# Quinet to Ace leads jump event

BERKELEY—Homestead High School's Phil Quinet led a field of 20 Central Coast Section qualifiers into today's finals in the 50th State Track and Field Championships at University of California's Edwards Stadium.

Quinet leaped 24-5 in the long jump to carry the top mark in that event into today's finals. The competitive Mustang fouled on his first jump then came up with his 24-5 mark before passing on his last two jumps.

The Homestead athlete has done 25-2 this year and should receive the stiffest competition from Heulon Hewitt of Merced, who went 23-7 Friday but has a 25-10 mark pending.

Centennial High of Compton appeared the team to beat going into the finals. Field events were slated to start at 12:30 p.m. and running events at 2 p.m. The last event was set to start about 4 p.m.

## GARRISON WINS

Centennial's iron man, Edsel Garrison, won qualifying heats in the 100 and 440 and anchored Centennial's mile relay team to the day's best time of 3:15.8, tying a California record.

A crowd estimated at 5-6,000 watched the trials under near-perfect sunny conditions. Only a slight headwind marred the otherwise perfect day.

State Meet veteran Brad Lyman qualified in both sprints. The Los Altos standout ran a 9.9 100 and a 22.0 220 to make his way into the finals.

Los Altos' mile relay team ran its best race of the year with a 3:18.7 clocking, but a poor baton-pass between the No. 2 and No. 3 runners proved costly to the Knights. They finished fourth in their heat.

Knight sophomore Rick Brown, who showed some gutty running in moving up two places on his third leg of the mile relay, qualified in the 880 with a 1:54.5 clocking, fourth best among the nine qualifiers.

Carlmont's Jim Penrose, Homestead's Ralph Show and Belmont's Jon Friestadt all qualified in the discus. Penrose,

Whitfield, a sleek junior, finished eighth in his heats of both the 120 high hurdles and the 180 lows.

On both occasions, Whitfield came off the blocks poorly, and recorded times of 15.1 and 19.8, both of which is well off his season's best.

Lydon also a junior, was among the 15 pole vaulters of an original field of 27 who failed to make the qualifying mark.

The field was cut to 15 vaulters after the 13-foot mark, which Lydon cleared, but the Bearcat missed on three attempts at the 13-6 and now can only look forward to another chance next year.

a State Meet veteran, was second with a 178-5 toss; Show was ninth with a 165-0 effort and Friestadt took 11th with a 162-10 mark.

Rory Kenward of San Marcos of Santa Barbara threw the discus 182-0 to lead qualifiers.

## MAHON QUALIFIES

CCS runners did well in the mile where Lynbrook's Manny Mahon, fourth in the State Meet last year, qualified with a 4:14.0 time, Willow Glen's Jamie Baldwin had a 4:17.8 and St. Ignatius' Klaus Hoffmann was clocked in 4:18.1.

Two CCS lads qualified in the 440 with Frank Hughes of Cupertino taking third in his heat with a 49.0 lap and Sequoia's Darryl White coming in with a 49.5.

Tony Roseland of Pioneer of San Jose was one of 15 over the bar at 13-6 in the pole vault. He was the only CCS vaulter to make the cut.

Though he failed to qualify, Menlo-Atherton's Bill Hatcher turned in a top effort. He was outclassed in the 100 where he ran 10.1, but looked good in the 220 where he barely missed qualifying. His 22.2 mark was the same as the No. 2 and 3 men but he was edged at the tape and finished fourth.

Hatcher's strong finish netted the Bear 440 relay team a fourth in its heat in M-A's best time of 42.6. Homestead's 440 team was a distant seventh despite a fine second leg by Quinet.

The only event that wasn't run Friday was the two mile where Burlingame's Steve Sofos, Carlmont's Chris Carey and Mills' Arvid Kretz represent the CCS.

## SPECIAL RACES

Special exhibition events today included a triple jump, a 330 intermediate hurdles race, a 2000-meter steeplechase and a sprint-medley relay.

The last CCS discus winner was Bruce Naglee of Bellarmine in 1965. Penrose and Show have both been over 180 and could come up with a winning toss.

In the long jump, Quinet stood a chance of becoming the first CCS athlete to ever capture a gold medal in the event.

Mike Ryan was the last CCS runner to capture the mile, turning the trick in 1964 for Santa Clara with a 4:11.2 time.

