LOS ANGELES, CALIF.--The "Super Duck," Neal Steinhauer, and his fellow Oregon Webfoots come to town this Saturday at 1:15 p.m. (April 22) to battle UCLA's unbeaten Bruins in an important dual track meet at the Los Angeles Coliseum.

The 6-5, 260-lb. Steinhauer has already this season got off the second longest shot put in world history with a 68-11 1/4 heave, second only to Randy Matson's world record of 70-7 1/4. He also is a talented discus thrower and has improved his lifetime best to 187-3 this year.

He may be pushed in the discus Saturday by the Bruins' ever-improving Kirk Wassell, who posted his lifetime best of 179-0 1/2 against Stanford last Saturday in only his second meet as a UCLA performer. His previous best was 173-6. Only two Bruins in history have ever tossed the platter farther, Gerald Carr with a 181-2 1/2 throw in 1960 and Dave Weber with a 180-8 heave last year.

The Webfoots, who impressed with an 85-69 victory over California last Saturday, also have some other standout performers, including half-milers and milers Wade Bell (1:48.2, 4:05.8) and Roscoe Divine (1:49.5, 4:03.3), high hurdler Bob Blum (13.9 wind-aided), shot putter Bob Foskett (59-3 1/4) and javelin thrower Bill Heikkela (239-2 1/2).

And so there should be two outstanding races in the 880 between Bell and Divine and the Bruins' capable Arnd Kruger (1:50.7) and also in the highs between Blum and UCLA's great Ron Copeland, who indicated he's nearing top form with a 14.0 clocking last week.

The javelin competition also looms as a meet feature. Bruin Dick Selby, who has been in a slump, snapped out of it against Stanford with his seasonal best of 225-7 1/2 and figures to challenge Heikkela, a consistent 230 footer.

UCLA coach Jim Bush was pleased with the overall performance of his Bruins in their lopsided 115-28 victory over Stanford, the most decisive win in history in this traditional series dating back to 1934.

"I believe we are starting to jell now and should really break loose any meet now," Bush observed following the Stanford meet which was marred by rain at the start.

After they had both cleared 16-6 3/4 in the official pole vault competition against Stanford, Bruins Dick Railsback and Rick Sloan went over 17-4 and 17-1, respectively, to give the fans a post-meet thrill. In fact, Railsback cleared 17-4 by two or three inches.

Triple jumper Gerald Lee set a new UCLA record of 51-9, breaking the old mark of 50-11 1/4 by Kermit Alexander in 1962. Coach Bush ruled it was not wind-aided as it was definitely a cross-wind.

Another Bruin star was Don Domansky, a double winner with fast times of 46.7 in the 440, a new Trotter Track record, and 21.2 in the 220. He also ran a sensational leg on the winning 440 relay team (40.8).

"Domansky is looking great and he looks ready to go even faster," Bush said.

For the second straight meet, Zenon Andrusyshn set a new UCLA frosh discus record with a 164-5 toss, breaking his week-old mark of 159-5. Also exceeding the former record was fellow Brubabe Jim Peters with a 163-3 toss. The yearlings defeated Reedley JC, 96-47, last Saturday.

The Brubabes will host Palomar JC in a dual meet to be run off Saturday with the varsity competition.

With spring football practice starting this Saturday, the Brubabes will now be without the services of weightman Mike Garratt and hurdler/sprinter George Farmer, two top performers.

LOS ANGELES--With possibly the best football player in the United States--Quarterback Gary Beban--to start with, head Coach Tommy Prothro will greet some 75 Bruin candidates Saturday at the opening of 1967 Spring Football Practice on UCLA's Spaulding Field.

Missing will be the explosive ball-carrying talents of All-American left Halfback Mel Farr and 18 other stars who aided the Bruins to a 9-1 season last year, plus a quartet who will return to the squad in the Fall.

The four out of Spring action are split left End Harold Busby, the leading Bruin pass-catcher last Fall, currently on Jim Bush's track team; defensive first string left Half Mark Gustafson, who doubles as a golfer; and Linebacker Don Manning and Center Paul Mayfield, for medical reasons.

However, Prothro will have the services of 18 returning lettermen this weekend when he splits his squad into two groups for drills that will last from 1:20 p.m. until 5:30. Only the players will work for two hours; the coaches have to go "all the way."

A photo session for the first group is slated for 3:20 to 4:00 and 3:00-3:30 for the second group.

Among the returnees few changes have been made, the most notable one being the switch of two-year letterman Steve Stanley from fullback to the right halfback or wingback spot. This leaves Junior Rick Purdy at fullback but give the Bruins some overall experience in a backfield that will be largely unproven after the first team.

Beban, who is well on his way toward breaking all UCLA passing and total offense records and establishing himself as the greatest in Bruin history, will be backed up by 205-pound Bill Bolden, the strong-running ex-freshman from San Diego. At left half Junior Mike Bergdahl's 50-minutes of playing time in 1966 is the only experience; but Greg Jones, a quick 200-pounder from South San Francisco, and Paul Derflinger, a highly-rated junior transfer from San Diego's Mesa College, may help fill the gap left by Farr's graduation.

Busby's duties on the track team will give Prothro the opportunity to get a good line on much-heralded George Farmer, the 6-4, 205-pound sophomore from LaPuente, who apparently has the size, speed and catching ability to give Beban a great new target.

In looking forward to the 20 days of drills, ending with the usual final scrimmage on May 27, Prothro said, "It would be unrealistic to believe our team will be up to the caliber of the immediate preceding years, but the 1967 team is one that should improve as the year goes on.

As always, however, we're expecting to have a fine UCLA football team."
