

# Howard Tops Prep Milers

Ken Howard of St. Ignatius provided San Francisco's lone bright spot in yesterday's trials for the 46th annual California prep track championships when he turned in a 4:16.7 mile to lead all qualifiers.

The remaining Northern California entries did a little better than San Francisco's, but today's team battle appears to be among three Southern California schools—Muir of Pasadena, Jefferson of L.A. and Long Beach Poly.

Howard ran his usual race, sprinting from fourth place in the last 600 yards to win with relative ease. His winning mark, by two-tenths of a second his all-time best, led a Northern California sweep in that particular heat. Dwayne Ray of Modesto was second at 4:17.1 and Keith Krieger of Tamalpais third in 4:17.5

Pete Santos of Fresno won the second heat in 4:17.0 and favored Mike Ryan of Wilcox took the last trial in 4:16.9.

Howard led through a 61-second first lap and most of the second. He fell back just before the half-mile mark but was never more than 15 yards off the pace-setter and sprinted home in a 61-second final quarter, winning easily enough so he could look over his shoulder at his pursuers as he neared the finish.

Most impressive performance of the day in the mammoth Coliseum was by Jim Hines of McClymonds, Oakland, who convinced Los Angeles fans that he was a legitimate favorite.

He won his 100-yard dash heat in 9.6 (he's done 9.4) and then took his 220 trial in

21.3, an automatic meet record since this is the first year the race has been run around a curve.

Sophomore John Johnson of Pacific Grove, the State's leading broad jumper with a 25-2/4 best, had to have his tonsils removed Thursday and was forced to scratch from the meet. Bobby Bonds of Riverside Poly jumped 25-0 to take a commanding lead in the event.

Other Northern California standouts apparent in the trials were Bob Brannen of Los Gatos, who took the lead in the shotput at 62-7/4; Charles Smith of Castlemont, who won his low hurdles heat easily in 18.8, and the Castlemont relay team, pulled from fourth place by the same Smith in the final 220 to win its heat in 1:27.3.

San Francisco fared poorly.

Lou Kirtman of Lowell, figured as a finalist and possible point-getter in the high hurdles, lost his steps coming off the fourth hurdle and finished sixth in his heat in 14.7 to fail to qualify.

Most encouraging local performance besides Howard's was by the Washington relay team, which ran its all-time best of 1:28.2 for 880 yards. However, that was good for only fifth place behind Jefferson, which edged L. A. High by a tenth of a second in a sizzling 1:26.1, only two-tenths off the national record.

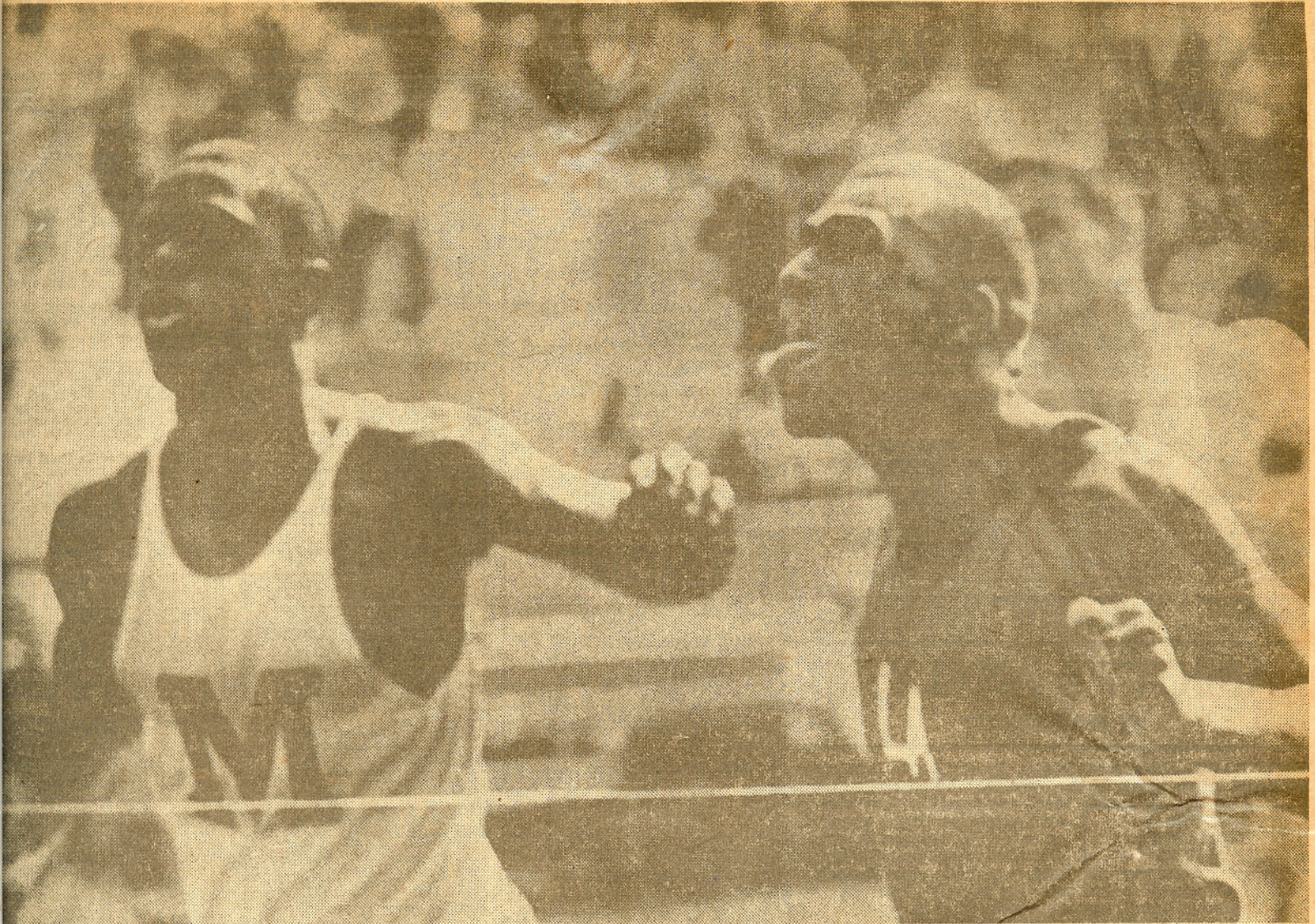

# Four-Way Duel Seen for Prep Track Title

It is a four-way tossup for the California prep track field title today, and it will be surprising if the 46th state meet ends that way.

Unconceivably, all four competing schools—Muir, Long Beach Poly, McClymonds of Oakland and Jefferson—could finish with 15 points when the state's top high school athletes assemble before a crowd of 10,000 at the Coliseum.

