BUSBY'S 20.5 SHATTERS MARK, TOP MILERS ALL GAIN FINAL

BAKERSFIELD—All systems are "go" for Project Mile today. Ditto for the 100 and 220-yard dashes.

All five sub-4:12 milers here for today's 47th annual California high school track and field championships survived the qualifying but it came as no real surprise.

But the biggest news of the trials on Bakersfield College's cement-like track was turned in by Muir's Harold Busby, whose lightning-fast spikes made their mark on the state record book.

Wise Runs 20.6

Busby's fellow townsman, Ralph Wise of Pasadena, also got into the jet-stream in both races by turning in a 9.5 in a subsequent heat, and also dipping under the 7-year-old record (20.7) of Muir alumnus Mel Clipper with a 20.6 effort in the 220.

Thus, Busby and Wise—who handed Castlemont's touted Jerry Bright his first seasonal defeats in the process—joined the two previous co-holders of the 100-yard dash record—Jefferson's Willie White, who ran 9.5 in 1956, and Glendale Hoover's Forrest Beatty, who did likewise in 1962.

The stage, then, is set today for what should be a rip-roaring assault on the U.S. interscholastic 100-yard dash record of 9.4, and the fast-running surface of crushed brick, clay and volcanic ash here in Memorial Stadium will surely help matters.

As expected, the blue-chip field of milers stayed intact for what shapes up as one of

the most lively high school races ever when the finals begin today at 4 p.m.

The favorite and defending champion, little Mike Ryan of Wilcox High in Santa Clara, has run 4:08.5 this season and only ran as if it were a workout Friday, winning his heat in 4:15.1. He'll be joined by four other runners under 4:12 this season—Westminster's Carl Trenladue (4:08), Chula Vista's Tim Danielson (4:08.1) and San Marcos' Bill Schabram and Dennis Savage, who have each run 4:11.3.

As for the team championship, the most likely to succeed are Long Beach Poly or Castlemont of Oakland, with Muir a close third.

Castlemont Threatens

Castlemont's stock soared Friday night when its Bright-anchored 880 relay team reeled off a scorching 1:26 flat, just one-tenth of a second off Jefferson's 9-year-old state and national interscholastic mark. And Castlemont did it with somewhat ragged baton exchanges, too!

Dash Men Better Records in Trials

The sprinters took the play away from the more heralded distance runners last night, with Hal Busby of Muir tying one state mark and breaking another to highlight the trials for the 47th annual California State high school track and field championships.

The finals will be held tonight, beginning with the discus at 4 p.m.

Castlemont's swift relay team, despite two bad passes, came within one-tenth of a second of the national record with a 1:26.0 clocking, and San Francisco's Ernie Provost made the finest showing by a city sprinter in years—and perhaps ever—by winning his 100 heat in 9.6 and coming back with a 20.8 220, both all-time bests and both unofficially bettering the city record.

But sprint honors were reserved for Busby, the flyer from Pasadena. He won his 100 heat in 9.5 to tie the state record, which also had been tied moments earlier by Ralph Wise of Pasadena in the first heat, then came back with a sizzling 20.5 in the 220, cracking the mark there by two-tenths of a second.

Provost's 20.8 was good for second behind Busby, while Wise came back with a fine 20.6 to win his heat.

There was only one major disappointment in the qualifying. Lee Evans of Overfelt, the 440 favorite, pulled a groin muscle in the quarter, and not only had to drop out of that race some 20 yards from the finish, but scratched from the 220 and his team's relay quartet also dropped

appears to be among Castlemont, which lost only broad jumper Fred Jackson of its potential point-getters, Muir and Long Beach Poly. The latter, however, lost some key men.

Paul Wilson of Warren High in Downey, the first prep ever to vault 16 feet, qualified easily at 13-6. Both he and his teammate, Bob Steinhoff, also a 16-footer, cleared 15 feet easily, although it was strictly an exhibition, and Wilson then went over 16 on his first try.

That meant nothing but a thrill for the crowd, although Wilson seems a cinch to break his own State mark of 15-1/4 when he vaults for real tonight.

