

17-7 Vault For Record By Seagren

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Handsome Bob Seagren broke the world record in the pole vault at 17 feet 7 inches and Australia's Ron Clarke equalled the third fastest time for two miles with 8:25.2 last night.

Southern California's 440-yard relay team started the evening in the San Diego Invitational track meet with a record-breaking time of 39 seconds flat and did it running against a pickup team, its only opposition.

Competing in chilly weath-

er, Seagren, a 20-year-old sophomore from the University of Southern California, cleared 17-7 on his second effort.

Seagren did not come close when the bar was raised to 17-10 but he erased the established record of 17-16 1/4 set by John Pennel in Los Angeles July 23, 1966.

Clarke, who holds the world record from three miles up to the one-hour run, was aiming the world mark of 8:22.6 held by Michel Jazy of France.

The personable Aussie stayed off the pace for the first few laps but burst into a quick and wide lead going into the final mile.

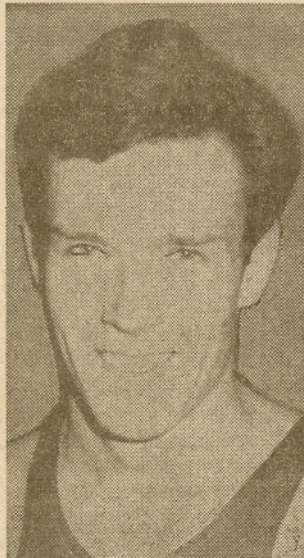
Finishing far behind in second place in the field of six was Pat Traynor of the Air Force, clocked in 8:34.5.

Clarke "apologized" for failing to break the record and said he had been ailing with the flu the past several days.

"I felt I'd make it," said the happy Seagren. "Last night at Occidental I tried a new pole and couldn't clear 16 feet.

"I broke the new pole tonight in the warm-up, so I went back to my old pole. I'll never use another."

Martin Liquori, 17-year-old high school lad from Caldwell,

N.J., won the mile in a remarkable 4:00.1, as the favorite, a national NCAA indoor champion Dave Patrick of Villanova faded to third.

But Liquori explained, "Patrick was sick with the flu. I knew after the first quarter I couldn't break four minutes — the pace was too slow."

Tim Danielson, Brigham Young freshman, ran second in 4:01.4 and Patrick, after leading, was third in 4:02.5.

Earlier the Trojans' sprint relay team broke the world

440-yard relay record by six-tenths of a second in the meet's opening running event with a time of 39 seconds flat.

Seagren held the pole vault record at 17-5 1/2 briefly until Pennel bettered it.

Seagren, who has been flirting with the record all spring, did not enter the six-man competition until the bar reached 16 feet. He cleared that, passed at 16-4, made 16-8 and went for the record.

The bar was raised to 17-10 as the crowd in Balboa Stadium roared encouragement.

While it was announced at the start that Seagren's mark was 17-7 1/4, officials after three lengthy measurements cut it to an even 17-7.

NCAA indoor champion Dave Patrick of Villanova in the mile. Liquori's only disappointment was that he failed by .1 of a second to become the third high school student in history to break the four minute mile.

San Diego Invitational(3rd annual) June 10, 1967 7,184 temp mid60's

It was Southern Cal's night at San Diego as the Trojan athletes came up with two new world records. One, a fantastic 440 relay clocking that chopped a full ~~xx~~ six-tenths of a second off a mark that has ~~xxxxxx~~ ticked downward by tenths each time. The 39.0 ~~xi~~ equalled the record for the shorter metric distance of 400m. The other mark came when Bob Seagren finally took back the record that he had been seeking for a ~~whole~~ year with a clean vault over 17-7 (5.36m).