**Carr Opens Races**  
Field events will begin at 10 p.m. with the discus, pole vault, with Paul Wilson of Warren taking his second flight over the 16-ft. barrier, will follow at 10:30 and an assault on Carr's national 880-yard record will give the running events a spectacular sendoff.

Most surely, the outcome

will hinge on what happens today in the final event—the half-mile relay—and if Jefferson has anything to do with it, the race might be the fastest high school 880 relay on record.

The Democrats came close Friday in a qualifying heat when Freddie Banks, Waymon Lampkins, Grundy Harris and Jerome Payne collaborated for a scorching 1:26.1 victory, just two-tenths of a second off the U.S. mark held by Jeff's 1956 team.

Right behind was Los Angeles in 1:26.2.

**Poly Loses Points**

A review of films this morning to officially award third place to either Long Beach Poly or Dorsey will go a long way toward determining Poly's fate.

With a sensational anchor performance by Earl McCullough, who was running

sixth after he lost a full second on the baton pass, Poly clocked 1:27.6, as did Dorsey. Poly was awarded an unofficial third.

Meanwhile, Poly lost some anticipated points when Al Nichols failed to qualify in the 880, finishing a narrow fourth, and Jeff's hopes were buoyed when Harris won his 440 heat in 48.6.

In all, six Coliseum interscholastic records fell and one was tied during the trials. Two of the most impressive were achieved by Jimmy Hines, the sprinter who should, without question, give McClymonds 10 points today.

Running into a headwind of 5 m.p.h., Hines was clocked in 9.6 in the 100—on the "slow" Coliseum track, yet—and then came back to established a State meet 220 mark of 21.3 around a bend.

**880 Goes Early**

As far as the 880 is concerned, it'll be wise to show up early today. It's the first running event, and Compton's Devone Smith (1:51.1), Bob Hose of San Diego Madison (1:51.1) and Pasadena's Larry Arnett (1:51.6) are all capable of dipping below Carr's record of 1:50.9, which was set in the State meet a year ago.

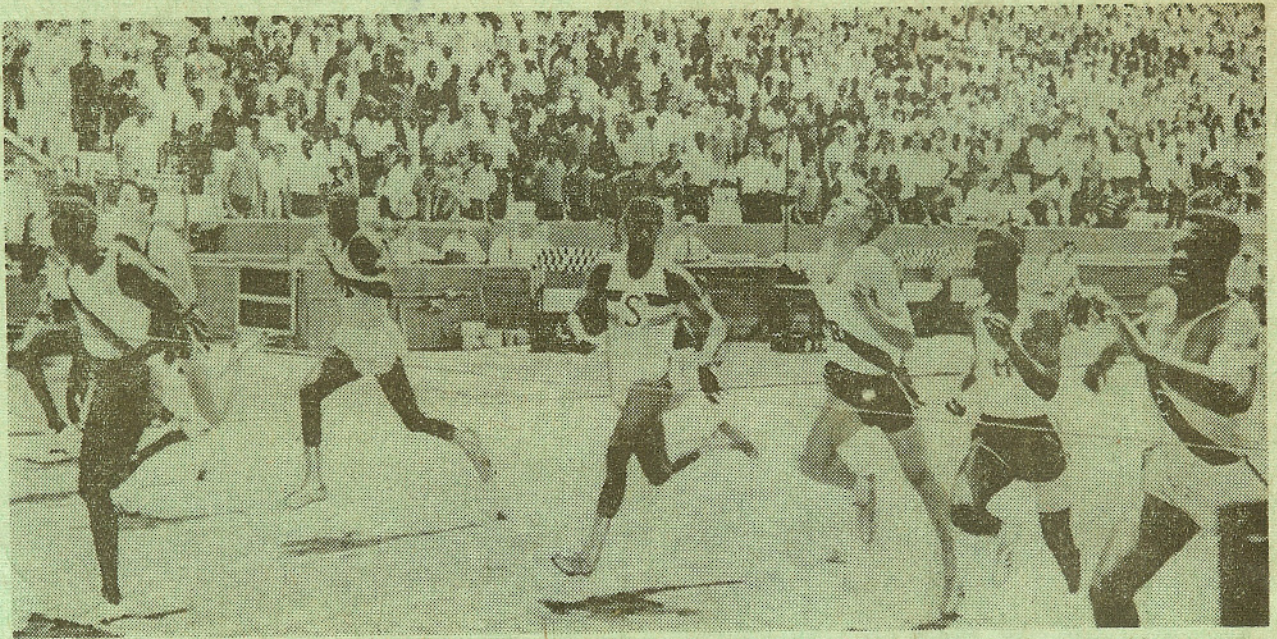

# Mike Ryan

## Santa Clara Runs

### 4:11.2; Howard 2nd

#### Los Angeles

Mike Ryan of Santa Clara's Wilcox High, who's just getting warmed up at a mile, poured it on in the final two laps to win the Northern California-dominated mile in the 46th annual California High School Track Championships yesterday.

Ryan clocked 4:11.2 on the slow Coliseum track to easily defeat fast-closing Ken Howard of St. Ignatius and share the spotlight before the crowd of 14,018 with Paul Wilson and Jim Hines.

Wilson, the junior from Warren High of Downey who holds the national prep pole vault mark of 16-0, cleared 15-4 $\frac{1}{4}$  to crack the state meet record. Hines, the powerful McClymonds sprinter, battled a headwind in both races to win in the relatively slow times of 9.7 in the 100 and 21.5 in the 220 around a curve.

Ryan, a junior who is even better at longer distances, led for all but a portion of the first lap in the mile, but he really won it on the third lap, which he ran in 64 seconds. That gave him a 3:09.7 at the 1320, and left all opposition in the dust.

Howard followed his race plan for the first half mile, watching Ryan closely, but fell off to a 69 second third lap, and that put him too far out of it.

He came from sixth with a 60 second final lap in a typical closing rush, passing Fresno's Pete Santos in the final 10 yards to get second with a personal all-time best of 4:15.7.

Santos was third in 4:15.8.

Ryan, a straight "A" student, has been clocked at 9:09.8 for two miles and even more amazing 30:04.5 for six miles.

Aside from Hines and Ryan, and expected victories in the weight events, it was a frustrating day for Northern California athletes.

Max Lowe of Awalt (Mt. View), one of the high jump favorites, cleared 6-7 $\frac{3}{4}$ , same height as the winner, but was knocked clear back to fourth place on number of misses. Greg Heet of Lowell (Whittier) was an upset winner.

Charles Smith of Castlemont, wary with one false start charged against him,

got a slow start in the low hurdles, and, although he was moving fast at the finish, failed to make up enough ground to beat Long Beach Poly's Earl McCullough. McCullough clocked 18.4 to go with a 14.1 high hurdles victory and join Hines as the day's only other double winner. Smith was second in his all-time best, 18.5.

