EC's Booth Scores Area's Only Point

The Big Daddy of California prep track and field—The State Meet—comes to Berkeley next year and is it possible that it can surpass the 1962 show?

You wonder after watching the cream of California's prep spike brigade make a shambles of national, state and stadium records in an awesome display of talent at the 44th annual Classic at Modesto JC Stadium Saturday night. A howling and oohing crowd of 8056 continuously was on its feet for every race that provided a bunched finish.

But this great affair does get better every year and area fans should see an even better show next June 1.

This area had little to cheer about, coming out with only one point, a fifth-place finish in the 220 by El Cerrito's Charlie Booth in 21.6, four-tenths over his best.

All our other entries were victims of one of the most fantastic trials ever staged. One national record was bettered, another equaled, while three state marks were surpassed and another tied, though all went out the window because of excessive winds.

That's when Booth and teammate Al Copher were wiped out of the 100, despite the fact that Sweet Charlie roared to a 9.6 time!; Gaucho Bob Straughter never had a chance in the lows, though running 19.4, and Berkeley's Wilburn Williams ran the fastest 220 of his life—21.4—but could not get fifth and failed to qualify.

In the evening finals, Booth couldn't get going in the broad-jump—he fouled twice—and his best of 23-4¾ was not good enough for a place.

The Gaucho 880 relay team was in good position until the final exchange, which was fumbled momentarily between Straughter and anchorman Copher, and it finished sixth in 1:28.6 and out of the money.

Two Piedmont entries also failed. Steve Hogan got off to a fast start in the second heat of the 440 but tired badly in the stretch and wound up a badly-beaten eighth.

Husky Bob Foskett reached his all-time best of 58-10¼ but it was far back of the pack. DeAnza's Jim O'Brien gave his school its first State championship with a toss of 62-2¼, his best-ever.

As for the meet itself, two national records were racked up—the mile and 180 lows—while three

state standards went up, the pole vault along with the lows and mile.

Cal's future sprint prize, Forrest Beaty of Glendale Hoover, won the loaded 100 by a yard in 9.5, tying the State record, but pulled up at around 120 yards of the 220 with a slight pulled hamstring muscle in the back of his right thigh.

That forced Hoover to scratch from the relay, therefore forfeiting all hopes for the team title, shared by Jefferson of Los Angeles and Lincoln of San Diego with 14 points. LA Fremont was third with 12½ while McClymonds surprised with a fourth-place showing with 9 points.

Ed Moody of the Macks contributed one of the national records when he barely nosed out San Bernardino's Tornado Tom Hester in a sizzling 18.3 in the lows. The timers gave Hester 18.4 but they must have been timing third place.

Hester closed ground so quickly after the last hurdle that only a dip and a lunge by Moody saved him. Hester, lean and lithe, the week previous also clocked 18.3 in the Southern CIF finals so the

two will share the national record.

Dennis Carr, coming in almost unheralded in the mile, what with La Habra's Bruce Bess and La Sierra's Gary Baker in the spotlight, stole the thunder from those two with a blazing 4:08.7, a new U.S. prep standard.

Only a junior, Carr, 5-10, 145 from Fullerton's new Lowell High, came in with a best of 4:18.8 and third in the Southern CIF behind Bess and San Marino's Bob Day.

In the first heat, Bess out-kicked Baker to win in 4:13.4, which was considered a shoo-in victory. Everyone was expecting a 4:16 or 4:18 from the second go-around with Day the winner. Only Joe Neff of Norte Del Rio was out in front all the way and looked like a winner until the final lap.

All of a sudden Carr darted out in front and turned on the juice. He sizzled the final lap in 58 seconds and finished some 15 yards ahead of Neff, who timed 4:15.6.

The pole vault produced co-record holders when Eric Berge of Costa Mesa and Bob Richardson of Pomona's Ganesha High tied at 14-3. Berge had won the Southern CIF the week before in 14-5¼. Both had fair cracks at 14-6. DeAnza's Skip Hempler, the ACAL champ, went out at 13-6.

Powerful Doug Parker of Chico, a 6-3, 187-pound senior, routed touted Jonathan Peck of North Hollywood's Harvard High with a 1:52.2 half. Peck was a badly-beaten fifth in 1:55.4 in the first heat with Parker, despite coming in with the best time in the State: 1:53.1.