The Trojan quartet thought they could do 39.3, and their coach, Vern Wolfe, had predicted a 39.0 as possible if they had perfect passes. The hopes of a record dimmed and Wolfe's face grew longer as first UCLA ~~scratched~~ and then the SC Striders ^{scratched} ~~from~~ the relay. An All Star team of George Anderson, Bob Beamon, Jim Kemp, and John Carlos was gathered to supply the opposition for the Trojan foursome of Earl McCullouch, Fred Kuller, O.J. Simpson, and Lennox Miller. The Trojans had lane seven and the All Stars were in six to take advantage of the broad sweep of the turns. The Trojans were ahead at the first exchange and winging until the third exchange when a stretching O.J. just reached a twisting back Miller to get the stick off in the final yard of the zone. Vern Wolfe clocked his charges in 39.0, and said "Darn, I missed the flash". When the time was announced, Wolfe's downcast face broke into a wide smile and the bad pass was forgiven and forgotten.

Wolfe's smile became even broader after Seagren cleared 17-7 by four to five inches on his fifth vault of the night at 9:28 after a mere two hours of vault competition. Seagren passed 15 and 15-6; made 16 on his first try; passed 16-4, made 16-8 on his first try and 17-3 $\frac{1}{2}$ on his first try. This mark erased Fred Hansen's stadium record of 17-2, which at that time was a world record. The bar_n was raised to 17-7 $\frac{1}{2}$; Seagren came close on his first attempt. Pandemonium reigned supreme when he cleared the bar on his second attempt to regain the record from John Pennel. A jubilant Wolfe, ~~formerly sullen Wolfe~~ exclaimed "We're hot tonight". After consultation with Seagren, who carefully supervised the measurement, they decided to go big for 17-10. The first attempt was the best, just knocking the bar off with his hands.* *see p 2*

Earlier in the week, Clarke had announced he would shoot for the world two-mile record to add to his world record collection. But at mid-week he had caught a virus and was laid up for three days and thinking of not running. The race started slowly as Smith led with a 64.5 first lap (Clarke 65.3), a 2:08.5 half (Clarke 2:09.0. But at announcer Dwain Esper's insistent urging with Jazy's lap times in front of him, Clarke was goaded

~~xxx~~ into pulling abreast of Smith in 3:14.0 and ~~xxxx~~ spurting to a 4:13.5 mile with a 59.5 interior quarter (probably the fastest on record) to put him within two seconds of Jazy's mark. Smith had 4:16.3 at the mile and had broken contact with the pack. Clarke's next lap of 63.0 carried him to within a second of Jazy's pace and gave him a five second lead on Smith. With no competition Clarke slowed to 6:20.8 and 7:25.1 and managed a 60.1 last lap to record the ~~xxxx~~ equal third fastest time of 8:25.2. Pat Traynor made another of his characteristic late bursts of speed to overtake Smith with a 58.5 last lap to 60.8 to clock 8:34.6 to 8:34.9

held him off at Earl McCullough got the jump on Ron Copeland at the start again and ~~xxxx~~ the tape in 13.6. Tom Von Ruden edged Villanova's Frank Murphy in a four man blanket finish, which for some reason the timers clocked in tenth second separations from 1:49.6 to 1:49.9. Martin Liquori waged a nip and tuck battle with Dave Patrick over the last 330 yards, but the high schooler proved too strong for Patrick in the last 100 yards. A much improved Danielson slipped by Patrick in the final yards as Patrick gave up in his battle with Liquori. Liquori's time ~~xxxxxxx~~ ^{improves his} third fastest by a high schooler position by a full second in the span of a week. Liquori was unapproachable for comment after the meet since he was closely guarded by a cordon of Villanovan athletes. ^{whom he intends to join next fall.} Ron Whitney ran a beautiful race to the tenth hurdle at a sub 50.0 pace, and then had to chop to take the hurdle off balance. Officialdom insisted on starting the race in the middle of the track. Consequently, the tenth hurdle is right off the turn which means the hurdles are all straight in a row but the runner is still turning and must take the hurdle at an angle. Nash closed fast in the 220 and just missed catching Jerry Bright as both returned 20.7.
