

Proctor Sparks Muir; Centennial Hopes Fade

SAN DIEGO — Muir's sensational Jerry Proctor won his heat in both hurdle events and led the field in the long jump as expected but that was about the only thing that ran true to form at the 49th annual California state high school track and field championships at Balboa Stadium Friday.

Walt Opp's Mustangs, behind the versatile Proctor, were pre-meet co-favorites with Centennial—the Southern Section titlists, but wound up having the field virtually to themselves when the Apaches faded badly in preliminary events.

Centennial was able to gather only three qualifiers for the finals, which get under way at noon today. Muir, meanwhile, showed unexpected strength by getting sprinter Howard Williams (9.7) into the 100 finals and Eddie Howard (62-1) in the shot put.

Best Under Pressure

And, of course, Opp has the favorite in three events with the indefatigable Proctor who seemingly can run all day. The lithe, 5-10, 150 pounder, seems to improve as the pressure mounts.

Proctor did 13.9 in the highs, 18.8 in the lows and an effortless 25-3 in his specialty. Jerry is the national inter-scholastic recordholder in the long jump at 25-7.

His 18.8 will also be submitted as a national record bettering the mark of 18.9 set by Mel Renfro (Jefferson, Portland) in 1960. Gardena's Mike Jeter, who will be pushing Proctor in the hurdles today, also has an 18.8 pending. Jeter coasted to victories in 13.9 and 19.0, and will be ready to give Proctor his stiffest of his career.

In all, Muir qualified six for the final go-around leading all schools in that category. Fremont of Los Angeles was next with five qualifiers.

It was an afternoon of upsets, most notably the collapse of a Centennial team which figured to push Muir down to the relay. Centennial's fine sprinter, Nathan Spann, ran fifth in both his 100 and 220 heats, Spann was the Southern Section 100 champion in 9.6, and was runnerup in the 220.

Also, Apache hurdler John Veal failed to get as high as third in the 120 and 180s, and this knocked Centennial completely out of the title picture.

Other startling reversals included the failure of Gardena's Wayne Collett

to crack the low hurdles grid and the inability of Rubidoux's Victor Dias — with a season's best of 15-5 — to clear 13-6 and enter the pole vault finals.

Collett was noticeably tired after having won his 440 heat in 48.3 and had scarcely 15 minutes before the hurdles race.

Masters 9.5, 20.9 in State Qualifying

Sprinter Dave Masters of El Cerrito and hurdler Jerry Proctor of Muir (Pasadena) set a stiff qualifying pace yesterday in the 49th annual California State high school track and field championships at Balboa Stadium.

Masters, the favorite to win both sprints, bolstered his position by qualifying with the fastest times in the 100 and 220. In the 100, he raced away from the field in his heat to win in 9.5. In the 220 on a curve, he followed his familiar breakaway pattern and zoomed to a national record—equalling 20.9. He clearly overshadowed the sprint field and will be considered a heavy choice today in the finals.

Proctor, the sensational Muir senior, made giant strides toward sewing up a triple win. He flashed to an 18.8 for the 180-yard low hurdles on a turn, one-tenth of a second better than the national mark of 18.9 set by Mel Renfro of Jefferson High in Portland, seven years ago.

Proctor, who as Masters has signed a letter-of-intent for Cal, was the top qualifier in the long jump with a leap of 25-3, four inches off his national mark. He tied for best qualifying time in the 120-high hurdles with a 13.9. In another heat, Mike Jeter of Gardena also ran 13.9.

Balboa's Tom Clyburn, one of two returning champions, qualified for the high jump with 12 others clearing 6-4.

The other returning champion, Wayne Collett of Gardena, finished with the fastest time in qualifying for the 440, with a 48.3. Clarence Taylor of Richmond, running in the same heat, finished with the second fastest, 48.7.

Mer Gray of Montgomery (Santa Rosa), figured by many to be the best runnerup in years, won his heat in the 100 in 9.6, finished third in the 220 at 21.4 and was second to Proctor in the long jump with a leap of 24-3.

Aside from Clyburn, only two San Francisco schoolboys will compete today. Poly's Andy Vickers cleared 13-6 with 10 others to get into the pole vault finals, and St. Ignatius' Klaus Hofmann didn't have to qualify for the two-mile.

Several major upsets occurred, which should cause much shuffling of form charts. In the pole vault, Victor Dias of Rubidoux (Riverside), who had the best vault in the state this year with 15-5/2, failed to qualify. And, in the high jump, Steve Lang of Fremont (Los Angeles) didn't qualify, although he had a regular season best of 6-9 1/2.

John Buehler of Whittier established himself as an odds-on favorite in the shot put with a toss of 65-feet and Mark Ostoich of San Bernardino led a field of outstanding discus throwers with a flip of 177-7.

In the mile, two San Diego runners should have a dandy battle. Thornton Bigley of Clairmont won his heat in 4:15.3 and Lloyd Apgar of Lincoln won his in 4:15.6.

Dick Howard of St. Ignatius turned in San Francisco's best running performance and barely missed qualifying when Gary Woods of Narbonne (La.) passed him in the final 30 yards to finish third behind Mike Solomon of Westminster. Howard was timed in 4:22.5, only 3-10ths of a second off his all-time best.

The long-standing CIF 880-yard relay mark might be threatened as Centennial of Compton Muir and Los Angeles Fremont all raced to exceptional times yesterday. Centennial and Fremont were timed in 1:26.3 and Muir in 1:26.6. The CIF mark of 1:25.9 was set by Jefferson of Los Angeles in 1956.

Don Burns of Redondo became the man to beat in the 880 with a 1:52.4 time. He raced in the same heat as Pete Fairchild of Encina, the Norcal leader with a 1:52.2. Fairchild finished third yesterday in 1:53.4 behind LA Wilson's Arthur Martinez, who ran 1:53.0.

