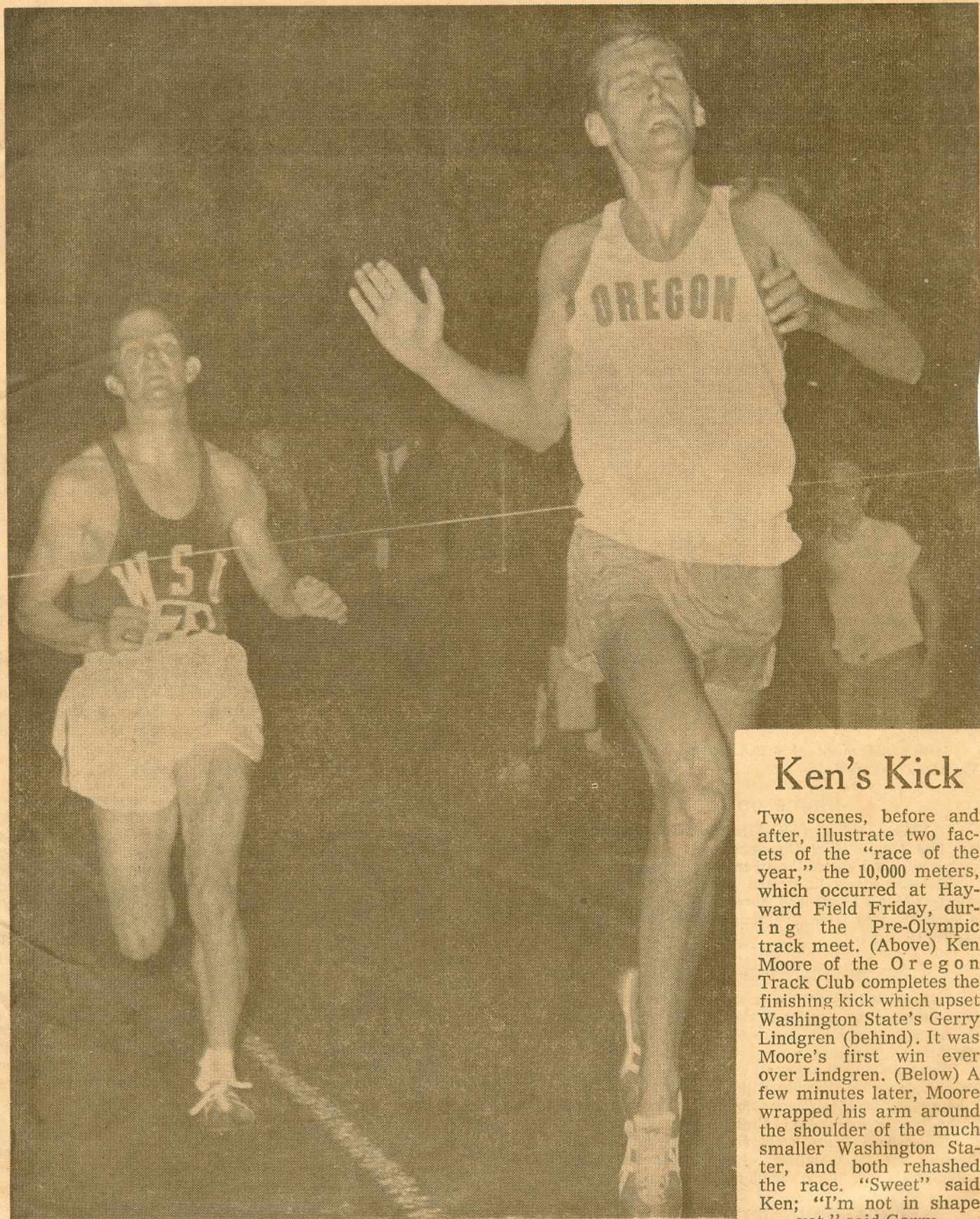

Moore, Gerry Shove 'Big Four' Into Wings

It takes a heap of something to shove Jim Ryun, Neal Steinhauer, Gary Knoke and Harry Jerome into the background.

But that "something" — consisting of Ken Moore and Gerry Lindgren — did exactly that in front of some 8,000 frenzied spectators in the Pre-Olympic track and field meet at Hayward Field Friday night.

In the last glimmer of twilight before complete darkness enveloped the covered stands, scantily illuminated by some portable lights rigged up along the walls. The aroused fans screamed, applauded and stamped their feet as Moore and Lindgren engaged in what has to be one of the most sensational distance race duels in the long history of Hayward Field.

At the finish of the 10,000-meter run, it was Moore breaking the tape first after a furious sprint that saw him wrest the lead from Lindgren in the backstretch of the final lap.