Miramonte's Dave Dunning salvaged fifth in 1:53.5, while Encinal's Willie Green barely missed, placing sixth in 1:54, his all-time best.

Ron White of Dorsey flashed over the highs in 14-flat after ripping off a record-tying 13.9 in the trials. Rich Clough of Mt. Diablo was in a pack and wound up fifth in 14.3, the same time for third, fourth and sixth. Castlemont's Curtis Crum was sixth.

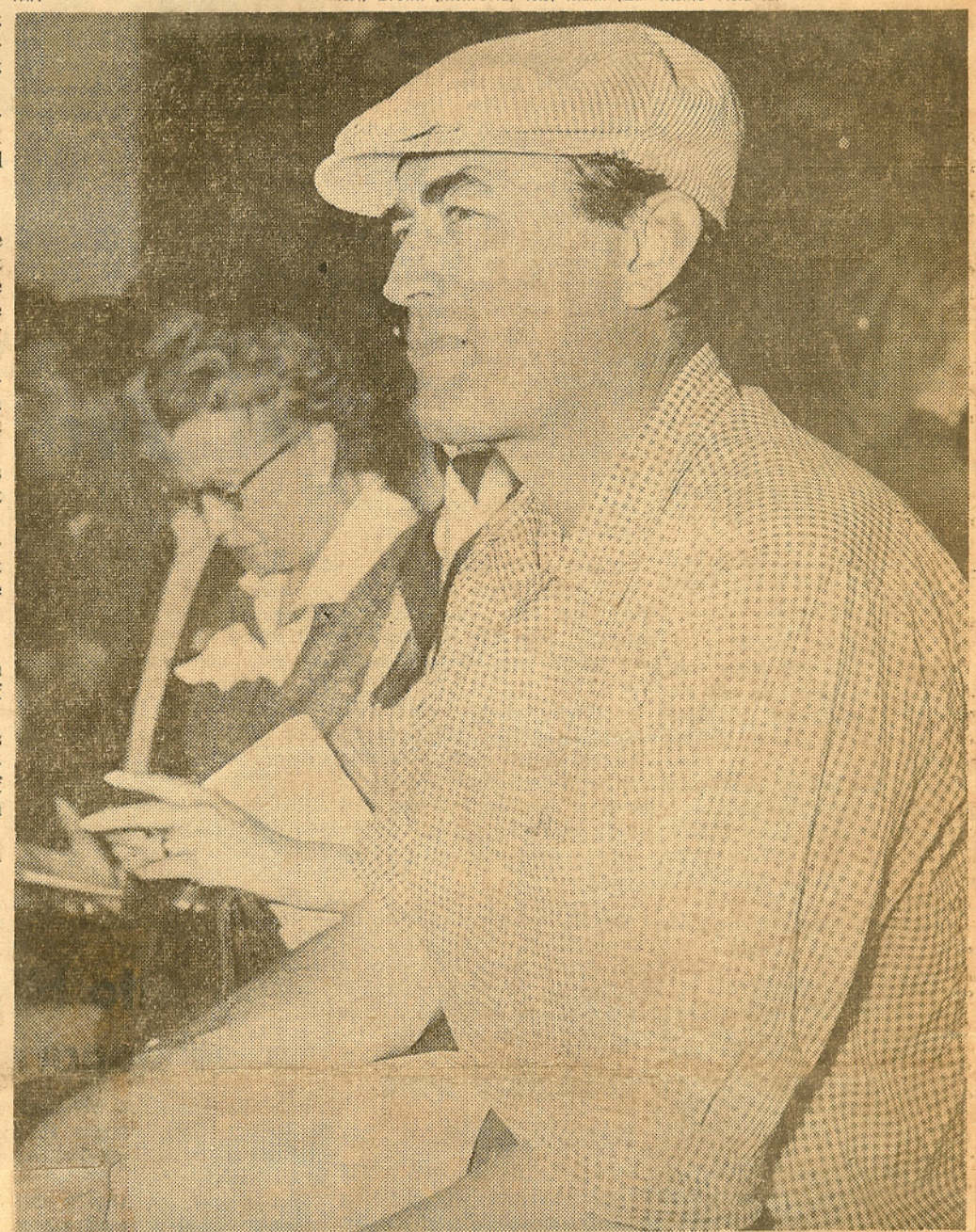

State track finals

Prep mile

MODESTO — Track fans came here to see the great **F o r r e s t** Beaty of Glendale Hoover High School in the state championship but went away talking about a slender junior from Lowell High School in Fullerton.