Proctor's Triple Leads Muir

SAN DIEGO — Jerry Proctor won three events as Muir galloped to the team title, but little Mel Gray of Montgomery High of Santa Rosa captured the hearts of the 8,268 fans Saturday in the 49th annual California State High School track and field championships at Balboa Stadium.

It was no contest in the team category as Walter Opp's Mustangs compiled 26 points to far outdistance second-place Montgomery (16) in a record-shattering meet which produced two national interscholastic marks and six CIF standards. One national record also was equaled.

Gray, a football "fugitive" who will perform at Los Angeles this fall in the Shrine North-South grid classic, accounted for one of the national marks, clicking off a fantastic 20.7 in the 220 around a curve. The old record was 20.9, held by three athletes, among them Jimmy Hines, star of Friday night's Coliseum-Compton Relays.

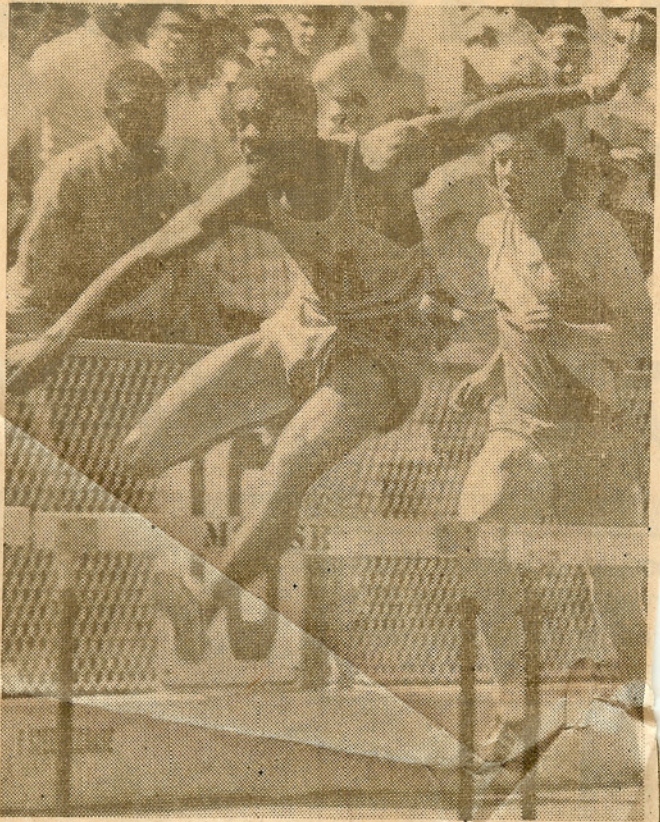
Hines, who attends Texas Southern, set the mark in 1964 while a student at McClymonds High of Oakland.

Gray's other victory—which tied the national record—came in the 100 at 9.4 seconds. Bill Gaines of Clearview High, Mullica Hill, N.J., has a 9.3 pending recognition.

In both events, Gray outlegged the favorite, Dave Masters of El Cerrito. Gray had run against Masters several times this season, and had not been able to beat him.

Masters' times in the 100 and 220 were 9.5 and 20.9, normally good enough to win either event by a sizeable margin.

In his last competitive appearance for Muir, Proctor was at his best. He won the high hurdles in 13.7 (a CIF record), the lows in 18.7 (a national record) and the long jump with a 25-4½ on his first

leap. This effort tied the CIF record, but was short of Jerry's pending 25-7 national record.

The 5-9, 150-pound youngster became only the third athlete in CIF history to win three events in the State meet.

Interestingly, the "triples" each came 20 years apart. Glendale's Frank Wykoff won the 100, 220 and long jump in 1927 and Hugh McElhenny of L.A. Washington won both hurdles and the long jump in 1947.

Opp was lavish in his praise of Proctor, who is bound for the University of Redlands.

"He has to be the greatest," he said. "Sure, he won the hurdles and long jump in fine fashion, but what impressed me most was his effort in the relay after competing in three events. It was a real

tribute to the boy's courage."

Opp was referring to the third leg of the 880 relay, in which Muir was fourth when Jerry dropped the baton, then suddenly led when his 220 was completed. Muir finished second to L.A. Fremont, which won at 1:26.0.

Still, Proctor had nothing on Gray, who singlehandedly brought his team to a second-place finish. In addition to his firsts in the sprints, the 5-9, 160-pounder also finished second in the long jump at 24-1 1/4.

In the high jump, sophomore Reynaldo Brown of Compton soared 6-9 1/4 to beat Ken Burnside of San Ramon, who also cleared 6-9 1/4, but lost on more misses.

Biggest upset was in the 440, where defending

State champion Wayne Collett was beaten by Mike Newton of Whittier. Newton's time was 47.2.

It was the third State title for Muir, which also won in 1935 and 1936.

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Muir 'Shoo-In' In Prep Track

SAN DIEGO—When runners went to the post today in the 49th annual California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) track and field finals at Balboa Stadium here, it was Jerry Proctor and the Muir High (Pasadena) Mustangs in an expected cakewalk.

The Proctor-led Mustangs were hands-down favorites to bring Coach Walter Opp his first state championship and Muir's first since 1936.

The expected battle between Muir and Southern Section champion Centennial went by the boards as the Apaches failed to qualify several performers in Friday afternoon's qualifying, and the City's top two entries, Gardena and Fremont, failed to establish themselves as title threats.

Proctor was the whole show Friday before a first-day gathering of 2,500 fans, winning three events and anchoring the Mustang 880-yard relay combination to a heat triumph.

The sensational Pasadena spiker, who already holds the national prep long-jump mark of 25-7, led qualifiers in his specialty with a leap of 25-3, topped both his heats in the hurdles (13.9 in the highs and a national standard-tying 18.8 in the lows) and paced the Mustangs to a 1:26.6 clocking in the relay.

Gardena, the City's runnerup, got top preliminary efforts Friday from hurdler Mike Jeter, winning his highs heat in 13.9 and his lows race in 19.0, and quarter-miler Wayne Collett, who cruised home easily in 48.3.

