

# Meet Records Galore Fall As Spartans Crush Injun

six new Spartan-Indian dual meet best-ever claimants, lost out, too, because they didn't accomplish what Winter set for them.

However, Bud didn't get away without some spending.

Weight-man John Powell doubled up on him with his 186-11 in the discus and 50-1½ in the shot. Neville Myton, the swift-moving Jamaican, cut himself in with a 1:50.5 880 in which he easily handled Pete Fairchild, despite the Stanford soph's best of life 1:52.5.

And Marion Anderson, who had a 25-5 long jump wiped out by the gusty breezes, but had an unassisted meet record leap of 25-1¼ to go into the books, and Adrian Porter, with still another meet standard setting 50-6½ in the triple jump, also "dined" at Winter's expense.

Despite the heroics of some of Payt Jordan's scrappy troopers — Fairchild, Rick Tipton, Tom Colby and Allen Sanford, among others — the Indians never offered up too much argument.

They won the javelin (with Colby's 238-10), the mile (with Sanford's 4:10.0), the high hurdles (with Tipton's windpushed 13.9) and the 2 miles in which the surprising Chuck Menz staved off Spartan Ralph Gamez in a stretch thriller that finished

so tight that both men were credited with 5:57.4 clockings.

For Tipton, the powerful soph from New Mexico, it marked continuation of a string of unbroken dual meet hurdle victories started in his high school days and running through his Stanford Frosh and varsity competition.

The blond youngster, also gave the Indians what were to be short-lived leads in both the 440 and mile relays and his triumph over San Jose's Caruthers, although tainted by the over-the-limit aiding wind, was a sizzler.

Jim Kauffman, the brilliant all-around frosh star of last season, also cheered coach Jordan with his first track action of the year following completion of his rugby activity.

Marks, the Spartan strong man, continued to befuddle all observers, among them yesterday, Bill Nieder, America's 1960 Olympic gold medalist at Rome, who served as judge of the shot.

Despite a painful shin splint, his flat-footed stance, concern over catching a plane to L.A., where he competed in the state weightlifting championships last night, Marks, on his first try, "oomphed" the 16-pound ball out two inches better than the school mark of 60-5 he set last week.

This was the fifth straight meet in which the southpaw, who insists that his comely blonde girl friend, Pam Holland, be seated near the putting ring, racked up a best ever.

"It's amazing," was all Nieder could say. "If he can do what he does from a standing position, where'll the ball go if he takes the usual run at it?"

Winter, perfectly satisfied with what Marks has been doing, isn't about to intrude and change things.

Powerful John Carlos won the 100 with a wind-aided 9.3, the 220 in 20.4 to tie the track record set by Tommie Smith in 1968 and anchored the 440 relay team to victory in 40.6.

Capt. Lee Evans was also a busy man, running a leg on the 440 relay team, winning the 440 in 47.2 and being clocked in 46.8 for his anchor mile relay leg as the Spartans won in 3:13.0.

Another outstanding performance was turned in by the Spartans' John Powell who won the discus with a seasonal best of 186-11. He had foul throws of 192 and 193.