His name is Dennis Carr and Saturday night he set a new national record for the mile run with a dazzling clocking of 4:08.7.

What made the performance all the more remarkable was that Carr won by 15 yards and had no competition after three laps.

NO RECORD

Beaty met misfortune in several ways. In the afternoon trials he whizzed through the 100-yard dash in 9.4 but the time was disallowed because one of two wind gauges registered 5.5. The other gauge showed a wind well under the allowable 4.4.

In the finals Beaty pulled ahead in the last 25 yards to beat Richard Stebbins of San Diego's Lincoln High School in 9.5.

In the 220, Stebbins and Beaty were even after 100 yards when the Glendale great suddenly pulled up. He hobbled a few more steps and then stopped.

SLIGHT PULL

Beaty explained after the race:

"I felt a slight pull in my leg during the 100. It happened again in the 220. I didn't want to take a chance of hurting it more."

The loss of Beaty ruined Hoover's chances of winning the team title. In the final event — the 880-yard relay — Hoover tried for the first place that might have won the meet but didn't get it.

Beaty ran the anchor leg but didn't go all out after taking the baton 25 yards behind leading Fremont of Los Angeles.

Most of the crowd of 8,056 that packed the Modesto Junior College stadium were on their feet when Carr turned on the speed in the final lap of his mile.

They sensed a national prep record and Carr gave it to them. He ran the last 440-yards in an almost unbelievable 58 seconds.

EX-TEAMMATE

Said Carr:

"I am happy I didn't run in the same heat with Bruce Bess. We were teammates at La Habra High School last year.

"I thought that Bess and Gary Baker would be running a tactical race rather than going for a good time.

"I wanted someone to set a good pace. I knew what Bess had run in his heat (4:13.4) and I wanted to beat that."

Carr, who is only 16 years old, worked out with Bess all week. Bess went two seconds under his all-time best in winning the first heat.

Carr chopped 10 seconds off his previous best in setting the national record. The old prep mark was 4:11 set three years ago in the CIF championships at Bakers field by Dale Storey of Orange High School.

ANOTHER MARK

One other record was broken in the meet. Ed Moody of McClymonds High School in Oakland lunged into the tape a split second ahead of favored Bob Hester of San Bernardino to win 18.3.

The old mark was 18.4 by Bill Mackey of East Bakersfield last year. Hester tied that mark last week in the CIF finals.

The rest of the meet went about as expected with the Southern runners and jumpers taking nine first places to only four for the North.

Moody, Bob Stoecker of Los Altos. Jim O'Brien of De Anza and Doug Park of Chico accounted for the Northern California firsts.

SECOND VICTORY

Stoecker won the discus for the second straight year after almost missing out on the finals. He fouled on his first two throws. The next one slipped and went barely 16 feet.

On his last throw in the preliminaries, Stoecker cut loose with a 187-11½ heave that was the best any one threw all night.

Randy Schnider of Los Altos was fourth at 167-3, more than eight feet short of his best.

Randy didn't qualify for the finals of the shot-put. His best effort was only 57 feet. O'Brien won the event with a fine put of 62-2¼.

BEST OF LIFE

Parker got his gold medal in the 880-yard run with a best of lifetime of 1:52.2.

Other Midpeninsula participants didn't do as well with the exception of sophomore Max Lowe of Awalt High School in Mountain View.

Lowe cleared 6-5 in the high jump to get a tie for fourth place. He had never cleared more than 6-4½ before.

Here's what other Midpeninsula runners did:

Walter Hewlett, Palo Alto. Walt ran in the same mile heat with Carr and finished far back in seventh place. No time was recorded.