The heralded mile races turned out to be strictly strategy runs. Mike Ryan of Wilcox, the defending State champ, was the only one of the three favorites to win easily, in 4:15.1. Carl Trentadue of Westminster, with a 4:08.5 best, eased up at the tape and was nipped by Buwayne Ray of Modesto in 4:15.7, while junior Tim Danielsen of Chula Vista (San Diego), won his heat narrowly in 4:15.2.

Clark Mitchell of Bakersfield, the home town favorite, set the pace in the 880 with a 1:51.8 heat victory, and other top marks were provided by Steve Marcus of Palisades in the shot, 63-11-1/2; Ernie Smith of Lemoore, 18.4 in the lows; and Manual Murrell of Long Beach Poly, 24-2-1/2 in the broad jump, with national record holder Johnny Johnson of Pacific Grove second currently at 24-3/4.

The only San Franciscans to come close to qualifying, besides Provost, were James Carter of Poly, 49.5 for fifth in his 440 heat, and the Galileo 880-yard relay team, which ran a fine 1:28.0 for fourth.

Area Schools Among State Track Powers

Three Eastbay high schools rank among the top 10 in state CIF track and field championship scoring over the past decade according to a study made by Menlo-Atherton cinder coach Plato Yanicks.

Berkeley High is third with 66 points, just one half point behind runnerup Long Beach Poly, while Castlemont and McClymonds are eighth and 10th with 37 and 31 respectively. Jefferson of Los Angeles leads with 88½ points.

The year-by-year compilation by the former Alameda mentor shows Berkeley has scored in double figures twice since 1956. The Yellowjackets totaled 23 when they won the state title in 1957 and 10 in 1963.

Castlemont's largest accumulation of points came in 1960 when its total of 13 missed the state title by two. The Knights got 11 this year.

McClymonds bunched its scoring from 1961 through 1964, when it attained its high mark of 10 points.

The purpose of this paper is to show which of the nine sections in the California Interscholastic Federation is the strongest section on the basis of the number of points scored in each meet for the past decade, (1956 -1965).

The California Interscholastic Federation has long been recognized as the strongest high school Federation in the nation. What we are trying to discover in this research paper is what particular areas the top athletes in the state come from.

The task is complicated by the fact that some section are allowed more qualifiers to the state meet than other sections. This discrepancy in the number of qualifiers varies from section to section, with San Francisco, Oakland, and the Northern Section, able to qualify only one athlete to the the five qualifiers allotted to the Southern Section.

Historically, the Southern Section has usually led the state meet in the total number of points scored. However, the Southern Section covers by far the largest territory, the largest population, and has the most qualifiers. Recently the schools of the San Diego area have broken away from the Southern Section and formed their own section. The old North Coast Section also broke up and divided into sections this year.

Even though the San Diego Section came into being just recently, for purposes of this research paper, it will be treated as a separate section for the entire decade.

The results of this research work show that the Southern Section completely dominates the State Meet each season. The Los Angeles City Section and the the North Coast Section are fairly even with only thirty points seperating them in the battle for second place for the last ten years. The traditional "hot bed of track" area, the Fresno and Bakersfield environs which comprise the Central section and the San Diego section were only ten points apart for fourth position in the ability to score points in the state championship meet.

The ten top schools in the production of points during the past decade are: Jefferson of L.A. 88 1/2, Poly of L.B. 66 1/2, Berkeley 66, Fremont of L.A. 63, Muir of Pasadena 55 1/2, Manual Arts of L.A. 43, Pasadena 39, Jordan of L.A. 36 1/2, Mc Clymonds of Oakland 31, and Castlemont of Oakland in tenth place with 28 points.

The Southern Section scored the most points in the state meet nine of ten times from 1956 to 1965, and was second once. The Los Angeles section scored the most points once, and were runner-ups four times. The North Coast Section was also second four times.

State Prep Track

South Leads Mark Assault

By BOB SPRENGER

BAKERSFIELD — The "greatest high school track and field show on earth" finished its most spectacular two-day run in Memorial Stadium here yesterday.

After it was all over, the nation's finest vanguard of prep athletes shattered one National Interscholastic record, established four new meet standards and equalled another in the 47th edition of the state CIF track and field championships.

Some 7,500 spectators, who "baked" in 90 degree plus temperatures, were well-entertained as California's youngsters once again proved, as a group, they're the best in the U.S.