And Castlemont suffered further misery when its 880-yard relay team, an expected point getter, was eliminated when third man Jerry Bright either dropped the baton or had it knocked from his hand some 30 yards before he was to hand off to the powerful Smith.

Wilson, who has completely revised prep vaulting standards, didn't even begin to compete until the bar reached 14 feet. Using an extremely short 12-step approach until he gets to 15 feet, Wilson missed once at 14-10 $\frac{1}{4}$ , then didn't miss again until his three unsuccessful tries at 15-10.

He fractured the old state meet record of 14-8 $\frac{3}{4}$  by Bill Fosdick of Hill (San Jose) last year, while Tom Dullam of Buena (Ventura), the second best vaulter in prep history with a 15-4 effort, got second yesterday at 14-10 $\frac{1}{4}$ , also to top the old mark.

Bob Brannen of Los Gatos didn't improve on his trial mark of 62-7 $\frac{1}{4}$ , but still won the shot put easily, while Bill Staley of Las Lomas took the discus at 181-2, his all-time best.

Bob Hose of San Diego's Madison High closed fast on the outside in the final 75 yards to win the 880 in 1:51.7, equalling the mark he turned in at the 1963 state meet. Last year, it was second to record holder Dennis Carr. This time, it won.

Southern Californians won the other two events, both with outstanding marks.

Bobby Bonds of Riverside Poly improved his broadjump by going 25-3 on his final effort, and Freddy Banks — largely responsible for Jefferson's tie for the team championship — took the 440 in 47.5.

## Bum scoring method discovered in state track championships

The state track meet in Los Angeles last weekend exposed a glaring weakness in scoring.

Max Lowe of Awalt High School cleared 6-7 $\frac{3}{4}$  in the high jump. He placed fourth.

Third place went to Mike Neuman of Stagg High School in Stockton. He also cleared 6-7 $\frac{3}{4}$ .

The second-placer was Ed Hanks of Hoover High School in San Diego. He too cleared 6-7 $\frac{3}{4}$ .

And the winner?

Greg Heet of Lowell High School in La Habra and he also cleared 6-7 $\frac{3}{4}$ .

According to the rule book, in case of a tie, the winner will be determined by the number of misses at lower heights. It does not depend on number of misses.

Lowe missed only once at a lower height. That was on his first attempt at 6-7 $\frac{3}{4}$ . He made it on his second try. Then he—like the other three who made that height—missed three times at 6-9 $\frac{3}{4}$ .

Hanks, Heet and Neuman each made 6-7  $\frac{3}{4}$  on their first try. Hanks missed twice before clearing 6-5 $\frac{3}{4}$ . So did Neuman.

Heet missed once at 6-3 and again at 6-5  $\frac{3}{4}$ . That gave him two misses.

But when it came to deciding the winner, Lowe was placed fourth because he was the only one to miss at 6-7 $\frac{3}{4}$ .

This seems unfair.

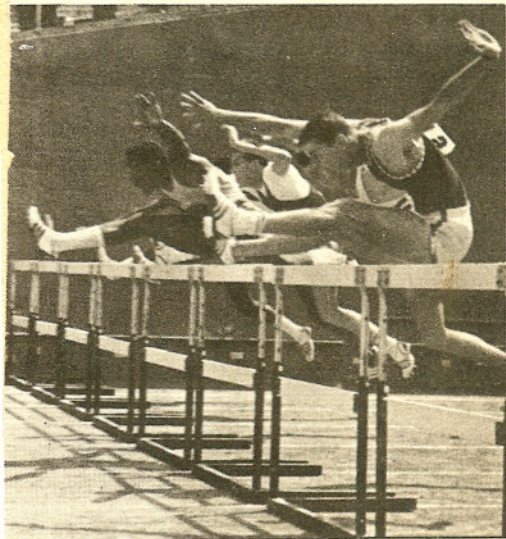
The rule book allows a contestant three tries to clear the bar at each height. It would seem logical that any athlete who clears the highest height should be given a tie for first.

Reportedly the reason for the rule to break ties is to be sure there is no need for duplicate issue of gold medals for first place.

The present rule makes it almost a certainty there will be no ties in the high jump or broad jump.

Track officials would realize how foolish their high jump rule is if it were applied to the mile run.

Suppose Dyrol Burleson leads for three laps and then loses to Tom O'Hara in the final lap. Why not give Burleson first place because he had the best time for the first three laps. After all, he finished the race, too.

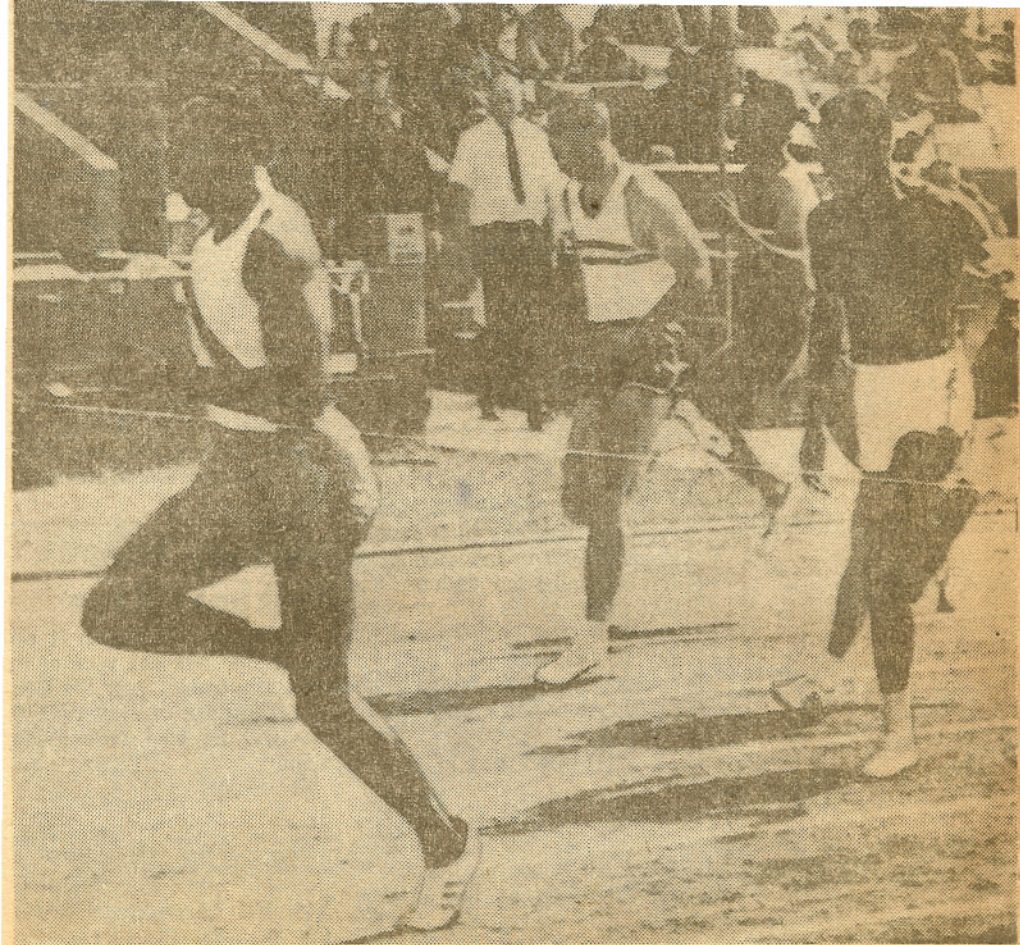

This was the first time the California preps contested the furlong around a curve. Hines also won the 100 in 9.7 against a 4mph headwind after doing 9.6 in the trials yesterday.