Jerry Rose, Carlmont. Rose failed to qualify for the finals in the 220-yard dash. He finished sixth in his trial heat.

The burly University of Cali-

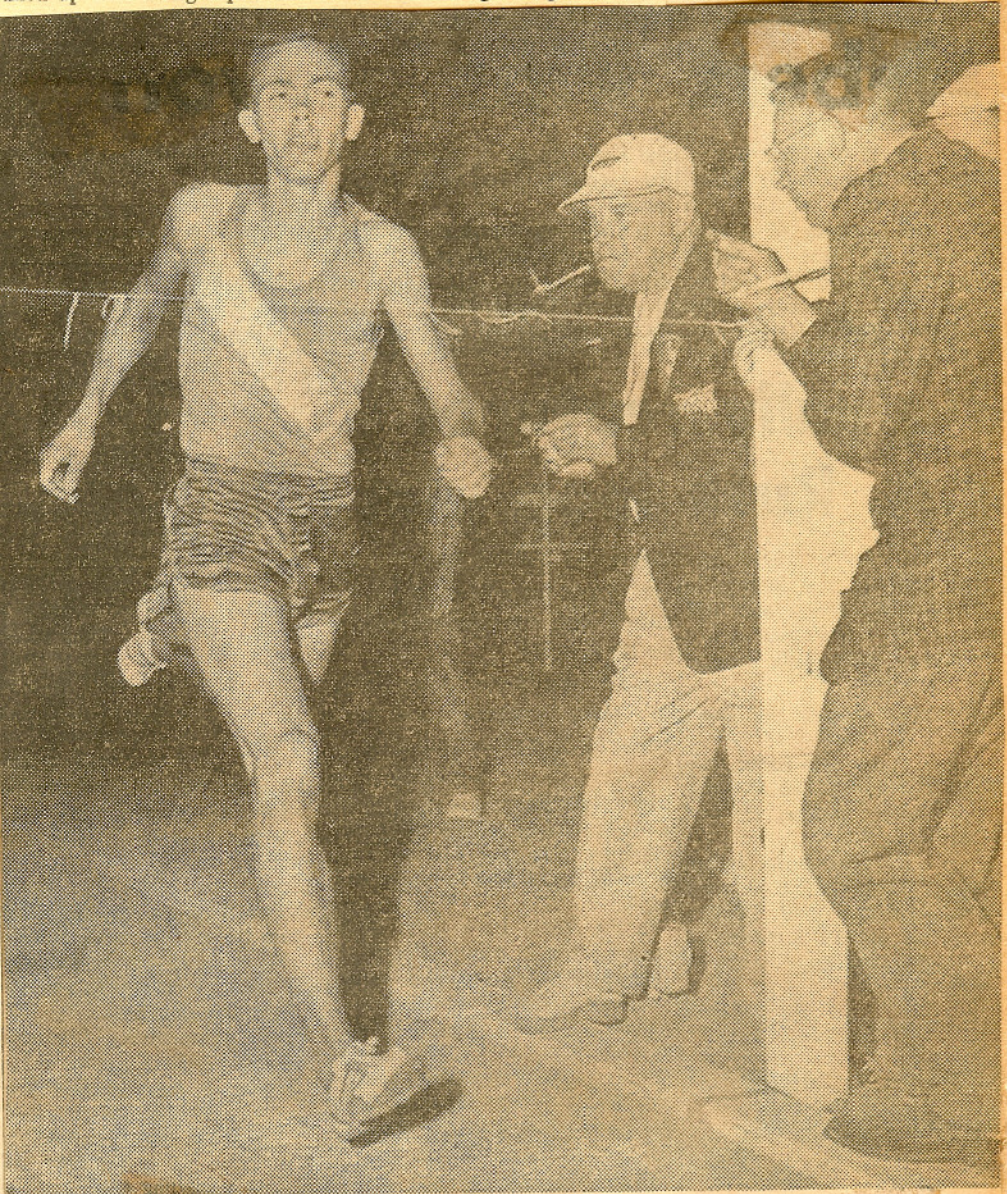
fornia-bound defending champion pulled up lame in both races about halfway through the 220, complaining of a muscle twinge in his right leg.

