"It should be close between USC, Oregon State, Oregon and Washington State with UCLA a dangerous darkhorse."

That's how UCLA coach Jim Bush tabs this weekend's (May 16-17)
Pacific-8 Conference track and field championships at Corvallis, Ore.,
with Oregon State University serving as host.

"The Trojans and Beavers, both undefeated in dual meet competition, must be favored, but the Webfoots and Cougars also are mighty potent teams," coach Bush added. "And the Bruins cann't be counted out of it if we get come-through performances right down the line, especially from pole vaulter Jon Vaughn triple jumper Denny Rogers and weightman Russ Hodge, who are coming off injuries."

Bush also is hopeful that his speedy 440 and mile relay teams can win at Corvallis. His quarter-wile quartet of Reggie Robinson, Harold Busby, John Johnson and Wayne Pollett really impressed in posting a smooth 39.9 clocking behind San Jose State's super speedsters, headed by Olympians Ronnie Ray Smith and John Carlos, who won in 39.7 in the West Coast Relays at Freen last Saturday.

Also at Fresno UCLA's previously unbeaten mile relay team lost to Villanova in another close race. The Eastern flyers won in 3:06.9 while Bruins John Smith (47.5), Andy Young (48.0), Len Van Hofwegen (45.8) and Collett (45.5) posted a 3:07.3 clocking, one-of the fastest in the country this season, to date.

However, the Bruins won't be able to employ Smith at Corvallis because he is a freshman. Running the opening leg in his place will be either Joe Rippinger or Chip Minnick. With Rippinger, UCIA has a best of 3:09.9; with Minnick, a best of 3:10.4.

Another likely winner at Corvallis also performed in winning form at Fresno. He was pole vaulter Dick Railsback, who soared over 17-5 to beat world record holder Bob Seagren of USC and former record holder John Pennel, both of whom cleared only 17-0.

"I had real good power on one try at 18 feet, but I hit the bar on the way up," Railsback said. The world record, of course, is 17-9.

If Vaughn is ready to go all out, he and Railsback are both capable of beating Seagren in a key event at Corvallis. Vaughn hasn't really competed since March 29, however, because of a heel injury. Back on March 15 he cleared 17 feet.

But UCLA's deepest event is the 440 where Collett (45.8), senior Len Van Hofwegen (45.9) and soph Andy Young (47.1) are capable of scoring a 1-2-3 sweep at Corvallis. Last year, the Bruins came in one-two with Don Domansky winning and Van Hofwegen placing second.

Another exceptionally potent event for UCLA could be the shot put, with defending champion Steve Marcus (64-1) expected to repeat. He's backed up big two other good ones, soph Mark Ostoich (61-9 3/4) and senior Russ Hodge (59-112).

Besides such logical winners as Marcus and Collett and, very possibly, Railsback, the Bruins also are counting on John Johnson to be right there in the long jump. This 26-footer indicated he's reaching top form with a 25-2 wind-aided winning leap against USC earlier this month.

Capable of scoring points are such Bruins as high jumper Cary Ross (6-10), sprinters Reggie Robinson (9.4 wind-aided and 21.0) and Harold Busby (9.6), triple jumpers Denny Rogers (50-11 3/4) and Jerry Jackson (49-1 3/4), steeplechaser Dave Smith (9:05.4) and high hurdler Dan Kaiser (14.1).

The UCLA track party flies to Portland via Western Airlines flight No. 215. Following their arrival there at 4:40 p.m., They'll bus to Corvallis where they'll stay at the Towne House Motel. The Bruins return home Saturday night, arriving at the Los Angeles International
