

Smith (19.6) Anchors San Jose to 880 K

FRESNO—Running almost alone, Tommie Smith blistered a final 220 in 19.6 to speed San Jose State to a world 880 yard relay record of 1:22.1 here Saturday night.

It was the 36th world record established in the West Coast Relays, which were conducted for the 41st time Saturday under perfect weather conditions.

The record was a typical Smith performance, wiping out the world's best previous time by a half-second. Abilene Christian set the old mark of 1:22.6 in 1958.

Ken Shackelford led off the Spartans in 21.4, then Bob Talmadge pulled San Jose far in front with a 20.1. National AAU 440 champion Lee Evans followed with a 21.0, and then Tommie-Jet's 19.6.

The same foursome came back later in the second fastest mile relay ever run. The Spartans were timed in the American record breaking time of 3:03.5. Unofficially, Evans was credited with a 44.3 leg and Smith, running anchor, 45.2.

The world record is 3:02.8 set last year by a Trinidad and Tobago team anchored by Wendell Mottley.

Boston Sharp

Before the Spartan outburst, the meet had seen such world best performances of the year as a 27-2-1/4 long jump by Ralph Boston and a 50.1 intermediate hurdles by Ron Whitney.

Boston's record, coming on his second jump, unnerved young Bob Beamon, who beat Boston at the Mt. San Antonio Relays. Beamon, 19-year-old

National AAU indoor champion, fouled on all three jumps.

Although old-timer Jay Silvester won the discus at a meet record 201-2 1/2, the happiest platter tosser was USC's Gary Carlsen, whose second-place effort of 200-1 gave him a Trojan school record. Gary, who became the 13th discus thrower in the world (and ninth in the U.S.) over 200 feet, broke Rink Babka's USC mark of 198-10 made in 1958.

Back in third place for one of the lowest finishes of his long career, which includes three Olympic gold medals, was Al Oerter. At that, Oerter surpassed his own year-old meet mark of 195.0.

George Puce, the Latvian-born Canadian national who set a college division record of 197-8 1/2 throwing for the U. of Nevada Friday night, decided not to compete with the big boys Saturday.

8:32.5 Two Mile

Another best in the world this year was posted by Tracy Smith, the former Arcadia High miler, with an 8:32.5 two mile. Tracy led all the way to hold off George Scott of New Mexico and Australia, who clocked 8:34.3.

Ron Copeland, after getting his hand spiked while running a brilliant 13.6 high hurdle heat, came back to nip Ervin Hall of Villanova in a 13.8 final. Copeland, off slowly, never led until the final inches.

Copeland's chief rival, USC's Earl McCullough, was one of several Trojans who suffered from aches and pains. Earl stopped in the middle of his hurdle heat, while intermediate hurdler Geoff Vanderstock, sprinter Lennox Miller and javelin thrower John FitzSimons

did not compete.

Pierce, coached by former Olympic half-miler Bob Chambers, kept the relays' tradition of a national JC record by running the two mile in 7:29.3—over three seconds under Santa Ana's record. The team of Biff Newman, Terry Tubbs, Paul Myers and Bob Hansen, who ran 1:50.8, won by 80 yards.

Prior to the two speedy legs turned in by Evans and Smith, Talmadge led off with a 47.5 lap and Shackelford followed with a 46.4.

San Jose State was never behind in the mile relay, although Talmadge was even with New Mexico when he

Smith Named 'Best'

Tommie Smith, who anchored the San Jose State Spartans to a world record in the 880-yard relay and an American record in the mile relay, was named the Outstanding Collegiate Athlete of the West Coast Relays.

passed off. However, the Spartans got a better baton pass and Shackelford was three yards in front of New Mexico as he took off. From then on, it was San Jose all the way.

The 880 race became the seventh world record that Smith has been a part of. He has the records for the 220 on the straightaway and on the turn, and has the same records over the meter distance. He shares the 1,600-meter relay record and holds the 440 indoor mark.

Prior to these two big efforts by San Jose, Ralph Boston missed by less than three inches his world record in the long jump and Ron Whitney ran the world's fastest intermediate hurdle flight for the year.

Boston, the record-holder at 27-5, soared 27-2 1/4 on his second attempt to easily win by more than two feet over runner-up Darrell Horn of the Athens Athletic Club.

Under perfect weather conditions, Boston smashed the meet record of 26-8, which he himself set here last year.

Whitney, running during the afternoon portion of the program, ran a blistering 50.1 for a five-yard victory over Paddy McCrary of the University of California.

The 100-yard dash became an all-Bay Area show as former Castlemont star Jerry Bright, now running for Arizona State, cracked the tape in 9.5.

Right with him, and with the same clocking, was Menzies Campbell of the Athens Club. Third was Southern Cal's O.J. Simpson, former City College of San Francisco star, in 9.6.

In the intermediate hurdles, Whitney came on strong to beat by a 10th of a second the season's previous best which Geoff Vanderstock of Southern Cal ran a week ago.

Whitney's winning time wiped out the meet record of 51.2 previously held by Larry Godfrey of San Diego State and Mike Douglas of Brigham Young.

Coming in second in 50.6

McCrary was not only under the old meet record, but cracked his own school record of 51.2. Whitney, McCrary, third-place Roger Johnson of UCLA (50.8) and fourth-place Tom Wyatt (51.0) of the Athens Club all bettered their previous bests of the season.

Pierce J.C. Sets Record

FRESNO — With Bob Hansen running a 1:50.8 anchor leg, Pierce Junior College cracked the National Jaycee record for the two-mile relay in the West Coast relays here last night.

The Pierce quartet of Bill Newman, Terry Tubb, Paul Myers and Harsen raced to a 7:29.3 clocking under the clear evening skies to win by 65 yards over second-place Orange Coast.

The time for Pierce erased the national record of 7:32.8, which Santa Ana set in this same meet back in 1964.

Newman, the leadoff man, was clocked in 1:54.7, followed by Tubb in 1:51.2 and Myers in 1:52.6. Jack Malloy, the anchor man for Orange Coast, had a 1:50.6, but had no chance to overtake the big lead which Hansen had been given.

The Eastbay came up with two big winners when Gary Kerr of Chabot took the high hurdles in 14.3 seconds and Fred Jackson of Laney won the high jump at 6-10.

Kerr won by a yard over Ron Jesse of Imperial Valley. Jackson had a two-inch edge over his nearest opponents, and then took three unsuccessful attempts at seven feet.

Marion Sims and Mickey Mathews of Laney won their 100-yard dash heats, Sims in 9.5 and Mathews in 9.6. However, in the finals, it was a clearcut 9.4 victory for Sam Davis of Fresno, with Mathews third in 9.7 and Sims fourth in 9.8.

Kerr also finished second to Wes Williams of San Diego Mesa as the latter set an automatic record of 53.3 in the intermediate hurdles. It was the first time the event was held here. Kerr finished only one-tenth of a second back.

Laney's Eagles won their sections in both the 440 and 880-yard relay races, but wound up second in the 880 and unplaced in the shorter race.

The quartet of Horace

McGhee, Aaron Carter, Marion Sims and Mickey Mathews was clocked in 1:26.5 in the 880 race, which Allen Hancock won in 1:25.1.

Sims, McGhee, Chris Garoutte and Mathews had a 41.8 in the 440, but Hancock won in 41.3.