Fremont, the City titlist, placed five of its sprinters for today's finals, but was hurt in the title-fighting by the loss of City Champion high jumper Steve Lang, who failed to make a minimum of 6.4

Valley fans got a tingle of excitement from the performance of Notre Dame miler Jim Mosher, who ran a fine 4:16.5 second in his heat. Birmingham ace Kerry Ellison, the City champion and still a junior, failed to make the grade though finishing fifth in his heat in 4:23.3.

Hollywood High's Manuel Greene turned in the best effort by a Western Leaguer, just missing today's finals after placing a tight fourth in his half-mile heat at 1:56.3. Dorsey's Larry Banks won his 880 heat with a great come-from-behind effort in 1:55.0.

Next to Proctor's great efforts came the sprinting heroics of Dave Masters of El Cerito. Masters sped to a pair of national record-tying clockings of 9.5 in the century and 20.9 (around a turn) in the furlong.

A great hurdle battle shaped up for today's 120-highs between Proctor and Jeter, both of whom won heats in 13.9.

The 180-lows also looked great with the two claimants to the national mark, Proctor and Jeter, locking horns and gunning to better the standard they share at 18.8.

Co-City champion Jeff Sakala of Taft was one of 10 pole vaulters to make the 13-6 qualifying as the other co-champ, Anthony Moore of San Fernando, dropped out early in the vaulting.

The two Western League relay teams, Palisades and Hamilton, failed to make the grade, with the Dolphins finishing eighth behind Muir and the Yankees placing fourth behind Fremont.

Gray Sprints to Two Marks

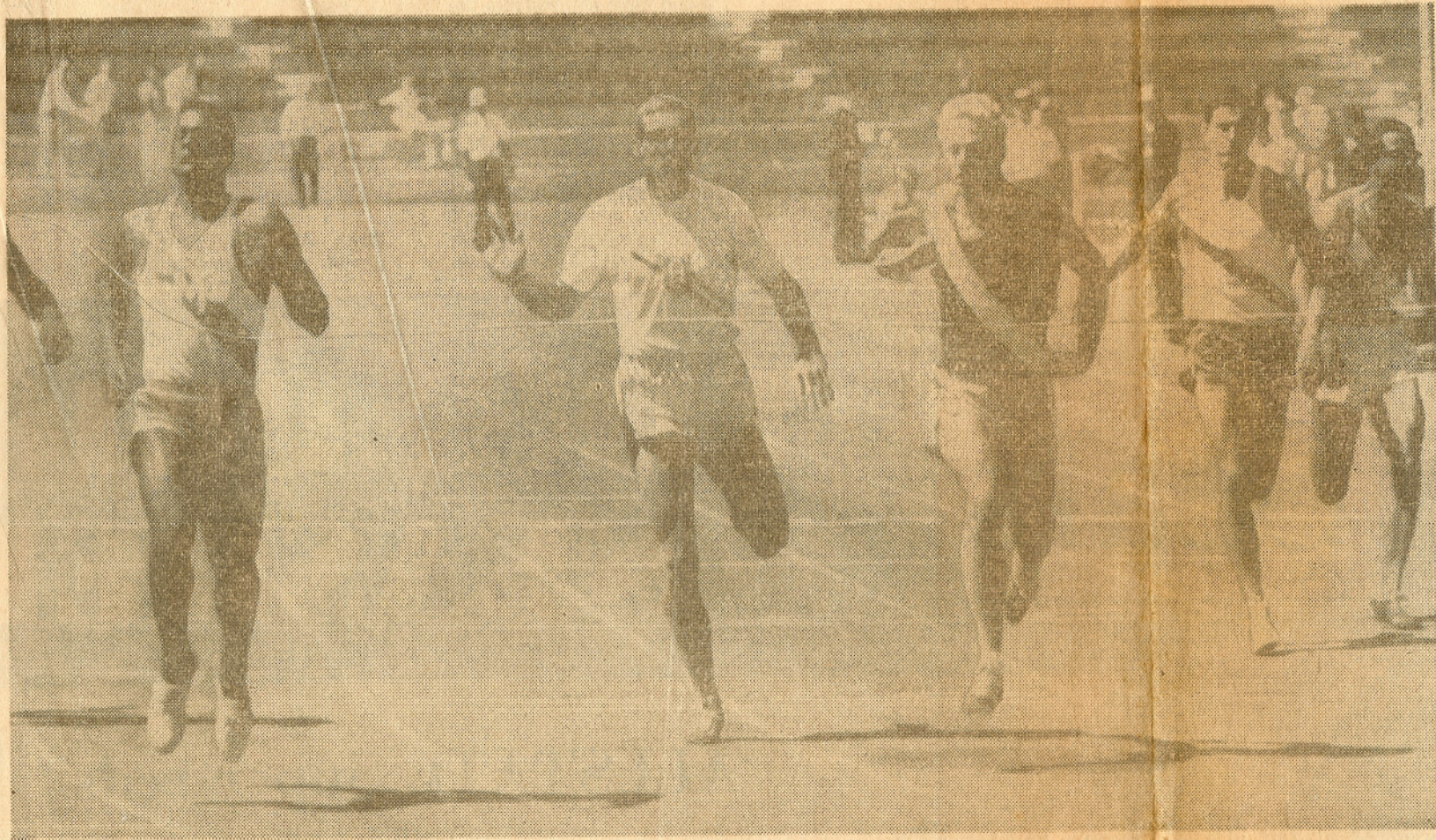
Pasadena Ace Nabs 'Triple'

SAN DIEGO — The greatest one-man show in the history of prep track and field and a brilliant record-smashing sprint double by Marvellous Mel Gray of Santa Rosa's Montgomery High put a spectacular stamp to the 49th annual CIF State High School Championships at Balboa Stadium yesterday.

Gray's fantastic National record-breaking 220 victory and his U.S. record-equalling 100 yard dash win, mixed in a triple victory — including another National interscholastic mark — by Muir of Pasadena's Jerry Proctor, were enough, in themselves, to make this the finest school-boy show in the Nation.