Earl McCullouch (Long Beach Poly) joined Hines in the double win column by taking both hurdles in 14.1 and 18.4, also against the wind. Roger Moody (Corona) and Steve Caminiti (Crespi of Encino) also clocked 14.1. Charles Smith (Castlemont of Oakland) chased McCullouch in the lows in 18.5.

The half-mile produced the best competition, winner Bob Hose (Madison of San Diego) winning in 1:51.7 and the sixth placer being clocked in 1:52.9.

Other winners: Mike Ryan (Wilcox of Santa Clara) 4:11.2 in mile; Greg Heet (Lowell of La Habra) 6'7 $\frac{3}{4}$ " in high jump (four over same height); Bobby Bonds (Riverside Poly) 25'3" in broad jump (two more over 24'); Bob Brannen (Los Gatos) 62'7 $\frac{1}{4}$ " in shot put (three others over 60'); Bill Staley (Las Lomas of Walnut Creek) 181'2" in discus (four others over 171'). Muir of Pasadena was an upset winner in 880 relay with swift 1:26.4. Jefferson of Los Angeles nipped rival Los Angeles High in Friday trials, 1:26.1 to 1:26.2.

Failure to place at least second in relay cost Jefferson an outright team crown, but it shared that honor with Long Beach Poly with 13 points. Muir of Pasadena was third with 11.

Greg Heet, Lowell of Whittier, scored a surprise victory in the high jump where the first four finishers all cleared 6-7¾. NorCal's Mike Neuman (Stagg) was third and Max Lowe of Awalt fourth.

Ezunial Burts was scratched from the finals after the Edison of Fresno senior qualified in both the 120 high hurdles and quarter mile. A pulled muscle in Friday's trials sidelined him and it might have cost Frank Fletcher's Tigers a successful defense of their team title.

With Reaves and Burts both scoring yesterday, Northern California might have done an even better job.

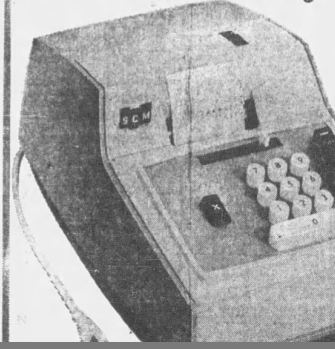

# TRIALS FOR STATE PREP MEET START

## Classy Field of 300 Athletes to Clash for Championship in Coliseum Saturday

As if it were a creation of Cecil B. deMille, California's prep track-and-field season thunders into a spectacular climax here this weekend, bringing together a cast of more than 300 athletes, 11 of whom have bettered or tied U.S. interscholastic marks.

The setting for the state's 46th championship meet is the Coliseum, where qualifying in each event except the discus will be conducted at 3:15 p.m. today and where finals will be staged beginning at 12:30 p.m. Saturday.

Never before has so attractive an array of nationally-prominent high school stars competed for California's choicest prizes. And, seldom has the race for the team trophy, currently held by Edison of Fresno, been fraught with so many possibilities.

### Four Standouts

Interestingly, the four schools within closest reach of the title—Long Beach Poly, Muir, Jefferson and McClymonds of Oakland—are each staking their hopes on the speed and durability of one competitor. And each is capable of winning blue ribbons in two specialties.

Poly is relying heavily on hurdler Earl McCullough (13.7 and 18.1). McClymonds has sprinter Jimmy Hines, who has clocked 9.4 and 20.9 around a curve, thus tying U.S. prep records.

Jefferson's chances, meanwhile, are anchored in its combination quarter-miler and sprinter, Freddie Banks (47.3 and 9.6). And, as far as Muir is concerned, sprinter Harold Busby is the primary difference between victory and defeat.

### Strongest Support

Of the four contenders, though, Poly and Muir have the strongest supporting cast to complement their leading men, with Poly holding a

### Relay Vital

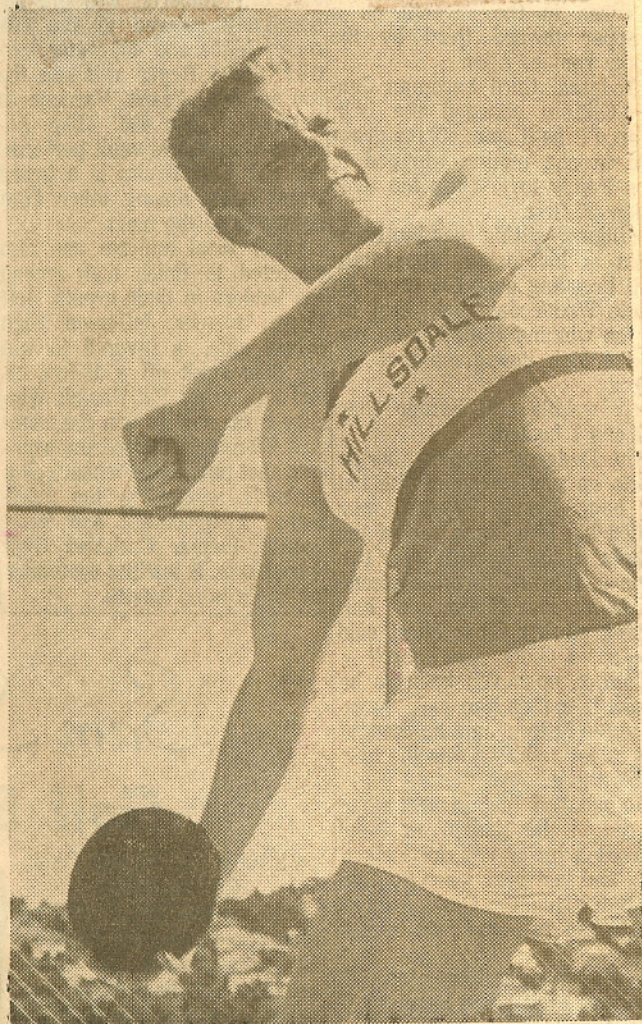

Northern California should make its best showing in several seasons tomorrow in the 46th annual California Interscholastic Federation State Track Meet at Los Angeles Coliseum and, with a few breaks, could take home the team championship.