SOUTH PREVAILS

With the boys from down Los Angeles way taking ten of the 14 first places—including a sweep in the shot put—and gathering up most of the follow-up points, there were only a handful of bright moments for Northern California followers.

However, through all of this Southern Cal domination, emerged, surprisingly enough, a San Franciscan who became the most successful sprinter from the Golden Gate city ever to run in a CIF meet.

Washington's Ernie Provost, only a junior and the fastest streaker SF has ever produced, ran the best NorCal double in the sprints when he finished second in the 220 and third in the 100.

In both races on the crushed-brick straightaway, Ernie gave double sprint winner Harold Busby of Pasadena's Muir High a real battle. He ran 9.6 seconds in the 100, a tenth of a second behind Busby, who equalled the state meet mark of 9.5 for the second time in two days. Rick Wise of Pasadena was also clocked in :09.6, a "nose" ahead of Provost.

Busby won the furlong in 21 seconds flat compared with Provost's 21.2.

TOP PERFORMANCE

The most remarkable performance of the day, however, would have to be the national record-breaking 880 victory by Rich Joyce, a long legged senior from Sierra High in Whittier. Starting in lane No. 6, Joyce surprised everyone when he took command of the field on the first on the first lap and never was headed the rest of the way.

He won by half a second over pre-meet favorite Clark Mitchell of Bakersfield in 1:48.8, shattering the national prep mark of 1:50.4 set last year by Laurence Kelly of Maine East High in Park Ridge, Ill. Mitchell's time was

also won the 180 yard low hurdles in a CIF record-busting time of 18.2 seconds but there was too much wind (6.0 mph) for it to go into the record books.

Undoubtedly, the biggest disappointment of the meet was Castlemont's sudden crash dive in the team race.

Just one-tenth of a second off the national record in the 880 relay trials Friday, the Oakland foursome completely missed the baton exchange on the first handoff and ran themselves right out of the team title by finishing dead last in the final event of the day.

Meanwhile, Long Beach Poly — defending co-champions who won their last outright state title in this very same stadium in 1959—got some tremendous come through performances, including a double victory by Manuel Murrell in the broad jump and the 180 yard low hurdles, and wrapped up the team championship with 16 points. The aptly named Jackrabbits finished three digits in front of Castlemont and Muir despite the fact their half mile relay quartet was bumped out of third place on a disqualification.

Murrell upset pre-meet favorite Johnny Johnson of Pacific Grove—who has a pending national record leap of 25-4¾ going for him this year—when he sailed 24-9¾. Denny Smith of Compton went 24-6¾ for second place, leaving the Pacific Grove junior six inches short at 24-¾ in third place.

NORCAL TRIUMPHS

Other NorCal first places, besides Gamez fine two mile triumph, went to Bellarmine's Bruce Naglee in the discus (172-3½), Castlemont's Ken Brown in the high jump (6-8½) and a surprising first for Grant Union (Sacramento) in the 880 relay in 1:26.6.

The Southern Cal sweep in the shot put where the first six finishers all went over 60 feet must be some kind of a blue ribbon accomplishment in prep circles. Steve Marcus of Palisades won the iron ball gold medal with a put of 63-11¼.

Joyce's 880 time surpassed all of the previous prep bests including Dennis Carr's best ever 1:49.2 at Compton in 1963.

Including that mark, Carr, now at USC, had three of his prep standards broken, others being CIF marks in the 880 and mile.

BAKERSFIELD — The new North Coast section of the CIF will play host to the state's high school track teams next year when it stages the 48th track and field championships at Edwards Stadium in Berkeley.

Long Beach Poly's victory by winning the low hurdles in 18.2—a State record but for an aiding wind of 7 m.p.h.—and the broad jump in 24-9³/₄, his all-time best, for 10 of the Jackrabbits' 16 points.

And Harold Busby got Muir (Pasadena) a tie for second place with Castlemont at 13 points by winning the 100 in 9.5, the 220 in 21.0 and anchoring the Mustang relay team to third place.

Ernie Provost of Washington High was the lone bright spot for San Francisco. He was third in the 100 in 9.6, and second in the 220 in 21.2, the finest showing ever by a San Francisco sprinter and one of the better performances by a junior in State meet history.