But the 8268 sun-baked spectators were treated to even more than that.

In addition to the three National prep record performances by Gray and Proctor, six CIF meet standards crumbled as the Proctor-led Muir Mustangs ran away with the team championship on 26 points, the highest total since 1952.

Other than what was provided by Gray, who pulled off the two biggest surprises of the day by whipping rival Dave Masters of El Cerrito in both sprints, Northern California followers were given very little to cheer about.

Southern California athletes walked away with 11 of the 14 first places, including 1-2-3 sweeps in the mile and 850 relay.

Individuality, it was Proctor who dominated the show by some lengths.

The multi-talented senior — who has signed a letter of intent for the University of California but now declares, "I'm leaning toward Redlands" — scored the first triple since ex-S.F. 49er Hugh McElhenny's three firsts in the 1947 State meet when he was a prep at Washington High in Los Angeles.

Like McElhenny, Proctor scored his first places in the two hurdle races and the

long jump, but there, the comparison ends.

Proctor put together three performances that are unmatched by any prep in the nation.

He first established a new CIF meet record in the 120-yard high hurdles — 13.7 seconds — polished off, with ridiculous ease, a talented 180 low-hurdle field in a national record breaking 18.7 seconds which chipped two-tenths of a second off the existing mark, and won the long jump on his second leap at 25 4/8 inches.

Proctor already has a 25-7 mark pending for a new national standard. His jump yesterday broke the CIF's oldest meet record, set by Monte Upshaw of Piedmont 13 years ago, by a quarter of an inch.

That piled up 18 points for the one-man gang.

Then, for good measure, he pulled Muir's half-mile relay team from way behind into the lead on the third leg. The Mustang foursome eventually would up second to Fremont of L.A. for four more points and the 26 total digits.

The spectators were startled by what happened to Gray, who had beaten El

Cerrito's Masters only twice in more than a dozen races over two years of North Coast Section competition.

But the U. of Missouri-bound speedster from Santa Rosa — a member of the North Shrine football team — was a clear-cut winner over his chief rival in both sprints. He led from start to finish while tying the existing national 100-yard dash mark of 9.4 seconds. And, when Masters closed in on him at the end of the 220 turn, Marvellous Mel just turned on the afterburners and raced away for a 20.7 clocking.

The 100-yard dash mark probably won't get into the books because Billy Gaines of New Jersey has a 9.3 pending before the National Interscholastic Committee. But, the two seconds he chipped off the 220 record for a turn should be around for awhile.

The only other NorCal triumph came in the two mile where Reedley's tiny Pete Romero ran away from the pack after the second lap, set his own pace and finished in a strong 9:00.5 for a meet record.

The real disappointments for NorCal came in the high

jump, where defending champion Tom Clyburn of San Francisco's Balboa failed to clear 6-9 and had to settle for third place behind Reynaldo Brown of Compton and San Ramon's Ken Burnside. Both of whom cleared 6-9 1/4, and in the discus, where NorCal didn't win for the first time in the nine years the event has been staged.

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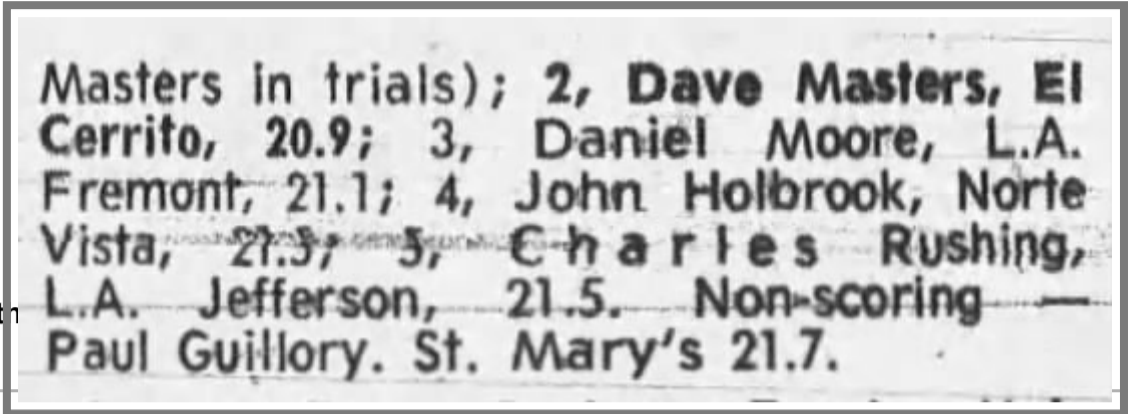
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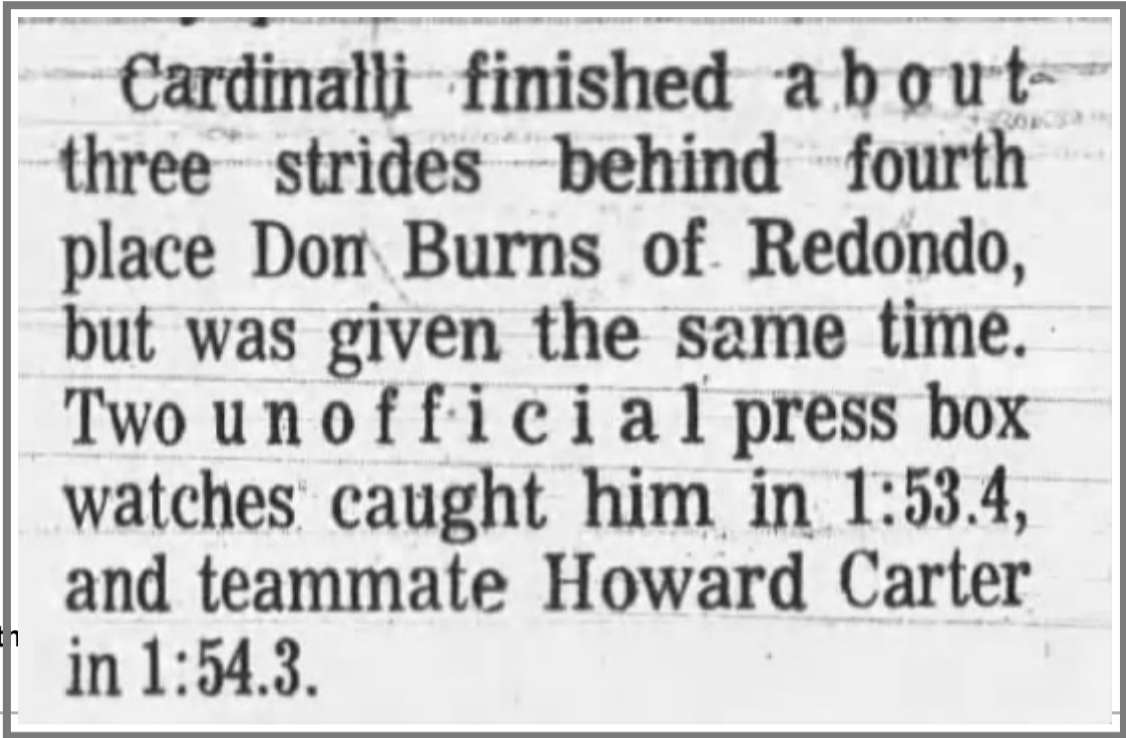