McClymonds High School of Oakland, led by its great sprinter, Jimmy Hines, is Nor-Cal's best bet for a team title, but other athletes from the Bay Area may also steal some of the thunder from the Southland in the weekend meet of the nation's best prep trackmen.

Hines, who has tied the na-

tional record with a 9.4 clocking in the 100 and who has run the 220 around a turn in 20.9, is a good bet for a sprint double. If his team mate, Frank Bailey, can equal or surpass his high jump mark of 6-8¾ McClymonds could tally enough points for the title. Past meets have shown that in the last six years, 15 points would insure no worse than a tie for the team championship.

McClymond's chief competition for team honors will come from Pasadena Muir, the South Section champ; Long Beach Poly, Los Angeles Jefferson, and last year's champion, Edison of Fresno. The meet is ex-

pected to draw a crowd upwards of 9,000 people.

If Hines can come through as hoped, this writer expects no worse than seven first places from Northern California athletes, in the sprints, mile, high jump, broad jump, shot put and discus. Berkeley was Northern California's last State Meet champ in 1957.

Four San Mateo County athletes are entered in the competition, but only one stands a better than even chance to finish in the finals. Carlmont's duo of miler Mike McCann and pole vaulter Dennis Phillips are not expected to survive the competition and Burlingame's Mike Ja-

cobs also takes on a formidable field in the 880, where he qualified with a 1:55.0 mark. Jacobs, however, may not have scratched his true potential and could surprise everyone.

Hillsdale's Mike Hickey, however, is a good bet for a medal and could possibly win it all in the discus. The 17-year-old senior, who has made rapid improvement in his last two meets, takes a best-of-life mark of 174 feet, 11 inches into the discus finals, which has been exceeded by only one other competitor in the field.

Hickey, son of the former 49er coach, has concentrated on

LOS ANGELES — San Mateo County had its greatest representation in three years here today in the finals of the California Interscholastic Federation track and field championships, after qualifying competition held yesterday in Memorial Coliseum.

Mike Hickey of Hillsdale, Mike Jacobs of Burlingame and Carlmont pole vaulter Dennis Phillips were local competitors entered in final competition which began at noon today.

Jacobs, the heady middle distance runner who is entered in the 880, will have to come through with the greatest performance of his career when he enters a field in which six men have bettered the 1:53 mark.

The Panther pacer gave indication in yesterday's trials that he may just be ready for that assignment.

Jacobs ran a best-of-life 1:54.2 to finish third in the second heat of the 880 trials, a mark which was eight-tenths better than his sectional clocking two weeks ago. Robert Hose of Madison, San Diego, is favored to win the race off a 1:51.1 clocking made earlier this season.

Phillips was included in the field of 13 vaulters who cleared 13-2 $\frac{3}{4}$  for today's finals, but his team mate, Mike McCann, failed to qualify for the finals in the mile.

Hickey did not have to qualify for the discus, in which he takes the second best mark of the entire field at 174-11.

# State Track Meet Should Be Corker

California athletes, who have bettered three National Interscholastic records and equaled two others, converge on Los Angeles' Memorial Coliseum tomorrow and Saturday for what promises to be the greatest high school track and field meet in history.

Just to qualify for Saturday's finals in the 46th annual CIF Championships will take some fantastic marks. Never before have the Golden State's unmatched prep cindermen run up against such a powerful field in all 13 events.

Tomorrow's trials get under way with field event qualifying at 3:15, while Saturday's show will start with the discus at noon and the first running event at 2 o'clock.

More than 300 athletes, representing 160 schools and nine CIF sections, will shoot for no less than eight National Records in the two-day meet.

## SOUTH STRONG

If comparative times and distances are considered, northern California will take a severe beating from the southerners.

Runners and field men representing the six NorCal sections will pin their hopes on McClymonds sprinter James Hines, miler Mike Ryan of Wilcox, weightmen Bob Brannen of Los Gatos and Chuck Smart of Los Altos and broad jumper Johnny Johnson of Pacific Grove.

And from that point, you can just about close the books on any first places for the visitors.

## SPRINT STAR

Hines could be the hero, though, for he is favored in both the 100—where he has already equaled the National standard of :09.4 along with Southern Cal's Johnny James of Perris—and 220—where his 20.9 seconds clocking around a curve ranks as the best in the State.

In fact, the Oakland school,

with Hines in the sprints and Frank Bailey, who has the third best high jump mark of 6-8 $\frac{3}{4}$ , could wrap up the team title.

Ryan shaved his mile time down to 4:12.4 in the North Coast qualifying meet two weeks ago. That is 1.6 seconds better than done by any one else in the State, and Wilcox track coach Roger Hoy thinks the junior has a good chance of going under 4:09.0 this weekend.

He'll have plenty of competition. Six prep runners have qualified under 4:16.0 and all but three of the entries have bettered 4:24.0.

Brannen has the best shot put mark in the State at 63-9, and Smart's 183-6 in the discus is also No. 1.

Johnson, the phenomenal sophomore who will try to make the finals in the 100 and 220 tomorrow, has the State's best broad jump mark, 25-2 $\frac{1}{4}$ , which is just 2 $\frac{1}{4}$  inches off the National record.

## HURDLES SPEEDSTERS

Southern Californians Steve Caminiti of Crespi and Earl McCullough of Long Beach Poly have bettered the 180 yard low hurdles record by two-tenths of a second at :18.1 and equaled the 120 yard high hurdles mark of :13.7 several times; high jumper Eddy Hanks of San Diego. Hoover has established a National high jump standard of 6-9 $\frac{7}{8}$  and pole vaulter Paul Wilson of Warren (Downey) became the first high schooler to clear 16 feet.

No doubt all four will be pushed beyond that limit in the CIF Championships.

National records also could tumble in the 220 where Hines will go up against Sunnysvale's John Figueroa (21.3), James (21.0), Roger Cox of Redlands (21.3) and sophomore Charles Moch of Los Angeles (21.3), and the half mile where three have qualified at better than 1:52.0 and all but three of the 23 entries have clocked better than 1:58.0.

Ryan has a best time of 4:12.4 in the mile this year, the top time in the state in 1964. Johnson broad-jumped 25-2½ two weeks ago in the North Coast Section finals at Leigh High School.

He appears a good bet to beat the state meet record of 25-4¼ set in 1954 by Monte Upshaw of Piedmont.

Awalt's Max Lowe, with a best of 6-9½ in the high jump, also has a good shot at first place.

Other records that should fall are in the pole vault, discus, and high jump.

Pole vaulter Paul Wilson of Warren High School in Downey has cleared 16 feet this season. The state meet record is 14-8¾ set last year by Bill Fosdick of Hill High School in San Jose.

