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23 Tourney Records:

PASADENA CC TOPS STATE TOURNAMENT, FINAL JC RATINGS

While Pasadena City College raced to its first California junior college basketball championship in its history, 20 team records and three individual marks were set during the three-day state tournament at Allan Hancock College, Santa Maria this month.

In the San Joaquin Delta College-Riverside City College game on the second day, ll team records alone were broken. In addition Delta's Mustangs established four three-game records and three individual standards.

But the big news was Pasadena's state title—the fourth straight for coach Jerry Tarkanian, who came to the Lancers after winning three crowns at Riverside CC. The Lancers' big front line of John Trapp, Sam Robinson, and Willie Betts proved to be too much for Long Beach City College in the championship contest. Pasadena won, 89-79, even though the 6-8 Robinson sat out the final 13 minutes of the game with a painful thigh injury.

While he was healthy Robinson scored 10 points and pulled down four rebounds. Trapp and Betts, who are both 6-7 sophomores, tallied 40 points between them with Betts hauling in 15 rebounds.

The trio more than offset the superb rebounding of Viking all-state center Carey Bailey and the fine outside shooting of 5-ll guard Mack Calvin. Bailey, who stands 6-5, grabbed 14 rebounds and scored 17 points. Calvin hit on nine of 17 field goal attempts and scored 22 points.

Robinson, Trapp, Calvin, and Bailey were all named to the all-tourney team along with City College of San Francisco's Eugene Williams and San Joaquin Delta's smooth guard Louie Small. Trapp was the Most Valuable Player.

Small led the tourney scorers with 92 points, averaging over 30 points per contest. Williams, a huge 6-5 center, scored 50 points and grabbed 38 rebounds for CCSF, which finished third with an 84-73 victory over Imperial Valley College and its flashy 6-4 forward George Reynolds. San Joaquin Delta won the consolation crown with a 115-93 triumph over Laney College.

Riverside CC got 63 points in two games from Joe Stephens but lost both and was the second team to be eliminated. The Tigers were the defending champs. Host Allan Hancock was the first team to be eliminated.

It was a good year for prognosticating, CCSF coach Sid Phelan reminded us on the eve of the state tournament in Santa Maria. Six of the top ten teams from our pre-season poll made the select state tourney field of eight. The remaining two squads, Laney and defending champion Riverside CC, both were listed among the second ten teams in the poll--but they proved to be two of the weaker teams in the state tourney.

We did pick Fullerton ahead of Riverside in the Eastern Conference, but had Mt. San Jacinto correctly tabbed as Desert champion and really only missed the boat in the Golden Valley were Sierra beat out our co-favorites Marin (second place) and Santa Rosa (co-third). Sierra lost the state challenge playoff with Laney.

The Thunderbirds got 27 points from soph guard Ed Tavis.

In other final games, Contra Costa took second place with a 71-68 win over last place Diablo Valley and College of San Mateo defeated San Jose City College, 77-67, to grab a share of third. Chabot also finished third after beating Foothill, 82-79.

San Mateo's 6-1 sophomore Owney Williams won the GGC scoring title with a 22.4 average. Williams scored 27 in CSM's final game. Contra Costa got 20 points each from its pair of soph forwards, Don Lyons and McKinley Reynolds, in its victory.

In the previous round, CCSF took San Jose CC, 67-51; Contra Costa throttled Merritt, 83-71; San Mateo beat rival Foothill, 81-75; and Diablo Valley upset Chabot, 82-81. Earlier CCSF defeated Contra Costa, 78-64; Foothill nipped SJCC, 59-57; Chabot beat Merritt, 84-78; San Mateo stymied DVC, 66-60; CCSF stopped Foothill, 65-45; CCC outscored Chabot, 97-81; San Jose defeated Diablo Valley, 70-58; and Merritt thumped San Tateo, 78-67.

COAST CONFERENCE

Despite the loss of star soph guard Murphy Ward, Laney College romped through the Coast Conference basketball race, finishing with a 13-1 record. Ward missed the final four conference games with a knee injury, but Laney continued its winning ways, topping things off with a 79-69 win over Golden Valley Conference champ Sierra which placed the Eagles in the state tourney.

Monterey Peninsula and Menlo finished in a tie for second place with 10-4 records. MPC was paced by Mel Mason, a fabulous soph guard who averaged close to 30 points per game for the entire season. Mason scored over 30 digits in five Coast games and set a conference record with 59 points against Solano.

The Bulldogs, paced by 6-8 center Dick Brenneman, 6-7 forward Wilson Jones, and freshman guard Bobby Baker, dominated the conference despite being hit by early season forfeitures for using an ineligible player.

In final Central action Antelope Valley beat Cuesta, 91-83; Merced defeated Coalinga, 70-66; Hancock thwarted Reedley, 113-76, AVC stopped Coalinga, 104-78; Reedley took Porterville, 105-78, Hancock got 40 points from Brenneman and defeated Antelope Valley, 120-81; Merced beat Porterville, 111-63; Cuesta took Coalinga, 72-66; Hancock edged Cuesta, 89-78; Merced defeated Reedley, 127-91; and AVC outscored Porterville, 110-98.

Sonny Festejo, Reedley's 5-11 soph guard, averaged 32.2 points per game in the final half of the season with a high game of 40. He finished his two year career at Reedley with 1113 points. a new school record.