### South Ace Threat for Triple Title

Serving notice he may make the 50th Annual State Prep Track Championships his personal plaything, Centennial of Compton's Edesel Garrison yesterday finished a winner in three events in three-hour-plus competition in the trials at Edwards Stadium.

The Centennial flash and a bevy of other prep aces will go for broke in today's finals, beginning on the Edwards facilities at 12:30—and running through the mile relay gun, signaling the last event at 4:05.

Willie White's Berkeley quartet, a bit up-tight in the third heat of the trials, came home second in 3:20.5, enough to get them into the last act today although they'll need a far better showing to win any award.


"No good—they just went to sleep out there," answered White, assessing the performance of Ken Frank, Wayne Brown, Kermit Bayless and James Gordon. Frank, running under the gun for only his second time, didn't get loose—but Brown, Bayless and Gordon got the job done, the hard way.

A flickering finish by Terry Danshy caught Gordon and gave first place in the heat to Santa Monica. Other heat winners were Centennial (3:15.8) and L.A. Fremont (3:18.0), with Garrison's punch at the end making the Centennial outfit an awesome favorite entering today's finals.

Energetic Edesel won the third heat of the century in 9.8 and his pet, the 440 dash, in 47.5, the same time he posted in his sectional and better than anyone else in the meet has done. It is the 100 that could keep him from becoming the fifth prep to cop a triple crown, the latest, Jerry Proctor at San Diego last year.

South High in Bakersfield's Ken Jones won his heat in 9.7 to edge Willie Deckard, who went in with the best qualifying mark of 9.6 and could still be the guy to beat. El Cerrito's Billy Walker finished seventh in his heat.

Castlemont's Billie (The) Kidd won his heat of the century in 9.8, flaming the finish to

"Did you see what Centennial did?" exclaimed White. The Compton foursome of Jack Hilgreth, Bob McCall, Vince Buford and Edesel Garrison ran 3:15.8 for the best qualifying mark of the day.

White indicated that the first two BHS runners, Ken Frank and Wayne Brown "tightened

up a little." But after thinking for a second he retorted, "they tightened up a lot."


After the first lap, the Jackets were last and at the conclusion of the second circuit they were eighth out of nine teams.

Kerry Hampton, San Francisco's best ever prep hurdler, is just full of surprises.

The hustling Poly high stepper went into yesterday's qualifying heats for the 1968 CIF State Track Championship at Berkeley's Edwards Stadium a definite underdog to the South's contingent of mercurial entries. He did figure to qualify, but not in as grand a style as he did.

Going into the meet Hampton's best was a 14.1, an AAA record which he clocked during the All-City Trials and tied in the league meet. This is a fine time, especially by San Francisco prep standards, but it hardly matched the 13.8s attained by several southern entries.

**STIFFEST TEST**

Yet the husky athlete rose to the occasion against the toughest competition he's ever met to clock another 14.1, this time against a stiff headwind, for the fastest time of the day. He won his heat when favorite Lowell competitor clocked 14.5. The closest clocking of the day to Hampton's came in another heat with favorite Lowell Harris of Marin's Terra Linda was timed in 14.3.

But Hampton was only half done. He came back to win another hurdles heat, this time the 180 lows, in 19.3. The strong headwinds hampered most of the short sprint times. When the finals got underway today Hampton was firmly planted in the role of favorite, instead of the underdog role he figured to play.

As per usual, however, Hampton's feats were overshadowed by the heroics of entries from the southland.

One incredible case in point is that of Centennial's Edesel Garrison. The Apache started his afternoon by bucking the breezes for a heat winning 9.8 in the 100-yard dash. In that same

heat, San Francisco's lanky Andy Watkins qualified with a 9.9.

**GREAT ANCHOR**

Garrison later uncorked a fine 47.2 anchor leg in the mile relay to pace the Apache foursome to a state best of 3:15.8. That same school, in the thick of point grabbing in today's finals, also qualified its 440 relay squad with a phenomenal 41.5.

Leaping Heulon Hewitt of Merced qualified easily in his specialty, the long jump, with the afternoon's second best distance of 23-7/4. To this add an almost too casual 6-5 leap in the high jump. Hewitt set a pending national prep record of 25-10 3/4 earlier this year.

**PHOTO FINISH**

In the mile run trials, St. Ignatius' Klaus Hofmann kicked out with 100 yards to go and overhauled San Diego's Steve Becker in a beautifully run race that was won in 4:18.1.

