

Area Preps Fail In State Meet

James Marshall's John Stampfl, as expected, failed to qualify in either the 100 or 220. Grant Union's sophomore, Leon Horne, ran last in his heat of the high hurdles, was sixth in his section of the 440 at :50.5, far off his best of 49 flat, and finished a distant 15th in the broad jump with a 21-10 $\frac{3}{4}$ effort.

El Camino's Barry McFadden was 10th in the shotput at 55-11 $\frac{3}{4}$, Herb Tillman of Sacramento High tied with a host of others at a sub-par six feet in the high jump and San Juan's Emmet Harless ran a poor 2:05.4 in the half-mile. Best effort by a capital prep came from La Sierra junior Gary Baker, who ran fourth in his section of the mile with a 4:25.5, but that was good for only 10th when other times came in.

Except for one bad break, which counteracted all the good ones, McClymonds High could have won the State track and field championship Saturday at East Los Angeles College.

Coach Jim Coleman had the Warriors figured for 13 points if everything went right, and as it turned out 12 would have been enough.

McClymonds' chances were nullified, however, when hurdler Abe Johnson suffered a muscle tear while winning the highs.

Johnson was first out of the blocks but fell behind at the third hurdle. In his anxiety to win he aggravated the muscle in his right leg.

Coleman gave his star a rubdown before the low barrier test, and Johnson got off to another good start. The leg began bothering him again at the second hurdle, but he still managed to finish third.

"Under the circumstances," said Coleman after the meet, "it's phenomenal that he even finished the race. Anyone else but Abe would have pulled up."

A track doctor advised Johnson not to run in the relay, and alternate James Warren took his place.

Although Warren did a good job considering he had little time to warm up, a healthy Johnson would have given McClymonds at least a fourth place relay finish instead of fifth.

Even though they got a gift point when the Jefferson of Los Angeles anchor man fell in the relay, the Mackmen could have tied for the title if Johnson had finished second in the lows. That would have pushed James Tucker of Centennial down to third and given both teams 10 points in the final standings.

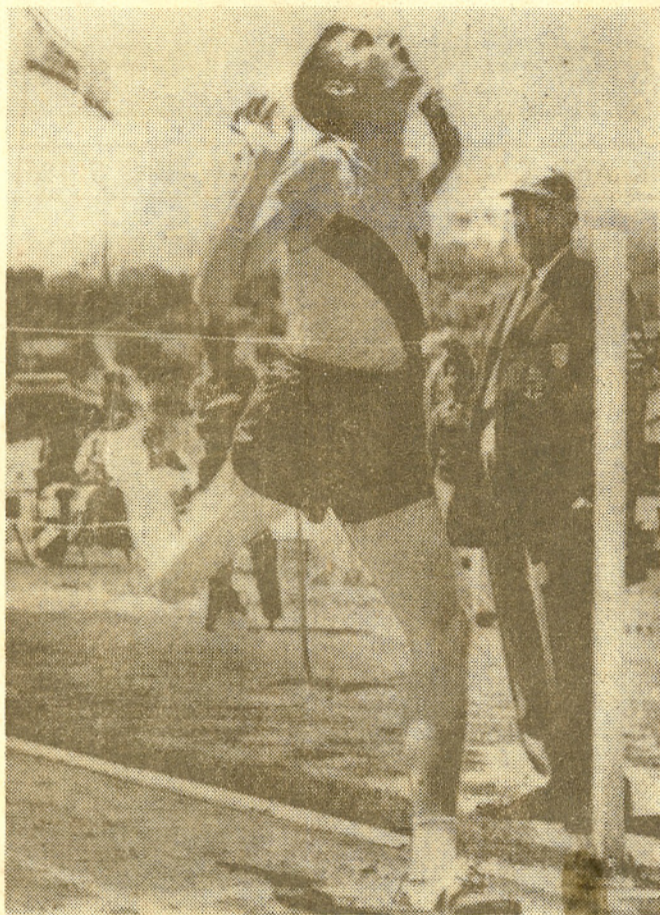

None of the seven official qualifiers representing the Valley placed among the top five, but some of the local exhibition relay teams turned in fine performances.

