State meet—which was witnessed by a crowd of more than 10,000. But his time will enter the books as a new state mark.

The only other new State record was the pole vault mark of 14 feet, 1 inch set by John Rose of Glendale Hoover. Rose, whose brother Joe has cleared 15 feet, broke the old mark of 13 feet 9½ inches, by Ron Morris, later a USC star.

Hubie Watson of Jordan Los Angeles provided the day's biggest upset in the 100-yard dash when he beat both Clipper and James Bates of Manual Arts in :09.6 seconds.

But Bates was a big factor in the Los Angeles team's triumph. In addition to a third in the century, he matched that finish in the 220 and anchored the winning 880-yard relay team which actually won the meet for manual arts. The winning team was clocked in the excellent time of 1:28.3.

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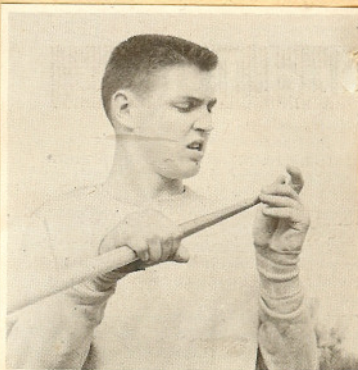

Manual Arts won with an 11-point total over runners-up Compton and Muir.

However, Manual's victory is unofficial, pending a study of the movies. The close finish in the 220, in which Bates was given a third, has been questioned.

If there's a reversal, the lost point would topple the Toilers into a three-way tie with Muir and Compton.

Seven distinct upsets came in the 12 events in the finals.

Biggest surprise of all was registered in the 100 where Sophomore Hubie Watson of Jordan sneaked by on the outside to defeat Mel Clipper of Muir and Bates, who were supposed to battle it out for first. Watson, only 16, was caught in 9.6. Clipper (second) and Bates (third) had 9.7s.

Two State records fell during the afternoon.

Clipper came back to breeze to victory in the 220 with a time of 20.7. It equals the existing national interscholastic furlong mark held by Jesse Owens and Eddie Southern, but Clipper has a previous 20.6 clocking up for world-record consideration.

In the pole vault Glendale Hoover's John Rose cleared 14ft. 1in. on his first attempt to break the old State vault mark of 13ft. 9½in. set by Ron Morris of Burbank in 1953.

Upset victors were Miramonte's Dixon Farmer in the 440 (48.6 over St. Francis' Steve Schwartz), East Bakersfield's David Douglas in the lows (19.0 over Centennial's Bennie Sankey) and Millikan's Jack Slocombe in the shot-put (61ft. 4¼in. over L.B. Poly's Jim Smith).

Fremont Surprises

Another startling surprise of the meeting was the 880 triumph by Fremont's Alfred Gentry over Bill Crowley of Compton.

Going into the race, Gentry's best for the year was 1:58.3, compared to Crowley's 1:54.0, but the Pathfinder star had too much left at the end and won going away in 1:55.4. Hollywood's Warren Farlow, in another surprise, outkicked Crowley to the tape and stole second.

Muir, with Clipper, Low-Hurdler George Williams and a strong relay team, was favored to take the team title but the Mustangs' chances faded as early as the morning prelims, when Clipper, trailing on the anchor, tried to go inside, was blocked, had to stop and then couldn't make up enough ground to qualify Muir for the finals.

As the relay started, Compton and Muir held the lead with 10 points each and Manual Arts, with six, needed a first to win it all or a second for a three-way tie.

Toiler Relay Wins

The Toilers had run a 1:27.7 preliminary heat—the fastest in the nation this year — and were favored. Bates got the baton five yards behind Fremont's Ron Mitchell on the anchor leg, caught his adversary on the curve and beat him to the tape.

Muir's Clipper CIF Track Athlete Of Year

Two Los Angeles City High School track and field athletes — James Bates of Manual Arts and Willie Davis of Roosevelt — and Mel Clipper of Muir High School in Pasadena were named 1958 Track and Field Athletes of the Year when members of Helms All-Southern California Board of Athletics met at Helms Hall to make their annual thirclad selections. Clipper received no competition in being named the CIF High Schools track athlete of the year when Board members cast their ballots.

Clipper led Muir to the CIF Southern Section track and field meet title, by scoring a double in the 100 and 220 and then anchoring the 880-yard relay team to a much-neded third place when it looked as though the Mustangs were far out of it. Clipper won the furlong in 20.6 seconds and thereby set a new interscholastic mark. The old 20.7 clocking belonged to Jesse Owens (1933) and Eddie Southern (1955). Clipper won the State Meet 220 in 20.7 for a new meet mark and placed second to Jordan's Hubie Watson (sophomore) in the State 100.

Bates and Davis both turned in interscholastic marks in the Los Angeles City section in 1958. Bates ran 9.4 seconds in a dual meet with Dorsey early in the year, to tie a national mark first set by Owens in 1933 and duplicated by Jamse Jackson of Alameda in 1954. Bates won the City Meet 100 in 9.9 and took the 220 in 22.0. He was third in both races in the State Meet.

Willie Davis set a new Los Angeles City Meet record in the broad jump of 25'5". The mark will doubtless not be accepted as a national mark since there was an aiding wind at the time of the leap. Davis has also been clocked in 9.6 seconds for the 100 during competition this past year.

Willie Davis' broad jump mark was the only City Meet record to fall in this year's meet. Mel Clipper's 220 mark was the only CIF Southern Section record to go by the boards.

Bates and Fremont's Gilbert McCulley were the only double winners in the city finals. McCulley won both hurdle events and gave the Pathfinders ten big points toward their second straight Los Angeles City Track Championship.