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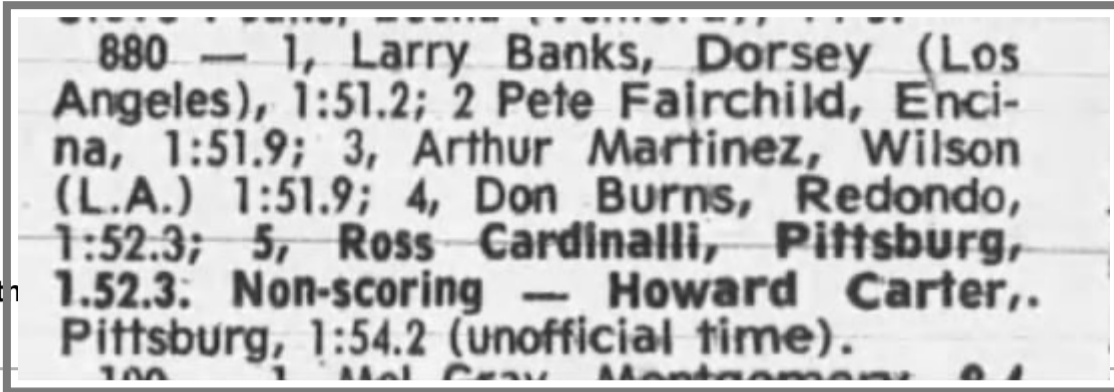

Proctor's Triple Leads Muir to State Title

SAN DIEGO — Jerry Proctor won three events as Muir galloped to the team title, but little Mel Gray of Montgomery High of Santa Rosa captured the hearts of the 8,268 fans Saturday in the 49th annual California State High School track and field championships at Balboa Stadium.

It was no contest in the team category as Walter Opp's Mustangs compiled 26 points to far outdistance second-place Montgomery (16) in a record-shattering meet which produced two national interscholastic marks and six CIF standards. One national record also was equaled.

Gray, a football "fugitive" who will perform at Los Angeles this fall in the Shrine North-South grid classic, accounted for one of the national marks, clicking off a fantastic 20.7 in the 220 around a curve. The old record was 20.9, held by three athletes, among them Jimmy Hines, star of Friday night's Coliseum-Compton Relays.

Hines, who attends Texas Southern, set the mark in 1964 while a student at McClymonds High of Oakland.

Gray's other victory—which tied the national record—came in the 100 at 9.4 seconds. Bill Gaines of Clearview High, Mullica Hill, N.J., has a 9.3 pending recognition.

In both events, Gray outlegged the favorite, Dave Masters of El Cerrito. Gray had run against Masters several times this season, and had not been able to beat him.

Masters' times in the 100 and 220 were 9.5 and 20.9, normally good enough to win either event by a sizeable margin.

In his last competitive appearance for Muir, Proctor was at his best. He won the high hurdles in 13.7 (a CIF record), the lows in 18.7 (a national record) and the long jump with a 25-4½ on his first

leap. This effort tied the CIF record, but was short of Jerry's pending 25-7 national record.

The 5-9, 150-pound youngster became only the third athlete in CIF history to win three events in the State meet.

Interestingly, the "triples" each came 20 years apart. Glendale's Frank Wykoff won the 100, 220 and long jump in 1927 and Hugh McElhenny of L.A. Washington won both hurdles and the long jump in 1947.

Opp was lavish in his praise of Proctor, who is bound for the University of Redlands.

"He has to be the greatest," he said. "Sure, he won the hurdles and long jump in fine fashion, but what impressed me most was his effort in the relay after competing in three events. It was a real

State champion Wayne Collett was beaten by Mike Newton of Whittier. Newton's time was 47.2.

It was the third State title for Muir, which also won in 1935 and 1936.

Proctor Sparks Muir; Centennial Hopes Fade

SAN DIEGO — Muir's sensational Jerry Proctor won his heat in both hurdle events and led the field in the long jump as expected but that was about the only thing that ran true to form at the 49th annual California state high school track and field championships at Balboa Stadium Friday.

Walt Opp's Mustangs, behind the versatile Proctor, were pre-meet co-favorites with Centennial—the Southern Section titlists, but wound up having the field virtually to themselves when the Apaches faded badly in preliminary events.

Centennial was able to gather only three qualifiers for the finals, which get under way at noon today. Muir, meanwhile, showed unexpected strength by getting sprinter Howard Williams (9.77) into the 100 finals and Eddie Howard (62-1) in the shot put.