Joyce clocked 1:48.8 in the 880 and took some thunder away from the more-heralded mile race. Joyce took over early, clocked a 53-second first quarter, then held off a mild challenge by Clark Mitchell, the home-town favorite from Bakersfield High who finished second last year—and this year.

Mitchell was timed in 1:49.3, while Miramonte's George Coon ran the race of his life for third in 1:50.9, equaling the old State meet record.

Paul Wilson of Warren High in Downey, national record holder in the pole vault with several vaults over 16 feet, won the event last night. However, he cleared "only" 15-6¹/₂—though it was a State record, breaking his own year-old mark by two inches. He missed three times at 16 last night.

The mile was only slightly less amazing, and considerably more of a race as junior Tim Danielsen of Chula Vista upset defending State champ Mike Ryan in 4:08 flat, a meet record.

Ryan took charge early on the second lap, and raced out to a fine 2:01 half-mile. He held his lead through a 3:04.4 third lap, with Danielsen moving up into a close second. Then, with 200 yards left, the San Diego lad began his serious challenge.

Ryan, although drained by his early effort, held on around the turn, but then ran out of gas completely and Danielsen breezed past him with 60 yards left to win going away.

Even without Ryan, Northern California got a few victories. Ralph Gamez of Berkeley set an automatic but very respectable meet record in the two-mile, leading almost the entire way, clocking a fast 4:24 first mile and then coasting to a 9:12.9 victory.

Ken Brown of Castlemont

won the high jump at 6-8¹/₂ and Bruce Naglee took the discus with a throw of 172-3¹/₂ and Grant of Sacramento took that peculiar relay in a good 1:26.6.

Curtis Clark of Grant, who also anchored the winning relay team, chased Murrell to the tape in the lows, finishing in 18.4.

Sprint Records Fall In State Prep Track

BAKERSFIELD (AP) — California's prep track stars—after showing record-breaking form in qualifying heats—this evening battle for the state championship at Bakersfield College.

Another balmy night was predicted, with the first of the finals to start at 4 p.m. The college track — surfaced with crushed brick, clay and volcanic ash—is hard and fast.

The state's five sub-4:12 milers are on hand, and fierce competition is indicated for the dash events.

The state prep mark for the 220-yard dash has already been broken at the 47th annual championships. Harold Busby of Muir High School, Pasadena, broke it Friday night with a qualifying time of 20.5.

The old mark of 20.7—set by Mel Clipper, also of Muir, in 1958—was also shattered in another heat by Ralph Wise of Pasadena High, who was clocked in 20.6.

In different 100 - yard heats Busby and Wise each won in 9.5, tying the state high school

mark.

The first three men in each of three heats were eligible for the finals. All the top milers, as was expected, stayed in the stellar field.

Mike Ryan of Wilcox High, Santa Clara, who has run 4:09.5 this season, won his heat Friday in 4:15.1. Others competing will be Carl Trentadue of Westminster High, who has run 4:08.5; Tim Danielson of Chula Vista (4:08.7) and Bill Schabram and Dennis Savage of San Marcos (each 4:11.0).

Considered top favorites for the team championship are Long Beach Poly, Castlemount of Oakland, and Muir.

Long Beach Poly suffered a setback Friday when half-miler Al Nichols and dash-man Fred Muench finished fourth and dropped from today's field. Muir's odds rose after Busby's twin performances.

Castlemount's chances rose when its 880 relay team, anchored by sprint star Jerry Bright, won its Friday event in a swift 1:26 flat.

8 area preps in state meet

BAKERSFIELD — The prep track season comes to an end today and Saturday in a blaze of glory—the 47th annual California Interscholastic Federation meet at Memorial Stadium here.

It should be a happy ending for at least four Northern Californians who are favored to win their events.

There are some entrants — Paul Wilson of Downey in the pole vault and two miler Ralph Gamez of Berkeley — who can't help winning unless they show up at the wrong stadium.

Other races like the 100, 880 and relay probably won't be decided until the final stride.

Eight Midpeninsulans are entered in the meet and four have a better than average chance of winning.

Mike Ryan of Wilcox High School in Santa Clara is the defending champion in the mile. He is unbeaten this season and is still looking for some competition to bring out his best.