#### MARK IN DANGER

Bob Stoecker's discus mark of 188-6½ is in danger too but at least it might stay in the "Knight family." Another Los Altos High School student, Chuck Smart, has a best of 183-6 this season and has hit 190 several times in practice.

Trials in all events will be held Friday afternoon. There will be three heats in each of the running events. The top three in each heat will qualify for the finals in the Coliseum Saturday.

John Figueroa, the Sunnyvale High School sprinter who has bests of 9.5 and 20.5 this season, will find out right away what his chances are in the finals.

In his Friday heat of the 100, Figueroa will run against John James of Perris High School who has a 9.4 clocking this year. Also in the heat is Charles Moch of Los Angeles with a best of 9.6.

Gary Mahan of Fremont will have an easier time in his heat of the 100. He has a best of 9.6 and will be running against only one other sprinter—Fred Banks of Jefferson High School in Los Angeles — who has run that fast.

Figueroa, a poor starter, will have his best chance to make the finals in the 220-yard dash. Because of training in the quarter-mile, Figueroa is strong in the last half of the longer sprint.

Trials start Friday 3 p.m. The finals Saturday start at noon with the discus. The first final running event is the 880-yard run at 2 p.m.

The only competitor scratched was Johnny Johnson, the sophomore long jumper from Pacific Grove with a best of 25-2½. Johnson has been hospitalized for two days with strep throat and did not compete in either the long jump or 100 trials Friday.

LOS ANGELES — The moment of truth came today for Northern California entrants in the 40th annual State High School track and field championships at Los Angeles Coliseum.

Trials in 12 events eliminated all but the swiftest and strongest from the finals to be held on the same track Saturday starting at noon.

There are a half dozen Peninsula entrants who can be fairly certain of competing again in the finals.

They are miler Mike Ryan of Wilcox, high jumper Max Lowe of Awalt, sprinter John Figueiroa of Sunnyvale, weightman Chuck Smart of Los Altos, half-miler Mike Jacobs of Burlingame, weightman Bob Brannen of Los Gatos, broad jumper Pete Wilson of Awalt, and pole vaulters Dennis Phillip of Carlmont and Steve Weed of Palo Alto.

The pole vault may wind up as the most spectacular event of the meet.

### TOP VAULTERS

Among the entrants is Paul Wilson of Warren High School in Downey. He has cleared 16-0 $\frac{1}{4}$  already this season. The meet record is only 14-8 $\frac{3}{4}$  set last year by Bill Fosdick of Andrew Hill High School in San Jose.

Consider the plight of vaulters Ray Monterrosa of St. Ignatius in San Francisco and James Tugwell of Manuel Arts in Los Angeles. The starting height in the pole vault has been set at 13 feet today.

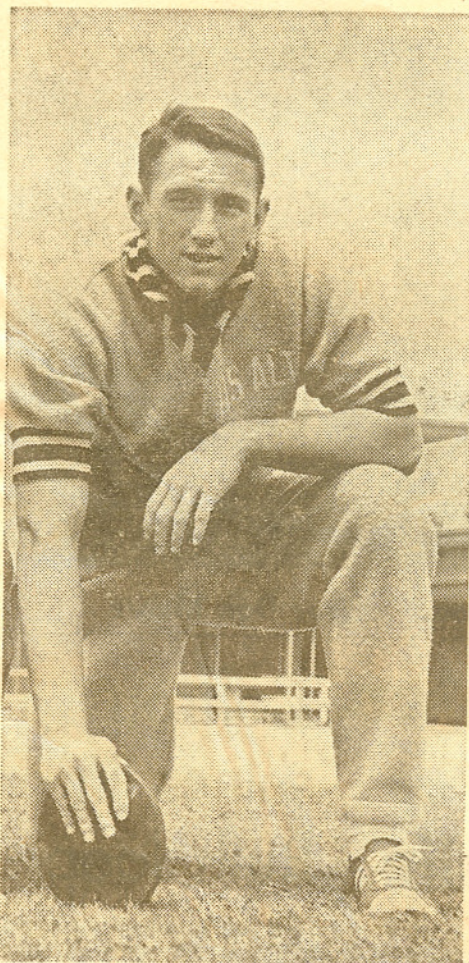
Monterrosa and Tugwell have never jumped that high in their young lives.

The meet could have three double winners. That has never happened in any of the previous 46 meets.

Jim Hines, the flashy sprinter from McClymonds in Oakland, is favored in both the 100 and 220-yard dashes.

### SPRINTS

But anyone who ever has seen a California state track meet knows that in the sprints it means nothing to be the favorite.

Given a good chance of winning titles in the state prep track meet beginning today in Los Angeles are weightman Chuck Smart, left,

of Los Altos and high jumper Max Lowe of Awalt. The meet concludes on Saturday.

You have about nine and a half seconds to "do or don't." Hines has a best of 9.4. But that time also has been run by John James of Perris High School in Southern California.

Then there are such relative "slowpokes" as Sunnyvale's John Figueiroa (9.5), Gary Mahan of Fremont (9.6) Charles Moch of Los Angeles High (9.6), and Fred Banks of Jefferson in Los Angeles (9.6).

It would be safe to pick any of the five to win. Or almost

any of the other 19 entrants, for that matter.

Other double winners might be Earl McCullough of Long Beach Poly and Bob Brannen of Los Gatos.

Northern California weightmen have a distinct advantage. The Southern youngsters don't throw the discus during the regular season and the shot-putters are just sprinters who ate too much.

The obsession in the South is speed, not strength.

The others are Bill Staley of Los Lomas High School and Mike Hickey of Hillsdale High School in San Mateo.

Smart has the best season mark of any entrant—183-6. He didn't throw that far in the NCS finals but that was because of illness.

Hickey, son of former San Francisco 49er coach Red Hickey has the most potential of the discus throwers. He has been consistently past 175 feet that last few weeks.

The first final event Saturday is the discus at noon. Then comes the pole vault at 1:30.

The first running event—the 880—goes at 2 p.m. A crowd of about 20,000 is expected.



# South Rated Tough Foe In State Meet

Northern California will have to scrap for its points when the 1964 California state track and field championships begin at the Los Angeles Coliseum tomorrow.

**SPRINTS**—Jim Hines of McClymonds, with a national record-equalling 9.4 in the 100 and a national seasonal 220 best of 20.9 around a curve, is a veteran, polished sprinter with plenty of top competition behind him. We like him to win both, although John James of Perris also has a 9.4 and a 20.8 (straightaway) and ran third in the State 220 last year.

**440**—Fred Banks of Jefferson (L.A.) is an overwhelming favorite with his strongest competition from fellow southerners and perhaps Ezunial Burts of Edison (Fresno). Watch Antioch's Joe Bonanno for a dark horse.

