

GEORGE YOUNG WINS AAU MARATHON CHAMPIONSHIP AND OLYMPIC TRIAL

Alamosa, Colo.--George L. Young, of Casa Grande, Arizona, won the combined National AAU Marathon Championship and Olympic Trial staged at Alamosa, Colorado, at 3 p.m. on August 18th. The prevailing altitude of the marathon run-off was 7,540 feet, almost identical to Mexico City. The weather, however, was a bright sunshiny day, not unduly warm.

Some 129 entries started off on the 5.2 mile loop precisely at 3 p.m. after an opening prayer by the Reverend Douglas Uhls, Presbyterian Pastor from Alamosa, Colorado.

The opening shot of the race was accented by a special color guard from Dickey Springer American Legion Post of Alamosa, as approximately 3,000 people hovered near the starting line.

Canon shots echoed in the rear and the race was on. The first lap was finished in a blistering time with Irish Marathoner Pat McMahon and Garry Garcia from Eastern New Mexico braking the first lap at 28:13. Close behind was Kerry Pearce, an Australian running out of the University of Texas at El Paso, Ken Moore from the Oregon track club, Eugene, Oregon, George L. Young of Casa Grande, Arizona; Captain Billy Mills of the USMC, Eamon O'Reilly of California, Norbert Sander of Yonkers, N.Y., Hal Higdon, Michigan City, Indiana; and Wayne Van Dellen, of Woodlake,

California, the previous year Alamosa marathon winner at 29:27. The first eleven were bunched well. However the huge field was already strung out nearly a mile and a half at this point.

Among the last to pass the first lap was the number one entry, 57 year old Dr. T.C. Pearce, from Redfield, Iowa.

The second lap was still a blistering affair with Kenneth Moore moving into the lead with a time of 57.38. Close behind was Kerry Pearce and Pat McMahon with Gary Garcia beginning to give just a little. Running well were young Mills, Sander and Steve Mathews.

The third lap saw Pearce take the lead back from Moore and turned the corner in one hour 28 minutes and 32 seconds. Moore was in at 1:29:42, J. Crandall was third and young was running fourth with Pat McMahon, an early leader, dropping to fourth with Garcia, dropping completely out of sight. This was the last lap for Billy Mills, and Ambrose Burfoot, the winner of the Boston Marathon, both whom suffered from stomach cramps. The mortality rate was reaching astonishing proportions at this time.

The fourth lap saw Kenneth Moore move back into the lead with a time of one hour, 58 minutes and 3 seconds. George Young was running in second, James Colpitts moved briefly into third with Evan Smith, Larry Boies and Steve Matthews followed by Captain Bill Clark of the USMC.

During the fifth lap, several position changes were made, and some were phenomenal as Young finished the last lap well ahead of the second place finisher Ken Moore.

Young finished with a time of 2 hours 30 minutes, and 43 seconds, breaking the previous record held by Hayne Van Dellen of 2:39.51.

Kenneth Moore of Eugene, Oregon, finished in second place timed at 2:31:47, and running well at the finish. The third place finisher was Ron "Old Folks" Daws, Pan Am Trial winner who coasted home in good shape with a time of 2:33:09. The fourth place finisher was Robert Deines who beat out Steve Mathews in a time of 2:33.13. Mathews, of Denver, Colorado, who had won the marathon in Alamosa two years before with a time of 2:45 came home in 1968 with a time of 2:33:17.

Ed Winrow, who could not finish the marathon in 1967 came in 6th, Nick Kitt was 7th, Doug Wiebe was 8th, Bill Clark was 9th and Jeffrey Reneau at 10th rounded out the best ten distance men in America.

Only 63 people finished the grueling race. The last place finisher across the string was R. Kirkpatrick of the University of Colorado who came through with a time of 3:58:54.

The clocks were kept open until every runner cleared the course, because championships were also determined...

The team championships went to Twin Cities, T. C. represented by Daws, Heinenon and Smith. Second place team standing went to the Southern California striders represented by Deines, Kitt, Husuark. Third place went to the Denver Track Club represented by Mathews, Godwin and Pierson.

At the awards banquet held later that night some seventy awards were handed to the runners for their tremendous effort.

At the banquet some twenty individual commercial awards were presented by AOTPC Coordinator Buddy Edelen, to the top twenty finishers. Some six special Commercial prizes were also awarded from the merchants of Alamosa, Colorado....12 USOC plaques were awarded to worthy individuals, plus five individual trophies for individual runners, three team trophies, 9 in dividual team medals, and 4 AAU patches.

Hilmer Lodge, Chairman of the USOC Track and Field team in conjunction with Ted Hayden and Mike Potanova of the AAU Long Distance Committee, in conjunction with Aldo Scandduraa, indicated "That this was one of the most tremendous marathon runoffs that we have ever seen in the United States or in the Olympics." Captain Billy Mills and other runners of note indicated that this was an extremely well run, and colorful celebration.



Formerly one of the outstanding marathon distance runners in the world, Edelen has clocked a time of 2 hours, 14 minutes and 28 seconds to rank among the fastest distance runners of all time. He was the number one marathon man in the 1964 Tokyo Olympics where he finished 6th in world competition. This finish for an American was the highest in nearly two decades.

The personable young man is employed on the faculty of Adams State College as an instructor in the Field of Psychology. He is one of many citizens of the San Luis Valley that has worked diligently the past three years to help bring today's event and high altitude training into existence.