Hester ran the lows in 18.3 during a qualifying meet last week, breaking the listed mark of 18.4 set by Bill

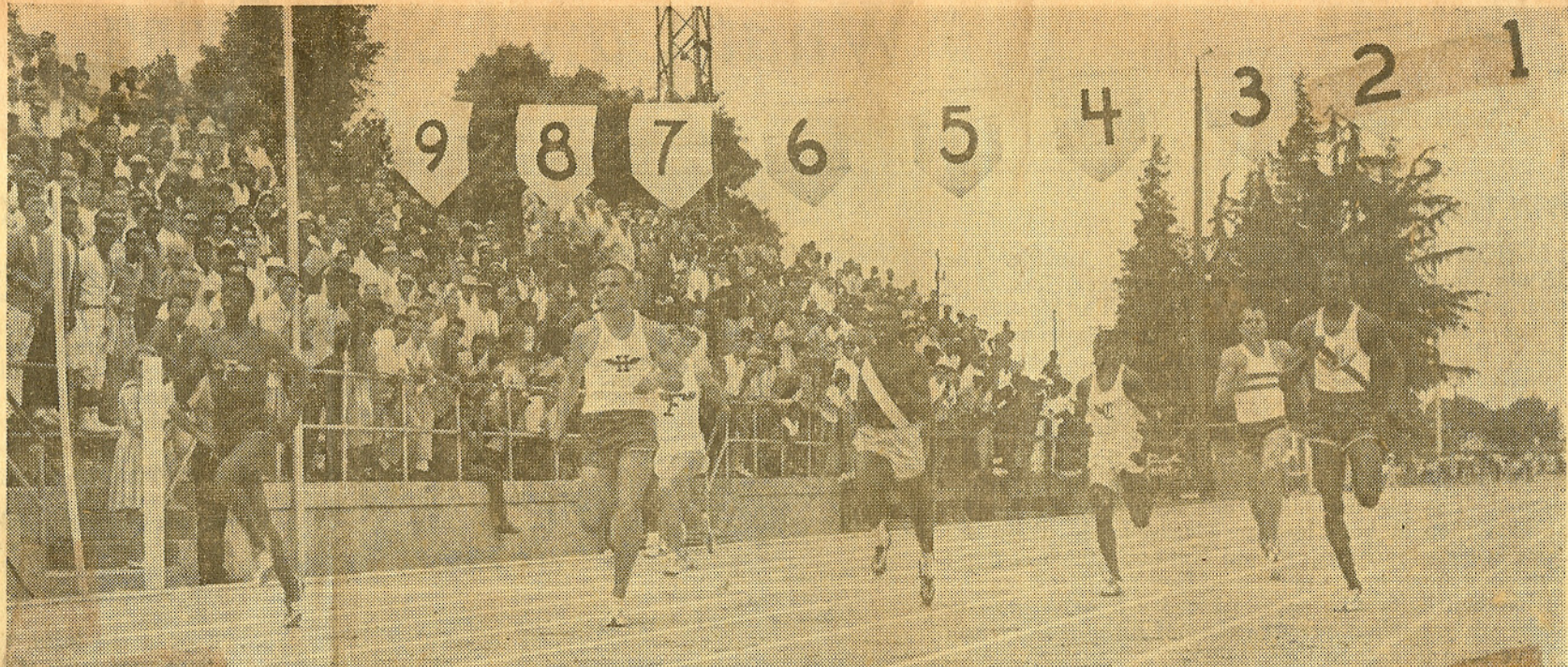

Moody's clocking knocked a full half second off the meet standard set by Robert Bonds of Riverside Poly in 1960.

Dennis Carr, a junior at Lowell in Fullerton, clobbered the national record in the mile with a blistering 4:08.7. The former mark was 4:11 by Dale Story of Orange in 1959. The 4:10 by Morgan Groth of Alhambra last year was not recognized by the CIF.

Sunset junior George Rios sliced four-tenths second off his best mark but could earn only fifth place with 4:19.2.

Whittier Prep Runs 4:08.7 Mile

Whittier Prep Runs 4:08.7 Mile

MODESTO—Dennis Carr,

an unheralded performer on a night that was supposed to belong to Forrest Beaty, stole the show in the state prep track and field championships here Saturday night.