**880**—Wow! Southern California has five men under 1:53, including Bob Hose of San Diego Madison, (1:51.1), Walt Channels of Colton (1:52.3) and Orrin I st year of Pasadena (1:51.6), who ran 2-4-5 respectively behind Dennis Carr in last year's record-shattering State half mile. And Devone Smith of Compton also ran 1:51.1 in the trials. Our pick: Hose.

**MILE**—Wide open. Mike Ryan of Wilcox has the best time in the State, 4:12.4, and could win the whole thing. His top competition should come from Rick Romero, Burbank; Dave Funderburk of San Diego Vista, and rapidly-improving Pete Santos of Fresno. However, a good bet to steal the whole thing is Ken Howard of S.F.'s St. Ignatius, who runs the last lap like a scared bunny and hasn't been beaten this year.

**HURDLES**—The south has the class. In the highs, Steve Caminiti of little Crespi High (Downey) has tied the national record of 13.7, while Ralph Moody of Corona and Earl McCullough of Long Beach Poly also have 13.7s with various disputing factors (wind, etc.). The Crespi Comet also set a new mark of 18.1 in the lows, tied by McCullough last weekend. The best northern bets for points look like Rick Rogers of Ellis and Lou Kirtman of Lowell (S.F.) in the highs, Charles Smith of Castlepoint in the lows. Moody and McCullough were third last year in the highs and the lows respectively.

**POLE VAULT**—Forget it. Paul Wilson, a junior from Warren High (Downey) is the first prep 16-foot vaulter. And he's consistent—he made 15-6 in the sectional. If there was ever an easy pick, this is it. Runner-up is a scrap (although Bob Seagren of Pomona, a 15-tooter who was fourth in the State Meet last, didn't make it), with Mike Robinson of Pacific (14-6 $\frac{3}{4}$ ) the NorCal best.

**HIGH JUMP**—A fine field—nine qualified at 6-6 or better—but the battle for No. 1 should be between Eddy Hanks of San Diego Hoover, whose 6-9 $\frac{3}{4}$  best ties the national record, and Northern Cal's Max Lowe of Awalt, with a 6-9 $\frac{1}{2}$ . Both are good competitors. Frank Bailey of McClymonds cleared 6-8 $\frac{3}{4}$  in his league meet and if he can repeat, McClymonds should be in the race for the team title.

**BROAD JUMP**—An amazing sophomore named John Johnson, of Pacific Grove, appears to have the edge. He leaped 25-2 $\frac{1}{4}$  in the North Coast finals. Only real competition, since Willie Crawford of Jefferson (L.A.), with a 25-1 $\frac{1}{2}$ , didn't make it because of illness, is Riverside Poly's Bobby Bonds, brother of the State record holder in the high hurdles.

**WEIGHTS**—The South is not a real factor in the discus—they don't throw it regularly—and will have to scrap for heavy points in the shot. Tim Kearin of Muir appears their only chance for a big score. Bob Brannen of Los Gatos is consistent almost as sure a bet as pole vaulter Wilson, while Ken Roberts of Del Valle and Larry Dixon of Wilcox both came on strong at season's end and Harry Hettsmansperger of Stagg is a fine competitor. Brannen was fourth in 1963. The discus is a scramble among Bill Staley of Las Lomas, mammoth Mike Hickey of Hillsdale, son of former 49er coach Red Hickey, Doug Smart of Los Altos and Brannen.

# NorCal prep runners have best chance to win mile, two mile

Northern California runners will have their best chance for a gold medal in the state meet in the mile run. The weight men—in the shot and discus—also have excellent chances to win.

Other than that, it will be a long two-days for NorCal preps in the state meet at Los Angeles Coliseum June 5-6.

That isn't to say area runners and jumpers won't score any points. They will. This year the North will send its strongest contingent to the meet since 1957 when Berkeley won the team crown.

Mike Ryan of Wilcox High School in Santa Clara has a best of 4:15.7 in the mile. The top mark in the state this year is 4:15.5 by Hill Daugherty of Glendale High School.

Two North Santa Clara Valley Athletic League entrants should win in the weight events.

## BEST DISCUS THROW

Chuck Smart of Los Altos has the best discus mark of any entrants with a toss of 183-6.

Burton Marks of Salinas has thrown five inches farther than Smart this year but did not compete in the North Coast Section II meet last week and is ineligible for the state meet.

Bob Brannen of Los Gatos has thrown the shot 63-1½ this season. That's two feet farther than anyone else in the state has thrown.

Northern California also has the best two-miler in the state—Ed Ortegan of Logan High School — but that event may not be held in the state meet. It became an official part of the Northern California track program this year.

## FORGET 3 EVENTS

Three events that the North can forget about are the 880-yard relay, the low hurdles and the pole vault.

Fremont of Los Angeles has a best of 1:26.5 in the relay. That's two seconds faster than any NorCal team has done.

Steve Caminitti of Crespi High School in Encino has a best of 18.1 in the low hurdles. He should win in a breeze.

The only entrant with an easier win will be junior Paul Wilson of Downey. He cleared 16 feet in the pole vault Friday night at Compton. That's eight inches higher than anyone else has jumped.

League is third-baseman Gary Jestad of Fremont.

Coach Al Talboy of Los Altos breathed a sigh of relief when the Knights' game with Fremont last week ended with Jestedt waiting to bat.

With Los Altos leading 4-2 in the final inning, Fremont had the bases loaded with one out.

Bill Hubbell was the batter with Jestedt on deck. Coach Talboy was happy to see Hubbell hit into a double play that ended the game.

That will give Talboy a year to figure out a way to stop Jestad the next time his team has to pitch to the Fremont star.

The track-minded SCVAL will be represented by its largest and classiest delegation in history tomorrow and Saturday at the 46th annual California Intercollegiate Federation Track & Field Championships in Los Angeles.

Eleven athletes from five schools will comprise the SCVAL delegation in the massive Coliseum for what looms as the finest high school meet in history. Competition starts at 8 o'clock with trials in every event except the pole vault and high jump. Finals start Saturday at 12:30 p.m.

Sunnyvale heads the SCVAL troupe with four boys, an 880 relay team composed of John Figueroa, Dan Burke, Ralph Mesa and Angelo Silva. Figueroa will be one of the busiest athletes in the meet as he also goes in the sprints.

Gary Mahan of Fremont also goes in both sprints and Los Altos has Chuck Smart in both weights.

Wilcox will have three athletes in the competition—miler Mike Ryan, low hurdler Simon Repasut and shot putter Larry Dixon. Awall has two in high jumper Max Lowe and long jumper Pete Wilson.

Ryan, Smart and Lowe loom as possible gold medal winners. Ryan is the pre-meet choice in the mile and the Standard & Register Leader dope-sheet also tabs Smart and Lowe for victories—Smart in the discus.

