THAIS LOSING REPUTATION AS SEAP OVERALL CHAMPIONS

Dec. 9

RANGOON, Tues.—Thailand continued to lose her SEAP reputation as overall champion yesterday on the second day of competition here, winning only three golds in judo, swimming and tennis.

Host nation Burma, however, went on amassing gold to stand 17 up at the close with Singapore also catching Thailand up with five golds, Malaysia having captured three. Both South Vietnam and Laos have yet to win a gold.

It is quite obvious that the standard of athletics of the Burmese has gone up by leaps and bounds. In every sport here, they have shown remarkable ability, and they

have been coached on the correct lines. Two sports in particular which Burma was considered backward in—badminton and tennis—have produced athletes whose performances are little short of a revelation. In tennis, both Somparn Champisri and Netr Grammatica were taken to five gruelling sets by their Burmese opponents in the men's singles, and in badminton, both the men and women of Burma surprised foreign contingents by their overall standard.

The decline of Thai amateur boxing standards is also a subject of comment among journalists here. Burma goes into today's finals with seven out of eight boxers, while Thailand—sweeping winners in 1967—have only five left, and out of these, only two appear favoured to win golds—Bantao Srisuk and Virat Vilalak in the light welter and welter divisions.

In track and field, the Burmese keep on racking up impressive performances, one of the best thing Jimmy Crampton's fine double when he beat R. Subramaniam of Malaysia in a thrilling 1,500 metres to take the middle distance events. Another double was performed by Burma's freak Khin Pu, who added the 100 metres women

gold to her javelin win on the first day. She appears certain to win the 200 metres and possibly another in the 4 x 100 metres relay. Canasabai Kunalan of Singapore, running in fine style, broke Dr M. Jegathesan's 200 metres record when he breaststoked the tape in 21 secs. flat to record a fine sprint double. In the 100 metres, Kunala equalled the Games record of 10.4 secs. set by Thailand's Suthi Manyakas in 1959.

The Thailand-Burma soccer game was notable for the sturdy defence put up by Thailand after taking an opening 1-0 lead through Kriengsak Nukulompratana in the 11th minute.

Outstanding in the defence were centre half Suppakit Meelarakit, Pallop Maklamthong and left half Vivit Teesopa. Ye Nyunt with a brilliant goal in the 69th minute, saved the day for Burma, who now meet the winners of Vietnam-Laos on December 10, while Thailand face Malaysia in the first game on the same day.

Malaysia to host next games

RANGOON, Tuesday — Malaysia this morning rescued the Sixth SEAP Games when she accepted to host it either in 1971 as scheduled or early in 1972.

In allowing Malaysia to host the next games, the SEAP Games Council agreed to let Malaysia omit swimming if she was unable to have proper facilities to stage it.

The SEAP Games Council had a special meeting this morning to decide on the venue of the next games as Singapore had declined to stage it and there was no other country prepared to accept it.

When the council meeting resumed today, chief Singapore delegate Chan Chee Seng reiterated that Singapore was unable to stage the 1971 SEAP Games as her facilities would not be ready by then.

Chan added that he had written to the minister in charge of sports in Singapore as requested by the council at the last meeting and had received a negative reply.

Enche Khaw Kai Boh, the Malaysian Minister of the Council, in accepting to stage the games in Malaysia said that a number of sports facilities were being reconstructed as Malaysia was preparing to stage the 1974 Asian Games. Under the circumstances, Malaysia was prepared to accept it according

to the facilities available Khaw said.

He pointed out that the swimming facilities in Malaysia were very inadequate as there was only a public swimming pool and they were not in a position to stage the swimming events in accordance with the requirements.

Khaw said swimming was one of the compulsory events in the SEAP Games and as such Malaysia would be in a very difficult position.

The council then agreed to allow Malaysia to waive swimming if it was unable to stage it.

When the special council meeting resumed this morning, President of the SEAP Games Federation, Col. Hla Han told the council that a telegram was sent to Malaysia Deputy Prime Minister Tun Abdul Razak to consider staging the games in view of the inability of Singapore to stage the games. He thanked Malaysia for having come to the rescue of the Sixth SEAP Games.