Last week Ryan won the North Coast Section crown in 4:09.5 but won easily with a

margin of 20 yards over Bob Surich of Watsonville.

Ryan won't have to look to find competition here. Two Southern Californians have better times than he has. Carl Trentadue of Westminster has a best of 4:08.5 and Tim Danielson of Chula Vista has run 4:08.7.

Discus thrower Bruce Naglee of Bellarmine has the advantage of lack of competition. Most schools in Southern California don't throw the discus.

Naglee has a best of 178 feet and will be going against throwers he has beaten before.

Dale Bennett of Los Altos is another runner with an untapped potential. He is unbeaten this year in the half mile and has a best of 1:54.1. He'll have to run two seconds faster to beat favored Rich Joyce of Whittier but he may be able to do it.

The other area entrants are in tough. Steve Weed of Palo Alto will have to face Wilson in the pole vault. Wilson, who has a world's best mark of 16-6¾ this year, doesn't start jumping until most of his foes have gone out.

High jumper Don Brown of

Ravenswood has a best of 6-4½ but in an unpredictable event he could sneak into a place on the victory stand.

The other Ravenswood entrant in the meet is sprinter Jim Marshall. He'll be up against a flock of swifties who have times around 9.5.

The best of the lot is James Busby of Muir High School in Pasadena who is a consistent 9.5 man. Last year in the state meet he took fifth in both the 100 and 220.

Sophomore Steve Wilhelm of Fremont is entered in the shot put. He's a consistent 58-8 man and that possibly could get a fourth place.

Rick Brackett of Homestead, with a best of 4:18 in the mile, will have to run faster than that to survive this afternoon's trials.

Ryan in the mile, Gamez in the two mile, Lee Evans of Overfelt in the 440, John Johnson of Pacific Grove in the long jump, Ken Brown of Castlemont (Oakland) in the high jump, and Ernie Smith of Le-moore in the hurdles all are potential gold medal winners.

Title Meet

State Preps Go At Bakersfield

The finest mile field in prep history and two 16-foot pole vaulters will be the highlights — but not the only features — of the annual California State High School track and field championships opening tomorrow at Bakersfield.

Mike Ryan of Wilcox will be on hand to defend his title in the mile, but even though he clocked a personal best of 4:09.5 last week, he is far from a cinch. Ranking ahead of him, in time if not experience, are Carl Trentadue of Westminster (Orange county), who won his section in 4:08.5, and Tim Danielson of Chula Vista, with a best of 4:08.7.

Only Jim Ryun of Wichita (3:58.3) and Gerry Lindgren of Spokane (4:06.0) both 1964 Olympians as high schoolers, and Dennis Carr of LaHabra (4:08.7), have run faster than these three as preps. And there are three runners in this weekend's field under 4:14.

The pole vault is a lot easier to dope. Paul Wilson of Warren High (Downey) has a best of 16-6 $\frac{3}{4}$ — best in the world by anyone this year at any level — and his teammate, Bob Steinhoff, has gone 16-1. They did 16-0 and 15-6 respectively to place 1-2 in their sectional meet.

As usual, it appears Southern California schools will take the lion's share of points. The best bets for big points from Northern California besides Ryan, seem to be Lee Evans of Overfelt in the 440; John Johnson of Pacific Grove, the national record holder at 25-4 $\frac{3}{4}$, in the broad jump; Berkeley's Ralph Gamez in the two-mile; unbeaten Jerry Bright of Castlemont in the sprints, his teammate, Ken Brown, in the high jump; Curtis Clark of Grant in the low hurdles and possibly the 440, and both the Castlemont and Grant relay teams.

The battle for team honors would seem to be among Castlemont, Long Beach Poly and Muir of Pasadena, led by its great sprinter, Harold Busby.

How the meet shapes up:

SPRINTS: Hal Busby of Muir (9.5 and 20.5) is the southern favorite, but will get a stiff test from Jerry Bright, Castlemont (9.6, 21.6 on a curve), unbeaten in both races, and Rich Jenkins of Lasuen (San Pedro), who has clocked 9.5 three times and is the only man to beat Busby this year. Ernie Provost of Washington (SF), (9.7, 21.7 curve) could be a dark horse.