Best Under Pressure

And, of course, Opp has the favorite in three events with the indefatigable Proctor who seemingly can run all day. The lithe, 5-10, 150 pounder, seems to improve as the pressure mounts.

Proctor did 139 in the highs, 18.8 in the lows and an effortless 25-3 in his specialty. Jerry is the national inter-scholastic recordholder in the long jump at 25-7.

Jeter Challenges

His 18.8 will also be submitted as a national record bettering the mark of 18.9 set by Mel Renfro (Jefferson, Portland) in 1960. Gardena's Mike Jeter, who will be pushing Proctor in the hurdles today, also has an 18.8 pending. Jeter coasted to victories in 13.9 and 19.0, and will be ready to give Proctor his stiffest of his career.

In all, Muir qualified six for the final go-around leading all schools in that category. Fremont of Los Angeles was next with five qualifiers.

It was an afternoon of upsets most notably the collapse of a Centennial team which figured to push Muir down to the relay. Centennial's fine sprinter, Nathan Spann, ran fifth in both his 100 and 220 heats, Spann was the Southern Section 100 champion in 9.6, and was runnerup in the 220.

Veal Fails

Also, Apache hurdler John Veal failed to get as high as third in the 120 and 180s, and this knocked Centennial completely out of the title picture.

Other startling reversals included the failure of Gardena's Wayne Collett to crack the low hurdles grid and the inability of Rubidoux's Victor Dias — with a season's best of 15-5 — to clear 13-6 and enter the pole vault finals.

Collett was noticeably tired after having won his 440 heat in 48.3 and had scarcely 15 minutes before the hurdles race. It was a tough double and Collett was never a factor in the lows.

Speedy Dave Masters of El Cerrito shared star billing with Proctor by clocking a sizzling 9.5 in the 100 and 20.9 in the 220 around a curve.

His time in the 220 equalled the national interscholastic record and his 100 mark tied the CIF standard.

The Proctor story—for Friday that is—wound up in the relay where Jerry anchored Muir to a 1:26.6 heat victory. It may be a different story, however, when Muir goes against the Centennial quartet which ran the Mustangs into the ground while blazing to a 1:26.0 win in the Southern Section finals.

Muir hopes to have things wrapped up well before the relay, though. Jerry Proctor's last day as a prep track competitor should be a memorial one.

Muir, Proctor Take State

SAN DIEGO — Led by Jerry Proctor's triple triumph, that included two meet and one national interscholastic record smashing performances, Muir High School of Pasadena Saturday captured the 49th California Interscholastic Federation track and field championship with 26 points.

As great as Proctor was, he had to share individual honors with an unsung sprinter from Santa Rosa's Montgomery High named Mel Gray.

Gray shocked the crowd of 8268 fans at Balboa Stadium by cracking the national interscholastic record for the 220 around a turn with a 20.7 sizzler and equalling the 34-year old U.S. prep 100 record of 9.4.

Both victories were upsets. He whipped Dave Masters of El Cerrito, the blond bullet to whom he had lost to 10 times out of 12 meetings, including seven straight outdoors this season.

ENOUGH

Proctor personally accounted for 19 of Muir's 26 points, enough to have won the team title without any help.

He won the 120-yard high hur-

dles over a great field by three yards in 13.7, one tick faster than the old mark set by San Fernando's Bill Persons and Monrovia's Dick Miller in 1965.

Jerry returned later to beat Gardena High's sensational Mike Jeter to the tape in the 180 lows in the national interscholastic record breaking time of 18.7.

After running a 21.4 third leg on Muir's second place 880 relay team, Proctor concluded his day's work in the long jump with a best of 25-4-1/2. This tied the old state meet mark set by Monte Upshaw of Piedmont in 1954.

He was pitted against Gray in a head-to-head encounter in the long jump, whipping the great Santa Rosa Athlete by 14 1/4 inches.

Gray's second place 24-1 1/4 in the long jump gave all of Montgomery's 16-point total, good for runner-up honors.

FANTASTIC

"He's something that borders on the fantastic," said Muir coach Walter Opp in commenting on Proctor's spectacular performances.

"He has to be rated as one of the best track athletes ever produced in this state," Opp added. "He came back today

with these great performances after turning in feats of 13.9, 18.8 and 25-3 in trials yesterday."

"I knew I had to do my best," Proctor said. "I felt we needed the points. That inspired me."

Reedley's disappointed Peter Romero added his name to the state meet record book by taking the two mile with some 80 yards to spare in 9:00.5.

"I was a little disappointed with my time," Romero said. "I wanted to break nine minutes today."

Whittier grabbed third place with 12 points on a pair of victories by Mike Newton in the 440 (47.2) and John Buehler in the shot (65-3 1/2).

L.A. City champion Fremont and 1966 state titlest L.A.'s Dorsey High shared fourth place with 10 points each. Gardena wound up sixth with nine.

BLAZING BURST

Fremont scored one of several upsets when Daniel Moore put on a blazing burst of speed in the final 50 yards to overtake Muir's Howard Williams to give the Pathfinders the 880 relay in a swift 1:26.0.

His mates were James Bryd, John Smith and Clarence Alexander.

Larry Banks of Dorsey came on like gangbusters in the final 120 yards to score a stunning upset victory in the 880.

He clocked 1:51.2, his personal best by 1.6 seconds and third fastest winning time in CIF meet history.

Tom Reynolds of Morningside soared 14-10 for a surprise triumph in the pole vault.

Perhaps, the most startling upset of them all was Renaldo Brown's victory in the high jump at 6-9 1/2. The 6-2, 190-pound Compton athlete is only a

Four from area in state

SAN DIEGO — There were a number of startling results Friday night at the San Diego Section CIF track and field track, but the Inland North County fans the spotlight centered on four area athletes who qualified for the state meet.

Falling to pursue a berth in last year's state championships, a crowd of 6,248 fans at Balboa Stadium saw Mike Quirk (Orange Glen High School), Len Thompson (Orange Glen), Paul Lawton (San Marcos) and Bruce Burdick (Fallbrook) all gain tickets to the dream meet—billed for this same oval last weekend (June 23).

