Diablos Beat Heat, Smog for CCAA Title

Cal State (LA) overcame the heat, the smog and an by Cal Poly (SLO) speed-ster Cecil Turner to win the CCAA track and field championship Saturday at Valley State College.

The Diablos, winning their second league title in history, finished with 63¹/₂ points to 47 for SLO and 41 for Cal State (LB), which wound up a surprising third.

The championship gave CSLA coach Jim Crakes a perfect ending to his sev-en-year career as Diablo coach.

Crakes, who has re-signed to become track Crakes, coach and athletic director at Cal Western University, was a happy man after the Diablos had clinched the title.

One-Two in Mile

"We really got a lift with we really got a lift with that 1-2 finish in the mile (Jim P e a b o d y won in 4:15.9 and Bob Blanchard was second in 4:16.9) and then Alvin Young's fourth in the 100 and Bill Lo-men's all-time best of 6-4 in the high jump (tie for in the high jump (tie for second) were pleasant sur-prises. But everybody contributed—it was a real team victory."

Turner, who is from Washington, D.C., where he went to high school with basketballers Dave Bing and Ollie Johnson, was easily the outstanding individual performer with 15 1/4 points 15 1/4 points.

He won the 100 in 9.6, the 220 in 21.3, finished second in the long jump at 23-11 and brought the Mustangs from behind on the final leg with a 41.4 win in the 440 relay.

Turner attended Pratt JC in Kansas for one year, transferred to Hancock last season where he had a 9.5 best but was hurt and did not compete in the State meet and has done 9.3 this year.

9.3 this year. "I'm looking forward to the college division and university champion-ships," he said. "The weather and the smog really made it tough out there today. It was awful-ly hard to breathe." Turner is a flanker on the football team and indi-

There were no records set in the 85-degree heat and Turner was the day's only double winner.