Carr, a 16-year-old junior at Lowell High in Whittier, ran the mile in 4:08.7 to shatter the national record of 4:11, set by Dale Story of Orange in 1959.

Jefferson came through with a big win in the 880 relay to wind up tied for the team championship with San Diego Lincoln at 14 points each.

Jeff, anchored by chunky Herman Harville, ran 1:26.1, the best in the nation this year.

Carr's victory is the upset of the year in prep circles. He wasn't even running in the same section

with the big boys in the race—Bruce Bess of La Habra and Gary Baker of La Sierra.

But after learning that Bess had run 4:13.4 in winning his heat, Dennis set about his business. He didn't take the lead until the last lap, but then tore off a 63 second final quarter to smash the mark.

Ironically, Carr and Bess are best of friends. They both went to La Habra last year, Carr transferring to Lowell when the new school opened this year.

"I felt I was ready," said Carr after the race. "I worked out with Bruce all week and I was feeling good. I knew I wouldn't be in his heat, but that didn't bother me. I figured he and Baker would have to run a tactical race against each other. I knew I'd be able to run to win."

While Carr soaked up the applause, misfortune caught up with Beaty in his last of-

ficial prep appearance and turned the Glendale Hoover phenom into a mere mortal.

After 24 straight meets and more than a year of winning everything in sight, Beaty went down to defeat. He lost his state title in the 220, but it wasn't to his opponents.

Forrest got beaten by a pulled thigh muscle, dropping out of the race at about the three-quarter mark.

As if that wasn't enough, some confused meet officials handed Beaty a national record in the 100 — and then took it away six hours later.

Beaty's injury in the 220 blew Glendale Hoover's chances of winning the team title. Forrest didn't even attempt to run the relay after that.

"I felt the muscle give a little in the 100," he explained. "Then I felt it again at about 160 yards in the 220 so I figured I'd better pull up."

Wind Changed

Beaty won the 100 in 9.5, but ran 9.4 in the afternoon trials. That would have given him a tie for the national mark, but six hours later the officials said the wind was too strong.

They had first announced the wind at 3.2, good enough for the record. Later they said one gauge showed 5.32 and the other 0.88, so the highest must be accepted. And so out goes the record.

In other significant developments, San Bernardino's Tom Hester was beaten in the low hurdles by a swiftie from McClymonds High in Oakland. It was no fluke either, as Ed Moody ran 18.3 to tie Hester's pending national record.

Southlanders Manuel Diaz of Keppel and Ron White of Dorsey came through with wins, but defending champ Robert McKeever of Fremont failed to even qualify for the broad jump finals.

Diaz Doubles

Diaz showed how strong he is by winning the 440 just minutes after placing fifth in the 100 finals. And this after he'd run heats in the century in the afternoon.

Eric Berge, Costa Mesa's late-blooming pole vaulter, deadlocked with Bob Richardson of Ganesha in a re-

They both cleared 14-3.

The anticipated Jon Peck-Dennis Breckow battle in the 880 never came about. They were in separate heats and this just wasn't Peck's night. He finished fifth in his section in 1:55.4, while Breckow won his in 1:53.2. The winner was a big-shouldered runner from Chico, Doug Parker, who blazed the half in 1:52.2.

Actually, Gregory Peck worked harder than his son. He signed autographs for an hour while sitting in the stands before the meet.

Carr Cracks U.S. Standard In Mile Run

MODESTO—Dennis Carr—a scrawny 145-pound junior from Fullerton who streaked a mile in 4:08.7 minutes — stamped himself the greatest Goliath - killer last night at a topsy-turvy state track meet.

Favorites bit the dust like extras in a western movie. Among the victims were "sure-thing" favorite Tom Hester of San Bernardino and Forrest Beaty of Glendale Hoover.

San Bernardino High wound up in the team scoring with two second places for eight points and tied for fifth place. Hester finished second in the low hurdles. So did the 880 relay team.

Carr was the sensation of the meet in the next-to-last running event. The overflow crowd of 8,500 track fanatics cheered him home to the new national schoolboy record.

Dale Story of Orange High set the old record of 4:11 flat in 1959.

