lead Cleveland K. of C. indoor meet

CLEVELAND, Feb. 22 - During a meet marked by generally stiff competition but a paucity of record-cracking, The Philadelphia Pioneer Club nipped arch-rival Sports International to record a swift 3:16.2 mlg in the Cleveland Knights of Columbus' 29th annual indoor meet tonight.

A sellout throng of 9,985 saw the Pioneers account for the only 1959 clocking of meet record as they brought it down from Morgan State's 3:18 for this 12-lap to the mile oval. The Sports International Club ran 3:16.6, and now these two teams have met eight times this winter, with only 1.4 seconds separating them in total time for all their clashes.

For the Pioneers, Chuck McPherson began with Craig Nation ran 49.4, Pete Schuder 4800 and Jim Burnett 48.2. Sports International was in close contention with John Collins, Mark Young, Andy Bell and Clympian Ed Roberts until the latter, who had previously run the open 440, faded a trifle although he clocked 48.3. Best leg in the race, however, was a 47.3 by the Ann Arbor Track Club's Kent Bernard, who was closing well in the last 150 yards. Bernard, like Roberts, was a member of the Trinidad-Tobago mile relay team that set the world outgood record of 3102.8 in 1966.