Although the fans failed to claim a blue ribbon, each placed second in the victory stand and were just a shade behind the top performer in their respective events.

In the varsity 120-yard high hurdles, Doug Jones of Lincoln led from the third hurdle and maintained that margin for a winning time of 14.1, while Thompson was also clocked in 14.5—gaining second place over teammate Quirk in the final three yards.

Thompson was a yard behind Quirk when they cleared the final hurdle, but Thompson put on a burst of speed and lunged for the tape to take second.

However, Quirk was to gain

his berth in the state championships in the 100 laws, logging his career-best of 20.8 for the distance. James King of Hemet won the event in 20.4.

Lawton, coming in the 20 dash on the 300 level, came from fourth place in the last 75 yards for a 22.8 second place clocking — Randy Bennett of Brea taking the blue ribbon in 22.6.

Burdick came through with probably the most stunning "victory" when he placed second in the varsity pole vault via a jump of 12 feet. Dave Stewart of Mt. Miguel was the event at 14 feet.

Three other runners also cleared 12 feet, including Quirk,

but Burdick was his best on five misses at a lower height.

In other highlights, the meet's biggest upset came in the varsity mile where heavily favored Armando Valencia of El Cajon failed to make it to the state meet—placing third in a disputed race.

There Bigley (Claremont) won the mile in 4:16.8, while Lloyd Apper (Lincoln) placed second. On the final lure, Valencia suddenly veered into the infield of the track when Bigley passed him and it wasn't until 13 minutes after the event had been completed that the judges ruled there was no foul. Valencia contended that he was pushed off the track by Bigley, however.

In other news, Lincoln made a clean sweep of the varsity, 100 and 100 hurdles, with Orange Glen placing a strong fourth via 100 yards in varsity competition.

Another dispute arose when CIF commissioner Don Clarkson stated the district would not count in the final point standings. While Lincoln won the varsity district with 38 points, Monte Vista placed second with an "official" 38 markers.

However, Monte Vista possessed seven points in the district and would have had 28 points in a final tally had the points been counted. Coach Bob Larnes of Monte Vista said Clarkson had told him up

Jim Penrose Gains State Discus Finals

SAN DIEGO — Two SPAL athletes qualified for tonight's finals of the California State high school track and field championships here Friday night, but Sequoia's Charles Johnson was not one of them.

While Carlmont's Jim Penrose qualified fourth in the discus and Gunn pole vaulter Ken Weed cleared the 13-6 qualifying height, Johnson — who had the third best long jump mark in the state this year with a 24-7½ effort — did not make the 12-man cutoff list.

Johnson's 22-3 — he went over 24 feet four times last week in

winning the CCS meet — placed him 17th behind top-qualifier Jerry Proctor of Muir, who recorded a 25-3, four inches off his national prep record.

Penrose tossed the discus 172-3½ and is within range of Mark Ostoich of San Bernadino, the top qualifier at 177-7. Penrose uncorked a 178-5 heave last week.

Carlmont's other entrant, sophomore two-miler Chris Carey, gets his chance tonight as all the eight-lappers go at once. There was no qualifying in the two-mile.

Palo Alto's Jon Enscoe, who placed sixth in the mile last sea-

son, was boxed in on his home-stretch drive and did not qualify in his specialty although recording a 4:19.9.

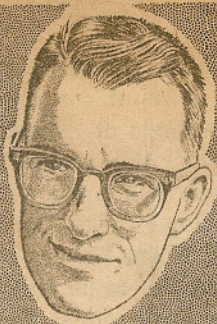
Paly's Bill Respini (880) and Mark Daley (high jump), Sequoia's Jim Portman (high hurdles), Cubberley's Bob Evers (highs) and Penrose in the shot put also failed to qualify.

Proctor was the headliner, as he also qualified first in the hurdles, including an 18.8 in the 180 lows.

Northern California's banner was carried by Dave Masters of El Cerrito, who tied the national prep standard with a 20.9 220 effort and qualified first in the 100 with a 9.5.

Penrose qualified in both the discus and shot put and Portman in the 120 high hurdles.