Carr, whose previous best was 4:18.8 last week, won easily by 25 yards or so. But he sprinted madly to the finish line when track coaches with stop watches had started the ovation at the head of the home stretch.

Bruce Bess, the defending champion from La Habra, had won the first heat of the mile in 4:13.4.

Carr is 16 and 5-10 and attends Lowell High in Fullerton. He earned another ovation by taking a victory lap shortly after his triumph.

Jefferson of Los Angeles tied Lincoln of San Diego for the team championship with 14 points each. Fremont had 11 and McClymonds of Oakland 9. Monrovia and McLain of Fresno tied SBHS with 8.

Hester struck the second low hurdle and lost to Ed Moody of McClymonds by about six inches. Hester missed with his last-instant lunge at the tape.

Moody was timed in 18.3, tying the national record Hester set last week. The crowd laughed and jeered when the judges announced Hester's time as 18.4. They thought he deserved better.

Moody also beat Hester in the prelims with a wind-aided 18.2.

Beaty, the nation's best schoolboy sprinter, pulled up limping and failed to finish the 220. He clutched a pulled muscle in his right thigh and stopped after 100 yards.

Beaty's injury almost certainly robbed Glendale Hoover of the state crown. He had won the 100 in 9.5, with 220 and relay remaining.

SBHS trailed all the way in the relay, running a 1:26.4 behind Jefferson's 1:26.1. Hester closed with a big rush. But Jeff had gone about 10 yards ahead.

The crowd included actor Gregory Peck, who watched his son, Jonathon, finish ninth in the half-mile. Peck was the pre-meet favorite. But this was no night for favorites.

George Greenwood, San Bernardino's long-shot hope in the high hurdles, had hard luck in the finals — after running the

Horne Sets 2 Area Marks, Baker Loses

MODESTO — Leon Horne, great and grim competitor that he is, last night cracked a pair of Metropolitan area records as Sacramento regained a measure of track gained a glory at the 44th annual state CIF championships.

Horne, Grant Union High School's durable junior, knocked three tenths of a second off the 120 yard high hurdle mark in a sizzling 14 seconds flat and banished the oldest record in the book—Ted Jefferson's 22 year old mark of 23-3/4 in the broad jump.

Leon leaped 23-7 in the preliminary jumps and that mark—fifth at the time held up through the finals.

This meet, on the sun baked track where the famous California Relays are held, will go down as one of the most exciting, surprising and yet disappointing runnings of the prep championships.

Almost incidental is the fact that Jefferson of Los Angeles and Lincoln of San Diego tied for the team championship with 14 points each.

The estimated 8,000 fans who looked on will remember Modesto where Glendale Hoover's heralded Forrest Beatty tied a national record in the 100 yard dash trials, but pulled a muscle in the 220, an event he was supposed to win.

They'll remember the national records set by a pair of youngsters who weren't supposed to win.

Upset In Mile

Dennis Carr of Lowell High School in LaHabra, just a junior who ran at LaHabra in company of Bruce Bess last year, pulled a surprising 4:08.7 mile out of the hat and thus one of the biggest upsets in meet's history.

And Ed Moody of McClymonds of Oakland, who qualified in his city meet in just :19.0, beat Tom Hester of San Bernardino in a blistering :18.3, 180 yard low hurdle race. Hester just last week established a national mark, also :18.3.

Disappointments?

Sacramento fans are bound to be stunned by the fact that Baker lost to someone other than Bess.

Gary finished second to Bess in the first section of the mile in 4:15.6, well over his top time of 4:13.1. Bess was caught in 4:13.4, Bruce taking Gary on the last turn and outkicking him by yards.

Norte Del Rio's Joe Neff, never able to beat Baker, also was timed in 4:15.6, in setting the pace for the better part of three laps.

Baker and Neff earned 2 1/2 points each for their schools.

Sacramento, shut out since 1957, when Bill James of El Camino placed fifth in the mile, did itself proud.

McFadden Takes 3rd

Big Barry McFadden of El Camino unloosed a heave of 61-7 3/4 to take third in the shotput. Another surprise,

Larry Maggard of Turlock, who brought in the top mark in the state, finished fifth. Larry pushed the steel ball 61-0 1/4.