Triple award winners were named in city high jump competition, with Frank Thomas, Ivory Howard and Carl Burnett all of Jefferson receiving joint awards. Although Ken Olson and Ernie Jones tied for the City pole vault championship, it was Belmont's Henry Aguirre who got the City award for his more consistent performances plus his 13' 6½" effort in the State meet.

Ray Nickleberry and Paul Stuber, top CIF high jumpers from Oxnard and Bellflower respectively, were co-picks in the high jump in the CIF selections. You couldn't separate these two star athletes. They tied for first place at 6' 7" in the CIF Southern Section finals and tied again in the State Meet at 6' 8".

All Southern California CIF and Los Angeles City Track and Field athletes named for 1958 all-star team honors will gather with a like group of baseball players at Helms Hall on Saturday morning, June 14 at 10:30. At this time, they will be recipients of lovely framed scroll awards from All-Southern California Board of Athletics. This marks the 22nd year that these awards have been given by Helms Athletic Foundation.

Co-State Meet Championship coaches, Charles Toney (Manual Arts) and Ernst Hartmann (Compton) will receive special tumbler awards for having coached their charges to the championship.

Farmer First in CIF 440. Only Win for North

S.F. EX AM 6/1/58

VETERANS' MEMORIAL STADIUM, LONG BEACH, May 31.—With two exceptions, the record book withstood the best shots of the preps here today in the fortieth annual State track and field meet, won by Manual Arts High School of Los Angeles.

The kids put on a dandy show for the 10,842

spectators, but only two of them—Muir's Mel Clipper and John Rose of Glendale's Hoover—managed to set marks.

Clipper, 6-0, 175 pounder, provided the afternoon's highlight when he blazed 220 yards in :20.7 to tie the national interscholastic standard set by the great Jesse Owens of Cleveland, Ohio, in 1933 and equaled by Eddie Southern, Dallas, Texas, three years ago. **DISAPPOINTED.**

The Muir flash prevailed by at least five yards over runner-up Bruce Munn of North Hollywood, who was clocked in :21.1.

Good as it was, the shirt-sleeve crowd was "disappointed" with Clipper's effort, inasmuch as he had wiped out the Owens-Southern mark by one-tenth of a second in the Southern section finals at El Monte last week.

That time, :20.6, has been submitted for recognition and it's almost a certainty that it will be accepted. And, if okehed it will wipe out the C. I. F. record of :21.0, set by Pasadena's Bob Poynter at Chico in 1956.

TOPS POLE VAULT.

Only other mark that was improved upon was the pole vault. Rose cleared 14-1, three-

quarters of an inch over his previous best. Rose was the only State prep to better 14 feet this season.

His effort erased the five year old mark of 13-9 $\frac{1}{8}$ by Ronald Morris of Burbank's Burroughs.

Only other mark that was tampered with was the 120 yard high hurdles. Floyd James of Centennial was a winner in :14.1—that's the State standard—but it didn't count because he was "assisted" by a 4.9 mile wind. The allowable breeze is 4.473.

Bob Gill of Fresno's Edison, who has a :14.0 pending, was second, a whisker back.

A BAD START.

As usual, southern California representatives dominated the program. They accounted for 11 of the 12 first places.

Miramonte's great all around athlete, Dixon Farmer, "saved the day" for the North when he scampered to first place in the 440. His time was :48.6.

He won by three yards despite getting off to a bad start. But once he got going, he

passed his counterparts in Silky Sullivan style.

Lowell's Tim Curtis, The Examiner's prep of the year and a favorite in the 440, finished fifth. He made his bid with about 80 yards to go, but fell far short. He was "boxed in" at the outset of the race.

Top upset of the meet was provided by Hubie Watson of L. A.'s Jordan in the 100 yard dash. This race figured to be a two man dual between Clipper and Jim Bales of Manual Arts. The latter was favored for an unofficial :09.4 in a dual meet last month.

TIMED IN :9.6.

It took a long time to get this event under way—three false starts—but once they were off and running it was Watson all the way. He breast-eded the tape in :09.6 as did Clipper who was second. Bates was third. Clipper was the last out of the starting blocks.

Another "spoiler" was Alfred Gentry of Fremont of LA who captured the half mile run in 1:55.4.

Dennis Boyle of Bellarmine, who was the choice, finished sixth—some eight yards off the pace. The SF entry, Balboa's Jim Smith, scratched.

BAY AREA POINTS.

Only other Bay area contestants who turned in noteworthy performances were:

1—Don Schaefer of Oakland, who tied for second place in the pole vault at 13-6 $\frac{1}{2}$.

2—Menlo-Atherton's Terry Baker, who broadjumped 23 3 $\frac{1}{4}$ for third.

3—Berkeley's Jackie Williams, fourth in the 220.

4—George Linn of Palo Alto, fifth in the mile.

Berkeley's 880 yard relay also picked up two points by taking fourth.

FAIL TO QUALIFY.

Three SFers didn't get past the morning trials. They were Ed Tank (100) and Len Menter (120HH), both of Lincoln, and Leroy Wise (180LH) of Poly. Poly's relay tandem also went out in the preliminaries.

Bill Hook of Ukiah turned in fine efforts to win both discus events—high school and college. Unfortunately, these were exhibitions and, as such, weren't worth a point.

He chucked the little saucer (3 pounds, 4 ounces) 166 feet, 8 inches and was tops in the big 'n (4 pounds, 7 ounces) at an even 145 feet.

In the weight event that did count—12 pound shotput—Hook was fourth with a 57-2 measurement. Winner was Jack Scolocumbe of Millikan, 61-41 $\frac{1}{2}$. Don Briemle of our town was the No. 5 man in the college discus exhibition.