But the battle for third was even more dramatic. Whittier's Doug Thompson was aced out when, after several reruns of a video tape, the judges declared Tay Thompson of Mt. Eden (Hayward) the No. 3 finisher by the skin of his neck.

Tay Thompson leaned his head at the finish, but since heads are not allowable in prep meets, the judges had to give him the nod because the base of his neck was further forward than his opponent's torso.



# County Has Five in State Meet Finals

San Mateo County sent five athletes into the Finals of the California State High School track and field championships at Berkeley this afternoon each hoping for a better fate than befell too many of their Peninsula brethren yesterday.

Almost three-fourths of this county's delegation to the 86th annual CIF meet succumbed to the rugged competition of the trials, which cut the original field of 206 athletes to none but the best.

Those who survived were mighty Jim Penrose, the Carmel weight man who qualified in both the shot put and discus, and Sequoia quarter-mile Dar-ryle White, a surprise third-place finisher in the last heat of his specialty.

Joining them for today's showdown competition at California's Edward Stadium were three two-milers, Chris Carey of Carmel, Arvid Kretz of Mills, and Steve Sides of Burlingame. Carey and Penrose were both expected to place in their respective events, with Penrose

avored to win the discus, even though his 172-5 qualifying mark trailed that of Rory Kenward, a San Marcos prep who threw 182-0.

Those who missed today's finals included Tom Lydon, the San Mateo pole vaulter who cleared 13 feet, but not the acceptable 14-6; the relay teams of Menlo-Atherton and Sequoia, who went to the sidelines despite seasonal best efforts; hurdlers Ashland Whitfield of South San Francisco and Jim Miller of Carmel, who just didn't have it, and sprinters Russ Col-

trell (SSP) and Bill Hatcher (M-A), who didn't have enough. Menlo-Atherton's 440 relay team turned in a 47.8 mark to finish fourth, one place out of the finals, and Sequoia's mile relay combo clocked 3:22.5 for fifth in the second heat.

Hatcher clocked 16.1 with a seventh in his heat of the 100 while Cottrell was dead last one heat earlier at 16.3. Hatcher came back with a game try in the 200, but ran 22.2 for fourth.

In the high hurdles, Miller was dead last in the first heat and Whitfield took a 13.1 eighth

in the third. The Warrior junior also finished out of the money with a seventh-place 18.8 in the 100.

Penrose got off a lifetime best of 58-10 in the shot put to finish fifth among the qualifiers while White ran 68.5 in his event. Trial marks in the field events do not carry over into the final, Centennial High School of Compton lived up to expectations as the favorite for the team championships. The Apaches qualified in five slots, chiefly off the durable talents of Edsel Garrison, a tough runner

who should bring his team its third State title.

Garrison ran a 47.5 quarter to lead all qualifiers in that event, churned to a 4.3 victory in his heat of the 100, and anchored an Apache mile relay team that clocked 3:13.8 to equal the best mark ever by a California team. Centennial also came through with the best 440 relay mark of the afternoon (41.5) and qualified Tom White, who anchored same, in the 200.

Centennial's home town rival, Compton High School, qualified

in four spots along with Merced, Pittsburg, Lincoln of San Diego and Roosevelt of Fresno.

A total of 10 youngsters went into the finals of the 860, their number augmented by the presence of Clayton Valley's Bill Bone, who did not finish his heat when he fell, face-first, to the track after being fouled. Judges awarded him a place in the finals as a result.

A crowd of 9,000 turned out for the first day's competition in the 86th annual renewal of the Nation's finest prep meet.

BERKELEY — High school athletes will journey from the desert, the mountains, Smogville and Fogville to take part in the 50th running of the California Interscholastic Federation's State Track and Field Meet at the University of California's Edward's Field this weekend.

Activities get under way Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock and conclude Saturday at 4:15 p.m. in a meet that will determine the State's only official high school champion.

The meet hasn't even started and two records already have fallen. The entry list includes 506 athletes from 215 of the

state's high schools. Both figures are record breakers.

This year's meet, hosted by Carlmont High under the direction of Loren Lansberry, Don Berry, and Andy Darby, will vary little from the previous 49, including the fact that Southern California is a heavy favorite to walk (or run) away with most of the medals.

The host school has the man favored to become the SPAL's first state champion since 1956 in Jim Penrose, who last year placed in the discus and this year is the state leader in that event at 181-11.