440: Lee Evans of Overfelt, has the Nation's best time of 46.9, and is a heavy favorite. The battle behind him should be among Curtis Clark, Grant (Sacramento), (48.2), Randy Julian, Bolsa Grand (Garden Grove), (47.9), and Ken Gagan of Crespi (Encino), (48.2). Larry Winrow of Castlemont might be a sleeper, as is Walter Jensen of Coalinga. Both have clocked 48.7.

880: This belongs to Southern California, with Rich Joyce of Sierra (Whittier), (1:51.2); Mike Owens, Valencia (1:52.3) and Al Nichols, Long Beach Poly, (1:52.3) and, perhaps the best bet of all, Bakersfield's Clark Mitchell, who was second in the State Meet last year in 1:52.0 and equalled that last week. NorCal best is Dale Bennett of Los Altos (1:54.1).

MILE: A battle royal among defending champ Mike Ryan of Wilcox (4:09.5), Carl Trentadue of Westminster (Orange county) (4:08.5) and Tim Danielson of Chula Vista (4:08.7). Other challengers include Bill Schabram and Dennis Savage, both of San Marcos, (Santa Barbara) (with identical 4:11.9 times, and Bob Scurich of Watsonville (4:13.4).

TWO MILE: Ralph Gamez of Berkeley (9:11.5), is the favorite, but must fight off Mike Stone of tiny (285 enrollment), Lower Lake, a dark horse (9:18.6); Al Sanford of Tustin (9:16.2); Mike Keir of Crespi (9:18.5) Kim Ellison of Birmingham (Van Nuys), (9:20.0), and Bob Waldron of Montgomery (Santa Rosa) (9:20.1).

HURDLES: Ernie Smith of Lemoore, brother of San Jose's great Tommy Smith, could double here, with bests of 14.1 and 18.4. The high hurdles field is weak, with Dick Miller of Monrovia (14.1) Larry Guinn of Redwood (Visalia) (14.2) and perhaps erratic Garland Burrell of Washington (LA), with a 13.9 wind-aided best, the top men behind Smith. In the lows, Clark of Grant (18.6) and Manuel Murrell of Long Beach Poly (18.4w) look tough.

880 RELAY: Castlemont (1:26.8) and Grant (1:27.1), of the North will battle Muir (1:26.9) and Long Beach Poly (1:27.5), but with a win by inches over Muir from the South, with Jefferson of LA, which clocked 1:27.4 in its only shot (LA city schools normally run the eight-man mile relay) also a factor.

POLE VAULT: All Southern California, with Paul Wilson of Warren (Downey) (16-6 $\frac{3}{4}$); his teammate, Bob Steinhoff (16-1); Paul Heglar (Muir) (15-2) and several others over 14-6.

BARKER FIELD — The Marrett of Long Beach Poly also won the 100 yard low hurdles as a CIF record-breaking time of 18.2 seconds but there was too much wind (6.6 mph) for it to go into the record books.

After it was all over, the nation's finest contingent of prep athletes shattered one National Interscholastic record standard and equalled another in the fifth edition of the state CIF track and field championships.

Some 7,500 prep athletes gathered in the stadium at the state CIF track and field championships, the first time since 1935 that the sport had so large an audience. The weather was ideal, with a mild 68-degree temperature and no wind. The sun was shining brightly, and the humidity was just what the doctor ordered for the sport.

SOUTH PREVAILS

With the boys from down the state taking part in the 14 first places—winning a sweep in the shot put—went gathering up most of the follow-up points, there were only a handful of targets for the boys from Northern California.

However, through an effort of the Southern Cal dominions, championship was enough, a San Francisco Golden Gate city over for the 20 and third in the 100.

Washington's Eric Prael set a new record for the 100 yard low hurdles, beating the previous record of 18.2 seconds set by the late Bob Spitzer.

Other notable records were set in the 100 yard low hurdles by Mike Wiles of Pasadena and the high jump by Bob Wiles of Pasadena.

NORCAL TRIUMPHS

The Northern Cal sweep in the shot put where the first winners all went over 60 feet and some had a high throw of 70 feet.

TOP PERFORMANCE

The most remarkable performance of the day was never would have to be the national record-breaking 100 yard low hurdle by Mike Wiles of Pasadena.