The final trial for the United States Olympic Team marathon representatives was held at Alamosa, Colorado on 18 August. The 7500 altitude took its toll as only 68 of 129 starters finished. The nonfinishers themselves make an interesting story, but more on them later. SBAC was represented by John Van Manen, Bill Anderson, Jose Dones, and Gabe Petroni; all trained extensively at high altitude for the weeks previous to the race.

The race was won by steeplechase-5000m specialist George Young in 2:30:48. It was, to our knowledge, Young's first marathon. Just why Young, who is undefeated at either of his specialties for the past 8 or so races, risked injury by running the marathon is beyond us. Short of a broken leg or similar catastrophe, he is as assured an Olympic berth as anyone could be with less than a month to go before the final track and field trials. No matter though, he did it and thus proves himself to be one of the great versatile runners competing today.

Second place was taken by Ken Moore, who was 59 seconds behind Young. Moore led a good deal of the race, but was passed by Young at 22 miles. Although Moore, who is the present AAU cross-country champion, is primarily interested in the 10,000m event, he has run a 2:25 marathon before. The Alamosa race apparently did him little harm, as he beat Gerry Lindgren six days later at 10,000m in Eugene, Oregon.

The next three finishers were extremely close with Ron Daws at 2:32:08, Bob Deines at 2:32:11, and Steve Matthews at 2:32:14. At the time, these three must have thought they were battling for the third (and last) slot on the marathon squad so the final miles must have been brutal. As it turns out, neither Young nor Moore will run the marathon in Mexico City if they qualify for the team in their main events so it appears that Deines for sure and probably Matthews will make the trip. Congratulations!

The race went as many predicted: the leaders went out too fast and unwound near the end. In fact, most of the 57 nonfinishers really came unglued between 15 and 20 miles and just couldn't face the prospect of a final 5.2 mile lap. Undoubtedly, several of the finishers ended near the top of the list because they used their heads and ran a nearly even pace--more power to them.

The SBAC runners finished pretty much together, but unfortunately out of the money. Van Manen was 24th in 2:50:21, Dones 25th in 2:52:43, Petroni 27th in 2:53:55, and Anderson 48th in 3:15:00. Our team finished 5th, behind Twin Cities, S.C. Striders, Denver, and Millrose.

Santa Barbara had three very successful all-comers meets this summer, thanks to assistant UCSB track coach John Luccio, Ed Ware of the Recreation Department and numerous volunteer officials. Sandwiched in with these meets were two Neighborhood Olympic meets for teenagers. The latter program, which came out of the governor's office in Sacramento, was poorly coordinated and was announced too late with inadequate publicity. The Santa Barbara group did a tremendous job, but neither the quality or quantity of competition possible was present.

The final all-comers meet was notable for the presence of coach Mihaly Igloi and a dozen of his runners. Although they won about every event that they entered, the two mile was outstanding: Ole Oleson and Dennis Savage ran together for 7 laps until Oleson, with a 60 second last lap, sped to an 8:43:9 victory over Densis in 8:50.5. Gary Tuttle of SBAC edged Russell Brail in 9:09 for third. Brennand and Cavaletto were the last runners not lapped and finished in 9:57 and 10:03. Dennis's time was 13 seconds better than his previous fastest, set earlier this summer; he has never been stronger. The old 2 mile record was 9:01.5 by SBAC's Mike Kimball.

Sunday, 25 August we ran the Santa Monica 6 miler. It was nearly a repeat performance of the 2 mile with Oleson 1st, George Husaruk 2nd (both in 30:05), and Dennis 3rd in 30:11. Tuttle was 8th in 31:16, Dale Severy was 16th in 32:40, Brennand 19th in 33:01, Van Manen 20th in 33:08, Larry Pontinen 21st in 33:36, and a new member, Steve Bushey 56th in 36:11. This was Steve's first race over 2 miles so he did well. There were over a hundred runners.

Returning from an eastern trip recently, the editor stayed with the Mike Kimballs in Akron, Ohio. Mike has again been plagued with sickness—this time pleurisy and a virus. He was just beginning to run again; he was pale, which is due to the Ohio weather, and in reasonably good spirits. Not surprisingly, the Kimballs miss Santa Barbara.

Our big event of the year, Santa Barbara marathon, is coming on 29 September. This time we are hampered because the two best workers are not here—Mike Kimball and Paul Polsky. Between them, they did the most of the fund raising and merchandise award gathering each year. This year our expenses will be up slightly as we have added age group awards in the 40-49, 50-59, and 60 year and up group, but have dropped the award for the oldest finisher. This will be our 4th marathon and it is attracting more and better runners each year. We hope that we can count on your support again this year.

Dear Dick,

I had our publicity director send along the results, but am enclosing this material for your information.

We had what I belive is the best AAU Marathon Championship ever. The Pueblo Citizens Radio Club came over with all their radio mobile units. Radio Constant radio centact was kept on every runner throughout the race. 75 American Legion members helped patrol the course (5 loops of 5.2 miles....385 yrds. at the finish.) We had a very impressive opening cermony, and over 350 people at the awards banquet. All of the runners praised the organization and the way the race was conducted. We had over 40 people on the two refreshment stations each loop.....Fortunately, we also had quite a lot of money in which to put promote this race.

It appears that the walkers have decided to hold their final trials here as well. We don't have much time, but will do the best we can. I guess the arrangements didn't work out too well with them out there.

Keep in touch. It should be an interesting Fall!