Five SEAP Games have so far been staged. By Burma (twice), Thailand (twice) and Malaysia (once). — AFP

BURMA'S 'WONDER BOY'

Dec. 9 BAGS 3rd GOLD

RANGOON, Tues — Burma's new sporting hero, distance runner Jimmy Crampton, won his third gold medal of the Southeast Asia Peninsular Games (SEAP) today.

Crampton, a 19-year-old schoolboy, overcame the determined challenge of the experienced Singapore and Malaysian runners to clinch the 5,000 metres final in a record 15 minutes 20 seconds.

The old record of 15 minutes 33.2 seconds was set by Malaysia's R. Subramaniam in the 1967 SEAP Games in Bangkok.

Singapore's Avtar Singh and Malaysia's A. Ramasamy burst into the lead in the last 200 metres of the race and looked certain to edge out Burma's "wonder boy."

The crowd of 40,000 kept up a steady chant of "Jimmy, Jimmy," as Crampton flashed to the finish line a few yards ahead of his rivals.

It was a great victory for Crampton, a virtual newcomer to international athletics who earlier won the 800 and 1,500 metre races.

The silver medal went to Avtar Singh who breasted the tape in 15 minutes 20.2 seconds, 1.9. seconds ahead of bronze medalist Ramasamy.

Burma's Khin Pu also brought her gold medal total to three when she won the women's 200 metres final today in a record 25.4 seconds —0.1 seconds better than the previous record held by Thailand's Y. Busabong.

Khin Pu had earlier won

the 100 metre sprint and the women's javelin final.

Singapore's Glory Barnabas took the 200-metre silver medal, clocking 26.0 seconds for the event. The bronze went to Malaysia's Fazilah Ahmad whose time was 26.2 seconds.

Malaysia's Nashatar Singh who won the javelin yesterday, scored a double when he captured the shotput gold today.

His throw of 14.32 metres was 0.1 metres better than his nearest rival, Burma's Sar Law Lar.

Another Burmese, Thein Win, took the bronze with a throw of 13.80 metres.

Mahmud Mansoor of Singapore smashed his own two-year-old SEAP record in the

pole vault final, w event with a leap of tres, 0.1 metres b his old record.

Two Burmese Kyaw Zaw and Mau Mra, won the silver ze medals clearing at 4.00 metres.

MARATHON GIVES BURMA 20 GOLDS

RANGOON, ^{P. 1}Thursday — Veteran long distance runner, Sumbwegan, won the marathon today to give Burma its 20th gold medal in the athletic events of the Fifth South East Asia Peninsular (SEAP) Games.

The Burmese athletics haul at the end of these events today was 13 more than runner-up Malaysia could accumulate. Singapore had six golds while Thailand got one.

In the women's volleyball final Burma beat Singapore 3-0, while in the men's tennis singles final, Maung Maung Lay of Burma beat Somporn Champisri of Thailand 1-6, 4-6, 6-2, 6-1, 7-5.

Singapore's Tan Lek Hiang and Peck Noi Woy triumphed over Malaysia's Ong Mooi Mooi and Chong Suk in the women's table tennis doubles final 3-1, and the men's doubles gold medal went to South Vietnam's Le Van Inn and Tran Thanh Doung who won over Malaysian pair Soon Poh Wah and Lim Hee Peng 3-1.

The men's basketball gold medal went to Thailand following its thrilling 72-64 win over Malaysia, while the women's gold medal went to the Malaysian cagers who beat Burma.

TIGHT SECURITY ON THE DAY FOR THAIS

RANGOON, Thurs—On a day when Thailand had her biggest haul of golds in the five-day-old Fifth SEAP Games here, it was ironic that student disturbances last night disrupted the even tenor of sports activities to the point where two events were cancelled — one of them at the starting point.

Tight security clamped down on university students, when all colleges and the Rangoon University were closed down by the order of the Government, who were concerned about the safety and security of visiting athletes, officials and VIP's.

The 42.195 kms marathon — the big centrepiece of the games and one which everyone expected local hero Sum-bwegam to win in a canter — was cancelled by games officials minutes before it was due to start. The athletes from all six participating countries were in various stages of warm-up at 1 a.m., when they were informed the event had been cancelled. The competitors then suggested that the event be staged the following day today, but no definite word was given. It was even suggested the race should be run inside the Aung San Stadium rather than cancel it altogether, but in the circumstances, it all looks as if the marathon might not be run at all.

who is also Organising Committee Chairman of the Sixth Asian Games in Bangkok in 1970. It was ironic again that their arrival here coincided with the unfortunate disruption of the games the night before and carried over into today.