Only local winner of the day was the North Hollywood High School eight-man mile relay team of Fred Vonder Kuhlen, Bob Dietrich, Kim Allender, Bob Falck, Rick Ergenbright, Rick Roth, Craig Fergus and Jan Crawford, who were clocked in 3:02.1.

Reseda was third in 3:03.2. The Regents' team was composed of Jim Braithwaite, Steve Jackson, Tracy Sheffield, Clayton John, Nick Wierzba, Dave Monypeny, Brian Silver and Pete Homer.

Paul Turnquist of Van Nuys and Randy Walker of Cleveland, who carried the Valley victory hopes, were disappointing, to say the least.

Turnquist, who was 15th in the state after winning the city finals last year, placed 14th this season with a time of 2:00.0, his second-worst effort of the year.

Walker jumped poorly, even at the early heights and went out at 6 ft., 3 in., tied for eighth.

Walker made 6 feet on this third try, 6-2 on his second

try and missed three times at 6-3.

The only Valley representatives who improved over the city meet showings were Dennis Firestone of Grant in the low hurdles and Rick Rupe of Canoga Park in the pole vault.

Firestone barely missed a medal by placing sixth. Rupe cleared 12-10 but missed at 13-2 and tied for 10th.

The defeat was the first of the year for Castle. He had a chance to even the score with Pace. Both boys earned invitations to the Golden West Invitational

track meet at Los Angeles June 17.

Only seniors — and there will be some of the best from all over the nation — can compete in the meet.

Two Midpeninsulans came through with surprising performances. Clayton Anderson of Fremont in Sunnyvale took fourth in the high jump at 6-5.

He barely missed at 6-6.

"I never felt better. I brushed the bar off with my thigh after I had cleared it," Anderson said. The winner of the event was Richard Jones of Bakersfield at 6-8¼.

Bob Sawyer of Carlmont High School, who went along to keep his more noted teammate Gary Gaskill company, ended up in the high hurdles finals.

He finished fourth to beat out several runners with better times in the trials.

Mack's Johnson Triumphs

EAST LOS ANGELES COLLEGE, June 3 — Speedy Abe Johnson won the high hurdles and placed third in the lows to boost McClymonds into a tie for third place in the 43rd annual state high school track and field championships before 15,000 appreciative fans here today.

Johnson clocked 14.2 with an aiding wind in the highs and came back with a 19.6 in the lows, trailing Bill Mackey of East Bakersfield and James Tucker of Centennial.

Coach Jim Coleman's Warriors placed fifth in the relay,

to wind up with nine points and share third spot with Los Altos and Compton.

Favored Centennial won the team title with 11 points, followed by Hoover of Glendale with 10.

Morgan Groth of Alhambra staged a thrilling last lap duel with Bruce Bess of LaHabra in the mile, but missed his hoped-for 4:12 clocking and finished second to Bess' stretch kick in 4:15.2. The winner was timed in 4:14.8.

Castlemont's Ray Saddler finished second to defending champion Ullis Williams of Compton in one of the two

quarter mile finals. Saddler was placed fourth in the final standings when two runners in the other race posted better times than Ray's 48.9. Williams had 47.8.

Mike Mallory of El Cerrito took a third in the discus at 189-11. Bob Stoecker of Los Altos set one of the three meet records with a heave of 188-6½.

Curtis Crum of Castlemont earned a tie for second in the high jump with a leap of 6-6.

John Stulgis of Encinal and Paul Connor of Pittsburg both cleared 13-6 in the pole vault, and the Pirates' Henry Law-

GRAVES SETS STATE RECORD

Track Season's Still on For El Cajon High-Flyer

Mike Graves has one more world to conquer.

The El Cajon High pole vaulter won the California state high-school championship at East Los Angeles Junior College Saturday, but he's not finished yet.