METROPOLITAN CONFERENCE

With sophomore all-state center Carey Bailey clearing the boards and guards Trent Gaines and Mack Calvin showing superb ball-handling and shooting, Long Beach City College had little trouble winning the Metropolitan Conference basketball race this season.

The Vikings finished undefeated and won the title by four games over second place Cerritos. Bailey, Gaines, and Calvin did not dominate the Metro scoring by any means. But all averaged over 17 points per game in Metro play. The Vikes easily defeated the conference all-stars at the season's end, 101-90.

In the final two weeks of action East Los Angeles defeated Santa Monica, 77-74; Cerritos bombed El Camino, 135-93; Los Angeles Valley also scored 135 points in beating Rio Hondo (89); Long Beach thumped Bakersfield, 114-73; East Lo defeated Bakersfield, 85-75; Santa Monica beat Cerritos for the first time in history 77-69; Rio Hondo surprised El Camino, 94-81; LBCC defeated LA Valley, 108-92; Cerritos throttled Bakersfield, 92-56; SMCC stymied Rio Hondo, 97-85; Long Beach beat East LA, 102-89; LA Valley outlasted El Camino, 107-103; El Camino outdistanced East LA, 121-101; Long Beach beat Santa Monica, 83-70; Cerritos defeated Rio Hondo, 77-62; and Bakersfield nipped LA Valley, 84-83.

WESTERN STATE CONFERENCE

Led by the tremendous front line of Willie Betts, John Trapp, and Sam Robinson, Pasadena City College romped to a perfect 16-0 Western State Conference basketball championship.

Betts, a sophomore who started for Bradley last year, become eligible midway through the year and proceeded to average over 10 points and 10 rebounds for the remainder of the year. Trapp and Robinson scored close to 20 points each throughout the year. Both averaged close to 10 rebounds also. Though they were left off the all-conference team by the other Western State coahes, both Trapp and Robinson were named to the all-tourney team at the state tournament. Trapp won the Most Valuable Player award.

The Lancers completely dominated the WSC and topped things off with a 108-81

triumph in the all-star game.

Rorald Knight, Los Angeles Harbor's 6-5 forward closed out his season with a 48-point outpurst against Los Angeles City College. He also grabbed 25 rebounds. All told, Knight scored over 30 points in six WSC games, including 39 against El Camino and 36 against Los Angeles Pierce.

RCC and Orange Coast tied for the regular season crown with identical 15-1 records. They split their two EC games, Orange Coast winning the first, 97-92, and Riverside winning the second, 92-91.

Dave Scott, a soph guard for Fullerton, scored 39 points while hitting 19 of 28 field goal attempts in his final game against OCC. John Irwin of Citrus became the Owls' third highest scorer with 662 in 28 games for a 23.7 average.

PACIFIC SOUTHWEST CONFERENCE

Imperial Valley College won its last ten Pacific Southwest Conference basketball games and with them its third consecutive PSC championship.

The Arabs, paced by flashy 6-4 soph forward George Reynolds, stormed back from an ealr loss to San Diego City College and sailed through the remainder of the campaign undefeated. At the season's end IVC did, however, succumb to the conference all-stars, 102-101.

Reynolds was clearly one of the best players in the state, scoring over 20 points and hauling in over 14 rebounds per game for the year. He was backed on the boards by center John Watts and forward Jim Hester. Guard Curt Watson added a good outside scoring punch. But it was Reynolds' consistent all-around floor play that spelled the difference between first and second place in the PSC.

In final Pacific Southwest play Southwestern defeated San Diego Mesa. 76-70; Mira Costa surprised San Diego CC, 94-88; IVC took Mira Costa, 94-78; Southwestern stymied Mira Costa, 93-79; Imperial Valley dumped Palomar, 77-64; Grossmont thumped Southwestern, 87-65; and Mesa defeated Palomar, 69-60.

DESERT CONFERENCE

With the discovery that freshman forward Lee Tolliver was ineligible, Desert Conference basketball champion Mt. San Jacinto was forced to forfeit all of its Spring semester victories ... and the conference trophy. College of the Desert and Barstow each picked up an additional win over Mt. San Jacinto and tied for the Desert title with 6-2 records.

Before the ineligibility was discovered, Mt. San Jacinto was challenged by Imperial Valley College of the Pacific Southwest for a berth in the state tourney and lost to the Arabs, 76-67.

In final conference games, College of the Desert defeated Victor Valley, 107-59; Mt. San Jacinto beat Barstow, 93-76 (later forfeited); Barstow took Palo Verde, 93-76, behind the 34 points and 14 rebounds of freshman Norm Wintermeyer; Mt. San Jacinto beat Victor Valley, 106-55; College of the Desert stymied Barstow, 87-72, while holding Wintermeyer to 19 points and five rebounds; Mt. San Jacinto thumped Palo Verde, 82-59, and beat College of the Desert, 81-71; and Victor Valley beat Palo Verde.

Tolliver proved to be a welcome addition to the Mt. San Jacinto squad. In the victory over Palo Verde, he scored 39 points and grabbed 29 rebounds. Robert-Presley, Mt. San Jacinto's 6-11 center, scored 27 points and hauled in 22 rebounds in the triumph over COD. All was for nothing however, as Mt. San Jacinto was later forced to forfeit all the games Tolliver had played in.