The talk of all visiting contingents here is the fantastic form shown by Burma's athletes in every sport they have participated. Despite their obvious problems in terms of facilities, their improvement is something

phenomenal, and Thailand for one will have to struggle hard to catch up with their quality in the near future.

There is little doubt that Burma will walk away with the unofficial games championship for the second time in these contests, but what is amazing is the fact that in sports where they have not been considered in the top bracket, they have smothered the opposition — surprisingly in tennis, badminton and even basketball. In shooting, the

Burmese have put Thailand in second place, but astonishingly, the defeat of the Thai yachting squad, who will not win a single gold, is something to think about for the future, especially with the Sixth Asian Games coming up next year.

Yesterday, both Gen Prapas and ACM Dawee watched Thailand achieve a magnificent 3-0 victory over Malaysia in the soccer semi-final, and earlier they presented gold medals to the winning Thai marksmen in the free pistol

Should this happen, it will be the first time in the history of the SEAP Games that this has occurred.

The judo contest which is being staged at the Arts and Sciences University Convocation Hall was also postponed to Friday, December 12. The venue has also had to be changed as a result of the disturbances.

This morning too, Deputy Prime Minister and Thailand's Olympic Committee President Gen Prapass Charusathira, arrived in Rangoon, accompanied by Minister of Communications, Air Chief Marshal Dawee Chullasapya,

While Patricia Chan seems certain to rack up yet another record haul of golds — she is a much more mature swimmer today — the performance of Burmese swimming ace Nanda Kyaw Swor, who has so far won three golds and one silver is one of the sensations of the games. The young swimmer took the 100 metres butterfly, the 200 metres butterfly events, and picked up a third in the 4 × 100 metres medley relay. His silver came in the 4 × 100 metres medley relay. Nanda surprised everyone here when he beat Singapore's much-toted Alex Chan in the 200 metre butterfly event. He is certain to add to his tally before the games ends.

Thailand's men's 4 × 100 metre relay quartet had to be content with a silver when a faulty baton change in the final lap saw Surapong Ariyamonkol slowly away to be overtaken by Malaysia's P. Rajalingam and lose what appeared a certain gold.

Another mishap befell Prayul Manha, considered a good gold prospect in the decathlon. Prayul injured his leg in the hurdles race Tuesday, and found difficulty in walking. He is going through with the rest of his events, but only for the sake of competing. A gold is most certainly out.

In tennis, the Vietnamese proved superior to both Somparn Champisri and Netr Grammatica in every respect. In both singles and doubles competition, Vo Van Bay and Vo Van Thanh outplayed the Thais in respect of strokeplay and stamina. Netr was a spent force at the end of four sets with Vo Van Bay, who gave Somparn a tennis lesson in a straight set maul, winning the final set at love. The Vietnamese waltzed over Somparn and Netr in the doubles in straight sets.

Thailand's two women — Somsri Chotchuti and Panao Sudsawasdi — who faced each other in the women's singles final for the umpteenth time, once again turned in a marathon. In three hours of thrust and parry, Somsri won the gold in three long drawn-out sets.

Dear Dick,

I'm sorry about the delay in getting these results to you. There wasn't much good in them as it was, and I had a very difficult time getting any results. I had applied for my visa to Rangoon just after I received the T&F credentials. That gave the Burmese government 2 months. They didn't grant the visa until the 5th of December and then sent it to me by sea mail. I got it on the 8th - 1/2 way through the games. When I got there, all newsmen were limited to the most expensive hotel and could not attend half of the games events because of rioting in Rangoon. In fact, as you will see from the clippings, the marathon had to be postponed.

I then went to Northern Thailand (Chiangmai) where I collected results from the Bangkok post - since they were more complete and better reported than I could do. I couldn't even see any of my friends in the Malaysian contingent.

Right now it looks like I'm going to work here in Thailand until next September. I'll keep my eyes open for anything on the Asian Games and send it in to you.
