

Michael Sets Mile Mark, W&M Tops Irish In Track

WILLIAMSBURG — Sophomore Howell Michael moved closer to his goal of bettering four minutes in the mile here

Tuesday afternoon, leading William and Mary to an 84-70 prestige track victory over powerful Notre Dame.

Michael thrilled the Cary field crowd of nearly 3,000 with

a 4:03.3 performance on a beautiful day that was replete with sparkling showings by both teams.

The Tribe standout broke his own school mark of 4:04.8 set last May in the Southern conference meet at Fort Eustis. He also erased the Cary Field standard of 4:07.7 established in 1966 by ex-William and Mary star Jimmy Johnson.

"I felt great and couldn't have been competing under more ideal conditions," Michael said after taking another first place in the 3,000-meter steeplechase. "I ran my first lap in the mile a little faster than I wanted (58 seconds flat), but the rest of the race went more or less like we planned."

the half and 3:03.5 for the three-quarters.

Six Cary Field records fell during the exciting afternoon and Notre Dame accounted for the other five.

The big man for the Irish, as expected, was Bill Hurd, the world class sprinter who turned down an academic scholarship to Massachusetts Institute of Technology to attend the football-famous Indiana school. He just missed being selected as a Rhodes Scholar.

Hurd's confrontations with Tribe sophomore Mike Fratkin helped attract the crowd and the husky Notre Dame senior made the most of the spotlight.

The well-coordinated Memphis athlete captured the 100-yard dash in a record-shattering 9.4 seconds running into the wind and came back to knock eight-tenths of a second off the record for the 220 on a curve with a blistering 21.1.

Fratkin, who held the old marks of 9.6 and 21.9, was well back in both races with clockings of 9.8 and 21.7.

Bad luck cost Notre Dame a record and victory in the 440 relay in which the team of Ole Skarstein, Jack Samar, Tom Buckley and Hurd was clocked in 41.6. Hurd, the anchorman, See Notre, Page 18, Cols. 1-2

was disqualified for starting too far back.

Ed Broderick of Notre Dame and Burce Dallas of William and Mary each cleared 6-10 in the high jump, but the Irish star won on fewer misses. Both broke their own school standards by one inch.

The 880 resulted in one of the best finishes of the afternoon with Notre Dame's Rick Wohlehuter edging the Tribe's Juris Luzins as both were caught in a record 1:50.7. Their performance wiped out the 1:52.6 mark established by Larry Williams of Virginia Military Institute in 1960.

Mike McMannon of the Irish defeated Southern Conference champion Scott McLennan in both the long and triple jumps, setting Cary Field mark of 48-10 3/4 in the latter event. He went 24-6 3/4 on his first try in his long jump success.

The day's only other double winner was Notre Dame weightman Elio Palselli, who took the shot put at 53-4 and the discus with a record 166-5.

William and Mary's depth eventually told the story, Coach John Randolph's charges winning 12 of a possible 16 second places although being edged, 10-8, in firsts.