Moore, from the Oregon Track Club, was clocked in 28:54.9 — the fastest 10,000 meters ever on Hayward Field — while Lindgren, Washington State's "Spokane Sparrow," was less than two yards back in 28:55.1.

"That has to be, without a doubt, the distance run of the year," said Bob Tracy from St. Cloud State in Minnesota, one of the track coaches working with the Olympic hopefuls from the U.S. Olympic Committee's altitude testing camp at South Lake Tahoe, Calif.

Few would disagree with him. Certainly not the spectators left limp by the down-to-the-wire thriller.

"It was like filling an inside straight the hard way . . . at night and on that kind of track," smiled Tracy.

The Hayward Field cinder track, soaked by the all-day rain, was soft and slow. Excellent times or marks generally were the exception rather than the rule as the athletes complained of difficulty in getting good traction in the soggy footing.

Yet, the meet didn't lack for great competitive performances by the Olympic hopefuls engaged in their last low-altitude meet prior to the final trials Sept. 9-17 at Tahoe. Nor was there a lack of upsets.

In the 400-meter intermediate hurdles, Gary Knoke of Australia (and Oregon) inflicted the first loss of the season on American's Ron Whitney, rated the No. 1 intermediate hurdler in the world. Knoke, going out fast to a 10-yard lead that Whitney found insurmountable at the finish, won in 50.3 to Whitney's 50.6.

In the 400 meters, Ron Freeman of Arizona State came up with a strong finish on the inside lane to beat San Jose State's favored Lee Evans, 46.2 to 46.5.

And in the triple jump, Dave Smith of the Athens Athletic Club (Oakland-Berkeley) bumped American record-holder Art Walker back into second place by five inches, 50-8½ to 50-3¼.

While there was no upset in the mile—world record-holder Jim Ryun won in what, was to him, a disappointing 3:59.0—the biggest excitement was sparked by Villanova freshman Martin Liquori, who refused to give in to Ryun's famed kick in the

backstretch and raced him all the way to the tape. Liquori ended up with the second sub-four-minute mile of his young career, and an all-time best of 3:59.3.

And then, of course, there was ex-Oregon Duck Neal Steinhauer, uncorking for a 65-2¾ effort on his first attempt, then improving to 65-3 as he continued his shot putting comeback from a back injury . . . and Harry Jerome, the ex-Duck who recently made the Canadian Olympic team for the third time, winning the 100-meter dash in 10.3.

But all of these fine performances paled under the Moore-Lindgren finale.

It was Lindgren's show for the first three miles. He took the lead early and kept up the pace-setting, with Lou Scott of Detroit, Mich., and Jack Bachelor of Florida close behind. Everyone knew that Gerry, the machine that runs like a man, had to run the six-mile, 376-yard race in less than 29 minutes to meet the Olympic qualifying standard.

Moore, meanwhile, was virtually a forgotten man. Running his own pace, the North Eugene High and UO grad trailed the leaders by some 60 to 70 yards at the two-mile mark.

But shortly after the halfway point, Moore began closing the gap. He closed first on Scott, then a ways back in third place. Moore finally passed Scott, who dropped out later with stomach cramps.

Within less than a mile, the lanky Moore—who only six days earlier clinched an Olympic berth by placing second in the marathon trials—had paved a 20-yard deficit to a mere four behind the tiny (5-6) Lindgren and the tall (6-6) Bachelor. Soon it was Lindgren-Moore-Bachelor close together.

The excitement was electric. The spectators kept up a steady roar for their hometown hero. With three laps to go, Moore tried to pass Lindgren, but the plucky Cougar held him off.

And it was still Lindgren-Moore, with Bachelor close behind, as the gun lap began. Moore and Lindgren streaked side by side down the backstretch, Moore pulling ahead just before the final turn. Momentarily, Lindgren appeared as if he might close the gap, but Moore was driving and he led all the way to the tape —by no more than a yard or two—to conquer Lindgren for the first time. Moore ran his final lap in 56 or 57 seconds.

Both runners were ecstatic once they'd looked at the clock and realized they had successfully surpassed the Olympic standard. (Bachelor, normally a 5,000-meters runner, did, too, with a 28:58.9 clocking his first 10,000 venture ever.)

As they jogged around the track, besieged within seconds by autograph-seekers, Gerry yelled at Ken: "That was a good one."

"This one is sweet," Moore answered back.

"I'm not in shape yet," Lindgren panted.

"I'll accept that," Moore smiled. And with that, they kept jogging as the crowd gave them a standing ovation.

The way Moore related it afterward, his success was founded on running 70-second laps, even while Lindgren and the others were building up a big lead with swifter lap times. "Bill (Bowerman) was pretty stern with me. He told me just to run 70s and not fool around. The plan worked beautifully."