## Wilcox Ace Clocks 4:11.2

Mike Ryan will be a marked man when he tries to make it two straight mile victories in the 47th California Interscholastic Federation Track & Field Championships next year.

The talented Wilcox junior is already laying plans for a successful defense after obliterating a stellar field of four-lappers in the 46th annual State meet Saturday in Los Angeles with a 4:11.2 effort, best by a prep in California this year.

Should Ryan win again in 1965, and there are few of the 14,018 who saw him Saturday who will bet against him, he will become the third runner, and first since 1933 to win two consecutive California mile championships. Only Phil Morentin (Yuba) 1931-32 and Virgil Hooper (Antelope Valley of Lancaster) 1932-33, have ever won two straight mile crowns.

Ryan led a contingent of 11 SCVAL athletes in the most glittering of all California State splicefests. Two of the remaining 10 broke into the scoring column, Chuck Smart of Los Altos taking a second (discus) and fifth (shot put) and Max Lowe of Awall a fourth in the high jump.

The 12 points scored by the three SCVAL athletes was the most tallied by any league from the North Coast Section, and marked the third straight year the SCVAL has led the way. The 21 points scored by five Santa Clara County athletes also was the most by any county north of the Tehachapi Mountains.

Bob Brammen of Los Gatos won the shot put with a 49.7¼ heave and was fourth in the discus, and Lee Evans of Overfelt in the Eastside District placed fourth in the 400 yards 45.2 second the County record set

sixth in his heat of the 150-low barriers won by McCullough in 18.5.

Larry Dixon of Wilcox lacked one inch of making the finals in the shot put as his 56-1 was 15th in the preliminary round.

Pete Wilson of Awall also failed to make the first 12 in Friday's trials as it took a 23-1 to make the finals. Bobby Bonds of Riverside Poly leaped 25-6 in the trials and 25-3 in Saturday's finals, best by a prep in the nation this year.

Sunnyvale's relay team failed to finish the race in the first heat Friday when Ralph Mess pulled up lame after a strong 22.3 opening leg by Danny Burke. Angelo Silva was scheduled to run the third leg and Figueroa on the anchor. Jefferson of LA won the heat in a torrid 1:26.1 and neighboring Los Angeles High clocked 1:26.2.

Although no national records fell, the meet lived up to advance billing as the best State Meet in history. One meet standard fell and another was established.

Paul Wilson, Warren of Downey Junior who has scaled 16 ft., cranked the one-year old meet record of 14-3¼ with a 15-4¼ leap in the pole vault. He cleared 13-10 but scraped the bar off on the way down. Bill Fastick of Hill held the old meet mark.

James Hines of Oakland's McClymonds' High, one of two double winners in the meet, established a meet mark of 21.5 in the 220 during Friday's prelims. It marked the first time the 220 had been contested around a turn in a State meet.

Hines won the finals in 21.5, building up a sizeable lead on the turn and then holding off the fast closing Fred Kuller of Santiago (Garden Grove) who nipped three others for second place in 21.7.

Hines also won the 100 in 7.7, a remarkable time inasmuch as the field had to buck a 4-mph headwind.

Joining Hines in the double-win column was Long Beach Poly's Earl McCullough who copped the hurdles in 14.1 and 18.4, far off his national record marks of 13.7 and 18.1 set in earlier meets. Like Hines in the 100, hurdlers also had to buck a headwind although it was more slight during the running of the lows.

Getting back to the 100, Hines overcame a rolling start by Fresno Edison's James Reeves to win the event. Hines has the ability to overcome such a disadvantage, but the rest of the field was left in the blocks as Reeves was obviously out of the blocks when the gun was fired.

John Figueroa, who had surprised by qualifying in the shorter sprint race in Friday's prelims, was among those victimized in Saturday's 100. He came on strong at the end but along with seven others could not catch the talented Hines and Reeves.

All of the other SCVAL representatives failed to survive Friday's tough prelims.

Fremont's Gary Mahan had the same time as the third qualifier in the first heat of the 220 (21.3) but fourth place was not good enough and he suffered the same fate in the 100 with a fifth place finish.

Steve Ernsdorf of Wilcox was

once again proved their superiority over all others by turning in the outstanding high school marks in the country.  
Although the record breaking was limited to just one CIF state meet standard, there were few dull moments for the crowd of 14,018.  
From the opening event when Madison of San Diego's Robert Hose streaked to a 1:51.7 half mile, to the finish of the pole vault when Wilson barely missed scaling 15 feet 10 inches, this two day show was one of the best in its 46 year old history.  
Wilson, a slender junior who has a national interscholastic record vault of 16'4" pending, provided the only record when he sailed over the bar at 15-4 1/2. It broke the year old mark of 14-8 3/4 established by Andrew Hill's Bill Fosdick in the 1963 meet at Berkeley.

**FIVE WINS**  
Hines, with his double victory in the 100 and 220 yard dashes, miler Ryan and weightmen Bill Staley of Las Lomas and Bob Brannen of Los Gatos gave Northern California five winning performances to the Southland's eight

Hines' 69.7 century and 215 furlong gave McClymonds all its 10 points. The Oaklanders placed fourth in the overall scoring behind third place Muir of Pasadena with 12 and Jefferson of Los Angeles and Poly of Long Beach, which finished in a two-way deadlock for first with 13 points.  
There was no question about Hines winning either race. He bolted to the front in both sprints and never looked back, spurring away from Phillip Reaves (Edison of Fresno) in the last few yards in the 100 and coasting in two-tenths of a second in front of four rivals in the 220.

**HOWARD SECOND**  
Ken Howard of San Francisco's St. Ignatius turned in an all time best mile of 4:15.7. But it wasn't good enough to turn back Ryan, the short-stepping Santa Clara junior, who outclassed everyone.  
Ken finished a distant second behind Ryan, who set a blistering pace by running 3:09.7 — and simply didn't have enough left to chase the victor. Ryan sprinted his final 440 lap.  
McCullough finished his prep season undefeated by capturing the 120 yard high hurdles in :14.1 and the 180

yard low hurdles in :18.4. Castlemont's Charlie Smith gave McCullough a real run for the gold medal in the lows after getting off to a bad start.  
Greg Heet, Lowell of Whittier, scored a surprise victory in the high jump where the first four finishers all cleared 6-7 1/2. NorCal's Mike Neuman (Stagt) was third and Max Lowe of Awalt fourth.  
Ezuzial Burts was scratched from the finals after the Edison of Fresno senior qualified in both the 120 high hurdles and quarter mile. A pulled muscle in Friday's trials sidelined him and it might have cost Frank Fletcher's Tigers a successful defense of their team title.

With Reaves and Burts both scoring yesterday, Northern California might have done an even better job.  
Staley's winning discus toss was 181-3, leading a 1-2-4-3 Northern California sweep. Brannen's 62-7 1/2 trial effort stood up for a first place in the shot put.