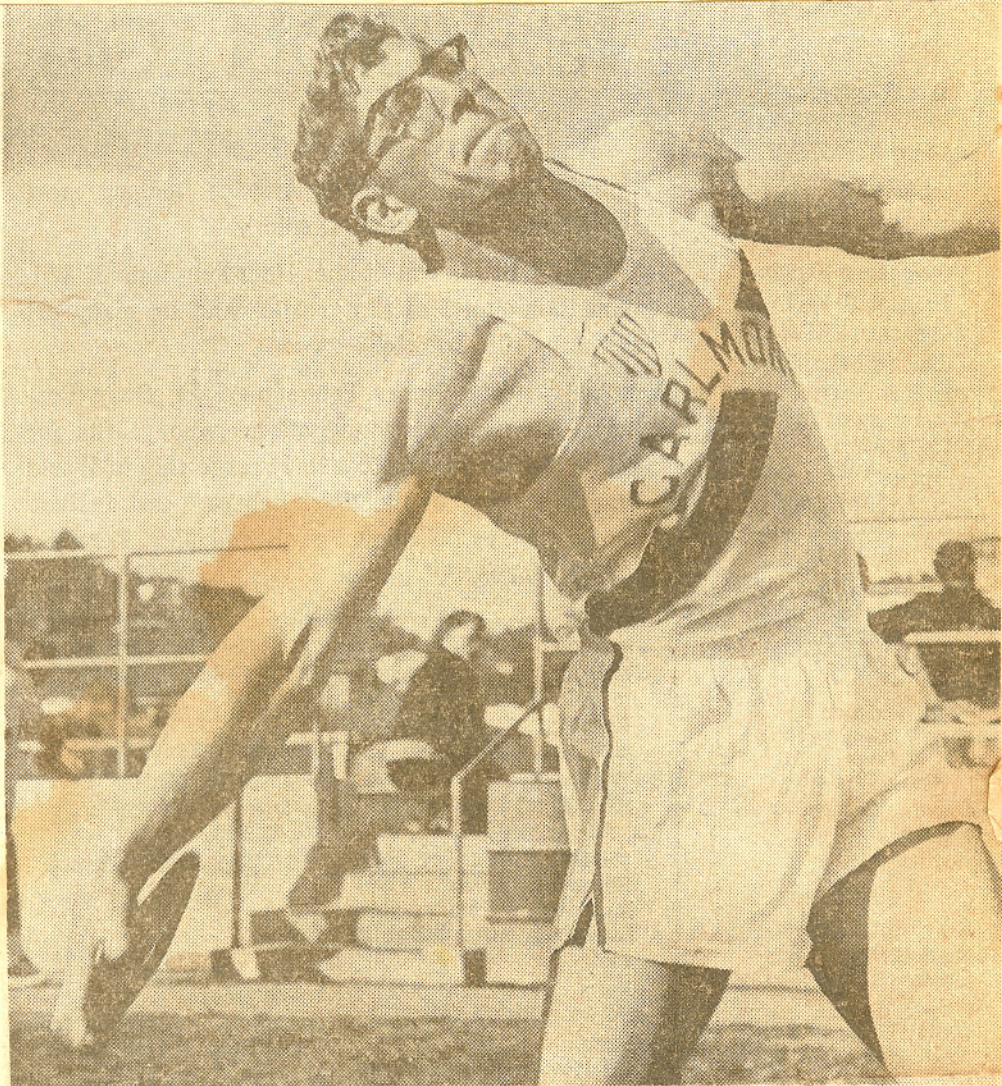

State Prep Track:

Next Year at Stanford

SAN DIEGO — The golden anniversary state track meet will be held at Stanford Stadium in 1968 and it will be a miracle if that one can match the 49th edition held at Balboa Stadium here Saturday.

Two national prep records were broken, one was tied and seven meet marks were smashed in a spectacular show of speed.

Jerry Proctor, a slender 150-pounder from Muir High School in Pasadena was the big record-breaker. He became the first prep in 20 years to win three events in one meet.

Proctor won the high and low hurdles and the broad jump. He set a national mark of 18.7 in the 180 lows and set a meet record of 13.7 in the highs. His other gold medal came in the long jump, which he won at 25-4½, which ties a meet record.

Mel Gray of Santa Rosa's

Montgomery High set the other national record with a 20.7 performance in the 220.

Mid-Peninsulans in the meet accounted for two seconds, two fourths and a sixth.

The runners-up were Steve Wilhelm of Sunnyvale and Jim Penrose of Carlmont. Wilhelm did a lifetime best of 65-0 in the shot, 3¼ inches short of the winning put of John Buehler of Whittier.

Penrose provided an upset when he beat Steve Davis of Los Altos in the discus. Penrose threw 176-1½ to 173-4 for Davis, but neither was able to beat Fred DeBernardi of Hart High, who hit 178-2 on his second-to-last throw.

Junior Bernie Lahde of St. Francis finished 13th in the two-mile. Sophomore Chris Carey of Carlmont was tenth.

Carey, the Scots' sophomore flash, was clocked at 9:29.9 for the eight-lap event.

Penrose, a junior threw the

platter 178-5 in the Central Coast qualifying meet and had an effort of over 180 ft. in warm-ups at San Diego.

Sequoia's two-man delegation of Charlie Johnson and Jim Portman did a respectable job in representing the Tribe.

Johnson finished 17th in the 40-tran field in the long jump with a leap of 22-10. Johnson took only four jumps in competition after aggravating a pulled muscle.

Portman was fourth in the fastest qualifying heat in the high hurdles in 14.5.

Proctor's other gold medal came in the broad jump which

he won at 25-4/2. That ties the meet record.

Proctor, who plans to attend Redlands University this fall, won the team title almost single-handedly. Muir had 26 points and Proctor's three firsts accounted for 18 of them.

Proctor also ran a blazing third leg on the 880-yard relay team but the Mustangs couldn't hold off Fremont of Los Angeles in the anchor leg and finished second.

Mel Gray, a muscular senior from Montgomery in Santa Rosa, also accounted for a pair of meet records.

Gray nipped nemesis Dave Masters of El Cerrito in the

100 yard dash in 9.4. That tied the national prep record for the distance and broke the meet record of 9.5.

Gray came back to meet Masters again in the 220 and this time he broke the national prep mark with a 20.7 clocking. It, of course, was also a meet record.

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The runners-up were big Steve Wilhelm of Fremont in Sunnyvale and Jim Penrose of Carlmont.

Wilhelm did a best of life 65-0 in the shot but that was 3/4 inches shy of the winning throw of John Buehler of Whittier.

Penrose accounted for an upset when he beat Steve Davis of Los Altos in the discus. Penrose threw 176-1/2 to 173-4 for Davis. But neither was able to beat Fred De Bernardi of Hart who hit 178-2 on his second to last throw.

Manny Mahon, a junior from Lynbrook, finished fourth in the mile with a best-of-life time of 4:17.6.

The winner of the four-lapper was Mike Solomos of Westminister who Mahon beat in the trials Friday. His time was 4:11.4.

Sprinter Brad Lyman of Los Altos missed out in both the 100 and 220. He ran a strong race in

the 220 with a time of 21.5 but still finished eighth. In the 100 he was ninth after a slow start.

Junior Bernie Lahde of St. Francis finished 13th in the two-mile and sophomore Chris Carey of Carlmont was 10th.

The two area pole vaulters in the finals — Steve Peterson of Cupertino and Ken Weed of Gunn — barely missed a medal. Peterson cleared 13-6 on his first try and Weed made it on his second. Neither could clear 14-0 feet although both have done it this season.

Broad jumper Grady Rogers of Homestead hurt his foot and could do no better than 22-6/2 which was good for 10th place.

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
