

COACH BUD WINTER

The man with the winning habit—Lloyd C. (Bud) Winter—is now in his 23rd year as head track coach at San Jose State. Over the past two decades he's turned out champion after champion; toured the world conducting clinics, coaching and consulting, written training books and made a film for world-wide use on sprinting.



In 19 of his 23 seasons at SJS the Spartans have scored in the NCAA championships including a present string of 11 straight years.

He's turned out 13 individual and two relay national champions, eight Olympic performers over the past five games, three runnerup teams in the NCAA championships, two runnerup teams in the USITF championships and so forth.

A highlight of Bud's career came in 1960 when he was selected as an assistant coach for the U.S. Olympic track team.

Recently he's been appointed a consultant in track to the Mexico Organizing Committee for the 1968 Olympics and held a similar position during Japan's 1964 games.

He spent last summer conducting clinics and coaching for the Rumanian government and visited the athletic federations and Olympic committees of Yugoslavia, Denmark and Switzerland.

In 1964 Winter was host of the international coach's conclave at the Tokyo Olympics and was one of four coaches honored for his contributions to track with an Olympic gold medal.

Bud is a past president of the American College Track Coaches Association and in 1956 was the chairman of the first International Track Coaches Clinic. He has represented the State Department on a world-wide tour during which he devoted much time conducting clinics in India.

Winter has written four books titled "Rocket Start", "Jet Sprint Relay Pass", "So You Want to be a High Jumper" and "So You Want to be a Sprinter". He also has a color film on sprint training techniques in circulation.

Before coming to San Jose State, Bud had almost perfect records at Watsonville High and then—Salinas JC (Hartnell College at present) while coaching both football and track.

COACH TRACY WALTERS

Tracy Walters, the nation's premier high school distance running coach, is the new cross country and assistant track coach at San Jose State.

His initial cross country teams at SJS were unbeaten in dual meet competition, finished second at the USITF Championships and third in the NCAA.

His best known product is the famed Gerry Lindgren who starred for Walters at Spokane Rogers High.

Walters was head track and cross country coach at Rogers High for nine years.

Over his last three seasons Tracy's prep cross country squads posted a 35-1 record and in 1965 placed third in national postal competition.

His cross country teams suffered only 11 defeats in 10 years, won three straight city titles and has a string of seven state AAU championships plus no finishes below fourth place in the state or third in the city.

In track, Walter's success showed only nine losses over nine seasons in all types of competition. In dual meets, Rogers High suffered only three defeats.

Walters, a 1953 graduate of Eastern Washington State, last summer served on the U.S. coaching staff for an European summer track tour.

The much-honored coach received the 1965 YMCA Outstanding Service Award, the 1964 Seattle "Man of the Year" honor, 1963 Washington State Junior Chamber of Commerce "Outstanding Man Award," the 1965 Optimist "Youth Appreciation Award," the 1964 Kiwanian "Service Award" while key-noting the United Crusade Chamber of Commerce meeting plus the Toastmasters International Convention.

He currently is a member of the U.S. Olympic Committee track and field division.

OUTLOOK . . .

An improved dual meet team boasting both the super stars and great depth summarizes the 1967 San Jose State tracksters.

World class performances are a certainty from the sprint record-holder Tommie Smith, unbeaten 440 man Lee Evans and Greek pole vaulter Chris Papanicolaou.

Smith owns the 220 yard and 200 meter world records of 20.0 and 19.5, the 440 dash indoor mark of 46.2, the fastest ever 400 meter leg of 43.8 on the record-breaking U.S. 1600m relay team (2:59.6), a 45.3 timing over 400 meters, 10.1 for 100 meters, 9.3 for 100 yards and a 25-11 long jump tossed in for good measure.

Evans is equally impressive. The world's premier quarter-miler in 1966 as a San Jose CC freshman, Lee was unbeaten in races in the U.S., Canada and Europe, showed a best time of 45.2 for the 400 meters, 45.5 for the 440 yards, a 44.5 400 meter relay leg on that 1600 meter team, a 21.0 220 curve timing, a 1:18.1 outdoor 660 and a 1:10.7 indoor 600.

Papanicolaou threatens 17-0 whenever he competes. A high finisher during the 1967 season, Chris shows outdoor vaults of 16-6 $\frac{3}{4}$ in the European Championships at Budapest, a 16-6 leap at Athens and three 16-5 leaps. His top indoor performance is a 16-6 vault at San Diego.

SJS by events:

100 and 200—Strong and deep. State JC champ Bob Griffin joins Smith and Evans giving SJS a great 1-2-3 punch. Improvement expected from Bob Talmadge, Jim Edwards, John Bambury, Jerry Haas and Pat Moran.

440—Strong and deep. Evans is rated the world's best and will step down from 880's late in season. Smith plans to attack world record here. Bambury, Talmadge and possibly Ken Shackelford will carry the load.

880—Stronger. Biggest experiment here with Evans moving up to 880's during early season. Bill Day a real comer and Shackelford durable to run here. Look for distance men Rich Klemmer, Bill Langdon, Steve Brown, Charlie August and Rich Bergstrom to drop down at varying times here.

Mile—Solid. Klemmer leading followed by Langdon, August, Brown, Day and Bergstrom. Look for sub-4:10 performances from most of this group.

Three Mile—Solid. Top man Byron Lowry slowed by blood virus, will make comeback by late season. Langdon tops here followed by Dave Barni, Dave Lower, Joel Clark, Dick Gray and Dan Guerrero.

Steeplechase—Improved. Rich Klemmer a year older in this event followed by Lowry.

High Hurdles—Much Improved. Rickey Rogers, state JC champ, and decathlon man Larry Melquiond join returnees Norm Anderson and Larry Herald giving SJS it's first threat here in many, many years.

Intermediate Hurdles—Improved. Shackelford the iron man followed by Roger Lee and Bambury who will run here for first time.

440 Relay—Great. Griffin, Evans, someone and Smith running for SJS. The third man will come from either Bambury, Talmadge, Haas, Rogers or Ellis Williams.

Mile Relay—Great. Shackelford extremely rugged leadoff man, Talmadge, Evans and Smith follow to make this team one of the world's greatest.

Pole Vault—Much Stronger. Papanicolaou will win many firsts for SJS. Keep an eye on Larry Bell who has cleared 15-0 in practice. Herschel Beahm and Pat Butler provide depth.

High Jump—Stronger. CCSF transfer Dwight Tucker a 6-11 $\frac{1}{2}$, Ed Johnson has hit 7-0. Bill Fowler at 6-8 and Bill Gee at 6-8 will win points.

Triple Jump—Strong and deep. Tucker has hit 51-2 and joins a host of high 40-foot jumpers in Rogers, Williams, Cornelius Frazier, Howard Butler, Fowler and Herald.

Long Jump—Strong and deep. Moran and Rogers vye for honors here with Tucker, Butler and Williams all figured to improve.

Javelin—Stronger. Rich Arcide, the state's runnerup and sixth best JC man in U.S. last year is tops followed by Andy Allen and Melquiond.

Shot Put—Fair. Randy Raus at 54 feet is top man with Melquiond following.

Discus—Fair. Bob Twelvetrees, Eldon Milholland, Max Johnston and Melquiond must improve.