The event was won by Jim O'Brien, DeAnza of Richmond, 62-2 1/4.

How Great Is Great?

VOLCANO, Amador Co.—By definition, Willie Mays is a great ball player. But there are many other center fielders who also make great plays almost every day. What is it that makes Willie the greatest?

Thuh greatest, man. Thuh greatest.

IN SPORTS, as in Hollywood, the word "great" has been devalued of its dictionary meaning by excessive use. Luella Parsons, Hedda Hopper and other semanticists of the movie industry recognized this trend toward verbal attrition some years ago and expanded their lexicons to include such counterfeit synonyms as "colossal" and "super colossal." Accordingly, a picture which was said to be merely "great" was deemed to be odoriferous.

H. L. Mencken, in his monumental masterwork, *The American Language*, also pointed out in scholarly detail how usage has eroded the King's English. The genius of the British industry recognized this trend toward verbal attrition some years ago and expanded their lexicons to include such counterfeit synonyms as "colossal" and "super colossal." Accordingly, a picture which was said to be merely "great" was deemed to be odoriferous.

H. L. Mencken, in his monumental masterwork, *The American Language*, also pointed out in scholarly detail how usage has eroded the King's English. The genius of the British industry recognized this trend toward verbal attrition some years ago and expanded their lexicons to include such counterfeit synonyms as "colossal" and "super colossal." Accordingly, a picture which was said to be merely "great" was deemed to be odoriferous.

In addition to covering more ground than a pony express rider William Howard Mays also has revived the pristine meaning of the word "great." He justifies its use as a matter of fact. He is the greatest center fielder I have seen since Tris Speaker.

Thuh greatest, man. Thuh greatest.

ONLY in track and field, target shooting, indoor swimming and weight lifting can an athlete's performance be calibrated to a fraction of an inch, second or pound, and be used as the basis of precise comparison with the performances of other athletes.

In all the other sports the variables widen the margin of error. Even in baseball the real worth of a player isn't reflected totally in his batting and fielding averages. The intangible qualities of greatness do not show in statistics.

On the way to an All Star Game with the players several years ago Charley Grimm, then a manager in the National League, said: "Willie is the only player I ever saw who could help a club just by riding on a bus with it."

YOU may remember the catch Willie made of a tremendous clout by Vic Wertz of the Cleveland Indians to the deepest part of center field in a World Series game at the Polo Grounds before the Giants moved west.

Deepest center at the Polo Grounds is almost a day's trek by covered wagon from home plate. Willie ran in the general direction of the Harlem River and caught the ball over his shoulder with his back to the plate as he leaped, and then whirled like a dervish in the same motion, while

Although Encina's Lloyd Reist, aided by a 6.2 mile wind, ran a :19.1 in the 180 low hurdles, he did not qualify for the finals. No other Sacramento athlete came close, the exception being the Grant relay team which early qualified in 1:28.6.

Jim Beam of El Camino made 13-0 in the pole vault and Paul Fuller of the C. K. McClatchy High School Lions cleared 6-0 in the high jump.

Horne, who has scored triple victories throughout the season, was not among the first five in the 440 although he knocked off a :48.8.

But this takes nothing away from his accomplishments. Leon erased a :14.3 by another Grant athlete, Ralph Jennings. And in sailing 23-7 in the broad jump he took care of that elusive record set in 1940 by Jefferson.

Chico's Dough Parker capped an outstanding high sports career with a spectacular 880 yard run victory.

Parker was timed in 1:52.2, best mark of the season for a California prep and only three tenths of a second off the meet record.

It was the first time in 25 years that the north section has had a winner in the state championships.

Doug, an all Northern Athletic League football end and an all conference basketball forward, grabbed the lead from John Garrison of San Diego Hoover in the last 300 yards but had a dog fight on his hands until the final 50.

Second Section Winner

Garrison was clocked in 1:52.7. The winner of the second section of the half mile, Pasadena Muir's Dennis Breckow, was third overall in 1:53.2.

The 6-3, 187 pound Parker will appear in Sacramento when the Northern California All Stars meet the Sacramento County All Stars in football August 18th at Hughes Stadium.