Ron Larrieau of Palo Alto was the league's last state champ, winning the mile in 1956 at

Chico.

But when a section has high jumpers that go over the bar at 6-10 and 24-foot long jumpers that don't even qualify, you know it has a few athletes doing more than just inhaling smog.

For instance, Centennial and Compton Highs, both of Compton, are going at this meet as if it were a dual meet and are the premeet co-favorites.

Centennial has a 440-yard relay team that toured the track in 41.3 and a 9.9 sprinter in Tom White and a 9.7 century trotter in Edesel Garrison. When Garrison isn't smoking up the runway, he's resting for the 440 where he brings in the fastest qualifying time of 47.5.

Centennial's mile relay team also holds a slight margin over Lincoln of San Diego in the four-lapper with a time of 3:16.6.

Compton has plenty of sprinters and middle distance runners, but what people talk about most down south are its high jumpers. Reynaldo Brown and Patrick Bradford take turns beating each other around the seven-foot mark.

Otis Haley of Wasco (near Fresno) will give the fans plenty to cheer about in the high jump. Haley, who stands a shade under six feet, has cleared the bar this year at 7-1 $\frac{3}{4}$ .

Other Southern California notables in the field events are Compton's Leonard Herring,

who has cleared 15-4 in the pole vault and Robert Richards, son of former Olympic champion and Wheaties hero, Bob Richards, who is a consistent 15-foot vaulter.

But everything won't be a bowl of sour grapes for the Northern California cindermen, thanks to Penrose, Chris Carey, Brad Lyman, Ralph Show, Tom Phillips, Darryl White, Jim Miller and Heulon Hewitt.

These NorCal runners, throwers and jumpers are depended upon to garnish most of the upper part of the State's points.

Merced's Hewitt is the best bet to get a gold medal in the long jump as he presently has a (See Carey, Pg. 18, Col. 1)

# Penrose, White In State Finals

BERKELEY — The Central Coast Section qualified more athletes than ever in the California Interscholastic Federation Track and Field Championships at University of California Friday, but that still won't prevent Southern California from walking away with most of the awards.

After the 506 participants from 215 of California's high schools battled on a picturesque day for track here, the CCS had 20 returning for today's finals.

Although the number could be matched by almost any Southern California section, or doubled by most for that matter, it is the most by any Northern California section.

Homestead's Phil Quinet was the only section leader going into the finals as he surprised many by long jumping 24-5 to

lead the qualifying field, which includes Merced's Heulon Dixon (23-7¼) who last month set a national prep record.

Carlmont's Jim Penrose, the premeet favorite in the discus, will have his work cut out for him this afternoon.

Big Jim qualified second in his specialty behind Rory Kenward of San Marcos High of Santa Barbara. Kenward got off four throws over 180 feet (two in practice) and had a best of 182-0 compared to Penrose's 178-5.

Field event marks in trials do not carry over to the finals like they do in section, region and league championship meets.

Penrose also qualified in the shot put with a fifth place heave of 58-10. The leader after a day's work with the steel ball was Ygnacio Valley's Rolin Luka, who hurled it 62-7¼.

Premeet favorite Centennial High of Compton seemed to make believers out of most of

the 5,000 fans on hand as it qualified in most events it entered, including leading both relays and the 100 and 440, thanks to sprinter Edesel Garrison.

Garrison won the century in 9.8 ahead of Los Altos' Brad Lyman (9.9). Menlo-Atherton's Bill Hatcher, after giving it all he had in a losing effort to qualify the Bears' 440 relay team, lost out in the crowd in the 100 and just missed a berth in the 220.

Garrison appeared to be loafing around the cinders in the 440, but still managed a best-of-life 47.5 to nail down the favorite's role in that race. Sequoia's Darryl White was the No. 9 qualifier in the event with a 49.5 clocking.

The only shockers came in the field events, but they meant little as today's marks determine the medal winners.

Talk around the Cal oval was that sometime today there would be a new record in the mile by either Klaus Hofman of St. Ignatius, Steve Becker (Kearney, San Diego) or Clifton West of Sacramento (4:12.8 Friday), and that the two-mile, which Carlmont's Chris Carey is tabbed to finish in the money, may go under nine minutes.

Other SPAL entries that failed to make the finals were Sequoia's mile relay team, Carlmont's hurdler Jim Miller and Palo Alto's Bill Respini in the 880.
