Trojan hopes in the NCAA got a big shot in the arm from freshman Garrison. The Trojans had the best double of the day in two "special" exhibition races. Garrison started off with a 45.8 440, beating Bruin freshman John Smith who had 47.1 and tying Wayne Collett's track record in the process. He then ran the "special" 220 as a late entry and bested the likes of Tom Jones (21.0), Bob Grey, Jim Means and Dalton LeBlanc with a windy 20.5!

In the only other "exhibition" Bruin freshman Paul Williams lost the lead to Jim Kemp on the backstretch, then charged back to take the 880 1:51.5 to 1:51.9. Jere Vandyk, Dennis Carr, and Terry Donnelly also were entered in the race.

Well, that brings the 1969 dual meet season to a close. The only other meet I see on my schedule that you may not have a senior reporter covering is next weekend's PCAA championships (San Jose, Long Beach, San Diego, etc.) in Long Beach. I'll send in results from that meet, and also any bits of information I gather from J. C. and high school meets in the weeks ahead.

Dear Dick,

I didn't think I'd see the Kansas-UCza meet topped this year for "class" marks and drama, but this afternoon's UAC-UCza ^{dual} matched it and then some! The story of UAC's 94-60 win can be told in two words - lifetime bests. All told, Trojans posted best-ever marks thirteen times to four for the Bruins. And that doesn't count wind-aided efforts.

Only in three events, the two mile, decive, and javelin did the winner fail to meet T+FN's reporting standards. There were so many highlights, including a spectacular double by AC freshman Edesel Garrison, that I'll summarize event by event.

Lennox Miller was great, as usual, in the short sprints doubling with 9.3 W and 20.7. Fred Kuller "cheated" Wayne Collett out of expected second place finishes in both events with 9.4 W and a lifetime best 20.7, almost nabbing Miller in the furlong. Reggie Robinson also finished ahead of Collett in the 100.

Len Van Hofwegen gave UCza its second sub-46 runner in history as he blasted 45.9. Andy Young challenged briefly at the head of the stretch, then faded to 47.3 for second.

The Trojans' sweep in the 880 was a real picture of depth - only Carl Trentadue missed his lifetime best as all three runners swept under 1:49.0, a feat duplicated only once before (Oklahoma State, 1966). Trentadue ran 1:48.3, good enough for first; Dick Joyce, fulfilling the promise shown in high school 1:48.6, and

Howard Becker completed the whitewash with 1:48.7. The Bruins inserted a "rabbit" (Keith Braunman) to "burn out" the Trojans with a quick 53.0 quarter before dropping out. Joyce kept up the pace with a 1:20.5 660, Frenetadue sweeping by on the curve and Becker staying up close. Bruin Chip Minnick was never in it although he, too, ran a best-ever 1:50.8.

Ole Oleson led the last three laps of the mile enroute to a 4:04.0 lifetime best win. Trojan Bruce Bowman surprised everyone with a strong 4:06.0 effort, 3.4 seconds under his previous top. Bowman seemed to be gaining steadily on Oleson the last 220.

With the meet already clinched, Oleson dropped out of the 2 mile after 1000 yards. He began fading after the first quarter, clutching his side occasionally. With him out, the race went in a tactically slow 4:36.8 first mile, the lead changing hands at least once a lap. UBC's Jeff Marsee and Andy Hevity sprinted 60 second last laps, getting first and second comfortably with 9:02.4 and 9:03.4.

UCSD's Dave Smith returned to action after a month-long layoff and showed no ill effects as he outkicked Troy's Curtis Jones in the steeplechase 9:05.4 (best-ever) to 9:18.6. Jones led with 300 yards to go.

Wern Franklin ran his second straight 13.7 in the high hurdles. Tyrone Dutton won his pivotal dual for second with Bruin Dan Kaiser 14.0 to 14.5; Both ran side by side until Kaiser missed his step at the last hurdle.

The Frojans missed a sweep in the intermediates when Bob Seagren was disqualified for dropping his trail leg around the final two barriers. Franklin doubled with 51.8, Sutton moved up to second with his life best of 52.9. I had Seagren timed at 52.8.

The 440 relay was a thriller - and fast! Leadoff runners Peg Robinson and Rich Coulter ran even, but the Bruins gained a step with a better handoff. Fred Kuller made up the difference and added a yard over Hal Busby. Another poor Frojan handoff evened the teams, and long jumper Johnny Johnson "burned" Don Pharis by a good two yards. This time the Frojan pass was superb, Collett juggled the baton just long enough to give Ferris Miller a yard advantage out of the turn - they ran stride for stride down the straight and the yard held up 39.6 to 39.7.

UCFA set a record for "mile relay with 51.3 leadoff runner"! Mike Newton opened up a 25 yard lead over UCFA's Joe Rippinger. Collett made up 20 on the second leg to put the Bruins back in the race. Andy Young sprinted past Howard Becker around the first turn, but the gutty ex-Pierce star didn't quit and stayed within three yards, keeping UBC alive. Len Van Hofweger quashed any hopes of a Frojan upset as he stretched out to a 30 yard lead in the first 220, then coasted in as the Bruins matched their 3:09.9 in the Kansan meet.

The two vertical jumps provided "high drama" as both went to jumpoffs to decide first and second places. Each time Frojans emerged victorious. Park Kennedy cleared 6-10 after three regulation misses to beat Bruin Cary Fox.

The pole vault proved somewhat of a disappointment after pre-meet talk of a world record. Jon Vaughn opened with a 15-6 clearance as Bob Seagren and Dick Railsback both passed. Vaughn passed the next height, 16-0, as Seagren and Railsback were successful on their first attempts. Vaughn missed at 16-6, again Seagren and Railsback passed. Neither was successful in three regulation attempts at 17-0, but Seagren cleared it easily in the jump-off to clinch the win; Railsback didn't come close.

Johnny Johnson captured the long jump by more than a foot with a windy 25-2. With Denny Rogers out, Bruin Jerry Jackson took over in the triple jump with his best of the year, 49-1 $\frac{3}{4}$. UC's Howard Pratt fell one inch short of his season high with 48-5 $\frac{1}{2}$.

In the shot put, the psyched-up Frojans all reached best-ever distances, while the Bruins tailed off a bit. Even so, UCLA's Steve Marcus and Mark Ostovich got first and second with 62-4 $\frac{3}{4}$ and 60-10 $\frac{1}{2}$ respectively. Trojan Dave Murphy came from last place to third, 57-0 to 60-5 $\frac{1}{2}$ on his last throw of the prelims, then improved to 60-7 in the finals. Tom Colich missed the 60 foot club by one-quarter inch with his first put of the day, but he injured his wrist and had foul difficulty after that. John Buehler improved 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ feet to 59-4 $\frac{3}{4}$; heavily taped Russ Hodge could manage "only" 58-8 and 58-7 $\frac{1}{4}$ on his two legal puts.

The discus was the real clincher for UCLA; the Trojan upended the expected ~~with~~ 6-3 UCLA win with a 9-0 whitewash right on the heels of the 880 sweep. Joe Antunovich led with 174-8.