Graves will compete in the Golden West Invitational meet June 17 at Los Angeles State College. This affair brings together the top high-school seniors in the U.S. That's when Mike will go after the No. 1 vaulter in the country, Warren Braatloff.

"My goal now is to beat Braatloff," Graves said yesterday.

Braatloff is the Galena Park, Tex., boy who has the top prep mark in the nation at 14-5 $\frac{1}{2}$.

"The pressure won't be on me against Braatloff," Graves said. "I like it when it's on somebody else."

Mike didn't react adversely to pressure Saturday. It was on him, but he was in complete command all the way.

"I was pretty sure of myself," he said. "I wasn't sweating too many people up there; I figured once I got over 14 feet I could win it."

Graves cleared 14-2 $\frac{1}{4}$ to establish a state mark, and, in doing so, overcame four others who had stayed with him until they reached the 14-foot barrier. In fact, this group put on the finest

prep vaulting exhibition of all time. John Champion of Long Beach Poly, Buzz Williams of San Pedro, Wayne Cox of North Bakersfield and Len Cirino of Arcadia all tied for second at 13-10, marking the first time any group of six preps ever cleared 13-10 in the same meet.

With his last official high-school meet behind him, Mike now is looking forward to college. He'll probably go to USC, he said, but he also has received offers from University of Oklahoma, Arizona, Arizona State, Colorado and Occidental.

With the exception of Graves, San Diego-area entries didn't fare well. Lou White of San Diego was fifth in the high hurdles and Bill Jones of Grossmont got a tie for fifth in the high jump.

Centennial High of Compton won the meet. And it did it with its last gasp. The Apaches scored only 11 points, and the clincher came in the final event, the 880-yard relay, where Centennial won in 1:26.7.

Top performer of the day was Glendale Hoover's Forrest Beatty, a double winner in the 100 (:09.5 with the wind) and 220 (:21.5) against the wind. San Diego-area performances:

El Cajon High's star pole vaulter, Mike Graves, was the only CIF San Diego Section winner in the 43rd annual state track and field meet held Saturday at East Los Angeles Junior College.

Graves, who last week set a Section record with a mark of 14'-3½", soared to 14'-2½" Saturday to set one of three records at the state affair.

ESCONDIDO's Dave Blunt failed to match his success of earlier outings as he didn't get past the morning prelims in the 100 and finished last in the 220 finals in the afternoon.

Blunt ran a 21.5 in the 220 prelims and came back with a 22.2 in the afternoon. His best time for the event was a 21.0 recorded in the SDCIF finals to establish an Escondido High record. Blunt also holds the EUHS record in the 100 (9.7) and the broad jump (21'-11").

Centennial won the team point title with only 11 while Glendale Hoover was runner-up with 10. Compton, Los Altos and McClymonds of Oakland all had nine and Graves' first place gave El Cajon five.

OTHER SDCIF placings were Lou White of San Diego High with a fifth in the high hurdles, a fifth by Granite Hills' Ray DeBolt in the mile and a tie for fifth in the high jump by Bill Jones of Grossmont.

Glendale Hoover's Forrest Beaty was the only double winner of the day as he copped the 100 in a wind-aided 9.5 and captured the 220 in 21.5.

The 220 was run against the wind but the 100 was run in the opposite direction.

Favorite Ulis Williams of Compton swept to a 47.8 win in the 440 and Bill Mackey of East Bakersfield took the low hurdles in 19.1.

FIVE THOUSAND of the 13,000 who turned out for the finals remained after the completion of all other events to watch Graves try at 14'-6½". He failed on all three tries but his second miss was close as he brushed the bar with his chest on the way down. Graves had cleared 14' while competing as a Bee last season and set the state record Saturday with his first attempt.

Other state marks were set by Bill Pace of El Rancho High in Whittier, 64'-3½" in the shot put, and by Bob Stoecker of Los Altos, 188'-6½" in the discus.
