Northeast won 12 of 17 events and turned an expected close meet into a rout, winning its seventh straight title in its own invitational by the biggest margin ever.

Coach Bob Groseclose's Indians, receiving outstanding performances from John Hollingsworth, Sylvester McKinney, Joe Profit and their 440 - yard relay team, totaled 119 points.

That was 42½ more than Louisiana Tech's 76½ and topped the Indians' previous best margin of victory, 38½, over Southwestern in 1966. Northeast has won the meet every year since it originated in 1963.

Improving Northwestern was third with 30 points. East Texas State fourth with 15 and Dallas Baptist fifth with 12½.

Hollingsworth and Tech's Bill Ebarb were the only double winners in the meet, which saw only one Brown Stadium record fall.

Hollingsworth, getting back in form after two off weeks, won

the discus with a throw of 169-4¾. It was the first time since the Texas Relays, April 10, that the big senior had topped the 160 - foot mark.

He had earlier won the shot put with a good throw of 54-1¼.

Ebarb sailed 23-2-4 to win the long jump over teammate Glenn Ferachi's 22-11½. He came back to win the triple jump with a 46-0½.

Profit and McKinney clocked their best efforts of the season in the 100 and 220 - yard dashes, respectively.

Profit, finally rounding into top form, clocked a 9.5 in the century dash, nipping McKinney for the first time this year. McKinney had a 9.6.

McKinney won the 220 in 21.2, the best time in the Gulf States Conference this season and brightening Northeast's hopes for the conference title in next week's GSC meet at Ruston High School.

Profit, running in the second heat, took second in the 220 curved event.

Tech's Don King, who beat McKinney in both race in a triangular at Tech two weeks ago, failed to place in the 100 and didn't run the 220.

In the first event of the night, the 440 - yard relay, Northeast turned in their best effort and tied the GSC's top clocking. The foursome of Profit, Ricky Smith, Jeff Rowdon and McKinney, clocked a 41.0, equalling Tech's effort in that same triangular.

Tech's Mike Guzman set the only stadium record, winning the javelin with a toss of 237-7, bettering the old record of 225-11½ by Louis Lenfant of Southwestern in 1967.

The toss was also more than 10 feet better than the previous best GSC mark this year. That was 226-0c by McNeese's A. J. Seymour.

Northeast's Jack McDougall tied the Brown Stadium mark in the high jump, one he had set in a quadrangular earlier this season. The senior ace, who cleared 7 - foot at Northwestern's Relays, went 6-8, well ahead of teammate Milton Grubbs, who was second in 6-4.

Freshman Joe Ross from Monroe Richwood continued his rapid improvement in the 440 - yard dash, winning with a time of 47.8. He knocked two - tenths of a second off his previous best, 48.0, which he clocked in the Tech triangular.

Rowdon, after running on the 440 - relay unit came back to win the 880 - yard dash in 1:54.0. However, because of the death of his father, had to leave the meet early and did not run on the mile relay team.

Northeast won the event with the team of McKinney, Robert Floyd, Larry Beebe and Ross in a somewhat slow time of 3:15.4. Louisiana Tech won both hur-

die events taking a 1-2-3 finish in the highs when Northeast's Richard Polk pulled up after hitting a hurdle. Phil O'Bryant won in 14.2 and teammate Wayne Mollere was second with the same time.

Ken Rorie won the 440 - yard intermediates in 53.3 with Northeast's Jimmy Stewart second in 53.8.
